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President's Blunt Warning Warmly Welcomed

FREEDOM OF THE SEAS

Australia Now Able To Extend Her War Effort

President Roosevelt's broadcast on Saturday, following closely on the recent declarations of his Presidential opponent, Mr Wendell Willkie, has given what the Press here feels is authentic notice in unmistakable terms of where the United States stands on the great moral issues which took Britain into the war against Hitlerism and where the American people will continue to stand until all danger to the ideals of freedom, justice, and neighbourliness among nations is overthrown.

The London "Daily Telegraph" hails the speech as the most forthright answer yet given to the Axis-Japanese pact, saying: "The President has re-stated his country's intentions with a new emphasis. He has placed the widest possible interpretation upon its policy of defending the Western Hemisphere against acts of aggression, reminding all whom it may concern that not merely the territories of the American continent and its adjacent islands are guaranteed by that policy, but also the peaceful use of the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans—a traditional principle of American diplomacy which has been ignored before with disastrous results to the challenger. With this, President Roosevelt combines a perfectly clear assurance upon a matter which more nearly concerns Britain and those peoples who in any way are able to act with her as combatants. No combination of dictator countries of Europe and Asia," said Mr Roosevelt, "will prevent the help we are giving to almost the last free people fighting to hold them at bay." That is as plain as words can make it.

No Intimidation "The Times" says: "If the pact with Japan is designed to intimidate America its failure has been disastrous. The President's broadcast has left no doubt where the United States stands and how it regards the pact. On the eve of a bitterly contested election the President could not have spoken as he did in this vigorous and uncompromising pronouncement if he had not been speaking for the great majority of the country."

The same point is made by the "Daily Herald," which writes: "Whoever wins, the pledge to help Britain stands. Mr Willkie sees his duty as clearly as Mr Roosevelt." The President's answer to the Axis threats have evoked admiring comment from other parts of the Empire. The Melbourne "Argus" says: "The President's bluntness is welcomed throughout the Empire. He has explicitly pledged the United States to give protection to the entire Western Hemisphere. The President's words mean that we will not be left solely to our own devices if we are menaced from the north."

Wholehearted Help "As a corollary to this, our participation in the Empire's struggle can be fully as wholehearted as the people of Australia wish it to be. Australia's first line of defence is necessarily naval. With the assurance that the United States is vitally interested in the Pacific, we can count on full strength where it can be used to the greatest advantage."

JAPANESE HINTS TO SOVIET "Beware Of Britain" WARNING AGAINST AMERICA Trading Difficulties

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received October 16, 0.10 a.m.) TOKYO, Oct. 15. The "Asahi Shimbun's" Hsinking correspondent reports that the new Ambassador (M. Tatekawa) who has left for Moscow, said that Japan does not need to worry about the reported Anglo-American rapprochement and overtures to the Soviet. He claimed that the wiser policy for the Soviet would be to be friendly with neighbouring Japan rather than the "shake hands with distant America."

The Soviet is undoubtedly aware that she cannot ignore Japan's naval strength," he added. "It would also be difficult to continue trade with America without previously securing Japanese-Soviet relations." M. Tatekawa added that he would start negotiations with the Soviet with a clean slate. He was not taking over where M. Togo had left off.

"SHREWD MOVE" BY LABOUR

CLAIM TO LEADERSHIP AT CANBERRA

OFFER TO PARTIES Country Members At Loggerheads

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received October 16, 0.35 a.m.) CANBERRA, Oct. 15. The problem of which political party will have the future government of Australia was advanced another stage to-day when the Federal Labour Party decided to appoint a committee to initiate discussions with the authorised representatives of all other parties, also with the two independents, Messrs Coles and Wilson, "with a view to securing their co-operation in the strengthening of the war effort and to ensure that Parliament can carry on effectively in the present grave and perilous situation."

The foregoing decision was communicated to the representatives of the other parties, which met later in the day. The precise number to constitute the Labour Committee will be decided when the replies are received from the other parties. The Rt. Hon. R. G. Menzies had a conference this afternoon with members of Cabinet after the receipt of Labour's invitation, which, in the opinion of the Government supporters, is a shrewd move to take the initiative from Mr Menzies.

Manoeuvring Another interesting sidelight on the political deadlock was the manoeuvring for the leadership of the Country Party on which the party is at loggerheads. The Victorians are dissatisfied with Mr Cameron and have nominated the Minister of External Affairs (Mr McEwan) against him, resulting in Mr Cameron refusing nomination and angrily quitting the meeting. Sir Earle Page immediately came into the picture and was nominated against Mr McEwan, a ballot resulting in eight votes each. The meeting then adjourned with the object of trying to induce Mr Cameron to return and record his vote and thus settle the leadership. No previous meeting of the party has ever been so acrimonious. At a further meeting of the Country Party a second ballot ended the same way—eight all, after which the deputy leader of the party, Mr A. W. Fadden, who is Minister for Air, was asked to lead the party until the deadlock is overcome. Mr Menzies was re-elected unopposed leader of the United Australian Party at its meeting.

Prime Minister's Letter The Prime Minister to-night sent a letter to Mr Curtin wherein he said: "I am treating your letter of to-day conveying your party's decision as in substance a reply to the proposal made at Melbourne recently for the formation of a National Government. I suppose I am right in assuming that the nature of the proposal adopted by your party indicates that discussions between the party managers might usefully take place."

Acting on that assumption, Mr Menzies has extended an invitation to Mr Curtin and two of his colleagues to attend a conference with representatives of the Government parties at 11 a.m. to-morrow. Mr Menzies informed Mr Curtin that he is sending a similar invitation to the leader of the Non-Communist Labour Party, Mr Beasley.

Broadcast By Parents WEEKLY PROGRAMME May Speak To Children Safe In Canada A. B.B.C. NOVELTY

British Official Wireless. (Received October 15, 7.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 14. Parents whose children have been sent to Canada under the Children's Overseas Reception Board scheme are to be given the opportunity of speaking direct to girls and boys in the Dominions. Princess Elizabeth's message inaugurated a new weekly programme in the B.B.C. North American service called: "For the Children." In part of this programme each week children from every part of Britain will be given a chance of hearing their parents' voices and it is hoped to be possible to let the children know in advance that some one from their own district will be speaking to them in the next week's programme.

U.S. AMBASSADOR TO BRITAIN Unconfirmed Report Of Resignation

Axis Turns Pincers Towards Britain's Eastern Stronghold

(British Official Wireless.) (Received October 15, 7.35 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 14.

Discussing the Balkan thrust "The Times" says: "Hitler has been compelled to recognise that his blitzkrieg against Britain is yielding no prospects of victory and none of those quick and dramatic results necessary for his prestige at home and abroad. Spain, in spite of the blandishments lavished on Senor Suner, has not committed herself, as far as can be divined, to departure from her watchful attitude. "Marshal Graziani has had time to experience some uncomfortable realities in his campaign launched against Egypt at a moment when the German bombers were supposed to be on the point of reducing London to ruins."

"The line of least resistance must have seemed to lead through the Balkans. The first step in the bloodless subjugation of Rumania has been successfully undertaken during the past week and a credible outline of the Axis plan now seems to be shaping itself. It amounts to the administration of a coup de grace to Egypt and the Suez Canal by some fresh form of pressure if not, indeed, by an actual attack from the north. In no other way can the so-called pincers of the Axis be made to close on the British stronghold in the eastern Mediterranean."

Two Obstacles "There are two obstacles to the realisation of any such grandiose plan. The first is the power and spirit of Turkey. It is significant that the successes of the Axis in south-eastern Europe have been achieved exclusively at the expense of those who allowed themselves to be bribed and terrorised. Yugoslavia, so far has been saved from molestation by her well-known determination to defend herself and by the reputation of her troops as stubborn fighters in a difficult country. "Greece has hitherto been spared because she has presented a firm front to the bully. "Turkey, the strongest military Power in the Near East, stands second to none both in the proud assertion of her independence and in her capacity to resist any infringement of it. Turkey will be saved by her own resolution. "The second obstacle to the German project is the growing strength of her independent Mediterranean. Had the Axis Powers been able to launch their offensive at the moment of the French Armistice the threat might have been formidable. Since then, however, successful reinforcements of men and material have reached British military, naval and air forces in the Near East."

Health Of Home Guards ACCIDENT QUESTION Minister Reviews The Position WHOSE LIABILITY? By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Oct. 15. Replying to a suggestion that the Government should accept liability for all disabilities that might be caused or aggravated by training in the Home Guard, the Minister of National Service (the Hon. R. Semple) said to-day that it was impracticable to arrange for the medical examination of everyone volunteering. In any case, it should not be necessary as the guardsmen would only train in their spare time, say, one week night and a few hours at the week-end. However, if in an emergency, a Home Guard is called on to be a member of the Defence forces, all guardsmen would then be entitled to the same compensation, pensions, etc., as were now applied to soldiers. "No person should join the Home Guard unless he is personally satisfied that the training is not likely to affect his health detrimentally. But if, in spite of this precaution, an accident occurred involving injury or disablement, then the public can rest assured that the Government would consider each case on its merits and would make whatever provision appeared necessary and just," said Mr Semple.

WAR WEAPONS WEEK AT BRADFORD Sum Set Exceeded GIFTS TO PURCHASE AIRCRAFT Cheque From Argentina

Gifts for the purchase of aircraft acknowledged to-day include the sum of £100 from Mrs Ravenscroft, Buenos Aires, as well as £6000 from Leves, Sussex. Bradford, which aimed at raising £1,250,000 during War Weapons Week, which began on Saturday, has, after two days, already received in cash and promises £1,509,370.

TRANSPORT VESSEL FOR U.S. TROOPS Former German Ship To Be Used EARL BROWDER'S CASE TO BE REVIEWED Communist Presidential Candidate

The Maritime Commission announces that it is lending to the War Department the former German vessel Amerika, which was seized in 1917 and has been laid up. TWO BIG VESSELS DIVERTED Evacuation Of Americans THE MARIPOSA AND MONTEREY Going To The East

(By Radio) It is announced from Washington that the Monterey is to leave San Francisco for the Near East to evacuate American citizens from that area. The Mariposa, at present in Australia, will be diverted when she reaches Honolulu and will proceed to the same area. The Government of the United States has taken measures to prevent the issue of passports to Japan and other countries in the Far East.

CANDIDATE IS SELECTED

MR C. G. E. HARKER FOR WAIPAWA

NATIONAL PARTY Six Nominees In The Ballot

Mr C. G. E. Harker was chosen as National Party candidate to contest the Waipawa seat made vacant by the death of Mr A. E. Jull. The selection committee's ballot was held in the Waipawa Municipal Theatre last night. There were present 131 delegates representing all 22 branches of the electorate. The keen interest in the ballot was reflected by the theatre's being filled to capacity by National Party members. The six nominees were Messrs Harker, C. R. Edgecombe, G. Forbes, McHardy, R. Tapper, D. M. Campbell and Sergeant J. D. Ormond.

Each of the nominees addressed the delegates for 10 minutes. Sergeant Ormond, who is in England, was represented by Mr L. McLean, Maraekakaho.

Preferential System Voting was conducted under the preferential system. The announcement of Mr Harker's selection was enthusiastically received and each of the other nominees in brief addresses spoke of the candidates capabilities and pledged him their support. Mr F. P. Kelly, chairman of the Hawke's Bay Electorate Committee and member of the Dominion Council of the National Party, presided over the delegates. Mr Harker's Career Born in 1899, Mr Harker has spent his life in the province and before he entered law was a farmer in the Waipawa district. He had taken a prominent part in the development of the Waipawa district and has had considerable experience in local body affairs. Mr Harker formerly was Mayor of Waipawa and is a vice-president of the Waipawa branch of the Returned Soldiers' Association. He is also president of the Waipawa Chamber of Commerce and is chairman of the Waipawa Electorate Committee of the National Party. He also is a member of the Dominion Council of the party.

BALLOT EXPECTED TO PRODUCE ENOUGH MEN

Authoritative Contradiction Of Story That Second Drawing Is Needed By Telegraph—Press Association WELLINGTON, Oct. 15. The Director of National Service (Mr J. S. Hunter) said that the assumption in a report from Auckland that the ballot held recently to fill vacancies in the Territorial Forces had produced insufficient men and that a second ballot of a similar nature was to be held on a Dominion-wide basis, was entirely incorrect. Nobody, he explained, could possibly say what number the ballot would finally produce, for the appeals had not been heard and the medical examinations were incomplete, but the indications were that the number called up in the ballot was about right to produce the number of men required. The scheme of training provided for its being spread over the training season and the first ballot was held to produce men who were to bring up to war strength the Territorials who went into camp in October. The next ballot was to bring the January quota up to war strength.

STAUNCH CIVILIAN SPIRIT EVEN IN SEASIDE TOWNS

Dover Busy And Cheerful, But Ramsgate Remembers August Onslaught

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received October 15, 8.45 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 14. The morale of Britons has been unshaken by the prolonged bombardment. This was proved by a tour of ports and holiday towns on the south-east coast. The civilian spirit is unbroken and life is as near to normal as the actual dropping of bombs permits. Dover is as busy and cheerful as any town in England. The seaside populations have dwindled, but the evacuation is nowhere wholesale. Children still play in the streets and women go shopping even after the raid warnings. Ramsgate has changed its way of life more than the other towns; the women and children, remembering the terrific onslaught of August 14, spend many hours a day and most of the night from 60 to 90 feet underground.

Naval Staff Of Dominion A REARRANGEMENT

Commodore W. E. Parry's Appointment OFFICIAL STATEMENT

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Oct. 15. The Minister of Defence (the Hon. F. Jones) announced to-night that the Government had found it increasingly necessary to call the Chief of the Naval Staff (Commodore W. E. Parry, C.B.), into consultation at Wellington, and for other reasons which the present circumstances dictated, he should be available for the conduct of naval policy and operations. "It has therefore been decided," said the Minister, "to terminate the temporary arrangements by which Commodore Parry acts as Chief of the Naval Staff while at the same time commanding H.M.S. Achilles and the New Zealand squadron. "Commodore Parry has therefore relinquished the command of H.M.S. Achilles on relief by Captain H. M. Barnes, A.D.C., R.N., formerly in command of H.M.S. Philomel, and will henceforth devote his whole time to the duties of Chief of the Naval Staff and first naval member of the Naval Board. "The appointment of a Commodore commanding the New Zealand Squadron will be in abeyance for the time being."

SIAMESE REITERATE CLAIMS

DAY'S PAY FOR MEN IN BALLOT

Medical Examinations CUSTOM OF THE LAST WAR Regulation Rate

Following what is stated to have been the custom in the last war, all men drawn in the recent ballot are being paid 7/-, the regulation day's pay for a soldier, for attending medical examinations, says the "New Zealand Herald." This applies to all men examined since October 7, including volunteers who had not then completed their examinations and still had to come before a medical board. If a man is classified as permanent unfit, he receives only one payment; but it is stated that if he is classified as temporarily unfit, each additional examination held to check whether his unfitness has been removed, will also be paid for at the rate of 7/- for any day or portion of a day he is away from his home. Men passed as fit at the initial examination will be paid a further 7/- upon attending for X-ray examination. Each fit man will thus cost 14/-, while the others will be a charge on State funds according to the number of examinations they attend.

The introduction of this payment has caused considerable surprise among volunteers. Neither Expeditionary Force nor territorial volunteers who were examined before October 7 received payment for attending medical boards. Hospital Hit An oil bomb destroyed parts of a hospital, including the operating theatre, but the staff put out the fires. The patients were all evacuated. An explosive bomb which fell in the grounds of the same hospital demolished three houses, the occupants of which were in the shelters and were uninjured. A bomb which struck the middle of a block of flats killed a number of tenants sheltering in the basement, on which tons of debris crashed down. Flats on either side were cut in half. Mobile cranes were used in recovering the bodies. Bombs hit a row of cottages in one area in the Home Counties, and two people were killed and 13 injured. A Salvation Army canteen in the London area was wrecked on Sunday night.



Special Work On Farms

SCHEME REOPENED 4B Employment To Be Continued

Late in August, Scheme 4B, which provided for the employment of men on special farm development and improvement work, was suspended in order to place as many suitable men as possible with employers requiring regular farm hands. The recent announcement that the 4B scheme was to be reopened indicated that the temporary suspension of the scheme had served its purpose in freeing single and married men for more urgent work on the farms.

Increased Production
The increased production drive placed a considerable strain on the available manpower for farm labour, and it was to meet a pressing need that the 4B scheme was suspended.

Men who are suitable for ordinary farm employment will no longer be referred to 4B contracts, but 4B work will be continued instead by men who are of more use on this type of work than on ordinary farm labour. Many farmers will welcome the reintroduction of the 4B scheme, as by it much work of value to their properties can be carried out.

Minister's Statement
"With the coming of the farming season," said the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb) in announcing the reopening of the scheme, "we were faced with the task of combing every possible field for men suitable for farm work and that fact influenced the Government in deciding to suspend 4B."

"A large number of men who were previously employed on the scheme or were awaiting contracts were accordingly placed in regular farm work. However, many Scheme 4B workers are unacceptable to farmers for various reasons, and their continued employment on developmental work of value to farmers and the Dominion has already been or is being arranged."

Sequel In Police Court

FINE INFLICTED

ATTEMPT TO BLOCK BURMA ROAD

Terminus Bombed

The following Air Force casualty is announced to-day: Sergeant Alfred Frederik Blatch, previously reported missing in air operations, now reported killed in action. His brother is Mr J. H. A. Blatch, of Lumsden.

Advice has reached the Rev. G. W. and Mrs. Hunt, Miramar, Wellington, that their youngest son, Sergeant Pilot G. W. Hunt, has been killed in an air accident in England.

VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY

CHARGES AGAINST A SALESMAN

JUDGE'S DIRECTION

Question Of Sale Of Shares

By Telegraph—Press Association. CHRISTCHURCH, Oct. 15.

A verdict of "not guilty" was returned by the jury in a case against Donald Otrrey Austin Knight, a salesman, in the Supreme Court. Knight was charged with theft in failing to account for moneys received from the sale of shares in Lange's Mobile Gas Producer Ltd. The verdict was returned at the direction of Mr Justice Northcroft after Robert Stewart Lange had admitted, when cross-examined, that Knight was entitled to sell shares transferred to him by Lange.

The Charges

The charges against Knight were that he committed theft in failing to account for moneys received for shares on terms requiring him to transfer them to Lange's Mobile Gas Producer Ltd. They concerned £60 obtained from Arthur Shaw on December 7, 1939, and £40 on January 15, 1940 from James Mayo, of Ouhua, on December 8, and £50 from Harold William Gill, of Blenheim, on December 13.

Questioned by Mr C. S. Thomas, counsel for Knight, about the transfer of 400 shares by him to Knight, Lange, the managing-director of Lange's Mobile Gas Producer Ltd., at Christchurch, said that on his part no "trickery" was intended.

"It Was Genuine"

His Honour: You knew the document was not genuine? Lange: As far as I was concerned, it was genuine. It was so that he would be entitled to sell.

Lange: I didn't really mean that. His Honour: The transactions meant either that Knight was buying the shares he paid for in future and that he was entitled to sell, or it was a trick. You say it was not a trick? That is so.

His Honour then said that he could not take the case any further and counsel agreed that he should address the jury.

"An Unusual Turn"

"The case has taken an unusual turn," said his Honour to the jury. "The witness had to acknowledge either that the transfer of 400 of his shares to Knight was a trick of humbug to mislead prospective investors, or that it was a genuine transfer to Knight to be paid for later."

"The Crown set out to prove that Knight had no shares of his own to sell, only the company's shares, which he had to account for. If, in addition, he was the owner of the shares, he could do what he liked with the money he received, though morally and legally he would have to pay Lange for the shares transferred to him. It appears that the Crown cannot take the case further, and that dishonesty has not been proved.

"You can take it as a direction from me that there is no evidence to justify you in finding him guilty. Without retiring, the jury found Knight not guilty."

JUDGE'S COMMENT

Auckland Supreme Court

CHARGE TO JURY

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, Oct. 15.

"I think the number of cases for trial not excessive for this large district," said Mr Justice Smith, when charging the Grand Jury at the opening of the criminal session of the Supreme Court to-day. There were nineteen cases, involving twenty persons, of whom four were women.

CHURCH'S FEARS FOR MAORIS

LACK OF MORAL CONTROL

SYNOD ADDRESS

Unfortunate Position In Auckland Province

By Telegraph—Press Association. AUCKLAND, Oct. 15.

The position of the work of the Church among the Maori people of the diocese gave cause for serious concern, said Bishop Sims when addressing the Anglican Synod to-day.

"The prevalence of drunkenness, lack of control in moral conduct and indifference to worship are three evils which demand the serious attention of Synod," the bishop continued. "The Church cannot stand aside merely looking on and doing nothing to stem the devastation of the spiritual lives of the Maori people. We must seek to find out where our weakness lies and apply the remedy."

In the fullest co-operation with the Bishop of Aotearoa (the Rt. Rev. F. A. Bennett) he hoped to exercise towards the Maori people the ministry of his office and to bring more closely together in worship and the service of God the people of the two races.

NAVAL BATTLE OFF SICILY

ROME ELABORATES DETAILS

CRUISER TORPEDOED

Italian Ships Heavily Pounded

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received October 15, 12.45 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 14.

The Rome radio, in supplementing the Italian official details of the reported Mediterranean naval battle, in which Italy claimed to have sunk a British cruiser of the Neptune class, said: "A flotilla of three Italian torpedo-boats in the Sicily Channel discovered a British naval squadron. The flotilla-leader ordered full steam ahead and attacked the British cruisers with three torpedoes at a distance of about a quarter of a mile and also fired several gunshots.

"Our torpedo-boats had to suffer under heavy pounding from the cruiser," the Rome radio added, "and the flotilla-leader was heavily struck and sank with the commander on deck reporting by wireless to his base that it was sinking."

"A second torpedo-boat also sank after being struck by several gunshots.

Fire Abroad "Fire broke out aboard one of our destroyers which came to the aid of the torpedo-boats. The destroyer was taken in tow but proved unable to proceed, and was consequently blown up by its own crew, who took to the boats. They saw the British cruiser sink."

Rome yesterday reported that a cruiser of the Neptune class had been sunk. These cruisers, of which the Leander is one, are of approximately 7000 tons.

AMERICAN DESTROYERS

Another Batch Reaches Britain

UNEVENTFUL VOYAGE

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received Oct. 15, 11.45 a.m.) LONDON, Oct. 14.

Another group of American destroyers recently arrived at a British port.

The captain of one ship said that the destroyers had a good trip. There were no incidents, and no German planes were sighted.

A naval officer who saw a batch of American destroyers delivered to the British Navy at an eastern Canadian port and travelled back to England in one of them described it as an unforgettable experience.

Remarking that the co-operation and helpfulness of the Americans were wonderful, he said: "The ships were sailed to Canada by their American crews. The American guns, torpedoes, depth charges, anti-submarine equipment, engines, and boiler driven slightly from ours, so a day was spent with the American officers and men explaining the details to their British opposite numbers."

"The destroyers, which had been refitted throughout, were scrupulously clean and in apple-pie order. Full outfits of ammunition and other war-like equipment were left on board, together with stores of all kinds.

Modern Fittings "Everything was left—rope, paint, mess traps, silver, china, linen, towels, sheets, blankets and pillows. Instruments were also provided—six-inch chronometer, high-powered binoculars for the use of the officers and look-outs, parallel rulers for navigational purposes, typewriter paper, envelopes, patent pencil-sharpeners, and so on. There was even an electric coffee machine in the wardroom and a refrigerator and ice-water faucet on deck," the naval officer added.

Admittedly, as destroyers go, they are old ships, but between 40 and 50 British destroyers of equal age have done yeoman service since the war started.

Destroyers have borne a heavy burden since the outbreak of hostilities. Their losses—32 to date—have not been slight. Coming, as it does, at a critical time, this reinforcement from America of 50 fast and well-armed vessels will be most welcome accession to Britain's already hard-worked flotillas, for which Britain is duly grateful.

SHOCK TROOPS FROM GERMANY

Arrival In Africa

PROBABLY SENT FOR EXPERIENCE

Tropics Warfare

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received Oct. 15, 12.45 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 14.

German shock troops are serving in Africa and are attached to Marshal Graziani's Italian forces, says a message from Berlin. They are believed to be an experimental corps sent for the object of gaining experience of operations in the tropics.

A communique issued at Cairo to-day says: "There is no change in the situation in Egypt. In the Sudan on Sunday, our mechanised patrols encountered and inflicted heavy casualties on an enemy force of 120 astride the River Gash, 20 miles south-east of Kassala. The same day our forward positions in the Galla bat area were bombed with no damage or casualties. On the other fronts, there is nothing to report."

BRITISH INVASION IMPOSSIBLE

AMERICAN EXPERT'S BELIEF

HITLER'S FAILURE

Axis Compelled To Make New Plans

British Official Wireless. (Received Oct. 15, 12.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 14.

The importance of the "Battle for Britain" as a setback for the German plans was emphasised to-day by Major George Fielding Elliot, United States air expert, in a broadcast from Philadelphia. He said: "While immediate attention is now centred on the confused events in the Balkan Peninsula, the very fact that Germany is now proceeding in the scene of south-east Europe raises the question whether the battle for Britain is being abandoned by Germany—whether the issue is not a clear-cut victory for the British, and particularly for the R.A.F."

Lost Venture "The evidence," he said, "seems to many minds quite clear that, in this battle for Britain, Hitler has at last met with a major defeat. For the first time, he had to turn back from a venture upon which he had set forth with every prospect of success. For the first time, he made boasts and announced intentions which he has been unable to make good."

"Naturally, every effort will be made by the Germans to distract the attention of the world and of the American people from this tremendous fact."

"The failure of the Germans to achieve air superiority over Britain made invasion of that island a hopeless project. The Axis is now compelled to recast its whole plan of war, and no man would now be bold enough to say what the result will be. A long war has been precisely the sort of war that neither Germany nor Italy was prepared to fight."

"As far as war in the air is concerned, the German mass-production plan has failed."

Swift Justice For Raider

WANTON ATTACKS

Blown To Pieces By Own Bombs

CRASH INTO GROUND

British Official Wireless. (Received Oct. 15, 12.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 14.

Swift punishment met an enemy bomber which dropped out of the sky and was seen to crash into the ground recently and machine-gunned civilians, says the Air Ministry news service.

The firing was entirely indiscriminate, for there was nothing visible on the pilot of the aircraft except civilians, shops, and small houses. He was flying at a height of about 500 feet.

After this attack, the enemy turned and flew in the direction of the next seaside town, but some distance outside this second town was a searchlight post, and on the approach of the enemy, the ground defences opened up with light anti-aircraft fire.

PREVENTION SOUGHT

Representations To Prime Minister

S.P.C.A. PROPOSAL

By Telegraph—Press Association. DUNEDIN, Oct. 15.

A decision to make representations to the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser) to have the Police Offences Act amended so that it would constitute it an offence to course hares in an enclosed area, was reached by the Otago Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals at its monthly meeting to-day.

Wide Support Communications were received from the Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Canterbury, Timaru, Poverty Bay, and Waikato Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals commending the action of the Otago Society in endeavouring to bring about a prohibition of coursing of live hares, and three individual persons, including Mr C. L. Carr, M.P., President of the Federation of New Zealand Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, also wrote upholding the society's stand.

The chairman (Mr E. C. Reynolds) said that as the Otago Society was not affiliated to the New Zealand Federation, it could not forward any representation to the Prime Minister through the Federation, but it could ask Mr Carr, as a private Member, to place its request before Mr Fraser, and the other societies could then be advised of the step.

Far Behind Britain Mr J. C. Willis said that New Zealand lagged far behind Great Britain in the matter of legislation dealing with cruelty to animals. The only laws on the subject in the Dominion consisted of a few clauses in the Police Offences Act.

It was decided to ask Mr Carr to approach the Prime Minister and place the society's request for an amendment of the Act before him.

DOMINION AIRMEN

Trained At Ohakea And Wigram

SERVING OVERSEAS

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Oct. 15.

Two officers of the Royal New Zealand Air Force have been awarded the Air Force Cross, according to an official announcement to-day. A notice to this effect is contained in the London Gazette. They are: Squadron Leader Harry Lumsden Tancred, R.N.Z.A.F. Station, Ohakea, and Flight-Lieutenant Erik Alfred Anderson Moen, R.N.Z.A.F. Station, Wigram.

Squadron Leader Tancred, who was born in Australia, is 31 years of age and was educated at Nelson College. He then went to England where he was granted a short service commission with the R.A.F. He returned to New Zealand in 1936 where he entered the R.N.Z.A.F. After the outbreak of the war, he spent a period at the flying instructors' school at Mangere and later was transferred to the R.N.Z.A.F. station at Ohakea.

Flight-Lieutenant Moen was born at Dunedin and is 30 years of age. He was educated at the Otago Boys' High School. He received his pilot's licence in 1932 and in 1935 joined the New Zealand Territorial Air Force. Two years later he was appointed to a short service commission in the R.N.Z.A.F.

The Air Force Cross has also been awarded to Squadron Leader Gordon John Grindell, of the R.A.F., about whom details are unavailable.

Axis Building Bases In Rumania

ARMY MISSION ARRIVES

"Great Teachers" To Direct Reorganisation

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received October 15, 11.55 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 14.

A German naval mission is expected to arrive at Bucharest to-morrow, probably in connection with the construction of a naval base at Mamaia, north of Constanta, where Italian Air Force units have already arrived to assist in the establishment of a seaplane base. According to German circles the German troops in Rumania will soon number 10 divisions.

The Rumanian Prime Minister (General Antonescu) in a speech at a reception to the German military mission said: "We are engaging great teachers for the reorganisation of our Army. Germany's international development is necessarily based on economic and military facts, not on illusions."

Troops of many nations are concentrating in the Balkans. Shiploads of Italians are being transported across the Adriatic from Bari and Brindisi to Durazzo and Valona, Albania. Turkey has concentrated 400,000 troops on her Bulgarian border.

Earlier messages from Athens refer to a Greek alarm at the German and Italian moves in the Balkans. Greece fears an Axis pincer movement from Albania and Bulgaria. Rumanians have been warned to leave Greece immediately.

Associated Press messages, referring to Russian troop concentrations on the Balkans border, say that civilians have been evacuated from Cernauti, in the territory Rumania recently ceded to the Soviet. Three hundred Russian fighter planes have arrived in the province of Bukovina, where many new hangars have been built. The Soviet is also reported to be constructing new aerodromes in Bessarabia, former Rumanian territory, where 12 Russian infantry divisions, as well as artillery and motorised units, are stationed.

Concentrations of river craft capable of carrying 20 or 30 men each are massed on the Prut River. Large fleets of Russian naval vessels also are gathered in the Prut and Danube rivers.

The Dardanelles Turkish newspapers stress the possible German threat to Russia. The official newspaper "Ulus" suggests that Germany is possibly preparing a base to strike north of Rumania to check any Soviet move southwards. The Istanbul newspaper "Tan" says that Russia would not allow the Dardanelles to fall into other hands. Sources in Tokyo state that Germany, alarmed at British diplomatic moves in Russia, is sending a mission to Moscow.

The British military and naval attaches at Bucharest and staffs departed on Monday for the Black Sea port of Constanza en route to Istanbul, accompanied by 30 members of the British column. It is expected that the only British subjects left in Rumania by the weekend will be 20 Legation officials.

About 3000 more German troops, mostly anti-aircraft crews, have arrived at Galatz. There is every indication that the German plans are being pushed on at high speed, and Germans in Bucharest are openly boasting that there will be 10 divisions in the country shortly.

Nazis in Control The Balkans correspondent of the "Daily Telegraph" says it now appears that German troops fully equipped with Rumanian officials and all strategic points. A constant stream of new arrivals bound for the Danube delta is reported from numerous points.

The German troops in Rumania are believed to number between 20,000 and 30,000, and more are said to be coming. Their presence is creating resentment among Rumanians. In Bucharest, where the German officers are living in palatial hotels, quarters, four of them, after dining extremely well, knocked down and killed a pedestrian when driving a car, and an angry demonstration took place.

The feeling in the Rumanian Army against the German forces is reported to be very strong. Turkish papers to-day repeat the reminder to Germany that a strong Turkish Army is standing ready for any emergency, and state that Germany must take the Soviet Union into account. One newspaper states that Russia would not allow the Dardanelles to pass into German hands.
