Just before the outbreak of war the Duke visited London to interest Britain in help for persecuted Catholics in Germany. He was received by Queen Mary and was given thousands of pounds from Lord Baldwin's refugee fund.

It is believed that the Duke was influenced by Hitler, who said that he had never forsaken the Catholic faith, and said that he was still a good Catholic.

Republican Support "Germany's new peace offensive will be launched on the eve of the Presidential election. Germany will support the Republican candidate, as she believes that she will find a certain section of his supporters willing to accept a peace offer."

"Germany's peace terms, which have been lodged with the American Embassy in Paris, provide for the British Empire to remain as it is and those parts of occupied Europe to remain outside the influence of Britain. It says that Hitler intended bringing the plan into operation on the basis of maintaining the status quo in Europe after bringing France and Spain into the Axis grouping, and subjugating the Balkans. # Success Would Mean Control Of World's Exportable Wool Surplus

LONDON, Nov. 2. It is learned from Bradford that a British trade mission is shortly leaving for South America and may pave the way for the British acquisition of the Argentine and Uruguay wool clips, thereby giving the United Kingdom control of the

world's exportable wool. It is stated that this would have three immediate and most important possibilities.

(1) It would prevent Japan acquiring the South American surplus at prices at present upwards of tenpence a pound under the United Kingdom controlled prices, thereby undercutting the British with piecegoods produced by cheap labour.

(2) It would centralise the whole of the world's export-

able wool for organised redistribution after the war. (3) It would strengthen the demand for Bradford products, which had sadly declined until the activities of the Export Council caused a revival.

# BAYONET POINT **Enemy Resistance Overwhelmed** And Important Summit

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received November 3, 7.45 p.m.)

LONDON, Nov. 2.

The Greeks are reported to have checked the Italian drive from Koritza by capturing at bayonet point the strategically important summit of Mount Pissoderi, dominating the only motorised route to Florina and from where Koritza can be bombed. The right flank of the Greek army in the Florina sector has advanced about five miles inside Albanian territory along the main road.

Further south in the Pindus area the Greeks apparently retired some 10 miles, but they advanced again after receiving reinforcements and captured a ridge of the Pindus Mountains.

The enemy are bringing up various types of artillery on the south ern coastal section and it seems ob vious that they are preparing to attack. This is the most likely region for them to use tanks and other mechanised units.

It is understood that about two divisions of Italian troops are con-

centrated in this area. centrated in this area.

The Greek communique states:
"Our troops in the Florina sector, after overwhelming the enemy resistance, penetrated Albanian territory for 3½ miles. We occupied strong military positions and captured nine officers, 163 men and 150 horses and mules.
"There were heavy artillery duels

"There were heavy artillery duels on the Epirus front. Enemy 'planes bombing Corfu bore the Greek colours. Our air force, flying low, bombed the aerodrome at Koritza; one of the enemy was shot down."

When the mine was being 'reopened, a "pilot" mill was set up at a cost of about £50,000 to test the ore and determine costs of produc-tion. Now, only the skeleton of that mill remains among the junk and wreckage of the earlier industry.





If you have this sort of skin wear a suntan make-up by all means, for the warm brown tints help to protect your skin, but remember that the heat of the sun, salt air and strong winds dry out the skin and that dry out the skin and that, there-fore, you need an extra amount of oil and creams. You should cut out all skin tonics, astringent lotions and soap—using a cleansing cream or cleansing milk in the place of soap. The best skin foods and massage creams are those intended for

dry skins.

Do not expect miracles from bleaching preparations. The suntan-ned skin is already dried out by exposure to strong light, and a pre-paration sufficiently strong to reach the pigmented under-layer is likely to cause redness and irritation. So give up the idea of turning from brown to white in no time at all, and make up your mind to keep the fading skin in good condition with plenty of creams worked in by mas-

FLARE-UP IN THE NEAR EAST

The President of Turkey (General Ismet Inonu) has adroitly cleared up a good many points in his speech to the Turkish Assembly. In one sentence he says: "At a time when Great Britain is carrying on under difficult conditions a heroic struggle for existence, it is my duty to proclaim that the bonds of alliance uniting us are solid and unbreakable"; and in another he states that "amidst the vicissitudes of the world Russo-Turkish relations present a factor of intrinsic value, not

These two statements can be reconciled easily enough with the present Turkish policy of watchful neutrality, but the report, published this morning, that leave has been suspended in the Turkish army indicates something more than mere watchfulness. The truth of the matter is that the possibility of Turkey's being compelled to enter the conflict has been brought appreciably nearer by the Italian attack on Greece combined with the German moves on the frontier of Yugoslavia. As the situation is at present, it may safely be assumed that Yugoslavia is to all intents and purposes in the power of the Axis. Her geographical position and the German "protection" of Rumania leave her only the alternatives of following Rumania into the Axis net or fighting a war that would be lost before it began for the simple reason that the Italian occupation of Albania leaves the Yugoslavs with no chance of retreat. In the last war, when the Serbians and Montenegrins (both of whom now come under the common name of Yugoslavs) were attacked simultaneously by Germany, Austria, and Bulgaria, their heroic little armies were successfully withdrawn from Albania under the protection of the British Navy. But to-day, when Italy is on the side of the aggressors, there is no possibility of a repetition of history as far as the

southern Slavs are concerned.

Turkey is in a different position. Except for a fragment of territory round Istanbul—the last relic of the vast Turkish Empire in Europe-she has no common frontier with any European Power except Russia, and, if General Inonu's speech is to be taken at its face value, Turkey has no fear of a Russian move against her. This does not agree with earlier reports that Russia, more or less in alliance with Germany, was contemplating the acquisition of the Bosporus and the Dardanelles, but it coincides neatly with the rueful statement in a Japanese newspaper (published on Saturday) that "it is well known that the Soviet is carrying on clandestine negotiations with England and the United States." So the tangle in the Near East resolves itself into this: The Axis can readily obtain control of the greater part of the Balkan Peninsula if and when it chooses to do so. It cannot, however, make a complete conquest of Greece unless there is a sudden collapse of the Greek forces and a serious interruption of the flow of British help to Greece. The establishment of German or Italian forces in any position in which they would constitute a direct threat to Turkey would result in a wide extension of the war without any marked gain to the Axis Powers them-

The Axis, and more particularly the Fascist end of it, has put itself in an uncomfortably tight corner. If it over-reaches itself it runs the risk of a major action in which British sea, land and air forces would play a vital part. If it continues its go-slow policy it will cause a serious slump in prestige among the smaller States and simultaneously will give its enemies and potential enemies further opportunities for consolidation.

### THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION

The result of the United States Presidential election this week will have a potent influence on the course of world events. While most people in British countries would like to see President Roosevelt returned to power for a further term, there is little question of the election of Mr. Wendell Willkie affecting in any way the United States policy of giving the utmost support to Great Britain in the struggle against totalitarianism. According to a cablegram published in Saturday's "Daily Mail," there is what might be described as hot competition between the Democrat and Republican candidates over the measure of support which they are prepared to offer. Mr. Roosevelt has promised 12,000 'planes. "Well, who wouldn't?" blandly asks Mr. Willkie.

The British Empire will draw a good deal of comfort from this passage-at arms. It indicates that however wide a divergence of thought there may be over domestic affairs in the United States, there is unanimity over the need for reinforcing Britain in the defence of liberty,


