## Roosevelt Certain To Return STARK TRAGEDY To The White House "ELECTORAL LANDSLIDE"

## Supporters Concede Defeat Of Mr Willkie

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received November 6, 11.20 p.m.) NEW YORK, Nov. 6.

The "New York Times" declared at 12.46 a.m. that victory is certain for Mr. F. D. Roosevelt "unless Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana reverse the strong Democratic trend at present showing. If the indications continue on the same proportions Mr Roosevelt will win in an electoral landslide, but control of the House of Representatives is undecided by the early

The "Times" adds that Mr Roosevelt will also win his home State, New York, which has 47 votes—much the largest vote in the country.

The Republican "Herald-Tribune" concedes Mr Roosevelt's re-election. Early returns indicate that 76 Democrats and 10 Republicans have been elected to the House of Representatives and 28 more are certain Democratic seats in the southern

At 1.30 a.m. Mr Roosevelt was leading in 37 States with an Electoral College vote of 436. Mr Wendell L. Willkie was leading in 11 States with 95 Electoral College votes

votes.

Mr Roosevelt was then polling 58.6 per cent. and Mr Willkie 41.4 per tent. of the popular vote.

Mr Willkie in a broadcast refused to concede defeat. "I am not disheartened," he said.

There are seven Presidential and Vice-Presidential candidates but only Democrats and Republicans are represented in all 48 States. Minor candidates include Socialist, Mr N. T. Kruger; two Socialist Labourites, Messrs J. W. Aiken and J. W. Ford; two Prohibitionists, Messrs R. W. Babson and E. V. Moorman, and two National Greenbacks, Messrs J. Zahnd and J. E. Yates.

There are 102 candidates for 35 Senate seats and 979 candidates for 432 House of Representative seats.

Bad Weather Fails To Spoil Aim

British Official Wireless. (Received November 6, 7.45 p.m.) RUGBY, Nov. 5.

Adverse weather over Germany on Monday night again hampered operations by aircraft of the Bomber Command. Channel coast areas were attacked and early in the night op-portunity was taken of a weather improvement to launch harassing attacks against docks and shipping at Le Havre, Boulogne and Ostend.

The sky was clear when the first raider reached Le Havre shortly

after 8.30 p.m., dropping a stick of bombs across the basin at Demaria from a low level, starting several large fires.

By 9.30 great banks of cloud 6000 feet deep covered the sky, reducing visibility to the minimum. In the final attack, launched in a shallow dive to below cloud level, a salvo of heavy-calibre bombs was seen to strike a large hangar-like building at the Gare Maritime.

The disaster, which cast a gloom over the whole district, is the worst experienced on the West Coast since the Dobson mine explosion in 1926 when nine were killed.

Deafening Explosion

Employees at the Briandale mine, which is situated on the opposite side of the Ten Mile Creek, heard a deafening explosion and saw a tongue of flame, estimated to be 150 feet long shoot from the mouth of the drive of Kaye's Mine. 

## THE PETROL CONTROVERSY

Ministers of the Crown do not, as a rule, go out of their way to make enemies by inflicting hardship and inconvenience on the public, because they know that the people concerned have votes, and when a suitable opportunity occurs they are liable to express their resentment in an unmistakable fashion. It can be assumed therefore, that in drastically rationing petrol supplies, the Government is impelled to do so by stern necessity and by the pressure of circumstances be-

At the same time, the motor trade, which has been fighting for a more liberal ration has a distinct grievance. Confusing and inconsistent statements have been made by Ministers from time to time, and the public have been left in a state of uncertainty as to whether it was matter of a shortage in the supply of petrol or of foreign ex-

change to pay for it, or both. It now seems fairly clear that rationing has been dictated purely by financial considerations, and that the supply is determined solely by the amount of petrol the Government will allow the oil companies to purchase. Whatever gallonage is necessary for a reserve can be put into the tanks up to the limit of their working capacity at any time, and held there. The quantity available for the motoring public has been cut down to make the smallest possible demand on for-

It may be news to the public to know that petrol rationing was contemplated before the war broke out and preparations were made for it. When the Minister of Finance states that every dollar spent on petrol is a dollar less for Britain to spend on munitions, he is hardly fair to users of motor vehicles. The effect of the statement is to raise misgivings in the mind of the car owner that if he is seen out in his car, he is helping the enemy, and whether this or the price

of petrol is the determining factor, many cars are out of commission. It would be just as true, however, to say that every pound spent on imports which have to be paid for in sterling is a pound less for Britain to spend on her war effort, and the consumption of tea and sugar which have to be purchased abroad has the same relationship to the war effort as the use of petrol. One would not like to be told that every time one drank a cup of tea one was reducing the capacity of Britain to wage war. Should it ever become necessary we will not only do without tea and petrol, but we will go barefoot if it will con-

tribute to the crushing of Hitler. It is important however, that the facts should be placed in their proper perspective. Rationing of petrol and other commodities is necessary purely for financial reasons. Mr. Nash gave an impressive statement in Auckland on Tuesday of the demands which must take priority in the allocation of sterling exchange. The balance that is left is utterly inadequate to cover all the purchases importers would like to make, and a good deal of heartburning and dissatisfaction has been engendered amongst those who are left out in the cold.

The only way that sterling funds can be increased over and above the amount yielded by the sale of our exports would be by means of a loan, but the Government has wisely refused to ask the British investor to lend money to enable us to buy all the petrol, whisky, and silk stockings we might be justified in importing under different circumstances.

Before the war is over we may be compelled to pledge our credit in an external market, and if this comes about, America will be the only country in a position to help us out, but borrowing in New York should be resorted to only as a last desperate expedient to finance our

## MR ROOSEVELT'S THIRD TERM

The unprecedented return of the President of the United States to office for a third term is both a source of encouragement to the British Empire and a heavy blow to the enemy nations. The American people have given an unmistakable endorsement of Mr. Roosevelt's policy of supporting Great Britain to the utmost limit short of war and at the same time they have demonstrated that the United States is fully aware of the implications of the present world situation. The result of the election is a magnificent tribute to the work of

Mr Roosevelt, who has been primarily responsible for the preservation of peace in the Western Hemisphere while giving the aggressor nations no encouragement in the form of appeasement.

There is no reason to suppose that the election of Mr. Wendell Willkie would have been followed by any marked slowing-down in the flow of American help to Great Britain, but it is undoubtedly true that Mr Willkie, although he had the support of some of the most powerful influences in American life, did not inspire the same trust (in British countries, at least) as President Roosevelt. Mr Roosevelt is an American Churchill with the idealism of the late President Wilson. But besides idealism he has powers of performance which place him above President Wilson as a world leader, and his career since his first election as President in 1933 has given him a unique international standing.

Mr Roosevelt's re-election will ensure the continuance of the Roosevelt-Cordell Hull partnership, which has been a powerful factor in re-establishing the prestige of the United States throughout the world. Further, there is no question that the policy of Anglo-American co-operation in regard to matters of mutual defence will be maintained and strengthened.

The election campaign has been hard, and frequently bitter, but the result will send a wave of relief through all countries where the ideal of democratic government is still maintained. It will have an incalculable effect in Great Britain, and it constitutes the sharpest rebuff the dictators have ever suffered from the other side of the Atlantic.

Mr Churchill began his eagerly-awaited statement by a review of the progress of the German air attacks since October 4. Hitler had declared his will to wipe out the cities of Britain. Mr Churchill said he did not doubt that the Nazi leader at that time sincerely heliev. he did not doubt that the Nazi leader at that time sincerely believ-ed that it was in his power to carry his will into effect, but the cities of Britain were still standing, although 14,000 civilians had been killed and 20,000 seriously injured—nearly four-fifths of them in the capital.

Property Damage

A great deal of house property had been destroyed or damaged, but nothing had been done which could not be covered by the Government's insurance scheme. Very little damage had been done to munition and aircraft production, although a certain amount of time had been lost through air-raid warnings. This lost time would have to be made up as the country settled down to the new conditions.

None of the services upon which the life of the great cities depended—water, fuel, electricity, gas, or sewerage—had broken down.

The weekly scale of casualties, killed and seriously wounded, was for September 4500, and for October 3500, Mr Churchill added. In the first week of intensive bombardment in September, there were 6000 casualties; in the last week of October, 2000. This diminution in the scale of the attack was not entirely due to the weather.

Mr Churchill concluded this part of his statement with the characteristic words: "Surveying the whole scene alike in its splendour and devastation, I see no reason to regret that Hitler tried to break the British spirit by brutal bombing of our cities and our countryside."

FATAL ACCIDENT

Majority Verdict By Napier Jury

A case of interest to motorists and yelists was heard in the Napier upreme Court yesterday, when a ivil claim was brought for damcivil claim was brought for damages following an accident on the main highway near Awatoto. After a retirement lasting over three hours the jury returned a majority verdict for the plaintiff.

The plaintiff was Hilda Mary Richardson (Mr C. W. Nash), who claimed £3000 general damages following the death of her husband, whose cycle was struck by a cardriven by the defendant, Sydney Victor Baumfield (Mr L. W. Willis).

The Chief Justice (Sir Michael Myers) presided.

Cycling On Wrong Side

The motorist had been overtaking the cyclist at a speed which had been variously estimated, but was probably about 45 miles an hour, and which in favourable circumstances would not be in any way excessive.

wrong side. What was his duty? Should he have continued without reducing speed, in the belief that the cyclist would also continue on his way? It was a question for the jury to decide in the light of all the surrounding circumstances.

The cyclist was undoubtedly negligent if he rode on the wrong side of the road, and to make matters worse he foolishly swerved across to the other side. The judge directed the jury that a person, whether cyclist or motorist, in moving across a stream of traffic had a duty to take care for the safety of himself and others. He should look about him, and if there were danger he him, and if there were danger he should wait. That was not only the law, but it was ordinary common

If the jury were to take the view that there was some negligence on both sides the jury must consider if either had a last opportunity of avoiding the accident, for the onus of responsibility would then rest on that nerson

If the jury took the view that the collision was caused by their combined negligence, neither having a last opportunity of avoiding it, then neither was entitled to claim damages from the other.

It was for the jury to weigh these questions of fact and to decide whose negligence was in a real sense responsible.

Jury Retires

The jury retired at 4.40 p.m., and after a retirement lasting over three nours returned and announced a disagreement. His Honour said that hey had been out for three hours and asked if there was a three-ourths majority. Receiving a reply n the affirmative, Sir Michael inti-

The foreman then announced that the plaintiff had been awarded £1352 general damages. Special damages amounting to £28 6/-, which had previously been agreed upon by the parties, made the total award £1380 6/-. She rejoined the guests, but later went to two other rooms and set the bed clothes alight. She lit all the fires with wax matches. No one else had anything to do with her actions.

Palmerston North Fires The accused also made a statement about fires at the Royal Hotel, Palmerston North, in which she stated that she was employed at the hotel but had been told that she was drinking too much. She remembered returning to the hotel late one night, going to a room and setting something alight. Later she had set fire to another room in the hotel.


