Greets Raiders Over Midlands

LONDON, Nov. 20. Pursuing the policy of selecting one provincial town as a target and concentrating a merciless onslaught on it, the German raiders to-night battered an east Midlands town.

Wave after wave flew towards the target shortly after dusk and met intensive ground fire on the way till they reached the town, where terrific explosions occurred almost

every minute for hours. The only persons venturing into the streets, except the homeless who were forced to brave the storm in a pitiable pilgrimage for shelter, were members of the Auxiliary Fire Service battling with the flames and Air Raid Precaution members forcing their way through the wreckage for those who had been trapped.

Delivering the Budget speech in the House of Representatives to-day the Treasurer (the Hon. A. W. Fadden) announced that the additional taxation for the remaining seven months to be imposed amounted to £31,100,000, of which £17,170,000 could come from income tax, £5,800,000 from companies, £3,400,000 from sales tax, £4,200,000 from customs and excise, and the remainder from the abolition of the rebate of

from the abolition of the rebate of company tax.

With the extra taxation imposed last May amounting to £14,000,000, the total additional war taxation for 1940-41 is therefore £45,100,000.

Increased taxation on companies will be levied by a wartime company tax and a tax on undistributed profits, which in the full year is estimated to return £5,300,000.

Mr Fadden said that the total taxation on public companies in Australia would become very high approximately £32,000,000, or 6/9 in the £, while dividends would be taxed without rebate on incomes of shareholders.





A QUESTION OF NEUTRALITY

A somewhat Gilbertian situation has arisen in Auckland, where a man has appealed against military service on the ground that he is a citizen of the "neutral State of Eire." The Auckland Manpower Committee, naturally enough, did not find itself in a position to make any comment on the appeal—which the appellant later said was based on conscientious objection with the reference to neutrality added "in the nature of evidence"-and the whole matter has now been referred to the Armed Forces Appeal Board.

The anomalous position of Eire in the present conflict was bound, sooner or later, to give rise to difficulties of this kind in various parts of the Empire, and although the case in question is of no particular importance as far as the relationships of the component parts of the Empire are concerned, it serves as a good illustration of what happens when one part of a closely-linked community of nations chooses to erect a smokescreen of neutrality between itself and the realities of a struggle which concerns it as vitally as it concerns any other

Exactly what is a "citizen of Eire"? The description presumably applies only to a person born in Southern Ireland after the signing of the Dublin Treaty which concluded the Civil War. Before that time the whole of Ireland was still, nominally at least, an integral part of the United Kingdom. After 1920, when the Free State was instituted, there was little opposition to the association of Ireland with the Empire for the simple reason that the Cosgrave Government frequently stated its realisation of the advantages to the country of theoretical allegiance to the Crown combined with an actual independence that went beyond the dreams of

the staunchest Home Rule advocate of the nineteenth century. All this was ended when Mr De Valera took power, and since that time virtually every tangible link between Ireland (now known as Eire) and the rest of the British Empire has been severed. But even Mr De Valera has not been able to bring himself to complete the work of establishing final independence, which would have cut the country off from the British markets on which it depends for its economic

At the present time no one will want to question the right of Eire to maintain neutrality as far as neutrality is possible in a world at war. The right is hers as indisputably as it is the right of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. The fact that none of these Dominions has chosen to exercise its right does not alter the technical aspects of the case. But when it comes to a point of citizenship the problem becomes complicated.

Even if Eire were completely cut adrift from the Empire and had to be regarded as a foreign republic, there might still be difficulties because people of Irish birth or of Irish descent now living in Great Britain, the Dominions, and the Colonial Empire would have to make up their minds as to which country claimed their allegiance. That such a situation is hardly likely to arise is due solely to the fact that the majority of Irishmen and Irishwomen, while retaining a strong sentimental affection for their homeland, are perfectly content with their British citizenship and with the advantages

that citizenship bestows. The only alternative for such people, in the event of their becoming "aliens" would be to journey to Eire where most of them would probably feel as strange as if they were about to settle in Tibet, and the comic opera plot would be complete.

The last point to be considered in a survey of Eire's present position is the most complicated of all. It is this: Supposing the country were invaded and occupied by German forces preliminary to an attempted invasion of Great Britain. Eire would then—neutrality or no neutrality—be incorporated in the Greater Reich as certainly as every other small neutral has been incorporated since the fashion was set in March, 1938. Would persons claiming to be citizens of Eire then be compelled to regard themselves as good Nazis? This is emphatically a disturbing thought, but happily it need not cause much concern as long as there is a British Navy to protect the neutrality of Eire.

MINISTER APPEALS FOR PRESERVATION OF BUSH

Co-operation Of Public Sought In Protection Of Country's Irreplaceable Assets

By Telegraph-Press Association

AUCKLAND, Nov. 21. The protection of native bush and the preservation of the country's birds were matters of permanent concern to the people of New Zealand, stated the Minister of Internal Affairs (the Hon. W. E. Parry). The coming of summer was the time, he said, when the community was justified in entertaining fear of scrub fires which, if some past experiences were taken as a criterion, would either threaten or destroy some of the most beautiful bush and fern scenery of the Dominion.




