LONDON, Oct. 28.

The "Daily Telegraph's" Athens correspondent says that 10 Italian divisions, totalling 200,000 men, attacked Greece from Albania at 6.30 a.m., supported by 'planes and warships. The points attacked by air included aerodromes at Tatoi and Eleusis.

Reports from Budapest state that the Italians were repulsed with losses in almost all their attempts to cross the Greek frontier. Later the Italians occupied two small frontier towns, Bodiho and Radoti, suffering 70 killed and 180 wounded.

The main Italian thrust from Albania is aimed eastward at Florina, and observers at Athens suggest that Salonika is the principal Italian objective. The invaders are apparently also thrusting in the direction of the mountainous region of Epirus.

The Greeks are resisting stubbornly and are actually carrying the war into the enemy's territory at one point.

The "Giornale d'Italia" says that great Greek troop activity in the mountains on the Albanian frontier beyond Konispoli is reported, while columns of lorries are moving continuously on the Florina road.

"I was half a mile or more below and behind the others as they crossed the coast. My target was dropping back rapidly and I was hoping to finish him off when six more Messerschmitt 109's came down at me from over the Channel in line abreast. They went into line astern and circled round me at about 30, yard intervals, but number six was about 100 yards behind number five, so I went for him. He climbed steeply in a close turn.

"I had about 300 miles an hour on the clock so I pulled up almost vertically and gave him a burst flat into his feet from beneath. He rolled over and went straight down.



## WATER ENGINEERS IN AFRICA

DIFFICULT PROBLEMS **OVERCOME** 

A VITAL WORK

Little-known Aspect Of War Strategy

(Official News Service) Among the advance guards of the South African troops in the north of the continent, there are none so important as the water engineers. Water is one of the main problems of the northern fron-tier districts of Kenya. In the months to come it will be the prize for which actions will be fought. It will determine future strategy. Water will be the reason why some places are held and others abandoned. So the South African water engineers have laid the foundations

of our campaign.
Armed with the most modern equipment possible, the water en-gineers have the distinction of being the first South African unit to go so far afield, says a correspondent. They have penetrated into barren desert wastes. While the remainder of the army have been comfortably camped in pleasant country, small groups of our engineers have spent many lonely days and nights in areas close to roving enemy patrols.

Miner, Mechanic, Artist I saw some of the men of this advance guard at work. Among them were miners from the Rand, mechanics from well-known engineering firms and garages. One of them in civil life had been a com mercial artist in Johannesburg, but on the outbreak of war he returned

to the engineering profession.

These engineers were camped not far from the front line trenches Despite frequent air raid warnings and occasional raids by the Banda, they carried or their job as uncon-cernedly as if they were still in the Union. Their boast is that they will get down to water level quicker will get down to water level quicker than anyone north of the Equator.
All of them are strong, sunbrowned men, and they have made a splendid impression among the native troops in the front line areas. Their principal job at the moment is boring for water, and they have brought with them all the necessary equipment. I have seen few more incongruous scenes the necessary equipment. I have seen few more incongruous scenes than a tall boring plant working at top pressure in a lonely desert area. The young, armed soldiers perspired as they worked, but all of them were cheerful. Their one grievance was that though they were the first South Africans to visit the front line area, they had still seen no action worth menstill seen no action worth men-

Back in one of the base camps I heard a story which illustrates the resourcefulness of the engineers. A large party of sappers, drawn from all parts of the Union, was rushed to Kenya to prepare a camp for the main contingent of South

THE DEMOCRATIC LABOUR PLATFORM

The Lee-ward drift of the Labour movement is beginning to assume serious proportions, and already many are speculating as to the political developments which may follow a split in the Labour ranks. With an engaging optimism, Mr. Lee predicts that the split will result in the official Labour Party being reduced to a chip, while the Democratic Party will be almost the whole log.

"Wishful thinking" has its uses for the purposes of propaganda, and no one requires greater faith in himself than the founder of a new political party, but it is hard to believe with Mr. Lee, that the administration of the country is shortly to pass into the hands of the gentlemen who framed the Democratic Labour Party's platform.

That the New Zealand Labour Party is in danger of becoming a house divided against itself is clear enough. In this respect, the history of the Labour Party in England and Australia is repeating itself in New Zealand. The ultimate effect of the division, however, is less likely to put extremists in power than it is to bring about a realignment of political parties.

All that can be said at this stage is that civil war in the Labour Movement will be a great help to the Opposition at the general election next year.

The platform of the Democratic Labour Party, which was published in the "Daily Mail" yesterday, is a clever bit of political carpentry, and as a vote-catcher is not to be despised. The chief plank is social credit, and it seems rather appropriate that its adoption was moved by a delegate named Douglas. Like the famous Townsend plan of liberal pensions for everybody, which swept like a prairie fire over several western American states, social credit has a fascination for thousands who do not know what it means, but think it offers a short cut to material prosperity for everyone, with a maximum enjoyment of the good things of life from a minimum of physical

Unfortunately we are living in a world where wealth has to be produced by hard work before it is available for consumption, and the means to produce must be available, as well as the capacity, if the standard of living is to be maintained and raised.

Many of the things that are part and parcel of the standard of living in New Zealand are produced abroad, and are obtainable only out of the proceeds of the sale of exported agricultural products. We have no iron and steel industry, no cotton textile industry, no chemical industries to speak of, not to mention a score or more others which are essential to the enjoyment of the present standard of living.

Mr. Lee would finance the establishment of these industries with a "debt-free currency" which "can be issued to the extent of the unutilised productive capacity." This "unutilised productive capacity" is an abstraction which may appear to mean something to the exponents of social credit, but is rather vague and meaningless to practical minds. It is sufficient to say that even if loans were available to persons or government departments for the establishment of such industries as those mentioned above, the technical difficulties in the way are so great that it would be a long time before the output would make much difference to the standard of living.

It is perfectly true that past governments have been more concerned with the development of the agricultural, rather than the industrial resources of the Dominion, and even if it is conceded that the future is destined to see a movement towards a more balanced national economy, the expansion of industry will have to depend on enterprise and capital rather than on the intangible thing called social credit.

Many of the planks in the platform do not differ greatly from the policy of the official Labour Party. Mr. Lee merely wants to go further and faster. Much will depend on the progress his movement makes in the next twelve months.


