





MECHANISING BRITISH FARMING

A whimsical philosopher like George Bernard Shaw would hardly be suspected of the right to speak authoritatively on agricultural practice, and "Daily Mail" readers to be a been broad in the publication of the publication. must have been keenly interested in the publication on Tuesday of his suggestions for rationalising British farming, together with Lord Bledisloe's comments.

The present war is helping on the revolution in farming methods which was begun in the last war.

Old customs and practices die hard, and Dominion visitors to Great Britain invariably find that the countryside presents some amazing contrasts. In many instances owner occupiers of farm lands work their places in a way that is beyond criticism, but there is still a great deal of farming that can only be described as a survival of feudalism, in which the result is unsatisfactory alike to the landlord, the tenant farmer and the labourer.

It is not at all uncommon to come across a block of rich farming land comprising a few thousand acres, worked as an estate. The land is expected to maintain thirty or forty farmers, several score agricultural labourers, an estate manager and his family, a big manor house with a dozen or more retainers, a stable of hunters, and a lord of the manor whose main concern is his social standing and the size of the income he can extract from his tenantry. As a result of changing conditions, taxation, obsolete farming practice and the competition of overseas producers, somebody has to be content with very little.

The answer to all this is obvious enough, but the reluctance of the landlords to face the situation is often past belief. They carry on bravely in genteel poverty and sacrifice much to appearances. The tenants have their fields galloped over throughout the winter and pretend that it does them no harm. The labourer, whose wages grew from 19/- weekly in 1914 to 32/6 in 1938, ekes out a meagre subsistence taking days to do jobs that could be done in hours by machinery.

Left to the remorseless operation of the law of supply and demand, the whole system would have disappeared years ago, but as the result of agitation and political influence, it has been bolstered up with subsidies for production running into millions annually. This, of course, is a roundabout way of making the taxpayer provide the tenant farmer with the means of paying his rent, and preserving much of the old nobility from complete expropriation of the ancestral acres.

A day has come, when necessity, which knows no law, is compelling the intensive cultivation of grass lands. The destruction of shipping by raiders and submarines, and the diversion of food ships to troop carrying and supply for the armed forces, has made it necessary to farm the soil of Great Britain up to the maximum of its productive capacity. Hence the importation of thousands of American tractors and implements and the manufacture of as many more in England as fast as the works can turn them out, to break up pasture and put in food producing crops under the supervision of the Ministry of Agriculture.

Mr Bernard Shaw's contention that the collectivised farming of the Soviet Union is the right system to apply to British agriculture will be received with mixed feelings. will take more than a European war to eliminate all the feudalism that clings to the British countryside, but there would appear to be a golden opportunity for an enlightened landowner to apply the principle of collective farming to his own estate. Instead of each individual tenant farmer keeping a team and a set of implements, the mechanised equipment might be provided by the landlord and operated over the whole estate according to a planned programme for maximum production. The disappearance of the old-time farm labourer and the lure of high pay in the munition works which tempts the younger generation to desert the villages for the industrial towns is another factor making for change in farming

Although there may be a reversion to some of the prewar methods when peace arrives, it is certain that many of the changes now taking place will remain long afterwards, and the English countryside will never be quite the same

The position of University students who have been or who may in future be drawn in ballots for territorial training was to-day elucidated by the Minister of National Service (the Hon. R. Semple).

"Those students who are now entering camp," said the Minister, "will not complete training until the end of March and thus will miss several weeks of the University term. So far as they are concerned, I am glad to say that the colleges have found it possible to make provision either by adjusting the dates of terms, or by providing additional tuition to compensate for the time thus lost. Those students who would in the ordinary course of events commence territorial training at a later period of the year should appeal to the appropriate Manpower Committee for a postponement of service.

Postponement Recommended
"I have recommended to the varous committees that in such cases postponements should be granted until the end of September in the first place, and then, if credit passes are not given, for a further period, until the examinations have been held

held.
"The position of students drawn in the overseas ballots is entirely a different matter, since the period of service is indefinitely prolonged, and it is not merely a question of fitting a training period of three months into the educational year.

Appeals to be Lodged

"Each case will, however, be considered on its merits. It is of course, understood that consideration of a postponement of service for University

postponement of service for University students is not given spontaneously. It is necessary for appeals to be lodged in every case.

"Appeals in regard to territorial service are required to be addressed to the secretaries of the Manpower Committees for the appropriate districts while those in regard to avertricts, while those in regard to over-seas service must be sent to the Di-rector of National Service."

BRITISH NOW 40 MILES BEYOND TOBRUK

Coast Road Blocked And Patrols Feeling Out Defences

(United Press Association-Copyright.) Received January 10, 10.45 p.m.) LONDON, Jan. 9.

By reaching Gazala, 40 miles west of Tobruk, the Nile Army has ensured that neither reinforcements nor supplies can traverse the coast road to Tobruk.

It would be premature to say that the encirclement of Tobruk is completed, but armoured units and light tanks are patrolling the desert plateau west of Tobruk and the British grip is hourly tightening. New forces are constantly arriving and patrols are systematically sounding the strength of the defences.

The raids are assessing every swell and fold in the ground as a future battlefield.

Devastating attacks on Italian air | bases and ports in Libya were made by the Royal Air-Force on Wednesday while the British land forces advanced their preparations to at-tack Tobruk. Many Italian war-planes were destroyed on the

planes were destroyed on the ground.

"While preparations for the reduction of Tobruk, the Italian base in Libya, are proceeding, our mechanised forces are now operating west of the town," says a communique issued from British General Headquarters at Cairo.

"As a result of our patrol activity on the Sudan frontier, an enemy post north-east of Kassala has been evacuated and occupied by our own troops."

Low-flying Raids.

At Martuba, British aircraft carried out low-flying attacks on 11 S/79's and several CR/42's on the ground. Two S/79's were set on fire. Others were badly damaged, and still others were seen to have been already damaged.

Two S/79's on the ground at Gazala also were attacked, one being severely damaged. The other was seen to be already unserviceable.

At Benina, about 100 enemy aircraft on the ground were heavily bombed, and several were destroyed and others badly damaged.

Seven S/97's at the Tmimi landing-ground were seen to be burnt out. "The Times" special correspondent outside Tobruk states: "From the ridge where I am writing I can see the British guns hammering at Tobruk's defences and the Italian guns are replying. It is the heaviest artillery fire I have heard in this thootre lery fire I have heard in this theatre of war.

"The Italians do not appear to lack guns and ammunition, both of which they are using liberally.

"Whereas, during the first days of the siege of Bardia, aircraft played the principal part in an attempt to interfere with the British approach, here artillery is the only enemy arm in evidence. The Italian Air Force has completely faded out and there are no other ground troops." out.

A particularly heavy raid was made on Benghazi, during which four or five ships received direct hits and a number of fires were started in warehouses. Enemy convoys north-west of Giarabub were attacked, and considerable damage was caused.

Rapid Fall Likely.

The inactivity of the Italian defences of Tobruk strengthens the belief military observers in Cairo hold that the Italians do not intend to make a determined stand at Tobruk

Referring to this point, Mr. Churchill had said he hoped that London at any time for consultation, would resume his full functions as a Minister of the Crown.

Automatic Approach-Light Signalling At All Stations

Much easier handling of trains between Napier and Wairoa is expected to result from the installation of automatic approach-light signalling at every station on the lines.

Officers of the signal and electrical section of the Railways Department have been working for some time on the installation, which is a complicated task in which thousands of pounds worth of equipment has already been used.

When the work is completed within a few months' time, it will be possible for trains to cross at any station, whether there is an officer in attendance or not. This will mean a marked saving in time. The risk of accident through the human factor will also be eliminated, since the celevared lights are claimed to prevent other traffic following the coloured lights are claimed to be quite foolproof.

Make The Most Of Delicious Peaches While They Are Plentiful

BAKED PEACHES

Take 6 slipstone peaches, sugar, butter, lemon juice and nutmeg.
Peel, cut in half and remove the stones from the peaches. Place in a shallow fireproof dish and fill each cavity with one teaspoonful of sugar, it teaspoonful butter, few draws of lower juice and servicing drops of lemon juice, and a grating of nutmeg. Cook in a hot oven for 20 minutes and serve on circular pieces of plain sponge cake with

PEACH FOAM

Take 4 ripe peaches, 2 cupful fine sugar, 1 egg-white.
Skin and cut the peaches into quarters, put them into a basin and duarters, put them into a basin and add the sugar. Beat them together, add the egg-white and go on beating till it forms a perfectly smooth cream. Put into custard glasses, top with whipped cream and serve proved and the sugar cold.

EMPRESS PEACHES

Take 4ozs. rice, 4 ripe peaches, 2ozs. castor sugar, 4 tablespoonfuls red currant jelly, 11 pints milk, vanilla essence.

Cook the rice in the milk in a Cook the rice in the milk in a double boiler with the sugar till the rice is soft and the milk has been absorbed, then add flavouring. Peel and halve the peaches and place the fruit in a baking tin. Cook for a few minutes in the oven. Heap the rice on a hot dish and arrange the cooked peaches on top. Put the red currant jelly in the baking tin and when it is dissolved pour over the peaches. This sweet can be served either hot or cold.

PEACH MILK MOULD

Take some lightly cooked peaches and cut them into slices and then turn them into a basin, keeping back a few slices for decorating. Take the thinly sliced peaches and after putting a layer of buttered breadcrumbs into a greased pudding dish, place in a layer of the peaches, sprinkled with sugar and a grating of orange peel. Continue with alternate layers of peaches and breadcrumbs until all are used. Cover the dish and bake one hour. Remove the cover the last half-hour to brown the crumbs. Serve hot with cream

Wrapped in cotton wool and often priced at four or five shillings each, peaches in England are a rare luxury seldom if ever enjoyed in the average household where no woman who must budget carefully would dream of including such a delicacy on her menu.

Yet here in New Zealand, where we can procure a dozen peaches for a few pence, the majority of us do not make as much use of them as we could, and because they are so plentiful they are not so much appreciated as they should be. These recipes will suggest ways of making the most of this luscious fruit while the season lasts.

To every pound of fruit allow \$1b. of sugar.

Peel the peaches and cut into slices, cover with two or three pounds of white sugar and leave all night. Next day boil with a little water for half an hour or until the peaches are tender. Add the remainder of the sugar, heated in the oven. The sugar should be quite hot so that it doesn't stop the jam boiling. Boil from 1½ to 2 hours briskly. The syrup should be rather thick when done. Use yellow peaches for making jam.

The Allipen, a small steamship chartered by an important British firm in Valparaiso, which leases the island for sheep-farming, was due at Hangaroa, the principal port, by De cember. It carried a new military governor for the colony, religious and educational instructors for the community of 500, and stores for the coming year.

There has been more interest in the island since continental security organisation began and the tripartite pact was signed among Ger many, Italy, and Japan. Its possi-bilities are speculated on as a base in any future air service to the Anti-

Easter Island is not viewed in erms of trade and strategy alone. The Allipen is carrying a cargo of 500 Chilean birds, many of them songsters, to give a little more variety to ornithological life on and around the island, which hitherto has been largely monopolised by the common sparrow. Until recent years there was practically no wild bird or animal life there.

The Famous Statues

No scenic or shore attractions exist for the ordinary tourist on Easter Island, but there are periodical comes impersonal, merciless, cal visits from natural scientific expeditions, interested in this supposed link with another or forgotten continent and to examine the colossal statues carved out of grey lava and the "rongo-rongo" wooden tablets with hieroglyphic inscriptions, the key to which never has been found.

The native name of the island is Rapa-Nui. It is a land of extinct craters, 40 miles square. There have been reports from time to time that it has disappeared in earthquakes. The last such report was in November. 1922.

There is ethnological as well as archeological interest in the island, for it is inhabited by people different from any in South America.

They are Malayo-Polynesians.

The statues, famed for their unusual erectness and majesty, number about 300, and can be seen on the island slopes from many miles out to sea. 
