R.A.F. Assists In Bombing Retreating Italians

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received November 24, 9.45 p.m.)

Reports from the Pindus sector indicate that a Greek column, driving through the mountain valleys, has cut the Italian Army in half. The Greeks are reported to be 10 miles

Dealing with the situation on the battlefront a Greek communique states: "Our army has succeeded in occuppying the whole of Morava mountain, Mount Ivan and Kafe Karit. In the Epirus the army has reoccupied the town of Filiates and has pushed back the enemy across the frontier.

'The Greek Air Force bombed the retreating enemy with great success, despite active reaction by the enemy air force."

The "Daily Express's" Cairo correspondent says that the Greek movements in the southern and central sectors are apparently going according to plan, namely:

(1) A drive along the coast, harassing the Italians retreating to Saranda.

(2) A drive turning off to the left by Permeti to encompass Argyrokastron from the north-east.

(3) A push in the direction of Tepelena, which is the junction of the roads from Vlona to Argyrokastron and Konitza and also the military base.

The Italian Air Force again received rough treatment at the hands of the R.A.F. on Saturday. A squadron of Spit-fires shot down seven Italian fighters and one German fighter in the Straits of Dover. The Spitfire squadron suffered no losses. Up to 8.30 p.m. on Saturday the enemy losses totalled

Berlin officials declared that strong German air squadrons again attacked Birmingham during the night, including dive bombing attacks on important aircraft and other factories.

The Berlin news agency, referring to the attack on Birmingham, says that whole streets and a block of factory buildings were destroyed.







END OF THE FIRST ROUND

Mr Churchill is not a man given to facile optimism, and he must have had good grounds for the statement which he made in his speech on the death of Mr Neville Chamberlain: "I think he died with the knowledge that his country had at

It would be interesting to know exactly what the British Prime Minister meant by these words. They were a reaffirmation of his unshakable confidence in the ability of Great Britain ultimately to weather the storm, but at the same time there is at the moment little encouragement for anyone to believe that the British people have won anything more than the first round of the struggle against totalitarianism. This is sufficiently indicated by the fresh warning to the Home Guard that the danger of invasion is far from being past.

The situation on the Continent is more hopelessly muddled than ever before. The series of "tea parties" at Berchtesgaden, Berlin, and Vienna have resulted in an imposing string of a lditions to the Axis line up but in effect

posing string of a lditions to the Axis line-up, but in effect this means nothing more than formal recognition of a state of affairs which has existed for many months. The German plan for the consolidation of Central and the greater part of south-eastern Europe in a bloc controlled from the Wilhelmstrasse has been carried through to a logical conclusion, but if Herr Hitler derives any comfort from this formal acceptance of the status quo by the small vassal States which he has already plundered, he is welcome to it.

The position of France is much more interesting. There are increasing indications that the state of dazed humiliation which followed the military collapse and the German occupation of the greater part of the country is already passing. The anti-British wave which swept the nation after the German break-through at Sedan is said to have been displaced by a pronounced swing in favour of Great Britain. Taking the mercurial French temperament into consideration, this was to be expected, but at least it indicates that the reaction will mean either that Germany will have to complete the occupation of the country—and, incidentally, add to her own burdens or else abandon all hope of inducing France to enter the Nazi orbit.

Russia remains as much an enigma as ever. Superficially she is friendly with the Axis; in reality she appears to be still attempting to anticipate the jump of the cat. The failure of Germany to achieve superiority over the Royal Air Force, the British Naval successes in the Mediterranean, and the fiasco of the much-publicised invasion of England have gone a long way in the eyes of official Russia towards countering the impression created by the German victories on land.

Of all the belligerents, Italy is in the most precarious situation. Within two weeks she has suffered blows which must inevitably result in a serious and perhaps disastrous loss of prestige. The success of the Greek forces in not only repelling the Italian invasion but in carrying the war well into the Italian territory of Albania and capturing the invasion base of Koritza, is one of the great surprises of the entire war. Few pepople doubted that the Greeks would put up a heroic defence of their liberties and their country, but their convincing defeat of the first Italian onslaught has amazed both military experts and news commentators.

Whether the Greeks will be able to hold their conquests or their own northern provinces if the full force of the Axis war machine is thrown against them is another matter. It will be remembered that in the case of Finland even the epic defence of the Mannerheim Line was insufficient in the long run to stem the force of the inexhaustible manpower of the Russian Army. Nevertheless, a point to be remembered in the case of Greece is that her entry into the war has opened up the islands of the eastern Mediterranean to the British Navy and the Royal Air Force, giving Great Britain invaluable bases from which to strike at southern Italy. Simultaneously she has reduced the possibility of a successful Italian invasion of Egypt.

If the Axis plan for a sudden sweep through Greece to Salonika and the Aegean had gone according to schedule, the situation in the Middle East would by now have been more dangerous for Britain than at any time since the fall of France temporarily threatened to put the whole French fleet into the hands of the enemy. But the plan has gone awry; Italy, for the first time since the March on Rome, has met with a major disaster, and the Axis has lost time—the com-

modity which it can least afford to waste. And lastly, there is Japan, the Asiatic end of the Axis and a potential threat to both the British Empire and the United States in the Pacific. As one of the most truculent of the Great Powers, Japan has given indications of a marked cooling in her belligerence since the Anglo-American policy of appeasement was ended by the reopening of the Burma Road. Japan, like her European friends, is losing too much valuable time. She might have had a reasonable chance of acquiring some of the Dutch islands when the Germans were sweeping through Holland, when Great Britain had her hands full in Europe, and when the United States was still attempting to keep up the facade of isolation. But that time has passed. The Anglo-American defensive alliance, the refusal of Russia to be drawn directly into anyone else's quarrels, and Britain's achievement in winning success out of what appeared to be inevitable defeat, have left Japan, like her allies, somewhat apprehensive over the prospects for the second round of the second World War.

WORK OF FLEET AIR ARM REVIEWED BY COMMODORE

Opportunity For Young New Zealanders Stressed In Broadcast

WELLINGTON, Nov. 24.

Broadcasting last night, the Commodore of the New Zealand Division of the Royal Navy (Commodore W. E. Parry) explained the work of the Fleet Air Arm. He cited as recent examples the bombing of aerodromes in Sardinia by aircraft from the Ark Royal and the crippling blow to the

"As you know, the Italian navy doesn't like going to sea and so, as our warships could not reach them, the Fleet Air Arm went to Taranto where, on Italian home ground, it accounted for two or three battleships, a couple of cruisers and two auxiliary vessels," said Commodore Parry,

Referring to the part played by the aircraft of H.M.S. Ajax in the Battle of the River Plate, Commodore Parry said that the action had been in progress some time before the aircraft were launched. "Can you imagine the feelings of the crew, with the concussion of the ship's guns rocking their frail craft, and surrounded by vast splashes made by the enemy's shells, while they hurriedly made their tests and preparations for being catapulted?" asked the speaker.

It said much for the strength of the machines and the nerves of their airmen that they stood up to these heavy conditions. The aircraft marked the fall of shot, reported the tracks of enemy torpedoes and his movements behind his incessant smoke screens. The aircraft were successfully recovered in the open sea during the chase of the Graf Spee later in the day.

Work of New Zealanders

Speaking of the New Zealanders, Commodore Parry said: "We have heard much and will hear more of the daring deeds of those in the Royal Air Force. We shall have the same words of praise for the New Zealanders in the Fleet Air Arm. "Since last May we have sent no fewer than 117 and there will be an opportunity for more.

from a letter received from a New
Zealander who arrived in England

recently:
"Of our twenty from New Zealand "Of our twenty from New Zealand eighteen are pilots and two observers. The observers of the Fleet Air Arm are given very extensive training, including flying, special gunnery, bombing, reconnaissance, air photography and navigation. We will learn Morse and Semaphore, squad drill and a good deal of seamanship.

"English Boys Friendly" "Sports facilities are good, and we have found the English boys most friendly and helpful. Being one of those New Zealanders' is a passport to all kinds of hospitality."

The writer said he would be training for ten months in various stations and he hoped thus to see the whole of the British Isles. Then he wanted a job on a cryisor on het. he wanted a job on a cruiser or bat-tleship as gunfire spotter, which might take him anywhere in the

world.

"Men wishing to join the Fleet Air Arm should offer through the New Zealand Air Force," said Commodore Parry, "Successful candidates are sent direct to England for training. Those who pass the courses are given temporary commissions in the Air Branch of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve."

Commodore Parry expressed the hope that his words would induce young New Zealanders to join the Fleet Air Arm.

MINES LAID OVER BOY'S MAGNIFICENT SWIM TO SAVE HIS COMPANIONS

Victors Refuse To Be Lured On Into Premature Occupation

> (British Official Wireless.) (Received November 23, 6 p.m.)

RUGBY, Nov. 22. A Greek official communique issued at Athens to-day states: "Our heroic troops, after a hard struggle, to-day entered Koritza, Albania, in triumph. The advance of our

troops continues everywhere."

Military circles in London, in discussing the capture of Koritza by the Greeks, emphasises the great strategic importance of the town, which was the main base of the Italian advance in this sector and is a great road centre.

The Greek troops entered Koritza' at midday and hoisted the Greek flag over the town hall.

It is learned that a complete Italian battalion and much material were captured in the Koritza operations.

The Greek High Command declared that the entry into Koritza by the advance guard of the Greek Army was delayed on the eastern approach to the city until the main forces came down from the mountains from which they had been dominating the town. They refused to be lured into a premature occupation just for the sake of making an impression. an impression.
