### Victory Was Vote Of Confidence In Foreign Policy

LONDON, Nov. 6. "The Times" in a leader says that President Roosevelt's victory is a vote of confidence in his foreign policy and a mandate for him to continue to give every possible aid to the

nations which are still resisting aggression. The majority of voters were satisfied that President Roosevelt was acting as they would have him act and also that —third term or not—this was not the time to turn him out and put an inexperienced man in his place.

PROVISION FOR TAKING VOTES

Regulations Gazetted

By Telegraph-Press Association. WELLINGTON, Nov. 7. Voting in the Parliamentary elec

Voting in the Parliamentary elections by members of the forces overseas is provided for in the Electoral (Members of Forces) Regulations, 1940, which are published with to-night's Gazette. These regulations were envisaged in the Act passed during the last session and cover the procedure to be adopted in the case of Parliamentary elections. For the taking of votes of soldiers serving abroad special returning officers will be appointed to supervise the recording of votes by New Zealanders. Officers will make the necessary arrangements for polling places, the distribution of voting papers and counting of votes, etc. After the poll has been held the returning officers will forward the results to the chief electoral officer in New Zealand by cable or other expeditious means. expeditious means.

Interesting Provision
Such machinery matters such as orwarding of necessary ballot papers to New Zealanders serving overseas are covered. An interesting provision is a definition contained in the regulations of those eligible to vote. They will comprise all mempers of the forces, irrespective of



NEED FOR INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

The dependence of New Zealand on the outside world for so many manufactured products is fully appreciated only when war interferes with the supply. From the colonisation of New Zealand right up to the Great War, trade flowed uninterrupted between this country and the outside world, and everything we could not produce for ourselves was obtainable

without difficulty from abroad. Conditions favoured agricultural production, and although manufacturing began quite early in our history, it was and still is described as "secondary" industry, and has never received much help or encouragement from successive governments, which for political reasons have concentrated

on the expansion of the farming industry. The last war demonstrated the dangers of an unbalanced national economy. Imports were restricted and many articles of commerce were unobtainable. It was not a matter of

money as it is on the present occasion. The difficulties related to supply and freight. The moral of the experience was obvious enough, but no sooner was the war over than the lesson was forgotten. The

Massey Government, which had to deal with repatriation problems, was essentially a farmers' government, and neither it nor its successors up to 1935 showed much interest or concern about industrial development. Another war has descended upon us again and the weak-

ness of our economic structure is found out. We are still dependent on countries overseas for a wide range of manufactured products which are necessary to the maintenance of the standard of living. During the last war, and in the boom period that followed it, very high prices were received for our surplus agricultural production, and we had the means to purchase abroad.

To-day, we are receiving very much lower prices, and the proportion of our export income required for overseas commitments is so large that the balance available for the purchase of imports is altogether inadequate. Hence exchange control, rationing and an embargo on the purchase of many things we dislike doing without.

The inconvenience would have been mitigated considerably, if, during the twenty odd years which separated the two wars, there had been the same effort to promote industrial production as there was to settle returned soldiers on the land. Unfortunately the trend of political policy is influenced less by public interest than by political expediency, and the rural vote has always been the determining factor in preventing the adoption of any wholehearted plan for the encouragement of manufacturing industries. The present war caught our industrialists as unprepared as Britain was to meet the German aggression. Our woollen and leather industries were called upon overnight to step up production to meet war requirements and to produce goods to take the place of imports that were cut off. In most instances the plant was inadequate and the operatives unavailable to meet the increased demands for output. In the heavy industries there had been so little development prior to the war that there was no prospect of doing much to produce iron and steel, electrical machinery, munitions, machine tools and a hundred and one other things urgently needed for domestic purposes or for the war effort. We have no chemical industry to speak of, no oil industry, no cotton textile nor rubber tyre industry.

Our vulnerability in time of war to enemy attack and economic disorganisation is painfully apparent. When we are safely through the present emergency, there should be a firm resolve never again to allow the Dominion to be caught at such a disadvantage.

In the years immediately preceding the war, the application of the quota system to the importation of agricultural products into Britain was beginning to set limits to agricultural production in New Zealand. In August of last year we had 1,000,000 carcases of mutton in store over and above our quota. The war has temporarily removed any difficulty on this score, and Britain wants all the food we can produce and ship,

but it may not always be so. Unless the energies of a substantial proportion of the population can be diverted to industrial production, employment and the maintenance of living standards will present postwar problems of exceptional difficulty.


