This Is Because Digestion Commences In The Mouth

I have asked many people "which should you chew most—meat, or breadstuffs and vegetables? If you had an equal quantity of meat and of vegetables (for example mashed potatoes, peas, and cauliflower) which could be sufficiently chewed with say, 500 chews, how would you apportion the chews?" says an overseas writer.

Nearly all thought meat should be much more thoroughly chewed than bread, vegetables, or fruit; that of 500 chews, 100 or 150 should be spent on the vegetables and the other 350 to 400 on the meat.

toes were to be swallowed without being sufficiently chewed, it would remain in the stomach for one to two and a-half hours without any further digestive activity.

The stomach juices depend for their action in digesting meats, fish, acceptable with the register of the province of the

eggs on the pepsin and hydrochloric acid.

When meat (or other forms of protein) is swallowed it is immediately attacked by the pepsin hydrochloric acid present in the stomach. Chewing it may aid the process, but is not essential to it.

How To Deal With Many Woollies

Pressing "knitteds" is child's play when it's a question of ordinary jumpers, and you have a sleeve-board by your side. But how do you iron outsizes like shawls, or the sleeve seams of baby clothes?

The old-fashioned way with a shawl was to sprinkle it with water, reall it is a towal for an hour until

the moisture soaked through, then pin it on the spare room bedspread and leave doors and windows open until it dried naturally.

Nowadays you can spread the roning-blanket on the floor, cover i with a clean sheet or the floor, cover it with a clean sheet or old tablecloth, pin the shawl on top of that and go over it with a hot iron and damp cloth. But be sure to air it well afterwards. As for wee sleeves, you can roll up a fairly stiff business envelope and use that instead of a sleeve-hoard.

There is always, however, the risk of stretching knitted garments when they are damped for ironing, and the best way of all is to fold a large towel so as to make a thick soft ironing pad, put the knitted article on it ready for ironing, lay over it a piece of brown paper to prevent scorching the wool, and then iron over the paper with a fairly hot iron, moving the paper when necessary as the task proceeds.

The Japanese campaign in central China has slowed down considerably, and the points most threatened at the moment are the great islands of the Dutch East Indies and the British strongholds at Singapore and Hong Kong. Further complications have arisen in French Indo-China, still nominally under the protection of Vichy France, which is threatened by Japan and by Thailand (Siam). The famous Burma Road, the Chinese "lifeline" which, although it is in British territory, has been repeatedly bombed by the Japanese, runs through Burma from Rangoon to the Chinese frontier. The map also illustrates the danger to Australia of any southern drive by Japan.

REPATRIATION PROBLEMS

The hubbub that has been aroused over the Small Farms Bill is an indication that the problem of providing farms for returned soldiers bristles with difficulties. For some time past, the Government, with an eye to the future, has been acquiring land for post-war settlement by men who are now serving in the armed forces.

Senior departmental officers will have a lively recollection of what happened after the last war. The Massey Government, which pledged itself to see that the men who fought for the country should have an opportunity of acquiring a bit of it for themselves, purchased heavily at inflated prices and the subsequent losses from putting soldiers on the land ran

Under the commandeer of meat and other products in the last war, the farmers got very much higher prices than they are receiving to-day, and there was a corresponding advance in land values. The compulsory acquisition of land for settlement under those conditions was an expensive business, and although most of the estates purchased for subdivision were acquired by private negotiation, the farms of many soldier settlers proved to be seriously over-capitalised, and when the prices of agricultural products slumped, the position of the unfortunate settler became hopeless.

One can quite understand that the Government does not want to get into a similar mess. But that hardly seems to justify a departure from the ordinary procedure which gives the expropriated owner the right to appeal to the Supreme Court, if he considers the compensation offered him for his land is inadequate. If the proposed Small Farms Bill becomes law in its present form, the only appeal will be to a tribunal specially appointed by the Minister, and one can hardly blame the owner of a property liable to be taken for preferring the protection of the existing law.

Much of the difficulty arises from the fact that agricultural land in New Zealand is almost always over-valued. There is never any lack of finance to put farmers into places so heavily mortgaged that they have to work early and late to get a living and pay their interest, and there seems to be a never-ending supply of optimists to take the place of those who fall by the way.

All the concessions made by the Government to farmers in the shape of cheap money, low railway freights, subsidised labour, etc., are capitalised and help to maintain values at a figure that is disproportionate to the return that can be got from the land by the average farmer. With all the will in the world to settle the soldier on the land on a basis that will give him a reasonable chance of success, the prospect of its being done without loss to the taxpayer is decidedly remote. Nor is the problem simplified by the fact that a good deal of discrimination must be employed in the selection of the most suitable men from the many repatriated soldiers who will want to go on the land. Only a relatively small number can be provided for in this way, and for the majority, some alternative opening will have to be found.

It may not be generally known that the total number of occupied holdings in New Zealand of one acre and upwards does not succeed 86,000. In fact, in the last 15 years there has been a slight decline in the total. With 50,000 men on active service, and the prospect that the number may be doubled before the war is over, it is clear that the number who can be provided with farms when repatriation commences will not be very great in proportion to total enlistments. Most of the returning men will, of course, go back to their former jobs, and the law compels employers to re-engage them, but in some instances the conditions will have changed and the jobs may not be there when they return.

With the expansion of industry due to war conditions, and in the certainty that restriction of imports must extend into the post-war period, returned soldiers who are compelled to start life afresh are more likely to find work in factories than on farms. The Government, in planning for the future, should recognise the importance of promoting industrial development, because repatriation is very far from being purely an agricultural problem.



High School Pupils' Drive For Patriotic Fund Yesterday

Hastings has never seen such an assortment of bottles as was collected in the drive conducted by boys and girls of the Hastings High School yesterday. From early in the morning the pile of bottles mounted at the depot at Newbigin's brewery as the enthusiastic collectors returned their spoils by the lorryload, sackful, box-load and armful.

"I have never seen anything like it," said Mr D. H. Newbigin, as he surveyed the mountain of bottles in the yard of the brewery. It is estimated that 36,000 bottles and jars were collected, returning approximately £150 to the patriotic funds. The current £1,000,000 appeal at Hastings will benefit by the school's splendid effort.

Collectors' Maps
Each of the 200 collectors was issued with a cardboard authority, on the back of which was a small map of the immediate district in which he was to operate. The bottles were collected in 171 heaps at the corners of the blocks and girls mounted guard over the "booty" until it was removed by lorry or car to the central depot.

The town was divided into four cones with a senior pupil in charge zones, with a senior pupil in charge of each for the house-to-house calls. When the sector was completed the zone chief put in a call for a conveyance to cart the bottles to the brewery, where sorting was begun

immediately.

Corner heaps had to be carefully watched, for beer bottles are legal tender among small boys and there were many envious eyes surveying gleaming piles of glassware.

The boys were entirely responsible for the campaign, and the splendid organisation of the drive testified to the thorough preparation made at the High School in the past week. Canvassing every house in the borough was a task of no small dimensions, but this work was apportioned in a thorough manner.

The containers of some pre-war vintages, many of them long since emptied, found a place in the collection. There were many cocktail bottles and also bottles which had held liqueurs that could not be identified even by the High School teachers.

After a nightmare flight across Europe and Siberia, Dr E. Parnes, once a member of the Polish diplonatic service, has arrived in Sydney with his wife. vith his wife.

"In Australia we know we will find the freedom that Hitler has taken from so many in Europe," he said.

Dr. Parnes, who speaks 14 languages fluently, was in the Polish diplomatic service for 20 years. When he retired he became European correspondent of a Warsaw newspaper, and was in Vienna when Hitler invaded Austria. Members of the Hitler Youth Movement arrested his wife, and for days he did not know where she was. At last the Polish Minister for Foreign Affairs secured her release. Her arrest was a revenge for his articles against Hitlerism.


