GREEKS ADVANCE AGAINST ITALIANS

Albania Entered: Country Is Urged To Revolt

REINFORCEMENTS FOR

Troopships Already On Way Across The Adriatic

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received October 30, 11.45 p.m.)

LONDON, Oct. 30.

The Cairo correspondent of the Associated Press says that the Greek leaders have learned that the Greek Army has struck the first blow at many places on the frontier. Mountain troops have pushed through several valleys into Albania, while Greek 'planes have dropped pamphlets urging the Albanians to revolt.

Radio reports state that the Greeks are holding the Italians comfortably at all points despite successive attacks of troops supported by bombers.

It is also reported by radio that the Italians are rushing reinforcements to Albania. Seven troopships have already been sent across the Adriatic and others are believed to be on the way.

A Belgrade message says that Italians attacking the Greek village of Dipalica were repulsed with 20 killed and 60 wounded.

It is reported from Tirana that the Italians have broken the Greek line at the south-eastern tip of Albania after 30 hours of fighting. Mountain troops have advanced from the Koritza sector. .

A report from Belgrade states that 50 were killed and 300 wounded in an air raid on Patras to-day.

The Athens correspondent of "The Times" says that the British Minister to Greece (Sir Michael Palairet) informed the Greek Prime Minister (General Metaxas) that Britain is immediately opening unlimited credits for Greece.

Bulgarian sources report the arrival of five German divisions in Albania ready for a lightning attack across northern Greece the moment the Italians pass the frontier defences.

Experienced snipers tumbling men and mules from the narrow mountain ledges enabled the Greek mountain units to throw back well-equipped Italian columns. The Greek communications are working perfectly. Isolated parties are connected by field wireless and observation 'planes are co-operating.

Still probing for weak spots in Greece's mountain defences, the Italians have not yet launched the main offensive. They claim further successes, but Athens insists that the Greek lines are unbroken. The Rome radio says that the Italian forces have advanced 40 miles into Greece at one point and have captured the town of Sannikol.

Explosions from the guns quicky followed the sirens in London to-night, and repeated flashes of gunfire were seen from all quarters as 'planes, flying high in the clear sky, streaked across the capi-

tal and away again.
Incendiaries fell early in the raid n a populous London area, and two high-explosive bombs were dropped on a residential district.

About 160 raiders, mostly fighter-bombers, tried to reach London during four elerts on Tuesday. A

during four elerts on Tuesday. A very small proportion penetrated the outer defences.

During the first raid, high-explosive bombs demolished two houses in London. A man was killed and a number wounded, several seriously, when a London crypt was directly hit. Another bomb hit a London hospital mortuary and narrowly missed a ward in which there were 50 patients. Seven bombs there were 50 patients. Seven bombs fell in the district, but there were no casualties.

Children Injured A bomb damaged an institution for crippled children in south-east England. Water poured from broken pipes. Seven children were slightly injured, and a cook and a house-

BRITISH NAVY ESSENTIAL TO AMERICA'S SAFETY

U.S. Ambassador Urges Support Of President Roosevelt's War Policy

(United Press Association-Copyright.) Received October 30, 9.30 p.m. MONTREAL, Oct. 29.

Mr. Joseph P. Kennedy, U.S. Ambassador to Britain, who returned to the United States recently, in a broadcast to-day, endorsed President Roosevelt's re-election.

He said that the charge that the President was attempting to involve the United States in the war was false. Criticism of the Munich Pact was unjustified, he added. Mr. Neville Chamberlain and nearly everyone in Britain knew that Munich was but an armistice. What would have happened to England, he asked, if the blitzkrieg of 1940 had occurred in

Mr Kennedy said he was more convinced than ever that America should keep aloof from the war. The American people were overwhelmingly in favour of avoiding war, out at the same time giving all aid short of war to Britain. No more harmful step could be taken from the viewpoint of Britain than our declaration of war

"England's valiant fight is giving us time to prepare," said Mr Kennedy. "Without assistance from us Britain would find it much more difficult to carry on.

"I have seen outnumbered but the surrous and men of the calibre of the omcers and men of the Royal Navy, can feel completely assured that the surrendering of the fleet to Hitler is thought so fantastic as to be beyond basic belief.

"Democracies such as the United States and England are difficult to carry on.

THE WAR IN THE BALKANS

Out of the tangle of conflicting reports and contradictory propaganda concerning the Italian attack on Greece, one fact emerges plainly: Greece is not another Norway. She has had sufficient warning of the Italian onslaught in advance to work out a practicable scheme of defence, and although it is obvious that a State the size of Greece could not long withstand unaided the battering of the Axis war-machine, there is no questioning the fact that Greece will fight and fight hard to maintain her independence.

On the other hand, while it can be said that Greece will not be overrun as easily as Norway and Denmark were overrun, it is doubtful whether Greece will rise to the epic heights achieved by Finland in her struggle with the Red Army. In the last war Greece, for various reasons, did not play a particularly heroic part, and the war with Turkey which ended so disastrously for Greece in 1922 effectively ended Greek hopes of a revival of the great days of the Hellenes.

But against these modern failures must be set the Greek tradition of liberty which inspired the revolt against Turkish domination in the early days of the nineteenth century and which created such admiration in Great Britain that for more than a hundred years there has been a peculiarly strong link of sympathy between the two nations

To-day Italy has assumed the role once played by Turkey and again Greece looks to Great Britain as her sole ally in the struggle.

In the present campaign an element of doubt is introduced by the attitude of Greece's former enemy, Turkey. A few weeks ago, Turkey announced that if Greece were attacked she (Turkey) would not stand by. Since that pronouncement was made, the Axis has moved into Rumania and to the western coast of the Black Sea. This move involves a direct threat to the Bosporus, Istanbul, and the Dardanelles. while an Italian conquest of Greece would leave Turkey in an extremely precarious predicament. But Turkey, at the moment, is inclined to evade her responsibilities both to Greece and Great Britain.

The reason for this attitude is fairly obvious. Turkey cannot take action unless she is absolutely certain of the attitude of Russia, and Russia, as always, remains an enigma. No one knows whether the agreement under which Ger-

many and Russia partitioned Poland has lapsed or whether a new scheme for the carving up of the Balkans has been evolved. In the days of the Czars, Russia dreamed of extending her frontiers to include Constantinople, now called Istanbul. In 1914 the Allied Powers promised Constantinople to Russia, but the promise lapsed after the revolution, and when the post-war realignments were made in Europe, Russia was too busy working out an unworkable scheme of Communism to worry much about Constantinople.

But since that time, Russia has re-emerged as an energetic, truculent, imperialistic Power. She has regained virtually all the territory she lost in 1918. Poland, Bessarabia, Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania—all have been reabsorbed. Even Finland, in spite of a magnificent defence, has once more come under the sway of the Kremlin.

All this leads to the conclusion that Russia may again be trying out her old game of letting others do the fighting for her as long as she is sure of a share in the booty. If her plan is to keep Turkey out of the struggle in Greece and then quietly to appropriate what she wants for herself, the situation in the Balkans will become increasingly dangerous.

The strongest grounds for hope are to be found in the reports that already British forces are engaged in the fight to save Greece.

ISLAND AND EMPIRE

While the Rt. Hon. J. G. Coates may be fully justified in his suggestion that if the United Kingdom should fall the disaster would not necessarily mean the collapse of the British Empire, many people will find it impossible to regard such a possibility with the calm, if logical, detachment of Mr Coates.

It is true that Great Britain to-day is a single island in the Atlantic, but she is no less the central mainstay of an empire which embraces a quarter of the earth and its people. If defeat should fall on Britain, there is no doubt that the Empire's administrative centre could be moved overseas probably to Canada—and that the fight against totalitarian tyranny could be carried on. But it is no less certain that if the British Isles fell under alien domination there would be an inconceivable alteration in the world's conditions, and the results in more than one continent would be convulsive.

Great Britain is fighting for her life. At the same time she is waging a colossal struggle for the life of the Empire. No one in the free countries, and least of all the British people themselves, doubt that the Mother Country will come through the ordeal, but a major disaster to Great Britain would be a major disaster to every corner of the Empire,

Mr W. W. Mulholland Discusses Question Of Hours And Expenditure
