Empire shipbuilding yards, by providing new tonnage, are helping Britain to defeat the U-boat menace. Canada, which before the war had about 1,250,000 tons on its shipping registry, has launched new vessels from yards at Vancouver, Montreal and Halifax. A large number of merchant ships are now on the stocks and it was announced recently that Canada is to build 18 large merchant vessels for the British Government.

There are some 40 shipbuilding and repairing establishments in the Dominion and even before war about 4000 permanent workers were employed. In 1938 repair work was done to the value of over £3,000,000. LONDON, Jan. 3. Cardiff was "blitzed" intensely for a long time to-night, but the attack was not comparable with those on Coventry, Birmingham and Southampton.

Reconnaissance machines flew over soon after nightfall and were followed by bombers using thousands of incendiary then high-explosive bombs, the raid reaching blitz force.



#### PARTY POLITICS AND THE WAR.

When Mr Holland was elected to the leadership of the National Party, it was clearly understood that the Opposition would continue to be represented on the Advisory War Council by the ex-Leader, Mr Hamilton, and Mr Coates. The Prime Minister had already acknowledged publicly the assistance and co-operation he had received from them. The other day Mr Fraser volunteered the opinion that one or other should be replaced by Mr Holland and a good many people must have been puzzled regarding his motive.

must have been puzzled regarding his motive.

The Advisory War Council is a makeshift device under which members of the Opposition accept responsibility for helping to direct the war effort without any voice in the policy behind it. They do so from a patriotic desire to serve the country in its hour of peril, and in default of being allowed membership in a coalition cabinet, which would give complete unity of purpose and vest in both parties alike the respon-

sibility for the Dominion's contribution to the Empire's cause.

New Zealand is far from being the only part of the Empire where political parties have been unable to combine for the purpose of organising for victory, but that does not lessen the misfortune of disunity in the face of danger. Party government, which means the rule of the party commanding a majority in the House of Representatives, is a cumbrous and clumsy method of translating public opinion into legislative enactments and of producing efficient administration. Compared with totalitarian government it is the tortoise and hare over again, with this difference, that the totalitarian hare has no intention of being caught napping. Because of this, party government in England disappeared in the night, and so far as Great Britain is concerned, the war is being waged by a chief dictator in the person of Mr Churchill, and a handful of sub-dictators, whose word is law in their respective fields of authority.

If bombs were falling in Queen Street, Auckland, or in Willis Street, Wellington, it is quite likely that we in New Zealand would speedily compose our political differences, or at any rate, subordinate them to the common purpose of defeating the Hun. It should not require a blazing inferno in our cities and a litter of dead in the streets to make us forget our political antipathies, but apparently nothing less

For this state of affairs it is, perhaps, hardly fair to put all the blame on the politicians. Citizens who can absorb themselves so completely in the fascination of racecourse gambling and avoid so successfully the "blood, sweat and toil" which in the words of Mr Churchill, are the price of victory, have little cause to sit in judgment of public men whose mutual jealousies and dislikes keep them apart.

It is a pity that this should be so, because it is difficult to believe that the best uses are being made of the country's manpower and material resources. The rate at which New Zealand is being drained of its manhood can be justified only on the assumption of a shorter war than the indications justify. In the last war we also started off at a gallop and had to slow down. It extended over four years, and we called up and equipped about 100,000 men. We must be well past half that number to-day, although the war has been in progress for only fifteen months. If we go on at the present rate, it will soon be difficult to maintain production on the scale that is supposed to be equally essential to the success of our arms in

The layman will naturally hesitate to express positive opinions on these matters in the absence of the information on which they should be based. One would like to think that everything which is being done fits in with the requirements of the Imperial authorities, and is at their express desire and

Those members of the general public whose minds are not entirely distracted by the problem of discovering which useless quadruped is going to emerge from the ruck in the straight and return a dividend, would probably feel more comfortable if they knew that a united government representing both political parties was giving due thought to these

weighty considerations. Under the existing arrangement, the Opposition representatives on the Advisory War Council can be pretty certain that they will have to share the blame for any failure of New Zealand to do the right thing, but when victory comes, the laurels will be for the government which monopolised the power while sharing the responsibility.

### Rapid Progress Of Industry Reviewed At Meeting Of Growers

All-round increases in prices for the current season's crops were announced by the managing-director of Wattie Canneries, Ltd (Mr J. Wattie) at a meeting of canning-fruitgrowers at Hastings last night.

The rapid progress made by the industry in Hawke's Bay was outlined by Mr Wattie, who emphasised that the canneries could take all canning crops that growers could supply. "The progress we have made in the canning industry is largely due to your support," Mr Wattie told the suppliers. "I am quite sure that with your assistance we can build here a canning industry that will be premier in New Zealand."

Mr Wattie said that this year ing a new tall bean which Mr Wattie there would be two grades of peaches instead of one as in past seasons. Same Price For Asparagus

Asparagus this season will bring fivepence a pound, the same price as that paid to growers last year.

Replying to a question, Mr Wattie stated that the increased prices would apply to contracts already in force. Contract rates would rule as a minimum and these growers would receive the benefit of any improved prices, he said.

The canneries were open to purchase all available supplies of canning fruits, said Mr Wattie, and further plantings of canning peaches were necessary. Long-term contracts had been made and the factory was anxious to make more and would give a guaranteed price of £11 a ton for canning varieties of peaches. peaches had been planted in the pro

There will be two grades of pears. A price of £11 3/4 a ton will rule for two and three-quarter inch fruit and over, and £9 6/8 a ton for two and a half inch and two and five eighth inch.

#### More Tomatoes

Mr Wattie said that he expected that the canneries would handle over 50 per cent more tomatoes this season than last. Comparing with the flat price of £6 5/- a ton of last season, this year growers will receive £7 5/- up to March 15 and £5 5/- a ton thereafter.

The nectarine price this year will be £14 a ton as against £11 13/4 last season. The same price will rule for yellow freestone peaches, but none of this species under two and a quarter inches is wanted.
