The "Sunday Times" aeronautical correspondent, discussing the major problem of defeating the night bomber, says: "Production on both sides at present outstrips the casualties by over ten to one. ## Resist Menace Of **Dictator Nations**

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received October 27, 9.5 p.m.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. Surveying world developments in a speech at the National Press Club, the Secretary of State (Mr Cordell Hull)

said: "Only once previously has such a grave danger threat-ened this nation. To-day all peaceful nations, including the United States, are gravely menaced. "The danger arises from the acts of a small group of national rulers who have transformed their peoples into

forceful instruments for widespread domination by conquest." Mr Hull reviewed the decade beginning with the Japanese attack on Manchuria and continued: "The tragedy of the present world situation lies in the fact that peacefully disposed nations failed to recognise in time the true nature of the aims of the rulers of the heavily armed nations. They were lulled into a false sense of security by assurances given by these rulers that their aims were limited.

"The rulers of these nations violated the principles of peaceful and orderly international relations with merciless armed attacks and unrebuted."

"The first need for all nations still masters of their destiny is to create as speedily and completely as possible an impregnable means of defence. In view of the unprecedent-ed character of the menacing developments abroad we have frankly recognised the darger involved. As an important means of strengthening our own defence and preventing attack anywhere in this hemisphere the United States is affording all feasible facilities for obtaining supplies by those nations which, while defending themselves against barbaric attack, are checking the spread

merciless armed attacks and unre-strained terrorisation through the strained terrorisation through the slaughter of women and children.

"Deceit, fraud, guile, forced labour and the confiscation of property were the weapons constantly used by the conquerors. They adhere to no geographical lines and disregard. our and the confiscation of property were the weapons constantly used by the conquerors. They adhere to no geographical lines and disregard every right of neutrals. Their fixed objectives are securing control of the high seas.

Oceans Give No Safety "Let nobody comfort himself with the delusion that these are mere excesses of war which will be volun-tarily suspended when fighting ceases. There is nothing more dan-gerous for our nation than the assumption that the avalanche of con-quest could under no circumstances reach any vital point in this hemi sphere. The oceans give this hemi sphere no guarantee against the possibility of economic, political or mili

sibility of economic, political or mili-tary attack.

"The oceans are barriers, but they also are highways. Should the con-querors gain control of the other continents they would next concen-trate on perfecting their control of the seas, of the air over the seas, of the world's economy. They might then strike at communication lines. then strike at communication lines, at the commerce and life of this hemisphere and ultimately we might find ourselves compelled to fight on our own soil for the defence of our independence and our very lives.

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

As Desserts They Are Delicious

Soaking in cold water for 24 to 36 hours is recommended for most dried fruits, as this reverses the drying process and restores the fruit to its original juicy state. Dried fruits are economical to use. One pound equals four to five pounds of fresh fruit. Less sugar is

many varieties may be stored in a small space. This enables the housewife to prepare dishes of great variety, and make fruit available all the year round all the year round.

Here are general instructions for preparing dried apricots, peaches, nectarines, pears, and prunes to serve as stewed fruits.

Allow one pound fruit to three pints cold water and three pounds

Soak fruit, after rinsing thoroughly, in cold water for 24 hours.
Strain water, in which fruit has soaked, through muslin. Dissolve in it the sugar, boil the sweetened juice five minutes and pour over the soak

If preferred the fruit may be put into boiling syrup and allowed to simmer for three minutes. Serve with custard or cream.

The flavour is often improved by additional flavourings such as lemon, cinnamon, or cloves.



## PEACE WHERE THERE IS NO PEACE

The failure of the German plan for the invasion of Great Britain has evidently convinced Herr Hitler of the urgent necessity for consolidating his gains. If he can build up a Continental system under German leadership he will be better able to ward off the British counter-stroke which, as Mr Churchill has promised, will be made in due course for the deliverance of Europe.

To attain this end, peace with France must be arranged as quickly as possible. With France drawn into the German orbit, and her domestic and colonial resources placed at the disposal of the Nazis, their position would be enormously strengthened for the continuance of the war against Britain. Hence the feverish efforts of Herr Hitler to reach an understanding with the Vichy Government which will not only yield spoils for Germany and Italy, but will make France a passive, if not an active, ally in the Nazi plan for world

The question at the moment is: Can France be saved from falling in with the German scheme? The remarkable speech delivered yesterday by Mr Cordell Hull and the King's message to Marshal Petain are indications of the tremendous diplomatic struggle that is going on. The Germans have a willing and useful tool in Pierre Laval. This sly politician, who according to Mr Geoffrey Cox, has an overweening personal ambition to wield political power, is ready to march step by step with the totalitarians and is prepared to sell his country to Germany if he is allowed to become its dictatorial head.

When France was beaten there was a widespread impression throughout the country that the defeat of Britain was also inevitable, but the events of the past two months have done much to convince the French that the Nazis are by no means invincible and many of them are taking fresh heart. Radio commentators report that hope is reviving daily in France, and it is to encourage Frenchmen who might otherwise bow their necks to the German yoke that his Majesty has sent an inspiring and encouraging message which, although addressed to the head of the Vichy Government, is really meant for the French nation.

With the same object in view, the American Secretary of State has delivered the most vigorous denunciation of the Nazi conquests which has yet fallen from the lips of any statesman of a neutral country, and has warned both Germany and the Vichy Government that there will be no recognition of a peace that is imposed by force on the victims of

American opinion counts for a great deal in France, and it will be interesting to watch the reactions of Marshal Petain and his Cabinet to the pressure from opposing quarters.

The temptation to yield to Hitler will be great. The French are suffering severely from the German occupation. Apart from the plundering that is going on and the dislocation of the economic life of France, the Germans are holding an enormous number of French prisoners of war whose liberation must be ardently desired by their relatives.

Bribery and intrigue will be playing their part in the negotiations, and unhappily many French politicians and officials are susceptible to corrupting influences.

It can be said to-day that one of the most critical phases of the war has been reached, and the situation holds potential perils for both sides. But the high cards are not all with the Axis. There are signs of weakness in Italy, whose naval losses have made her position increasingly precarious, while in the East Japan is plainly alarmed at the idea of joint action by the United States and the British Empire.

Thus it will be seen that the diplomatic battle in France is of vital importance, and Vichy is in an unenviable predicament.

Resistance to the German demands will mean still greater distress and hardship, for the Nazi is a hard taskmaster, but for the sake of her future and to hasten her ultimate liberation, France should stand firm and refuse the offer of a peace where there can in reality be none.

## President Of N.Z. Federation Criticises Policy In A Detailed Review

made by the Minister of Supply, increasing the petrol ration by what is stated to be 25 per cent. on the present allowance, says the New Zealand Motor Trade Federation in an official statement by the president (Mr. C. R. Edmond).

While 25 per cent. may seem a substantial rise, it must not be forgotten that the July reduction was on the basis of 33 1-3 per cent. ## NAPIER HOME GUARD German 'Planes Fly High Then Swoop Daringly Down

On London

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received October 27, 10.55 p.m.)

LONDON, Oct. 26.

In to-night's attack on London the raiders flew so high that the engines were inaudible, but the predictors picked them up and the guns provided a hot reception. Others daringly swooped just over the balloons.

A single German raider made a surprise swoop on London and bombed a crowded market-place, flats, and a street near the shopping centre. There were 50 casualties, including several killed, in a new building which sustained a direct hit.

When a bomb fell outside a theatre in the London area last night the blast struck an omnibus and killed a member of the R.A.F. and another man.

Two blocks of flats were severely damaged and a public house, which previously had been hit, is now demolished. All the windows were broken in a large block of offices.

Eight explosions in another district wrecked several houses and seriously injured four persons.

Casualties, some fatal, occurred when two shelters in different districts were hit.

An explosive bomb crashed into a club in a London area in which there are believed to have been many persons. Some were killed while sleeping under the billiard tables. Rescuers fought through a sheet of flame from a blazing gas sheet of flame from a blazing gas. sheet of flame from a blazing gas main which barred one entrance to reach the occupants and brought out many alive.

Directed to Safety

The casualties would have been heavier if the explosion had been later, because many of those usually taking shelter there had not arrived. The part owner of the club, knowing the lay-out of the club premises, was able to save many of those trapped and direct them through the debris and darkness to safety.

High explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped over a wide area. A row of houses was demolished and a mother and daughter trapped in an upstairs room when their house was severely damaged.
