Roosevelt's Determination To Preserve Peace

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received October 24, 11.45 p.m.) PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 23.

President Roosevelt, in the first of a series of major campaign addresses again stated his promise to keep America out of foreign wars. He charged the Republicans with using the dictators' propaganda technique of deliberate misstatements.

"Throughout these years my every act and thought has been directed towards preserving the peace of the world, and more particularly peace in the United States and the Western Hemisphere," he declared. "I stand upon the party platform—We will not participate in foreign wars and we will not send the Army, Navy or Air Force to fight in foreign lands except in case of attack.

"The allegation that I am going to war offends every political and religious conviction I hold dear. I have used every ounce of Presidential prestige to prevent and then to

"I have laboured for peace all my life and will do so to my death."

The Nazi Foreign Minister (von Ribbentrop) and the Spanish Foreign Minister (Senor Suner) were also present at the meetings, which took place on a train on the frontier of Spain and France







Fifteen Shillings Increase

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, Oct. 24. An increase in the Government subsidy of voluntary contributions secured by kindergartens is a feature of the amended education regu-

The general effect of this amendment is that the subsidy will be increased from 25/- to £2 for every pound raised by kindergartens.



THE AXIS LOOKS FOR FRIENDS

The Axis line-up is growing. On various pretexts and by devious ways States large and small are being cajoled, bullied, or dragged into the web of Nazi-Fascist influence, and the result is, on paper at least, a formidable bloc stretching from Spain to Japan.

The German intrigue to bring Spain into the war is, of course, nothing new. It dates back past the actual outbreak of hostilities to the days when German and Italian "volunteers" were fighting in the Spanish Civil War, and "unidentified" submarines were sinking British ships in the Mediterranean. If one thing was certain at that time it was that the dictators were not fighting Franco's battles for him solely in the interests of fraternal sympathy. Somewhere, at some time, both Hitler and Mussolini had fixed a price for their soldiers' lives, and that debt has now fallen due.

It is not likely that the latest moves to persuade Spain to enter the war will cause any loss of sleep in Whitehall. There are many thoughtful people in the British Empire and the United States who for some time have been weighing the possibility of a great totalitarian front comprising Germany, Italy, Japan, and Spain, with Vichy France more or less willingly bringing up the rear. Until the German drive into the Balkans there was also the likelihood of Russia's being included in the parade, but the presence of German forces on the Black Sea coast has given Russia a great deal to think about.

Neither the British Empire nor the United States would regard such a totalitarian line-up as a nightmare come true. There is more to it than that, and the principal point that comes to mind is the question: What makes this herding together so necessary to the Axis Powers?

The answer is fairly easy of deduction: there has been a hitch somewhere.

It will be remembered that since September, 1939, Hitler has won this war several times. First he conquered Poland and occupied Danzig. Having gained his immediate object, he thought that Great Britain and France would be only too willing to let Poland go the way of Czechoslovakia and to call the whole thing off.

That plan went wrong.

Then came the long sea campaign against British shipping. Magnetic mines, bombs, and torpedoes were launched at any and every ship near the British coasts; Britain was to be starved into submission.

That plan also went wrong.

Next the German forces swept into Denmark and Norway, and through Holland and Belgium. The neutral States which had been regarded as part of the Allied defences disappeared, and German air bases were established within a few minutes' flight of the Kent coast. Britain, faced with the threat of aerial attack on a colossal scale, was to realise her extreme peril and offer a compromise peace.

Again a plan went wrong.

The French defence crumbled, the Maginot Line disappeared, the Channel ports were lost, Paris was captured, and France collapsed. Italy declared war, and Britain, left without an ally, withdrew her army from the Continent. By all the rules of war, the British Empire should have tottered over the brink of disintegration.

And still the plan failed. Germany played her highest card—the terror of blitzkrieg, backed by the threat of immediate invasion. She held virtually the whole of the coastline of Europe, and Great Britain seemed within her grasp. But the northern winter is closing in and victory is no

All this explains why the dictators are frantically seeking friends. They may find friends of a sort. The pact with Japan shows what can be done, but if Japan has not learned just what the dictators' pacts and promises are worth, she is amazingly credulous.

No—the search for friends is yet another "plan."

Presidents Of North And South Island Motor Unions Issue Joint Statement

This would have allowed a considerable increase in consumption in recent months and a future monthly allowance greatly in excess of what the Minister now proposes.

"Support for the Unions' stand is found in the decision of the Oil Fuel Control authorities in Australia, the

Control authorities in Australia, the only British Dominion other than New Zealand to introduce rationing, where the quantities of petrol made available are consistently double and in some cases more than double, the existing allowances in New Zealand.

"Under the latest proposals by the Minister, motor vehicle owners renot reinstated even to the position of the period immediately before the harsh reduction of July 1. Relief from the inconvenience under which motor vehicle owners have laboured in recent months is not granted under the new proposals, and to our minds the Minister will have to go a good deal further to "Not Reinstated" have to go a good deal further to meet the reasonable requirements of motorists."


