Centred on a line from Whakatane to Taneatua and Ruatoki, what was described as the worst earthquake since the Napier disaster in 1931 rocked buildings and sent people rushing outside in many parts of the central Bay of Plenty area this afternoon.

The time at which it was felt varied from about 2.35 to 2.45 and it was generally estimated that the actual shock lasted for about one minute. Its intensity was greatest in the Whakatane-Taneatua-Ruatoki line and Ciminished as the shock spread east and west. It was felt only slightly at Te Puke and Tauranga and also in districts east of Opotiki.

At Whakatane people rushed into At Whakatane beopie rushed into the streets when the dull roar from the sea was followed by a shock which violently swayed buildings and trees and then dwindled off into a series of lateral waves. It was described as being the most severe earthquake the town has experienced since the Napier disaster.





EXERCISES ARE IMPORTANT TO MAINTAIN SLIMNESS

A Few Minutes Every Morning Is The Best Plan

Just accept this fact if you want to be smart; not the cleverest frocking on earth can possibly achieve a good effect for you unless you keep your figure slim and graceful. Take for instance, those little pads of flesh which one so often sees above the hips, or that slight thickness around the waist and abdomen-how fatal they are to all smartness and youthfulness of appearance. On the other hand, the plainest and most inexpensive frock will have an air of chic if your figure is supple and slender and free from unsightly bulges.

Of course, one need hardly mention how much more healthy it is to be thin than fat. That goes without saying. We shall speak only about the vanity side of it here, for that appeals to all women everywhere.

Whalever your age may be, then, watch your shape, and at the first.

watch your shape, and at the first sign of thickness roll it off, squeeze tioned off by vigorous rubbing with it off, exercise it off, but keep it off a towel or rubber hand glove. Every kind of exercise is valuable so long as it is done regularly every morning before jumping into your bath. Stretching and touching the toes, working the waist muscles, bending and twisting, all will keep you slender, but there are one or two exercises which cannot be beaten for reducing flesh on the abdomen and taking away those fleshy pads just above the hips.

Here is the one for the abdomen, and remember it is there that most fat begins, and spreads as though from a generating station to other parts of the body. Breathe deeply and rhythmically. Another excellent exercise is simply to stand on tip-toe, and as you draw a deep breath lift the arms above the head, pulling up all the stomach muscles. Keep them so, tense, for a few seconds. This will soon flatten and strengthen them.

As for those little pads of flesh over the hips, these can be actually squeezed away with the hands, for that is the method employed by Swedish masseurs for doing away with soft fat. Sprinkle a little talc on the hands, catch hold of the



CIVIL AND MILITARY EFFORT

"The Times" is usually the most judicial of all newspapers, and has access to sources of information that are never tapped by more popular but less authoritative journals. When it says that the war effort of the Services is not being adequately supported by the civilian population, and that Great Britain cannot expect to beat Germany until her whole strength is brought to bear on the enemy, it is time to ask why Mr Churchill's Government has not been able to fulfil more fully the high hopes which were entertained when he took over from Mr Chamberlain.

The answer is simple. The speedy organisation of a democracy for war, so as to produce totalitarian efficiency, is beyond the capacity of any statesman, whatever his ability. Considering the legacy Mr Churchill inherited from his predecessor, he has worked wonders, and if he cannot bring the Empire safely through the present war, then nobody else is likely to do it. This does not, of course, detract from the force of "The Times's" criticism, which is being met by the creation of new ministerial departments to bring production and trade more completely into line with the war policy, and to prepare for the situation that will arise when a peace economy has to be ordered to replace the insane orgy of violence and destruction which has been forced on Europe by

The real difficulty facing the British Government is how to apply civilian conscription and how to mobilise the private wealth of the country with the same completeness and thoroughness that Germany seems able to achieve. Many of the people who admit readily that it should be done would be the first to resist as soon as the policy was given a personal application. The Germans are more amenable to regimentation than the British. They can be assigned duties and compelled to perform them without provoking a strike or political agitation.

There are hundreds of thousands of people in England who ought to be doing war work. They fled to the safety of the Provinces when the "blitzing" started in London and they are lying low until it is safe to return. Last month a serious scandal came to light when it was discovered that British prisoners of war, who were supposed to be getting parcels of food and clothing through the Red Cross organisation had been left to starve on their meagre rations and freeze for want of proper clothing. The Red Cross organisation had broken down. It was dependent on voluntary helpers, many of whom failed to turn up as soon as the bombing began. The heroic few who stuck to the job were quite unable to do the necessary packing and dispatch the goods which were so badly needed by the prisoners in German

People are asking why the Government, which had power to requisition the services of individuals, did not do so. The answer seems to be that an organisation to carry out and enforce universal personal service for civilian duties did not exist, and the Government was preoccupied with organising and equipping the armed forces. It is perfectly clear, however, that compulsion is necessary to secure 100 per cent. civilian co-operation with the war effort. Hard things are being said of the shirkers who loaf about the English villages waiting till the war clouds roll by so they can resume a life of pleasure and idleness in the metropolis, when they ought to be in the munition works or doing something equally useful.

But to get totalitarian results, totalitarian methods must be employed. To talk about creating a political structure which will effect regimentation "while preserving the constitutional responsibilities of Ministers to the Crown and Parliament" is merely pretending to reconcile things which are completely irreconcilable. For the successful prosecution of the war, we are told that individual liberty and private wealth must be surrendered to an authoritarian regime—with the practical certainty that they will never be fully restored.

The future alone can show whether authoritarian government can be made subject to popular control,

By Telegraph—Press Association AUCKLAND, Jan. 9. An appeal to all industrial concerns to absorb as many workers engaged in employment promotion schemes as possible was made by the Minister of Labour (the Hon. P. C. Webb) to-day.

The Minister said that his remarks applied especially to more concerns.

marks applied especially to men on Scheme 13, as the Government was desirous that those fit and able to take permanent work should have the opportunity of replacing men going into camp for military ser-

vice.

"A considerable number of first-class men have found it difficult in the past to go away to jobs on account of family reasons," said the Minister. "I now appeal to these men and to men on all employment schemes promoted by the State to make every effort to get permanent work. Scheme 13 is to be reviewed by Cabinet at an early date and there is a possibility of its being abolished or considerably curtailed.

Essential Work.

"I would ask local bodies wherever possible to release men employed on non-essential work and place them in essential work where that is

possible to release men employed on non-essential work and place them in essential work where that is

in essential work where that is available.

"I was responsible for the introduction of the scheme as I felt it was economic waste to have men formed up in queues waiting to draw sustenance payments. I felt that it was better for them and their families and for the country that they should be provided with suitable work. This has been done and every town and village throughout the country has profited by their labour. They have rendered a national service, but the necessity which existed for the introduction of the scheme is fast disappearing.

"If positions are offered, these men now they must be filled. If the men refuse, except for some very good reason, they will hasten the end of the scheme. The only men who should be employed on Scheme 13 to-day should be those whose age or physical disabilities, together with their family responsibilities, preclude them from taking other employment."

In reply to a question, the Minister said there had been instances where men had refused to take other work and in some cases they had been struck off the employment roll. It was necessary for men to be engaged where they could be of the greatest service to the country. Southland A.A. Secretary Talks On Traffic Control At Hastings

Praise for the system of traffic control at Hastings was expressed by the secretary of the Southland Automobile Association (Mr F. W. Miller) in an interview with the "Daily

"Generally speaking, the traffic is well controlled in the borough, although I have at times noticed a careless disre-gard by motorists for pedestrian crossings," said Mr Miller. "This is certainly the exception rather than the rule, but it is the exception which causes accidents."

From the motorist's point of view Hastings presented certain traffic problems, not the least of which was parking in the main street, said Mr Miller. All cities and towns in New Zealand had been confronted with that problem and they had all solved it, with varying degrees of success, in their own way.

Invercargill, whose main street was about three times the width of Heretaunga Street, had decided on "nose-in" parking at an angle of 30 degrees, which many motorists still claimed was the most satisfactory method, said Mr Miller. The system of side-on parking also had been tried at Invercargill, but it was disliked by most motorists.




