Mussolini's Bluster Hides Uneasiness

BOASTS WITHOUT BACKING

Call For Renewed Vigour Is Significant

(British Official Wireless.)
(Received November 19, 7.45 p.m.)

RUGBY, Nov. 18.

Observers in London detect in Mussolini's speech indications that the Duce is on the defensive—an unaccustomed note in the discourses he loves to address to the well-drilled Fascist crowds.

He seemed to be searching for some way of counteracting the impression growing among neutrals and prevalent even in Italy that for the time being something has gone wrong with the Italian war effort. Despite his boasts of having command of the Mediterranean, the Italian fleet has evaded its engagements and waited behind its shore defences to be battered to pieces by British airmen.

The much-advertised advance in the Western Desert has not been followed up despite the estimated inferiority in material and numbers of the defence. The incursions into the Sudan have proved abortive and now the cold-blooded attack upon the scrupulously neutral neighbour, Greece, has been halted and the heroic defenders of this small and relatively weak State have actually forced back the invaders.

It would not be surprising if all this has created some uneasiness in Italy itself and the Duce's denunciation of pacifism and the call for renewed vigour on the part of the Fascist Party is interesting. It is certainly felt here to be significant that he found it necessary to insist at such length on the reliability of the Italian communiques. Italians may have been getting puzzled by claims such as that in a recent official statement from Rome on the naval position, that the Italian forces have sunk more British battleships than, in fact, Britain is known to have in the Mediterranean.

There is some speculation in London whether the audience heard with entire relish the Duce's boasts of his knight errantry towards his Axis friends in sending unsolicited Italian squadrons to take part in the German air war on Britain. It is more than likely that most Italians would prefer to do nothing unnecessarily to attract the attention of the R.A.F., while more ardent Fascists may wonder why these aircraft could not usefully be employed against the 'enemy' objectives nearer home.

The speech was made on the fifth anniversary of the adoption by the League of Nations of the programme of economic sanctions designed to assist the Abyssinians' resistance to an act of unprovoked aggression by Fascist Italy in defiance of its obligations under the League Covenant and the Pact of Paris. The fact that a growing threat, secretly planned by the Nazis under the cloak of Hitler's peaceful professions, had subjected the League's untried security system to such stresses and strains that in its first hour of trial it proved impossible to rally the collective will of the States to make it effective, this Mussolini chose once again to describe and celebrate as a Fascist 'victory over 25 nations.'

Here only was he on sure ground, which Fascist propaganda had made comfortably familiar to the Italian people, but as he passed to Italy's entry into Hitler's war on what proved to be a miscalculation that the sacrifices of the Italians would be slight and quickly and handsomely recompensed by a share in the victor's booty, his blustering falsification of the historic record of Britain's strenuous and unremitting efforts to safeguard peace betrayed his anxiety.

It is difficult to describe the imposition of sanctions as the first and last attempt of the old world, influenced by the superannated ideas of the League of Nations against the new European forces represented by Italy and Germany. Even after sanctions peace could still have been preserved if Britain had not, with the supreme complacency of France, initiated her policy of encirclement instead of constructive revision of treaties. This policy was not made with the object of retaining Danzig for Poland but of destroying the political and military power of Germany.

Peace could have been saved even in the last hours of August, 1939, if England, under pressure from the Polish Ambassador, had not stood out for one absolutely unacceptable condition to the conference proposed by Italy—that the German troops already moving should not only be halted but actually sent back to the starting place.

Referring to Greece, he said: 'I do not think it worth while to deny the reports of Greek victories removed abroad. General Soddou has visited the Alpine division which was supposed to have been destroyed and has telegraphed that it is in fine condition.' 'With absolute certainty, we will break Greece's back, in two months or twelve months it does not matter which. We have the means to break the Greek resistance and British help will not prevent a Greek catastrophe.'

'Those who think otherwise do not know me.' Mussolini confessed that the mountains of Epirus and the muddy valleys had not lent themselves to lightning warfare and added: 'No act of mine led anyone to believe otherwise.' (Other extracts from the speech appear on page 7)

EXPANSION OF AIR TRAINING SCHEME

NEW AERODROMES

Nearly 20,000,000 Dollars Spent

America And Britain

USE OF NAVAL DOCKYARD

Development Planned

Greek Soldiers In Koritza In Spite Of Fierce Resistance

LONDON, Nov. 19.

The Athens radio reports that the Greeks have occupied part of Koritza, in Albania, after fierce hand-to-hand fighting. It also claims that 10 Italian planes were brought down on Monday.

It is authoritatively believed in London that the Greek advance has compelled the Italians to evacuate two of the most modern Albanian air bases which are near Koritza. The only other main bases in Albania are at Durazzo, Valona and Tirana.

Twelve Greek fighters to-day shot down two out of 15 Italian bombers near the Yugoslav border.

A message from Belgrade says that foreign planes early this morning flew over Ucinj, Cetinje and Danilovgrad. There were no casualties though two bombs were dropped on Danilovgrad.

It is officially announced that Italy has expressed regret to Yugoslavia at the 'unintentional mistake' of Italian airmen in bombing Monastir on November 5.

Six hundred Italians with 130 tanks are reported to have entered Yugoslavia and surrendered to the authorities.

Commenting on the strategic importance of Koritza, which is the largest town in Albania, it is pointed out that, because it stands at the important junction of two roads leading towards Greece, its capture would add greatly to the defence of that country.

Should the town fall into the Greek hands, it is thought, an end would be put to the Italian advance toward Salonika, unless Italy were prepared to violate the neutrality of Yugoslavia and to attempt to enter Outer Greece via Monastir.

It is also probable, as long as Koritza remained in Greek hands, that the threat of invasion via Janina—that is, through Epirus—would be ended.

Military commentators point out, however, that the capture of this town, although it would be a severe blow to the Italians, and one

which they would undoubtedly strive hard to avoid, would not give an easy opportunity of advance to the Greeks. Although there are roads running in a north-easterly direction towards Elbasan, which has been described as the strategic centre of Albania, the country is extremely difficult.

Koritza has a good civil aerodrome, which the Italians have worked hard to improve, but it is thought that a military aerodrome has probably also been completed.

The Greeks have occupied fresh positions on the Epirus (coastal) and Koritza fronts, where Italian counter-attacks have been thrown back. The Greek artillery is shelling the roads in the rear of Koritza to prevent the Italians from escaping and reinforcements from being brought up.

British and Greek planes have bombed the town of Elbasan, which is an important junction in the centre of Albania 60 miles from the Yugoslav frontier.

GREEKS ADVANCE

Ring Of Steel Around City

LONDON, Nov. 19.

Unconfirmed reports from the Yugoslav-Greek frontier say that the Greeks took Koritza in the early hours of the morning. The amount of war materials seized is not specified.

A later message states that the Italians were exposed to withering artillery fire as they retreated from Koritza along the only road open to them. A ring of Greek steel invested them on two sides, ensuring the downfall of the base from which Mussolini expected to sweep to Salonika.

R.A.F. MUST CONCENTRATE ON ITALIAN BASES

Bombers May Help Greeks To Clear Out The Balkans By Spring

LONDON, Nov. 18.

'The Times' Athens correspondent issues a warning that it is as important to guard now against undue pessimism concerning Greece, as it was vital previously to avoid exaggerated optimism.

'It is inevitable that the Greek troops will react to the relative invisibility of the R.A.F. over the battlefields similarly to the complaint of the British troops at Dunkirk,' he says, 'but just as the R.A.F. then made evacuation possible by heavy blows against the enemy air bases, so now must we remember that the R.A.F. is concentrating against Italian bases rather than in costly fights over the front line.'

'But that is an achievement of bombers. And the fighting around Koritza and elsewhere on the Albanian front requires fighters,' adds the correspondent.

'If we enable the Greeks to follow up the magnificent achievements of their infantry and cavalry and artillery there is a serious possibility of throwing the Italians out of the Balkans before the spring, but this would mean more fighters besides more bombers.'

Few Small Fires Started

NAZI NIGHT RAIDERS Bombs On Scattered Districts CASUALTIES LIGHT

LONDON, Nov. 19.

An Air Ministry communique says that enemy planes last night dropped a small number of bombs on Merseyside, one area of the Midlands and at scattered points in southern England, causing a few small fires. The damage everywhere was slight and the casualties small.

A raider dived from a heavy curtain of cloud over a southern coastal town on Monday and dropped a heavy explosive bomb in the poorest section. The bomb wrecked houses, and some families were trapped under the debris and are unaccounted for. Two are known to have been killed. The blast shattered shop fronts, littering the streets with glass.

Four explosive bombs caused damage to residential property in the 283rd raid on a southern area.

Minor Activity

'Enemy air activity over Britain today has been of a minor character,' states an Air Ministry and Ministry of Home Security communique. 'Bombs were dropped at a few places on the east coast and on the coasts of Sussex and Kent. Some houses were damaged, and a few casualties were caused. Two small formations of raiders approached London from the south-east, and bombs were dropped at two points in the London area, causing some damage to houses but very few casualties.'

After a very quiet day, in which there was only one raid lasting a few minutes, London's night alert sounded later than for six weeks. No guns and no planes were heard over Central London.

Night raiders also visited Liverpool and another north-west town which dropped flares and incendiary bombs. Raiders were also reported over Welsh and north-east English towns.

Bombs damaged a number of dwelling-houses at a few points in the London area and in several Channel towns on Sunday night. The casualties were not heavy, but some people were killed.

MANY TARGETS DAMAGED

No Casualties Suffered

RUGBY, Nov. 18.

The Admiralty states that British light forces have carried out another naval bombardment, this time at Dante, Italian Somaliland, on oil tanks, coastal anti-aircraft batteries, and a landing pier. It is reported that all the targets appear to be badly damaged. The British forces suffered no damage or casualties.

An account of a patrol action last month at Libol, near the Italian Somaliland frontier, released there to-day, reveals the arrival of armoured cars from South Africa and their effective employment.

Four of these successfully attacked a large enemy force, inflicting heavy casualties.

To-day's Cairo communique says that the situation on all fronts is unchanged.

TREATMENT TO ENCOURAGE EYE BEAUTY

Regular Bathing And Exercises Are Of The Greatest Benefit

If you live in the country where the air is clear and clean and fresh you can rest content, happy in the knowledge that you cannot improve on nature. But those of us who live in cities where the air is laden with dust and petrol fumes, should be careful to keep our eyes clean.

The best way to do this is to use an eye tonic in an eye bath, or to be more exact, two baths. Each eye should have a separate eye bath, because if there are any signs of infection, this can be carried from one eye to the other by using the same bath for both.

The eye bath should be held under running water before the eye tonic is used, and again after use, and it should be boiled up at least once a week. The way to do this is to place the bath in a saucupan half-filled with cold water and bring the water slowly to the boil. This method prevents the glass from cracking.

Women who use eyelash cosmetic should always bathe the eyes after they have taken off their eyelash cosmetic and before they go to bed at night.

One of the most delicious tired eye treatments is given with herbal eye packs. The pack is steeped in boiling water, then squeezed out, and when comfortably warm placed over the eyes. This treatment is continued for about 20 minutes.

For lids which are inclined to be dry and shrivelled there is a herbal eye tissue oil. For crows-foot and lines under the eyes you can use anti-wrinkle creams. These should be smoothed on in the most light-fingered manner. Place the index fingers at the outer corner of the eyes, where the crows-foot are, move in small circles, continue under the eyes towards the bridge of the nose, and out over the eyebrows.

For Dark Circles

Dark circles under the eyes may be caused by too much work, too little sleep, or faulty elimination. No amount of beauty treatment will make them disappear. The way to cure them is to discover what is causing the trouble, and then set about putting matters right.

Discoloured eyelids and the curious brownish shadow that you sometimes see under the eyes indicate a rheumatic tendency. Even when the health has improved the patches of colour may still remain. Clever and light-fingered application of eye shadow to the upper lids, and a touch of mauve eye-shadow under the eyes will disguise the discoloration by electric light. Puffy eyes are sometimes caused by sleeping in a stuffy room, in which case the puffiness will disappear during the course of the day. If the puffiness does not disappear, then it should be treated as a symptom and a doctor should be consulted.

Eye-Strengthening

Eye-strengthening exercises and treatment were introduced many years ago by the famous American Dr Bates, and it is claimed that he achieved many wonderful cures. He taught his patients to practise "palming," which is supposed to work wonders in cases of eye strain. You rest your elbows on a table, place the palms of your hands over your eyes, crossing the fingers of one hand over the fingers of the other, which are resting on your forehead; your palms must not

press your eyes. You close your eyes and try to see black. This sounds easy enough, but if your eyes are tired or strained you will imagine you see brightly coloured lights flickering before your closed eyes and patches of grey. You are taught to think of a black object, such as a black curtain or a black spot, or anything black that you can imagine with ease.

Dr Bates also recommended reading an eye-test card every day, and was convinced that if these cards were hung up in the schools and practice reading were carried out every day, children would grow up with perfect sight.

POTATOES MUST BE CHEWED MORE THAN MEAT

This Is Because Digestion Commences In The Mouth

I have asked many people "which should you chew most—meat, or breadstuffs and vegetables? If you had an equal quantity of meat and of vegetables (for example mashed potatoes, peas, and cauliflower) which could be sufficiently chewed with say, 500 chews, how would you apportion the chews?" says an overseas writer.

Nearly all thought meat should be much more thoroughly chewed than bread, vegetables, or fruit; that of 500 chews, 100 or 150 should be spent on the vegetables and the other 350 to 400 on the meat.

The correct answer is that it is much more important to chew the breadstuffs, vegetables, and fruit than meat.

Yes, strange as it may seem, it is far more important to chew your mashed potatoes than your meat or fish.

The reason is that the digestion of breadstuffs is begun in the mouth. There are three chief classes of foods—carbohydrates, proteins, and fats.

The carbohydrates are represented

by the breadstuffs (bread, cakes, pudding, pies, pastry, spaghetti), vegetables, and fruit; the proteins occur in meats, fish, eggs, cheese; and the fats are represented by butter, cream, and the various animal fats.

An important step in the digestion of carbohydrates occurs while they are in the mouth.

In chewing your food much more is accomplished than merely cutting or grinding it into small particles.

Mixing the Food

This, in fact, is the least important function of chewing, for actually its chief purpose is to mix the mass of food held in the mouth with a certain starch digesting enzyme called ptyalin, whose function it is to begin the digestion of all carbohydrates.

By properly chewing the breadstuffs, vegetables, and fruits, these foods are mixed with this important digestive enzyme, so that when they are swallowed their digestion is continued in the stomach.

If they are not chewed, they will not be mixed with the ptyalin, and therefore will be so much dead weight in the stomach, for the stomach juices do not digest carbohydrates, but only proteins.

If a mouthful of mashed potatoes were to be swallowed without being sufficiently chewed, it would remain in the stomach for one to two and a-half hours without any further digestive activity.

The stomach juices depend for their action in digesting meats, fish, eggs on the pepsin and hydrochloric acid.

When meat (or other forms of protein) is swallowed it is immediately attacked by the pepsin hydrochloric acid present in the stomach. Chewing it may aid the process, but is not essential to it.

When Drinking Milk

Soon, with the warmer weather, you'll see people at milk bars drinking milk as quickly as they would water. That is wrong. Milk should be sipped.

When milk reaches the stomach it is curdled by the gastric juice, that is, it thickens into a cheese-like mass.

This mass, or curd, is then acted upon by the pepsin in the gastric juice and thereby digested, or, in other words, dissolved.

Now, if the milk is drunk quickly, it is curdled in one large mass, forming a particularly tough curd. Milk, therefore, should be sipped, or taken with a spoon like soup. It then forms a loose curd, which is much more easily digested. It is well also to take other food, such as crackers, between sips.

It is quite true that many drink milk the wrong way without any apparent ill-effects. They are those with sturdy digestions.

If an apple is put in the cake-box, it will keep the cake fresh for a long time.

Milk puddings will be more creamy if enough finely-powdered oatmeal to cover a sixpence is placed in the milk before cooking the pudding.

The "flat" taste of boiled milk can be neutralised by a pinch of cinnamon or even chocolate powder. Also, a large tablespoon of thin cream or cold milk, if placed in a glass first, will give a more appetising flavour to hot milk when poured over it.

A New Advantage From Flowers

DEEPER BREATHING IN SWEETLY SCENTED AIR

It has recently been found that flowers with a perfume exercise a positively beneficial influence on the atmosphere, by converting the oxygen of the air into that powerful oxidising, and therefore purifying, agent, ozone.

Essences found to produce the most ozone are precisely those which usage has selected as the most invigorating, such a cherry, laurel, cloves, lavender, mint, juniper, lemon, fennel, and bergamot, several of which are ingredients in the refreshing eau-de-Cologne.

Anise, nutmeg, thyme, narcissus, and hyacinth flowers, magnonette, heliotrope, and lilies of the valley also develop ozone; in fact, all flowers possessing a perfume appear to do so, whereas those having none do not.

It is suggested that when people say they like flowers, they do so, not altogether because of the blooms, but because these are capable of charging the air with ozone to a likeable degree, and in consequence more vigour is derived when breathing. The more the surrounding air attracts our fancy, the deeper we breathe, and the better in health we become. A bowl of roses is not only beautiful but strengthening.

"PRESSING" NEWS

How To Deal With Many Woollies

Pressing "knitteds" is child's play when it's a question of ordinary jumpers, and you have a sleeve-board by your side. But how do you iron oversized like shawls, or the sleeve seams of baby clothes?

The old-fashioned way with a shawl was to sprinkle it with water, roll it in a towel for an hour, until the moisture soaked through, then pin it on the spare room bedspread and leave doors and windows open until it dried naturally.

Nowadays you can spread the ironing-basket on the floor, cover it with a clean sheet or old tablecloth, pin the shawl on top of that and go over it with a hot iron and damp cloth. But be sure to air it well afterwards. As for wool sleeves, you can roll up a fairly stiff business envelope and use that instead of a sleeve-board.

There is always, however, the risk of stretching knitted garments when they are damped for ironing, and the best way of all is to fold a large towel so as to make a thick soft ironing pad, put the knitted article on it ready for ironing, lay over it a piece of brown paper to prevent scorching the wool, and then iron over the paper with a fairly hot iron, moving the paper when necessary as the task proceeds.

Shelves of a medicine chest can be prevented from becoming sticky or greasy by lining them with a double thickness of blotting-paper.

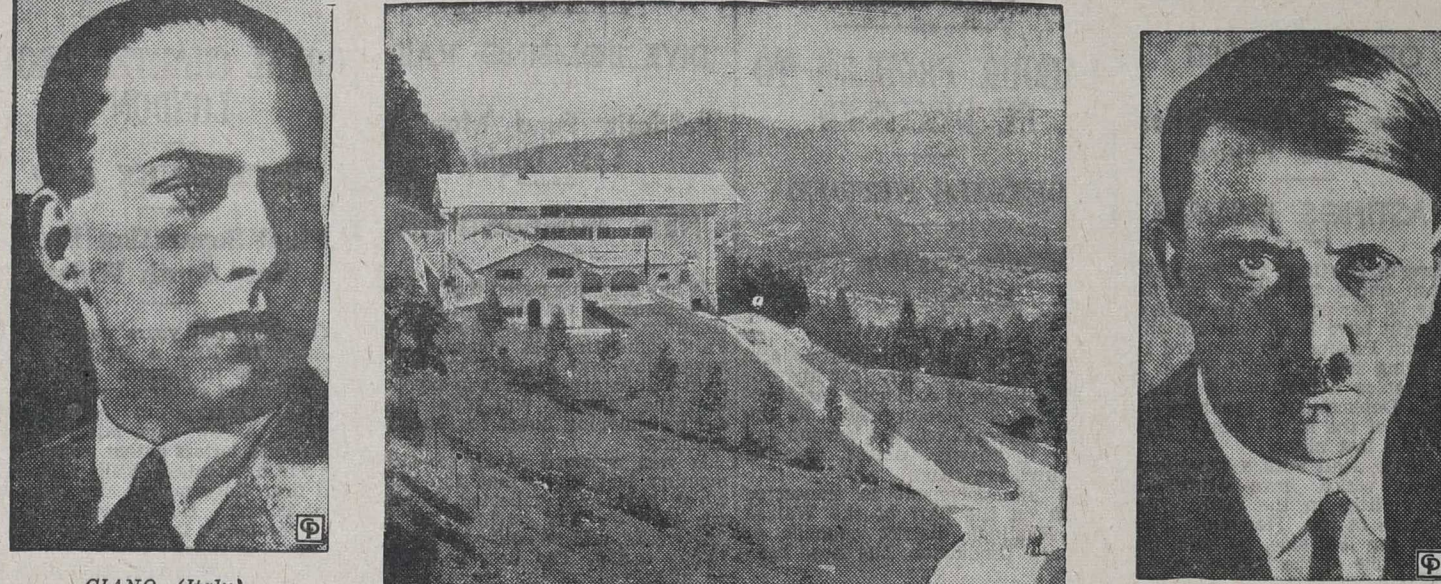

Hitler's Berghof in Berchtesgaden, the mountain eyrie where, it is said, most of his dreams of conquest and world-empire have been thought out, is situated in the Bavarian Alps. From the balconies, the Fuhrer can look out to Austria. Here he met Neville Chamberlain in the dramatic conferences over Czechoslovakia which ended in the Munich Agreement.

King Boris of Bulgaria paid a private visit to Germany and had a conversation with Hitler at Berchtesgaden on Sunday. The news was announced only to-day. The Bulgarian Foreign Minister was also present.

The Rumanian Prime Minister (General Antonescu) had scarcely returned to Bucharest from Rome when reports were circulated that he was going to Berlin on Friday for a conference with Hitler, who to-day conferred with Senator Suner and Count Ciano and entertained them at a tea party.

General Antonescu telegraphed to Mussolini: "The Rumanian Chief of State sends to Il Duce his heartfelt and most sincere wishes and deep gratitude and expresses his boundless admiration for the manner in which a member of the Roman family of nations prepares the way not only for the life of his own great people but for other nations."

By Telegraph-Press Association WELLINGTON, Nov. 19. "The Government has not interfered in any way with the right of the people to worship according to their religious beliefs and conscience," said the Prime Minister (the Hon. P. Fraser) when his attention was drawn in an interview to-night to the cable message from Sydney that the headquarters of "Jehovah's Witnesses" for Australia and New Zealand had sent a cablegram to the King protesting at the ban imposed on the organisation by the New Zealand Government.

"If the body called 'Jehovah's Witnesses' would confine themselves to ordinary religious observances like the churches and other religious bodies, they would have full liberty to do so, and there would be no interference with them whatever," said Mr Fraser. "However, the difficulties in New Zealand arose through 'Jehovah's Witnesses' constituting themselves as a propaganda body against other churches and thereby causing widespread ill-feeling, resentment and bitterness which resulted in at least one unfortunate incident in this country.

"Such provocative conduct and incitement would be inimical at any time and cannot be tolerated during wartime, when the greatest amount of unity and co-operation among members of all religious faiths is essential.

"There has been no interference with the right to worship, but there has been a prohibition imposed on the dissemination of literature and other propaganda directed against religious organisations."

British Israel Address At Napier

RESULTS OF WAR

MICAPS WERE FEW

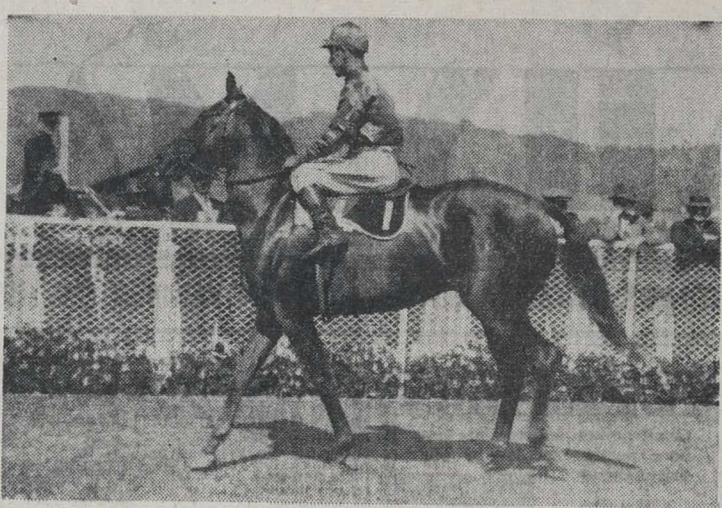

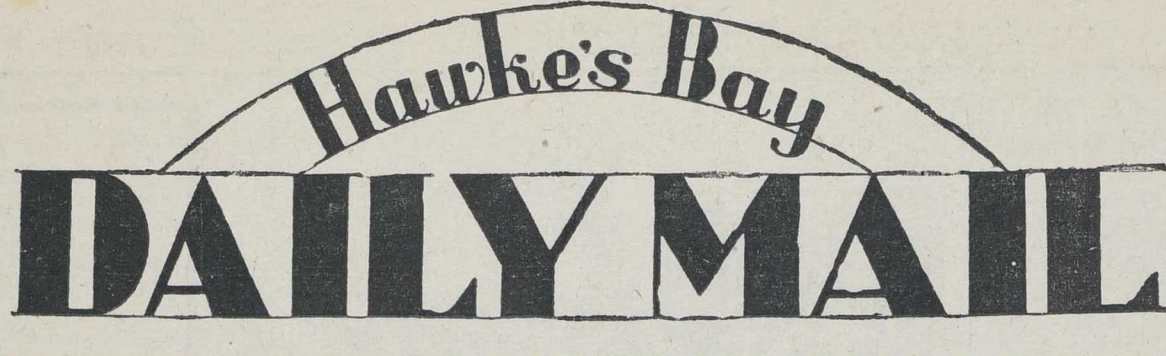
