Italian Attack Expected At Full Moon

BRITISH TROOPS READY

Heartened By Obvious Strength Of Defences

(United Press Association—Copyright.)
(Received October 24, 0.15 a.m.)

CAIRO, Oct. 22.

Apart from a marked strengthening of the British positions there is little change in the military situation in the Western Desert, although, with increasing rain showers heralding the approach of winter, it is reasonable to suppose that Marshal Graziani's order for the second stage of the Italian advance can be expected shortly.

At present the land activities are confined to strong enemy reconnaissance patrols attempting to ascertain the whereabouts of the British outposts. There is occasionally a short, sharp skirmish when British forward armoured units encounter Italian reconnaissance patrols, but the latter invariably retire because, apparently, they have been instructed not to engage the enemy.

Italian airmen are busy photographing the new British strong points, which have been so enormously improved in the last month that we are prepared to meet large-scale offensives.

Waves of R.A.F. bombers continue to pound the enemy's rear, operating between Sidi Barrani and Benghazi from dusk to dawn, the Italians replying with attacks on the British desert camps, which are so well camouflaged and dispersed that casualties are very few.

The Italian front-line troops are composed entirely of Libyan divisions under General Gallini, who superseded General Maletti as Marshal Graziani's second-in-command. General Gallini is experiencing difficulty in preparing his troops for the advance on Egypt. They are all Moslems and are showing a marked reluctance to move deeper into Egyptian territory. Moreover, many are pure Egyptians from Upper Egypt who settled in Cyrenaica and were conscripted shortly after the outbreak of war. In addition, many Libyans belong to the Senussi tribe, whose spiritual leader, Sayed Idriss II Senussi, openly declares friendship with the British cause and condemnation of Mussolini.

Moon Necessary.
General Gallini is undoubtedly able to compel his divisions to advance when ordered, but he has probably counselled delay until the holy period of Ramadan ends 12 days hence. Marshal Graziani will probably await the first full moon after Ramadan, because the moon plays an important part in desert operations.

The enormous improvement in the desert defences has done much to hearten the British troops, who await the onslaught with quiet confidence.

AMPLE LABOUR

Price Of Feeding Stuffs Stabilised

The Minister of Agriculture (Mr. R. S. Hudson) as a result of conversations with the Governors of the principal banks, has appointed officers in every county to discuss with the County Agricultural Executive Committees any difficulties of individual farmers who, in the opinion of the committee, ought to have had credit but have been unable to get it.

Agricultural labour has been adequate during the year, thanks to recruitment from various sources, including the land army and volunteers from schools and universities. The Minister of Food has agreed to stabilise the price of feeding stuffs until next year and the Minister of Supply has agreed to stabilise the price of fertilisers.

Taking the whole of agriculture and prices together, conditions are now created which should give that stability and security of reasonable remuneration for which for years the farming community has been asking.

The secretary of the National Patriotic Fund Board (Mr G. A. Hayden) announced this afternoon that the Minister of Defence had approved of the tour, which will open at Hastings on Saturday night and will conclude at Wellington on November 25.

America Confident That Naval Power Will Win The War

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.

"The United States needs more Pacific bases, and we will have them. How far-flung these Pacific bases must be awaits the outcome of events now in the making," said the United States Secretary of the Navy (Colonel Frank Knox) in a speech to-day.

"This war is again proving that the nations controlling the high seas control the world's destinies. The war has become a war of food and oil. The contestant able to survive immediate attacks while controlling the food and oil supplies will win the war."

"The nation controlling the sea approaches to Europe has an immense advantage—and that is Britain. Only the possession of sea power is denying the Germans the crossing of the English Channel. It has enabled British air power, outnumbered probably by four to one, to make a magnificent defence."

"The only way to approach the Western Hemisphere is across the sea. If we recognise the soundness of this principle not only are we safe ourselves but we will exercise a profound influence on the peace and security of the rest of the world."

"We now have 15 battleships and will have 32; we have 37 cruisers and will have 85. Our six aircraft-carriers will be increased to 15, and destroyers from 159 to 325. Our present submarine strength will be raised from 104 to 185. We have 1200 combatant planes and will have more than 6000."

More Slipways
"Every private shipyard equipped to build warships is laying down ships and building more slipways; every navy yard is building to capacity."

"The acquisition of the eight Atlantic bases has tremendously strengthened the United States and is equivalent to many ships, making our Atlantic defences well-nigh impregnable."

POOR SCORE AGAINST RAIDERS

Only Three Shot Down

LONDON HAS QUIET NIGHT

Excitement On Coast

LONDON, Oct. 23.

It is officially stated that three raiders were shot down in last night's encounters. Six of our fighters were lost, but two of the pilots are safe.

It was London's quietest night; only an occasional raider was heard and there was very restricted gunfire.

A lifeboat rescued the pilot of a Messerschmitt which crashed in the sea near Hastings. Another lifeboat vainly searched for survivors of a German plane that crashed aflame some distance from the shore.

Passengers flung themselves to the floor when a bomb-carrying Messerschmitt swooped down and machine-gunned a bus climbing a steep hill on the Kentish coast in the evening. No damage was done and there were no casualties.

Planes were reported over Liverpool, a north-western town and the Midlands, where high-explosives were dropped.

RELIEF FOR BRITAIN

Commonwealth Help In War

TALKS TO-MORROW

Of importance as an event in itself and as an indication of the inexhaustible resources of the British Commonwealth, the conference which opens at New Delhi on Friday excites great interest.

Charged with the duty of ensuring the best possible use of the resources, existing and potential, for purposes of war in all lands under the British flag in the Eastern hemisphere, the Dominions of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa join hands with Asia. Not only is two-thirds of the total area of the British Empire represented but Palestine, as a mandated territory, is included in this gathering, which has a recorded population of 365,000,000 in Asia alone.

The great sub-continent of India, which before the war ranged tenth of the main industrial countries of the world, is already making vast contributions to the war effort.

Steel From India
For some time India has been meeting not only all the steel requirements of the Middle East, Uganda and Iraq, but has also been supplying a considerable quantity to the United Kingdom. With this as what might be described as the core of the supply organisation, one main object of the conference is to arrange to equip and supply the Allied forces in the Middle East from "East of Suez."

LESS AVAILABLE FOR BRITAIN

NOT NAZI WORK

"U-Boats Scarce In The Irish Sea"

LONDON, Oct. 22.

The London "Daily Telegraph's" special correspondent says that Eire seems to have superfluous butter while Britain is rationed to two ounces a week.

"Irish farmers declared," he added, "that Irish butter was available at 135/- a hundredweight, New Zealand being 126/-. They added that the British Ministry could, but would not, buy the dearer Irish butter."

"A Government official of Eire said: 'We have been shipping all the butter possible. As a result of abnormally dry weather we have hardly enough for our own consumption. Some is in cold store for winter needs.'"

An official of the British Ministry of Food commented that it was not a question of Irish prices, Britain had contracted to take all Eire's exportable surplus; this surplus had ceased two or three weeks ago and probably none would be available until next April or May.

"The Germans like to believe that they are preventing Irish agricultural products reaching England, but U-boats are remarkably scarce in the Irish Sea," he commented.

Lord Snell, speaking in the House of Lords, said that the Government had no evidence that enemy submarines were receiving supplies from Eire. He did not know why the Ministry of Information had allowed the allegation to be published without saying whether it was true or untrue.

AMBASSADOR WILL NOT RETURN

LYING NAZI PROPAGANDA COUNTERED BY BRITAIN

Hitler's Story Of Seeing His Majesty And Mr Churchill Fleeing In Raid

LONDON, Oct. 22.

Lord Maughan, speaking in the House of Lords, suggested that the Government should publish a White Paper in a number of foreign languages and also English containing a selection of the more striking German untruths with a statement of the actual facts. Confronted with such a collection of falsehoods a man must be hypnotised or lacking in brains if the bandage did not fall from his eyes.

The Duke of Devonshire, replying, said that a special branch of the Ministry of Information existed for contradicting enemy lies and making public the true versions.

The Germans, he said, had issued the lying statement that Hitler himself on one of his periodical flights over England had observed His Majesty and Mr Churchill dashing for shelter in abject panic. This lie had gained a certain amount of credence in the Near East, therefore special steps had been taken to deal with it.

The Ministry of Information, he said, was always looking for effective methods of countering German lies, but at present it was not inclined to issue a White Paper. Other methods were more satisfactory.

TURKISH AREAS ALSO SHAKEN

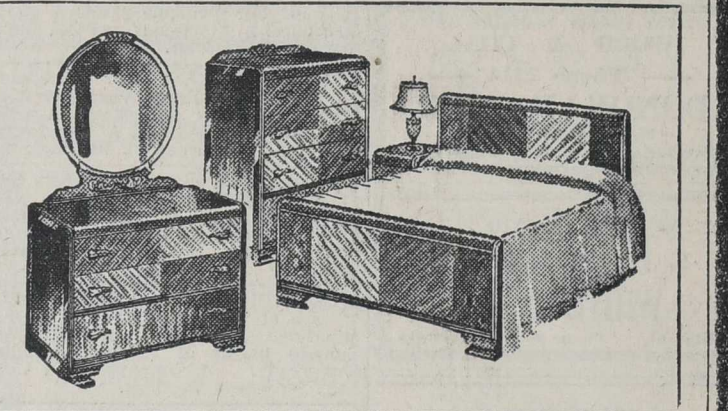
Felt In Afghanistan

A severe quake was felt through Rumania and Turkey. Bucharest reports describing it as the most severe in living memory. The damage does not appear to have been great in either Bucharest or Smyrna, but it is believed that the back areas of both countries have suffered more.

The shake was also experienced in Afghanistan. Waipawa Election
Sir,—Mr. Heffernan is reminded of the Old Woman who lived in a Shoe. I, sir, in turn, am reminded again by the immortal Irishman— "And still they gaz'd, and still they gazed, and still the wonder under them: That one small head could carry all he knew!"

If any magnificent gestures are needed, one of the foremost would be that Mr. Heffernan should be willing to agree to part up with its Mayor's Fund and then he could set out from charity's home port.

I do not like your correspondent's reference to the motor industry and it might temper his remarks with a little more correct reading of the position. This industry is playing the war game second only to the farming community and is not only carrying the crucial unnecessary social feathering-nest policy of an equally vindictive party political system, but is supplying trained men to our first line defence system. It has been asked by the Government to erect assembly factories in New Zealand and now by an Order-in-Council the use of these plants has been wiped out.

It was because the Government got itself into a mess buying American bulldozers and what not to make approaches to the four main cities and racing tracks to the pleasure resorts, that over the last year we have had to submit to the tremendous strain of the benzine regulations and taxation.

Now, so I understand, sir, comes the crowning insult. Unless the Garage Proprietors' Association back their complaints up with a joint complaint from their employees through the Workers' Union, the Minister will not consider it. That is to say that a boy of sixteen has the same responsible authority as an employer of 20 or 30 men.

Yes—Waipawa! "Arise ye Goths and glut your ire!"—I am, etc. NORSWOOD.

Hereditary Health
Sir,—The leading article in your paper this morning regarding the health of the community, with particular regard to the number of rejections for Home Service, is both arresting and timely.

Probably the reason why the huge number of rejections is now apparent is because unhealthy people would not experience that joyous urge for travel and excitement which, together with the usual patriotic fervour, brings forth a response from healthy, full-blooded men. Are the causes of the rejections avoidable?

Some time ago I had the pleasure of reading a book by an eminent American on the incidence of hereditary upon the American people. They have their problems, too, and he summed them up by stating that the remedy was the importation of a large number of Nordic people, fair-haired and blue-eyed, as these had an elevating effect upon the human race.

Now, Sir, in New Zealand we are, relatively speaking, isolated and in at least one district with which I am familiar, the matter of cousins marrying and close inter-marriage has created a problem. Large numbers of local families have children who are mentally defective to a greater or lesser degree. This is caused by the district being isolated and by the young people not coming into contact with outsiders.

We may be suffering to a degree from a lack of fresh blood, or, really speaking, of emigrants. A large-scale planned emigration scheme should be easy to-day. With the over-running of Europe there should be a surplus of Swedes, Danes and Dutchmen available in large numbers, and better stock could not be brought out.

In conclusion may I say that patriotism to-day calls for more than fighting men? It calls for honest men and true men who will come out and point the way, and it is a simple way. It is back to the Old Book. We have all the knowledge we need there; our system has failed—failed lamentably. We have worshipped at the Cross of Gold and we shall suffer until we root up the whole system and get back to a better and simpler life.—I am, etc., FINGERPOST.

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FACTORY WORK PREFERRED SYDNEY GIRLS AVOID DOMESTIC DUTIES The shortage of domestic servants in Sydney was so acute that the Department of Labour and Industry could find domestic jobs for 5000 girls at once, said the Under-Secretary of the Department (Mr C. J. Bellemore) recently. Sydney girls preferred factory to domestic work, he added. Two women in the waiting-room of a employment agency said that that employers were to blame for the lack of domestics, reports the "Sydney Morning Herald." Miss L. Pillar, of Darlinghurst, said that domestic workers were treated as inferiors. They were expected to work unreasonably long hours. "Regretted Our Food" In some places I have worked from 6 a.m. until after 8 p.m., six days a week, Miss Pillar said. "Women think that because they keep a servant they needn't do a thing themselves. In some places you are even begrudged the food you eat. "Some employers are very considerate, but they are in the minority, and they don't all live on the North Shore Lane." Miss Jessie Hare, of Double Bay, said: "If you work in a factory you are free to get nights a week; if you work as a domestic you are lucky to get one night free."

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CAN YOUR FACE WITHSTAND A CLOSE-UP VIEW?

Complexion, Hair And Eyes Need Much Care

It's one thing to have the sort of face that looks fine from the other side of the street, quite another to present an appearance that can stand up to a close-up.

No one would deny that it's very nice to make an impression on the young man over the road, but it's much more important to make an impression on the young man who's beside you.

The man-of-the-moment, dancing, dining, or sitting by the home fireside, sees your complexion, hair and eyes at close range—so make sure that they stand inspection.

In the first place pay attention to your diet—eat plenty of fruit, vegetables, milk.

If your skin is oily, don't be afraid to use plenty of soap, but see that it is good one.

Your morning make-up should have a foundation of an astringent cream.

If your skin is dry, use a rich nourishing cream at night. Olive oil is good, and stroke it in with firm massage movements.

In either case, beware of blackheads! You may get accustomed to them, seeing your face so frequently in a mirror. They're a horrible sight to others!

Wash your face in warm soapy water. Steam it, and remove the blackheads with gentle pressure. Follow with plenty of cold water and a disinfecting astringent.

Once a week try this face pack: Mix a teaspoon of almond oil with half the yolk of an egg and enough tallet oatmeal to make a paste. Spread on the face, relax for half an hour, and wash off the mask with lukewarm water.

For A Special Outing If you're planning a special outing in the evening use this mask beforehand. You'll be amazed at the soft glow it gives your skin.

Watch your neck! See that there's no ugly line where the powder ceases at the back, giving a clash of complexion shades. Always include your neck in facial treatments.

Remember that a close-up view of your mouth shows every tiny smudge. So first outline your mouth with a steady hand and a lip pencil. Then fill in the outline with lipstick, blot your mouth on a tissue, and powder very lightly over it.

Be careful with mascara, using it skilfully so that it doesn't blur and stick in blobs on the lashes.

See that it is bleaming, soft and fragrant. Wash it frequently, especially if it is fair, and more especially if you smoke, as smoky hair is hardly fragrant.

Editorial reference was made in yesterday's "Daily Mail" to the disturbing state of affairs revealed by the medical tests applied to men called up for home defence service. There are many aspects of the question—which was summed up a day or two ago by the Mayor of Christchurch (Mr R. M. Macfarlane, M.P.) when he said that the people of New Zealand had "had a shock"—and there are a number of additional points to which attention must be drawn.

It has already been pointed out that the most surprising thing about these revelations is that such a position should arise in this Dominion, which has perhaps the highest standard of living in the world, a climate which provides an abundance of sunshine, and natural conditions which give unlimited opportunities for healthy living. All the essentials are here, but still something is wrong. And it is difficult to avoid the conclusion that the present state of affairs is due almost entirely to artificial influences. The question of physical unfitness never troubled the Maori in the days before European colonisation, but to-day the fact that both Maori and pakeha are suffering from the effects of too much "civilisation" has to be faced.

There is, of course, no vestige of excuse for the situation. The time has come when New Zealand, which, in Mr Macfarlane's words, has "a lot to learn" in more ways than one, must set about putting things right.

As far as the development of physique on a nation-wide scale is concerned, the Dominion can learn much from Great Britain, but even more from our common enemies, Germany and Italy.

If anything good can be said of the Nazi and Fascist systems, it is that they have a strong appeal for youth and that in return for the fanatical support of youth, they give the utmost care and encouragement to their young men and women supporters. The fact that this laudable theory is warped and de-humanised by the application of such fantastic perversions as the glorification of war and conquest, the racial superiority of the Teuton and Italian over every other branch of mankind, and the deification of ranting dictators need not enter into the subject under discussion.

It is true that for years both Germany and Italy have regimented the youth of both countries for the purposes of war, but at the same time they have given the young people every inducement to achieve physical fitness in its highest form. To a certain extent they have revived the ideals of Ancient Greece, although it must be remembered that in the case of Germany the best work was done in the days of the Republic, before the blight of Hitlerism introduced a new creed of hatred to replace the ideal of international friendship.

But politics aside, the essence of the matter is that to-day both Germany and Italy are reaping the benefit of their creed of physical fitness.

In New Zealand there is always a spate of talk about the advantages of fresh air, sunlight, a well-balanced diet, and exercise. All sorts of "movements," from youth hostels to the "green leaf diet," come to light, create a flicker of enthusiasm, and then splutter out. Opportunities for taking part in organised games are provided everywhere, but there is little to appeal to the large section of the youth of the country which finds no attraction in organised sport.

There is no reason why New Zealanders should go to the lengths of the very peculiar people known in Germany as Nature Cultivators, but the medical tests have shown that something will have to be done, and done quickly.

FRANCE—ON WHICH SIDE?

The report that Germany is pressing France to declare war on Great Britain coincides neatly with the stirring appeal made to the French by Mr Winston Churchill.

The suggestion that Hitler hopes for joint Franco-German action is of little interest beyond the implication that Germany is becoming less and less certain of her own ability ever to win a decisive victory while the British Navy remains in unchanged command of the sea.

Neither the British Government nor the British people have ever harboured illusions about the pathetic shadow of a Government which officially rules "unoccupied" France from Vichy. Despite the statement, attributed to Marshal Petain, that "France does not contemplate declaring war on anybody," there is not the slightest doubt that what France does to-day depends entirely on the will of Herr Hitler.

It is all very well for M. Laval to say that he doubts whether the French army, navy, and air force would ever fight against Britain; the point remains that this is precisely what has happened at Oran, at Gibraltar (although there is a doubt as to whether Frenchmen were piloting the French planes that bombed the British stronghold), and at Dakar. The last-named incident leads to the conclusion that if Vichy Frenchmen are prepared to fight de Gaulle Frenchmen, they are fully prepared to fight anyone else, if they can be persuaded that such an action would be to their own advantage.

WOMAN CLERK APPEARS ON CHARGES OF THEFT

Allegation Of Fraud Heard In Supreme Court At Auckland

By Telegraph—Press Association

AUCKLAND, Oct. 23.

A clerk in a legal office, Phyllis Olive Barnett, aged 31, appeared before Mr Justice Fair in the Supreme Court on charges of theft of two cheques that had been entrusted to her by her employer.

The charges were that on April 26 she stole £996 from her employer, Robert Urquhart; that she stole a cheque for that amount or that she fraudulently omitted to account for that amount; and there were three similar counts relating to a cheque for £220 11/8 on June 28.

The Crown Prosecutor (Mr V. R. Meredith) conducted the prosecution and Messrs Beckerleg and Aekins appeared for the accused.

Mr Meredith said that the charges were that instead of paying these cheques into her employer's trust account, the accused had paid them into an account of her own in another bank. The accused had been in the law office of Robert Urquhart for three years and last April she was given the banking book.

On April 26 she was given a cheque for £996 and £54 in cash to bank, but she paid in only the cash to her employer's account and put the cheque into her own. She falsified her book by recording £996 to tally with the bank's records. On the next statement from the bank it would be seen that "£996" had been typed in in different type.

"Sum Transferred."

Later she paid in to her employer's account £150 which she had transferred from her own account, but a cheque of hers for a further sum of £340 which she sought to pay in was dishonoured, said Mr Meredith.

On June 28 she lodged a cheque for £220 11/8 in her own account and the net result was that there was a shortage of £1146 1/8 in Mr Urquhart's trust account.

"No Authority"

Robert Urquhart, solicitor, said that he had given the accused no authority to put these cheques in her own account. In a cross-examination, witness said that he had reported other matters to the Law Society. An auditor had, investigated his books on behalf of the Law Society.

Witness held the accused solely responsible for the defalcations. Witness was questioned by Mr Beckerleg about various entries in his books and said that certain items could not be reconciled. He denied that he had got £100 from the accused for the purpose of cleaning up an overdraft, but said that he got that sum from her in April to repay a loan.

Recently, said witness, he had been paying her £2 a week. Prior to April last she had been betting somewhat successfully and he had had some bets on information she had obtained. He would certainly deny that she had laid £200 for him on April 26 on a race to be run on April 27.

Witness said that if a man were to say that witness had given him a cheque for £996 and told him to bank it in the accused's account, the witness would say that was the first he had ever heard of a suggestion. It was quite untrue for the accused to suggest that he had used certain moneys in his possession to recoup gambling losses. Further suggestions put to him as coming from the accused witness described as pure fiction. The accused had admitted from the first that she was entirely to blame, witness said. The cross-examination was not completed when the hearing was adjourned.

New Record Is Set Up

FOOTWEAR INDUSTRY Peak Production In New Zealand

By Telegraph—Press Association. CHRISTCHURCH, Oct. 23.

Some interesting figures regarding the footwear industry have just been issued, said the Minister of Industries and Commerce (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan) today. The figures, of course, relate to the year ended on March 31, 1940, and they show that there has been a marked increase in the volume of production for the year 1939-1940. The number of pairs of boots, shoes and slippers manufactured went over the 4,000,000 mark and is an appreciable advance on the previous peak of production established in 1938-1939.

Actually more than 800,000 extra pairs of shoes were produced during the year, the respective figures being 3,222,118 and 4,093,181 pairs. Some 3731 operatives were employed during 1939-1940, an increase of 21 per cent. over the previous year. The cost of materials used, said Mr Sullivan, increased by 31 per cent., bringing the amount involved to £960,501, while the value rose by 45 per cent., or a total amount of £495,819.

Salaries and wages paid increased to £641,331, an increase of 32 per cent. The number of establishments increased by one, bringing the total to 17. Increased Demand. The statistics reveal, Mr Sullivan said, that there has been an increased demand for and use of New Zealand leather, as there has been also for imported leathers. The value of New Zealand leather used has risen from £348,194 in 1937-1938 and £356,054 in 1938-1939 to £465,285 in 1939-1940. In the same period imported leathers used rose from £161,874 to £204,551. The total value of materials used rose from £713,709 in 1937-1938 to £960,501 in 1939-1940.

WAIPAWA SOLDIERS TO VOTE IN BY-ELECTION

Facilities Provided For All Men In New Zealand And Overseas

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Oct. 23.

Men from the Waipawa district serving in the armed forces, whether in New Zealand or abroad, will be given an opportunity to record their votes in the Waipawa by-election to be held on Saturday, November 16. Those in mobilisation camps in the Dominion or away from the electorate for territorial training will be granted facilities to vote as absentee voters. Where there is a post office in camp, the postmaster will superintend the polling, but should there be no post office, the postal voting system will apply.

Soon after the close of nominations at noon on Saturday, November 2, full instructions will be cabled to those who will be in charge of the polling arrangements in New Zealand military camps overseas. It is expected that soldiers entitled to vote will be permitted to do so during the period of issue of the writ and November 15—the day before the election. This will allow for the time factor and for the result of voting by soldiers overseas to be available at the same time as the local results are known.

The writ for the by-election will be issued on Tuesday, October 23, on which day at 6 p.m. the Supplementary Roll will close with the Registrar of Electors at Waipukurau. The registration of electors is compulsory.

British Victory In Red Sea

SUNDAY BATTLE Italian Destroyer Blown Up

SHORE GUNS SILENCED

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received October 23, 1.15 p.m.) LONDON, Oct. 22.

In a naval action in the Red Sea, reports an Admiralty communique issued today, the British destroyer Kimberley blew up and destroyed an Italian destroyer and also engaged and silenced two guns of a shore battery.

The action began on Sunday night when a British convoy was attacked by two Italian destroyers, which fired torpedoes on the escorting vessels and shelled the convoy. The British escorting vessels at once returned fire and gave chase. Contact was temporarily lost, but they later regained touch, and the Italian destroyer Francesco Nullo was driven ashore and blown up by a torpedo. The action lasted 40 minutes.

There was one hit on the Kimberley when it came under the fire of the shore battery, but it succeeded in silencing two out of the three shore guns. The only casualties on the Kimberley were three wounded. No other ship, either in the convoy or escorting, was damaged. The Kimberley was launched in 1939 and played a prominent part in the second Battle of Narvik. The Italian vessel was of 1000 tons had a speed of 35 knots and carried a usual complement of 132.

Another Italian warship was attacked by a British bomber in another action in the Red Sea and received a direct hit on the stern.

TERRITORIALS AT DANNEVIRKE PROPER COMFORT

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25 PER CENT. INCREASE IN PETROL ALLOWANCE

Position Has Received Most Thorough Examination Says Minister

By Telegraph—Press Association. CHRISTCHURCH, Oct. 23.

An increase in the petrol allowance of 25 per cent. on the present ration was announced to-night by the Minister of Supply (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan).

Five coupons, Nos. 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16, will be available during November and December, and any one of these coupons may be used at any time during the two months.

"The whole position in relation to the supply and rationing of petrol has received most thorough examination and consideration by the Government," said Mr Sullivan. "It includes first and foremost the defence needs of the British Government in relation to the conservation of dollar funds, the requirements of the public, and the welfare of the industry in this country. The decision made was arrived at after consideration of all the factors named."

As far as the commercial user was concerned, Mr Sullivan said that his instructions to the Oil Fuel Controller still stood. The Controller would continue to make available such supplies of petrol as were considered essential for business and commercial purposes and for increasing production.
