"TOTAL DEFENCE" If Germans Attack **Turkey Soviet May** Go To Her Defence DEADLOCK STILL NOT

"It is reliably reported that Russia and Turkey are negotiating a pact of military assistance," says the Sofia correspondent of the Associated Press. "Russia is reported to be offering armed support if the Axis attempts to seize the Dardanelles. Turkey has chartered steamers and evacuated her nationals from Rumania.

"Turkish newspapers warn the Axis against attempts

to intimidate Greece or Turkey.

"Train loads of German soldiers are rolling across Hungary to Rumania; probably 50,000 are already in Rumania. A motorised division of about 15,000 has arrived at Ploesti.'

"Evidence is accumulating that Germany is becoming increasingly needless of Russian feelings, perhaps because the German General Staff does not fear the Russian military machine," says the London "Daily Telegraph." "On this assumption it would be reasonable to assume that Moscow is acutely apprehensive of what the early future may hold for Russia.

"The apparition of an unbeaten Germany established in the Black Sea has long been one of Moscow's worst nightmares. While perturbed worst nightmares. While perturbed at the succession of events and anxious to see the German eastward drive checked, the Soviet leaders hesitate to take action capable of interpretation in Germany as hostile, or even unfriendly.

"In such circumstances it is understandable that silence is the only course open.

CONFERENCE HELD GERMAN OIL FACTORIES SUFFER IN R.A.F. RAIDS

Politiz Changed Allegiance To

The R.A.F. so heavily attacked the synthetic oil plant at Politiz, whose annual production is over 1,000,000 metric tons of motor fuel, that the flames must have been visible from Berlin, 80 miles away. For nearly an hour a 'plane bombed the oil plant at Bohlen, southward of Leipsiz. A direct hit with a heavy bomb was also scored on a railway siding near Lehrte station, about a mile from the Brandenburger Tor.

When the matter was referred to the Mayor of Napier (Mr T. W. Hercock) last night he said that a soldier had called on him during the afternoon and had complained of the five-hour wait in the sweltering heat before resuming the long journey to Gisborne.

"The boy came to me not so much to get something for himself as to see that those who followed him did not go through the same experience," said Mr Hercock.

"Had I known that these soldiers were likely to be stranded I would have done something for them," he said. "As it was, I was unable to locate any of them when I was in a position to do something."

Mr Hercock said that he had written to the authorities concerned in the hope that soldiers calling at Napier in future would not be made uncomfortable by a long delay. The men could have hired taxis, as others did, and arrived in their home town 24 hours earlier, but on seven shillings a day taxis were expensive luxuries. The seldiers did not have the money.

The Army Department could get the men home by a much shorter route by train to Taneatua, complet-

ing the journey by service-car, but the soldiers themselves could not take the risk of being landed high

and dry in a township where all were strangers.

They thought it much safer to take the train to Palmerston North and then back to Wafroa and so home to Gisborne, but they did not reckon on such a long delay in Nanier

Pre-war Rationing Helped Nazis

But Shortage Will Be Felt In Long Run (United Press Association-Copyright.)

(Received October 17, 0.10 a.m.)

Authoritative opinion in London is that Germany is a

long way off a dangerous shortage of food. Her power to withstand the blockade for a long time is now being admitted. Experts here declare that Germany started with the advantage that she entered the war with the whole of her vast and complicated apparatus for rationing in operation and with a population accustomed to queues, inconvenience, and grumbling. Summed up, what the experts believe is that Germany is in no danger of a food shortage and the Reich's complete system of rationing has been of great aid in conserving supplies and building up stocks for the time being.

While the people grumble they do not protest.

In the long run, however, the situation may be different. An actual shortage of food cannot forever be held at bay.

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



ANGLO-AMERICAN UNION

The idea of Anglo-American union in the form proposed by Colonel J. C. Wedgwood, M.P., in an article in a London newspaper appears at first sight to be impracticable. Certainly it is a suggestion which will fire the imagination of everyone who believes in the democratic form of government, in freedom of speech, freedom of the Press, and the liberty of the individual conscience, but this fact does not mean that a virtual amalgamation of the British Empire and the United States would prove workable when it came to be put into practice.

The cabled summary of Colonel Wedgwood's article, although it gives only the main points of the suggested union, suggests that Colonel Wedgwood, with all the idealist's sublime disregard of unpleasant facts, has skilfully skated

round thin ice in several places.

The first danger point is the question of what would happen to the British Monarchy. Now if there is one thing certain in an uncertain world, it is that the British people will never give up the Throne while it is occupied by a Sovereign so thoroughly British as the present King. If there had been anything in the nature of a decline in the popularity of the Monarchy as a traditional institution, it would have become apparent during the abdication crisis of 1936. But nothing of the sort happened, and the affectionate regard which Britons of all classes had for King George V. has been passed on to the present King.

Again, it must not be overlooked that the next member of the House of Windsor in the line of succession is Princess Elizabeth. The British are a history-loving race, and the prospect of a future Queen who bears the name of the most brilliant of England's rulers, a Queen who may see her country reach some future Golden Age similar to that of the first Elizabeth, is something that holds a vivid inspiration for all those who are weary of the disillusionments and insecurities

of the twentieth century. But if the British Empire is to retain the Crown as a

symbol of its own unity, what of the Republican United States? There are many Americans who still cling to the idea that Monarchy is incompatible with Democracy. Such people, oblivious to the fact that the King-Emperor exercises only a fraction of the power given to the President of the United States, still believe, quite seriously, that a constitutional monarch is only a few degrees removed from an Oriental despot of the Dark Ages. The Puritan element is still strong in America-a fact which accounts for the temporary, incredible success of Mr William Thompson's "Keep King George Out of Chicago" campaign fourteen years ago. Mention of Chicago brings up another problem—the racial composition of the United States.

The total population of the United States, together with its dependencies, is not far short of 140,000,000, and included in this colossal total are minorities representing virtually every nationality under the sun. British people are accustomed to think of Americans as people descended from British colonists just as New Zealanders and Australians of the present day are descended from British colonists, but the truth of the matter is that the Anglo-Saxon section of the American population, which still predominates in the New England States, is in itself a minority, although it exercises a cultural influence out of all proportion to its numbers. It is these people who have played the most important role in the building of the United States, and they have been supported to a large extent by the Nordic Scandinavians and by the better type of German immigrant. The underworld populations of Chicago, New York, and other great cities have been supplied very largely by southern Europe, while California supports a large Asiatic element.

By a curious turn of history, all these people find them-selves to a greater or lesser extent united in a certain vague antipathy towards Great Britain. The New Englanders, while making considerable ado about the Mayflower and their English pedigrees, celebrate the Fourth of July with as much enthusiasm as their ancestors did in the days of George Washington: the Declaration of Independence is their Magna Charta. The Germans and Italians are very largely anti-British—for obvious reasons—while the enormous Irish population (considerably larger than the population of Eire itself) regards the I.R.A. with rather more esteem than it does the

British Army. Add to these the racial "mixtures," the negro and partnegro communities, and the vast number of those halfabsorbed "Americans" to whom Great Britain is to all intents and purposes as much a foreign country as Tibet, and there are very few people left to welcome such a proposal as that of Colonel Wedgwood.

All these things seem to indicate that an Anglo-American union is an impossibility. But there is one factor which may override every other consideration. It is the possibility of the realisation by Americans of all races, creeds, and classes that if some tangible form of unity is not achieved, there is a likelihood that the system called democracy will be hard put to it to survive in the event of any major disaster overtaking the British Empire.

The union of the last two great democracies would create a single Power many times greater than any of the empires of history, and in the present crisis any move towards Anglo-American federation, even if it does not go the whole way, would have a decisive effect on the course of the world conflict.

ENEMY FLEE IN DARKNESS

Risks Taken To Ensure Safety Of Survivors

(British Official Wireless.) (Received October 16, 12.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Oct. 15.

The British cruiser Ajax, veteran of the Battle of the River Plate, has sunk three Italian destroyers in the Mediterranean, suffering only superficial damage and a few casualties herself.

This is the principal feature of the latest British naval sweep of the Mediterranean. Again no contact was made with the main Italian forces.

"Shortly after this encounter, the Ajax sighted an enemy force composed of one heavy cruiser and four destroyers. The Ajax again engaged and succeeded in crippling an enemy destroyer. The remainder of the force escaped in the darkness.

Voluntary and Unpaid.

The purposes of the Home Guard are to have a reasonably trained and fully organised body of men immediately available and ready to support the armed forces and to exercise effective Government control and avoid the growth of sporadic and irresponsible organisations

All service is voluntary and un-All service is voluntary and unpaid and all must accept personal liability for any disability that may arise or be aggravated through serving with the guard. While in the guard men are still liable for military service, overseas or home, in terms of the National Service regulations. This means that they regulations. This means that they are available for the ballot, but may continue in the guard until called to camp.

YOUNG MAN CHARGED NAPIER PRODUCTION Suppression Of Name

Detective W. Mason told the Court that the accused came to Napier last Friday and spent Saturday drinking at various hotels. The accused then went to another hotel and stole a handbag containing money and some knitting from the bedroom of the licensee's daughter. He was observed coming down the stairs by the licensee's wife, who informed her husband.

The Minister said that the Aliens' Tribunal had now been functioning long enough to obtain a comprehensive view of the major problems involved in the question of classifying aliens and in determining the extent of restraint that might be prudent.

After describing the activities of the existing tribunal, Mr Mason said: "Upon its appointment it was felt that the one tribunal, following the present procedure, would hardly be called to deal with all the cases."

"Many people who are British subjects but are of enemy origin give ground for suspicion as to their loyalty and cannot be excluded from the purview of the Aliens' Tribunal. On the other hand, if we are not very careful, a definition which might include such persons might include also loyal subjects whose sons and brothers gave their lives for our country in the last war or who are fighting for us in this war, and in respect to whom it is unthinkable that they should be subject to the humiliation of going be-

fore the tribunal. **Essential Consideration**

"The safety of the country and the full prosecution of its war effort are essential considerations and nothing must interfere with this. But where we can, by taking proper care, see to avoid certain grave injustices and anomalies that arose during the last war.
