Italians Advance Heavy Fire Under On Desert Road

LONDON, Oct. 20. The British United Press correspondent in the Western Desert says that the Italians are showing signs of initiative. After four weeks of consolidation, heavily protected patrols are sallying forth from Sidi Barrani along the coastal road and from Sofafi.

"Their principal object is to discover the location of British positions," adds the correspondent. "One column, consisting of 60 lorries laden with infantry, with an escort of medium and light tanks, a reconnaissance 'plane, and 20 fighters advanced 10 miles along the coast from Sidi Barrani and then encamped, resisting staffing from British mobile 25-pounders, machine-guns from tanks, and armoured cars.







ASIATIC BOGEYMAN

Four years of war has not impaired the Japanese genius for imitativeness. The outburst of the "Sin Shun Pao" (a Japanesecontrolled journal published in Shanghai), which is published in the cable news this morning, indicates that Japanese leader-writers have learned a lot from their Axis friends in Europe. In short, the "Sin Shun Pao" warns the United States in exactly the same tone as the Goebbels Press has been warning the world in general for years.

The United States is not likely to be intimidated by threats. If Japan, by some sort of self-hypnotism, believes that she can continue the war in China and simultaneously defeat the combined forces of the United States and the British Empire in the Far East, she is heading for disaster. Further, she is still uncertain of Russia. and the possibility of a Russian move in China can never be wholly discounted.

Japan at the moment is a bogey employed by the Axis to frighten the Powers bordering on the Pacific and those with interests in Asia. Talk of "the prospective Japanese-American war" is intended principally for Americans who are worried both by the trend of the war in Europe and by the knowledge that the United States now, as in 1917, is not prepared for an immediate war on a major scale. It leaves out entirely the small consideration that Japan has not yet won her own war in China.

This brings up the question of whether the world at large realises the immensity of its debt to China. The Sino-Japanese "incident"there has never been a formal declaration of war and officially the two nations are still "friendly Powers"-is well into its fourth year, and the only result of the endless struggle has been a costly acquisition of territory by Japan and the increasing exhaustion of the Japanese nation. China, like Russia, is a country too vast to be conquered, and even an apparently final defeat of the Chinese forces in the field would not mean the end of the war or the subjugation

The Chinese have not spared themselves in the fight. They have been faced by a well-equipped and well-organised army; they have been compelled to rely on foreign sources of supply, while the Japanese have been able to draw on the strength of one of the world's most highly industrialised countries. But in spite of these things the Chinese have carried on, and in doing so they have played an important part in the drama of recent world history.

It involves no strain on the imagination to picture what would inevitably have happened if Japan had not been kept preoccupied with matters on her own doorstep. The European war would have given her an unprecedented opportunity to make a swift drive through the Pacific, a drive which would have had every prospect of success. Such a move would have secured Japan against any possible attack from the east, and she would have been free to set about the conquest of the highest peak of her ambition—the acquisition

China is very largely responsible for the fact that history has not taken such a disastrous course and that Japan to-day is in no position to tackle a first-class naval and military Power. The Chinese defence is giving America time to bring her forces up to a war footing, and once that is achieved Japan can be left to talk about prospective wars for an indefinite period.

Incidentally, there is an element of grim humour in the present situation in the Far East. It is to be found in the curious fact that the United States, Great Britain, and France were principally to blame for the changing of Japan from a land of medieval feudalism to a truculent modern industrial nation. As late as the last half of the nineteenth century, Japan was still a country of fantastic quaintness whose main political object was to keep European influences well away from her shores. It was only when Europe and America paraded warships round the Japanese coast and demanded, under threat of bombardment, the opening of Japanese ports to Western commerce, that Japan was brought into the realm of world trade. Japan complied with a good grace—and retaliated by beating Western

"materialism" at its own game. To-day the West is paying for that not very creditable deal, and Japan, finding herself in a desperately tight corner, is exacting a high price.

The closing of the Burma Road was a British concession to Japan, made with the object of permitting some move towards the ending of the Chinese war. The British Government may or may not have put faith in Japanese protestations, but in this case, as in all cases of "appeasement," the aggressor was the winner. It is for this reason that the reopening of the road has met with the approval of every nation outside the Axis influence. Whether the supplies reaching China through Burma will play any decisive part in the war may be questioned, but at least the free passage of those supplies is a small acknowledgment of a tremendous debt.

Recruiting for the Napier Home Guard commences at 8 a.m. to-morrow at the guard headquarters, Mayfair Theatre Buildings. The hours of attendance are daily, including Saturdays, from 10 a.m. to 6.30 p.m., while on Friday night the

office will remain open until nine o'clock. The Home Guard provides a means of national service which is of very real value, for every male citizen from 16 to 60 years of age. Each individual will be carefully graded, according to his age. Physical fitness and suitable training will be arranged accordingly.

Physical and ordinary drill, mus-ketry, signalling, and first-aid will, to start with, be the principal sub-jects on the syllabus. At the same time, it is not intended to keep trainees monotonously at these subjects. As soon as suitable instruct-ors can be arranged, specialised training in the more technical branches will be commenced, and a course of lectures by experts in various aspects of Home Guard duties will be arranged.

When trained, the Guard will be


