LEADER OF THE GIRL GUIDES

Sympathy In Her Loss
DEATH OF LORD BADEN-POWELL

Fine Collaboration Ends

The Girl Guides of New Zealand will feel deep sympathy with Lady Baden-Powell in the loss of her husband, Lord Baden-Powell, whose death has occurred at his home in Kenya. Lady Baden-Powell and her late husband were well known in the Dominion, for they visited here in February, 1935, and were accorded a typical guide and scout welcome from the two organisations with which their names are so vitally connected.

Many will remember, for instance, the rally held in the Auckland Domain to welcome the Chief Guide, when some 2000 rangers, girl guides and brownies drawn from places as far apart as Italia and Gisborne, and about 4000 of the general public were present.

When, in 1908, Lord Baden-Powell set up the Boy Scout organisation in England he found in Miss Olive Soames an assistant in the formation of a similar organisation for girls, and with her aid the Girl Guides came into existence. In 1912 the couple married, and as Chief Guide Lady Baden-Powell enlisted the interest and support of Princess Mary and the movement spread far beyond the British Isles.

The Chief Guide declared that its growth had been compelled by the girls themselves. The exercise of a hobby, she declared, was essential to the development of a healthy and contented girl, and of the 586,000 guides in Britain, all had hobbies, which included arts and crafts of every kind.

On her visit to New Zealand in 1935 Lady Baden-Powell said she was convinced that guiding had a definite purpose to serve in a period of mechanical movement and hurried chasing after pleasure. It endeavoured to build character and to teach useful arts and handicrafts, the quiet practice of which brought the true joy to be found in constructive living. No one-to-day will be more satisfied with the way in which the guides have lived up to their principles under war conditions, especially in such countries as England, Poland and Czechoslovakia, than their Chief Guide.

Although much younger than her husband, Lady Baden-Powell's birthday fell on the same day as his, and this gave the scouts and guides the world over a unique opportunity of extending their good wishes to both leaders at the same time. Grief at the loss of one leader will be universally felt by both guides and scouts, for with the death of the Chief Scout the collaboration of two notable personalities in a movement which has made a unique monument in history has come to an end.

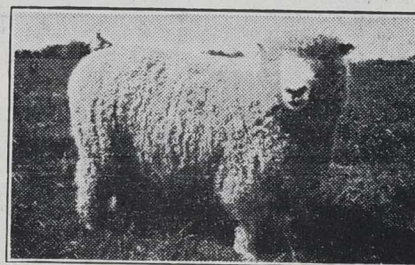

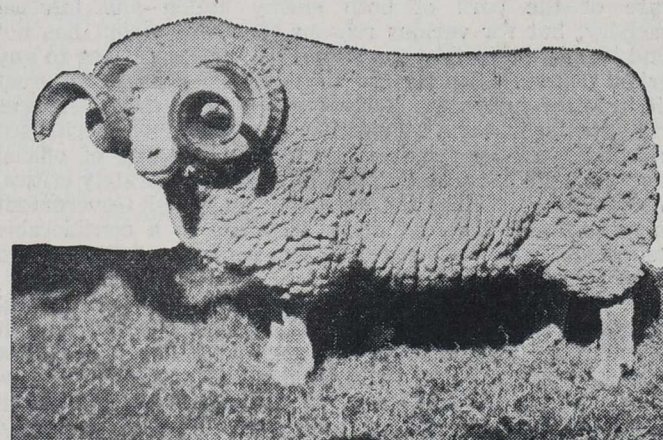

PARTLY-VEILED WARNINGS

Ministers of the Crown, with somewhat irritating persistence, continue to refer vaguely to the perils which surround New Zealand at the present time.

That the danger which confronts New Zealand to-day is both real and formidable cannot be doubted by anyone who reads a newspaper, and that danger has obviously come appreciably nearer since Great Britain has been compelled to fight desperately for her own existence.

There can be no question that the Government is fully aware of the peril of both enemy action and internal treachery, but for various reasons the Government has not found it possible to take the people into its confidence to any marked degree.

A point to be emphasised is that the public do not want information which might be of value to the enemy. Recent events in the Pacific seem to indicate that somewhere in New Zealand or Australia there are too many people who know more than they should about vital shipping movements.

As long as the present situation continues there will be a considerable section of the population which will persist in regarding the war as a far-off event until bombs fall on their own roofs or haystacks. The ostrich complex has long been firmly rooted in New Zealand for the simple reason that the isolation of the Dominion has been an incentive to insularity in outlook.

Then there is the widespread popular belief that the enemy Powers and their friends have too much on their hands to worry much about a small and remote part of the British Empire—a pleasant fallacy which will have to be weeded out sooner or later.

It may be possible that a full-scale invasion of the Dominion is unlikely. No one, except the Government, knows whether this is so. But carefully-planned attacks on the Dominion's ports and efforts to disorganise the country's industrial life with a view to hindering Great Britain and reducing her ability to carry on a world war almost single-handed, must be regarded as something more than a far-away possibility.

There is no reason for a continuance of the present apathy of New Zealanders, but the Government could combat the attitude which it criticises if it could be a little more explicit in its warnings.

Businessman Missing. Mr C. M. Brown, well known in Wellington business circles as a Customs and shipping agent, has been missing since Thursday morning. Any person who has seen him since is asked to inform the police. Mr Brown was an artillery officer in the Great War. He is aged 49 and is 5ft. 8in. in height. He was last heard of by relatives from his office at 10 a.m. on Thursday. He was wearing a grey suit, blue shirt, white collar, grey socks and black shoes. He has grey-blue eyes and sandy hair. He is married.—Press Association.

Workers Not To Blame. The national secretary of the Building Labourers' Federation (Mr P. M. Butler) denies a statement in the "Evening Post" yesterday that an important cause of the delay in completing Wairoa camp on schedule time is that the men have taken inordinately long holidays.

DOMINION MUST PREPARE AGAINST INVASION PERIL

Appeal For Total Of 100,000 Men For N.Z. Home Guard: Minister's Warning

(By Telegraph—Press Association)
CHRISTCHURCH, Jan. 11.

One hundred thousand men are wanted for the Home Guard in New Zealand. Enrolments at present number 50,000, and an appeal for the remaining 50,000 was made by the Minister of National Service (the Hon. R. Semple) yesterday.

"I appeal to the manhood of New Zealand to rally to their country's colours," said Mr Semple. "We must be prepared to defend these little islands of ours. They are the most prosperous and most free in the world. It is our job to defend that heritage, and above all to keep an eye on internal traitors for, believe me, they are here.

"To the boys who have left their homes and loved ones and have gone overseas we owe a debt of gratitude," continued the Minister. "The best we can do is to prepare ourselves to defend their homes and their loved ones while they are away protecting us. If we do not do that, then we will let them down. That would be treason of the worst hue."

The question of providing equipment and uniforms for the Home Guard is under consideration and it is hoped that a decision will be given in a week or two, Mr Semple continued.

War Against Empire.

"The declaration of war was not made against any part of the British Empire, but against the whole," added Mr Semple. "Invasion is possible, and it may come at any time. The raiders that have been stalking our waters should be sufficient to convince the people of New Zealand that it is time we should be up and doing before it is too late to prevent a tragedy coming our way."

"We must be prepared. We wanted to live in peace and we did not want for trouble, but trouble has been forced on us and we must meet it."

Defence Is Practicable.

"One of the things that makes me bullish is to hear people saying that New Zealand could not defend itself. This country can defend itself, and it has a big advantage in its geographical characteristics."

"The little Greek nation has shown the world what can be done when men are determined to defend their homes and their liberty. The world admires their great feat of arms and draws inspiration from them."

"The manhood of New Zealand could do the same thing if it were organised and understood its purpose."

Well Served By Telephones

HAWKE'S BAY AREA

Greatest Proportion In Country LATEST FIGURES

An increasing use of telephone facilities is shown by figures for the Hawke's Bay province which have now become available.

The statistics indicate that the proportion of telephones to residences is much higher in the country areas than in the towns. For instance, Patoka with 11 households and one business firm has 11 telephones, and Rissington, with 25 households and one firm, has 24 telephones.

In the Towns.

Of the towns, Hastings has 1562 telephones to 4423 households and 641 business firms. Napier is next with 1340 telephones, Waipukurau has 347, Waioira 307, and Waipawa 232.

In the whole area there are 16,842 households and 1930 businesses. They are served by 5502 telephones.

"Waste Of Time And Money"

ACCUSED'S REQUEST Remand To Other Town Unnecessary

(By Telegraph—Press Association) PALMERSTON NORTH, Jan. 11.

"I am pleading guilty to both these charges. Could not the case be heard in Palmerston North? It is just a waste of the Government's time and money to send me to Hamilton," said Cecil Geoffrey Turnbull, a labourer and shop assistant, when he appeared in the Magistrate's Court on charges of theft at Hamilton and false pretences at Christchurch.

Detective Sergeant Meiklejohn asked that accused be remanded to appear at Hamilton on Wednesday. "You must go to the place where the crime was committed," said the Bench.

"This court has no power to deal with you. It is only a matter of form."

Accused was charged with the theft at Hamilton of £5, and also at Christchurch, with intent to defraud, obtaining £135 by falsely representing that he required the money to pay a deposit on a house.

The remand was granted.

WORK CONTINUES AT AUCKLAND

Loading Of Ships On Sundays

(By Telegraph—Press Association) AUCKLAND, Jan. 12.

Work was continued as usual at the King's Wharf coal-stores today. The men were engaged in storing newly-arrived produce.

Work on overseas ships was put off on Saturday and the loading of the vessels was continued to-day. Little delay was caused despite unsettled weather.

YACHTING MISHAP AT NAPIER "BETRAYAL OF 1919" MUST NOT BE PERMITTED AGAIN

TRAGEDY NARROWLY AVERTED "Prussianism Must Be Ended Before Europe Can Find Peace"

NGARU CAPSIZES Amateur Yachtsmen Saved by Koau

Five Napier youths had a narrow escape from drowning when the 16ft yacht Nguru capsized and pitched them into Hawke's Bay, at a point midway between the Beach and the Hawke's Bay roadstead anchorage yesterday morning. But for the presence of mind of the master of the coastal vessel Koau (Captain Haraldsen), who noticed the yacht suddenly heel over in the face of a heavy squall, the incident would have ended in a tragedy, because even the strongest swimmer must have had extreme difficulty in reaching the shore.

The youths involved were:— Thomas Husband, 17, the owner of the vessel, who lives with his parents in Hastings; Roadie, Port Ahuriri; Ray Spackman, 17, Westshore; Colin Waddell, 18, Kennedy Road; Russell Zorn, 16, Kennedy Road; and Charles Merritt, 14, Port Ahuriri.

Shortly after 11 a.m. Husband and Spackman, who normally form the crew of the little vessel, picked up the other three youths and set out for the Bay under full sail. In spite of the heavy seas encountered and the large overload which the craft was carrying, the party decided to venture outside the seclusion of the pierheads.

Soon In Difficulties A strong westerly which was raging at the time, quickly carried the vessel across the Bay, and within 30 minutes, the party got into difficulties. First the bowsprit broke, and then a stay gave way, causing the small yacht to pitch and toss violently. Suddenly she turned over and the youths were pitched into the water.

Waddell and Zorn, who were wearing life-jackets, attempted to swim to the Koau to secure assistance, but the others, clinging to the Nguru. Noticing the plight of the yacht and realising the probable fate of its occupants, the master of the Koau put his vessel about and rescued Waddell and Zorn, who were fast becoming exhausted as a result of their attempt to swim to the vessel. Picking up the other members of the party, the crew of the Koau provided the survivors with a hot meal and endeavoured to dry their clothes.

Vessel Salvaged Later in the afternoon Messrs Richardson and Co's tug Kuri salvaged the upturned craft and brought it back to port, where it was successfully refloated.

Apart from the effect of wearing wet clothes, the rescued party suffered no ill-effects from their adventure.

Mrs Marjorie Livingston Horn, 333 The Terrace, who was found seriously injured at Oriental Bay on Thursday morning, died in hospital at 7 a.m. to-day.

Slaughtermen At Wanganui

OVERTIME WORKED

Mass Meeting To Be Held

IMLAY DISCUSSION

(By Telegraph—Press Association) WANGANUI, Jan. 11.

Although it had been stated that in order to cope with the rush of lambs being sent to the New Zealand Refrigerating Co.'s Imlay works, all employees except slaughtermen had agreed to start work at 7 o'clock to-day, the slaughtermen assembled and worked the extra hour.

The secretary of the Slaughtermen's Union (Mr S. Howes) when interviewed to-day, stated that the question of overtime work in the morning, involving an earlier start was discussed between the management and the delegates of the men on Thursday. The delegates referred the matter back to their respective departments.

A ballot was taken and resulted in favour of working the extra hour. The slaughtermen met yesterday and were informed of the result of the ballot, and after discussion, they resolved that the matter be referred back to a mass meeting of employees on Monday. They were agreeable to working an hour extra on three mornings a week.

No Overtime At Southland

Proposal Rejected Slaughtermen Are Unanimous

CONGESTION FEARED

(By Telegraph—Press Association) INVERCARGILL, Jan. 12.

Slaughtermen in Southland have unanimously decided not to accede to the request of the Southland Meat Co. that a certain amount of overtime be worked at the Makarewa and Matura works to relieve the congestion caused by the shortage of slaughtermen and the rush of lambs.

The proposal last week, the general manager of the company (Mr Alex Cerbit) stated that even half an hour a day would greatly relieve the congestion that was likely to arise. He said the matter was most urgent and he hoped the works would appreciate the necessity for action.

Since last week the position at the works has improved to some extent. More slaughtermen have been engaged and the recent rains have allayed the fears of farmers about a possible feed shortage.

Last night a combined meeting of the Ocean Beach, Makarewa, and Matura branches of the Freezing Workers' Union, decided that no overtime would be worked.

The German official and merchants with whom I was brought into contact readily accepted any advance we made, but did not respond by any corresponding approach, not by a single cent, and soon became necessary to adopt the plan of issuing instructions without regard to the wishes of these individual officials and merchants, but solely in the interests of the wider population concerned.

My work gave me opportunities of mixing with people of all classes from beggars and peasants up to (or down to) high ministers of State.

The Thr - Classes

The peasant class was concerned mainly with the cultivation of their soil and showed little feeling one way or the other. Workmen were very largely concerned with the advance of their own interests, and would use any person or group that would forward these. But in official circles, amongst officers and in the upper bourgeoisie class I found a deep, sullen resentment and hatred directed against Great Britain.

ARMY OPPOSE LEISURE HOURS ARE WELL PROVIDED FOR AGGRESSORS

ROOSEVELT'S BILL INTRODUCED Every Aspect Of Soldier's Life Receives Attention At Trentham

Facilities For Repair Included (Official News Service)

The Expeditionary Force training camp at Trentham was described in a recent article which discussed in reminiscent vein the difference between conditions in last war and those of to-day, with its brighter camp surroundings and improved dietary.

But there are other things in respect of which the Army has made advances. Not only must the soldier be well fed, but he has to be comfortably clothed and accommodated, and given facilities for enjoying leisure after the day's training.

Reveille at 6 a.m. is a bright awakening. Trentham's permanent camp band is out at the bugle call to make the round of the principal roads, playing march music in crisp style. The band is a valuable feature in camp life. Each training unit has its services twice a week to brighten the route marches or other activities, and it turns out every morning at 10.30 for the changing of the guard. Breakfast is served at 7 a.m. Training commences at 8.30 and goes on till noon, when there is an interval of one and a half hours for a light lunch and a spell. The hard work of the day ends at 4.30 and dinner is served at 5.30.

Compared with to-day, the men of the last war were overcrowded in the hutments. Sixty had to be accommodated in the space now taken by 46, and the sixty had to eat as well as sleep in these places. The stretcher beds to-day are in groups of two, with a window between each group. A modern innovation is the light wooden partition between each set of stretchers. It swings back during the night, bringing light out between the beds at night as a protective measure in case of colds or other infection.

The soldier does his own washing in laundries provided with hot water, and showers. He is allowed to smile at this—electric irons, training camps have not yet risen to the heights of luxury represented by baths, but there are many places where hot and cold showers can be enjoyed. Trentham has something of the sort in the old days, but one took one's chance of temperature and the water supply generally, because all the showers came on simultaneously, and went off when someone was about to drill. They had enough. To-day this is under individual control.

Clothing and Boots

Uniforms in the last war were at least a sensible advance upon the ancient days when the soldier had to make himself attractive but uncomfortable in a skin-tight dress of some material, and a worn and polished brass. To-day's battle dress is another advance. It is easily kept neat and is not tight fitting. This uniform is of New Zealand khaki serge and the soldier also has a working uniform of khaki drill.

In footwear it would be difficult to improve on "Bill Massey's Boots" of the old days. Probably our former Prime Minister had as little to do with Army boots as the Minister of Marine. Many boot designs were labelled with his name. If the cheese issued for dry rations happened to be hard or unpalatable, it was called "Bill Massey's" in derisive terms, with a lurid adjective.

"Bill Massey's Boots" were in high favour, and in this respect at least the Prime Minister received compliments.

New Zealand manufacturers to-day are turning out a splendid boot which is more comfortable than others, though the soldier has to take a chance on this. Training is hard on boots, and these heavy ones with heel and toe-plates, rarely go for longer than six weeks without a change. They are now being encouraged to take their worn boots to the central repair shop which has modern machinery and a staff of nine skilled tradesmen whose weekly average is about 500 pairs. They did over 3000 repairs for the men of the First Echelon.

Woolens, also made in New Zealand, are of finer texture than those of the last war, but the three pairs of socks issued to each man are, as before, comfortable and thick, suitable for the heavy boots.

Sickness Records Examined

As the result of long experience the Army has to make allowance for a daily wastage due to sickness, and this is three men per thousand. A commanding officer would regard such a temporary loss as normal, but Trentham's sick wastage comes out better, at two men per thousand. Epidemics of measles and influenza, coinciding with similar outbreaks in the civilian population, have caused fluctuations, but the figure quoted is what usually prevails.

In the camp hospital are fifty beds. There are six fully trained nurses, assisted by medical orderlies, and the hospital cooks are women. Details of hospital admission records were handed to the writer for examination, and this gave an opportunity of checking up on the health results of the camp diet. So the causes of admission to hospital were looked over carefully for evidences of dietary troubles. A mid-winter weekly return showed "nil" from this cause, and also disclosed the reassuring fact that total admissions for the period had been 34, or less than one per thousand, when in camp. Dietary trouble hardly appeared—there was a recent week with two cases.

Parents will be interested in what happens to a man who feels "off colour," which signifies that his own medical officer is of the opinion he is unable to face the day's duties, he goes to his Regimental Aid Post if he is able to get out of bed, otherwise his condition is reported and a visit from the medical officer follows. At the Regimental Aid Post, the soldier's condition is investigated, and if the illness is mild, he is given medicine, ordered light diet, and excused from duty. But the medical officer may consider him a hospital case, and he goes back to his sleeping quarters to await an ambulance. Men who are running a temperature must not parade for medical examination—a sensible precaution which the old hands at Trentham would have appreciated in their time.

U.S. ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

SUPPLY SHIP REACHES DUNEDIN LONG VOYAGE

To Proceed To Little America

(By Telegraph—Press Association) DUNEDIN, Jan. 12.

In the teeth of a strong wind from the south-east, the United States Antarctic service supply ship North Star arrived at Dunedin this afternoon and berthed at the oil wharf at 5.30.

From Seattle the ship had come by way of Honolulu, and from here she is to proceed south to join the expedition flagship, U.S.S. Bear, at Little America. There the two expedition bases, one at Little America and the other on Palmer Land, will be evacuated.

The North Star presented a very different appearance from that of her last voyage on January 1 last year. Then she was loaded heavily below and above not only with stores and equipment, but also with a specially designed snow cruiser stored above her after hatch. On the present visit she is riding lightly, having little on board beyond the necessary stores.

Crowded Ship.

When she embarks the 38 men who spent the winter in Antarctica, her accommodation will be taxed. There are about 150 sled dogs at the two bases, and of these the Bear is to take 24, leaving the remainder for the North Star. Two aeroplanes are also to be brought back, together with much scientific and other equipment, but the snow cruiser is to be left behind, because of the extreme difficulty of loading.

The principal purpose of the North Star's visit to Dunedin is to bunker. This supply will have to serve as fuel for the 3000 or 4000 miles she will cover between here and the Palmer Land base and then on to Buenos Aires, which will be the first port of call on the homeward journey.

Mr A. W. Melkie's Trio An outstanding filly apply describes the bay filly by Bulandshar from the Absurd mare, Charlady. It is no exaggeration to say that she is perhaps the finest thoroughbred filly this writer has ever seen. Last season Mr A. W. Melkie topped the price list with his Bulandshar-Tea Tattle colt (he has been named Murrumbidgee by his Melbourne owner but not yet raced) and it would surprise not at all if this filly repeats the dose for Mr Melkie. Personally, I prefer this filly to the high-priced colt, when her owner took her out and lunged her on a small circular track I was very pleased with the easy rhythm of her action. To describe her it is simply said that she is everything that a young thoroughbred should be and is built "according to Hoyle".

The grey colt by Theo from Lacquer is also well grown being built on true galloping lines. He has size, a long reach backed by plenty of power behind. Bred as he is, it should not be long ere his new owner gets a quick return on his initial outlay. He is bred on similar lines to that great retired galloper, Gold Rod, and although some describe it as line-breeding, it is no such thing, but is a true cross-breeding. Gold Rod may or may not be the exception that proves the rule, but he certainly set the fashion in this district, with what ultimate results remains to be seen. Ex-Pupils, the Woodville sole winner was bred the same way.

Mr Melkie recently had the misfortune to lose a full sister, a foal, the two thousand guinea colt, Charing Cross is at present running out on this farm and it has not been decided when she is to resume racing, in fact, quite possibly she may be retired to the stud.

Soutra Stud Mr H. Hassall's Soutra Stud's contribution to this season's sale consists of three—one colt and two fillies. Mr H. Hassall has a long record in connection with the breeding of the thoroughbred and is not in favour of hampering young stock, and so does not produce the youngsters into the sale ring "all dressed up." But a buyer can plainly see what he is purchasing and not just a lump of fat as in some cases. The Barb once knew of a stud

Cup), Old Bill (Wellington Cup), Motere (Auckland Cup), Wotan (Melbourne Cup), Gaine Carrington (Caulfield Cup) and many other well known and important winners. Even if this filly would prove a turf success she would be an acquisition to any stud.

Another bay is the filly by Bulandshar from Minnikin from a Martian grand dam, not far off to attract attention from buyers as she is built on the same lines as successful gallopers.

Withdrawn Mrs M. E. Fletcher, of Hastings, has withdrawn her filly by Siegfried—Sunlight by Australian Sun from the sale list but, all going well, will send her to Sydney to be placed at a public auction at the big Easter Thoroughbred Sales.

Karamu Stud Farm This breeding establishment was founded by the late Hon. J. D. Ormond in the 90's and quickly made a reputation for itself to occupy a prominent part among New Zealand thoroughbred studs.

The Hon. J. D. Ormond was one of the Dominion's best sportsmen, but he did not have an interest in the turf until middle life. It was like this. Mr. Ormond, who was one of this district's earliest representatives in Parliament, was forced to devote his physician for an overhaul, and the medicine told his patient that he must have something to occupy his mind, other than politics and business. For recreation he strongly recommended racing—not just to two or three horses, but a string of them.

Mr Ormond accepted this advice, and very soon owned a team of thoroughbreds. Later he founded the stud at Karamu, where a private training track was surveyed and put down.

Deadnought (Chester—Trafalgar) in Australia won the V.R.C. Derby and St. Leger, the A.J.C. St. Leger and Australian Cup, which earned for him the title of the best three-year-old of his year, although the opposition was not strong. He bred his eight best horses in Melos in the weight-for-age races when they were at their best, and while only beating Carbine once, he was always very close to him in all the races in which they met.

It was this horse that Mr Ormond procured for his Karamu Stud, where he scored a pronounced success.

Another Australian purchase that proved a success was the Officer (Robinson Crusoe—Marie Louise, whose mares were most successful at the stud.

English Importation. The first English horse imported by Mr Ormond was Birkenhead, who quickly established himself as one of the most successful sires in this land. His progeny won all classes of race from early juvenile classics to Grand Nationals. Further, he sired a fine big type of horse.

By this time Mr Ormond had become one of the biggest owners in New Zealand, and he was known to have thirty horses in training at one time. He headed the New Zealand winning owners' list quite a few times.

Other sires imported from England for the Karamu Stud were King Mark and Hymettus, also successes.

After the Hon. J. D. Ormond's death his sons, Messrs J. D. and F. Ormond, carried on, first importing Arandia and after him Bulandshar and the French-bred Lang Bian.

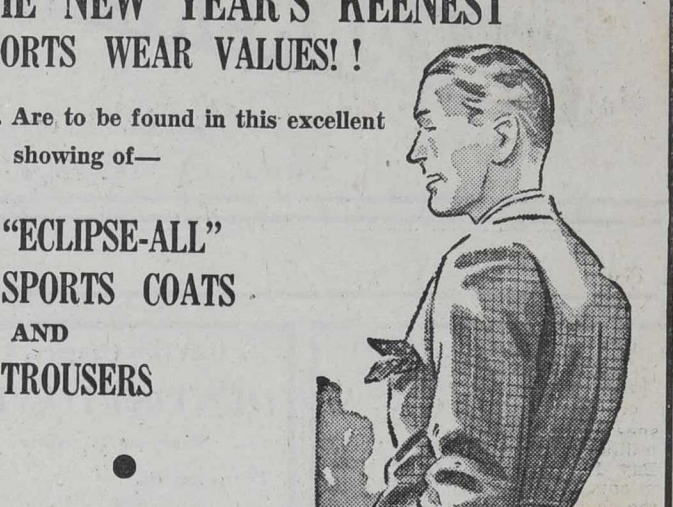

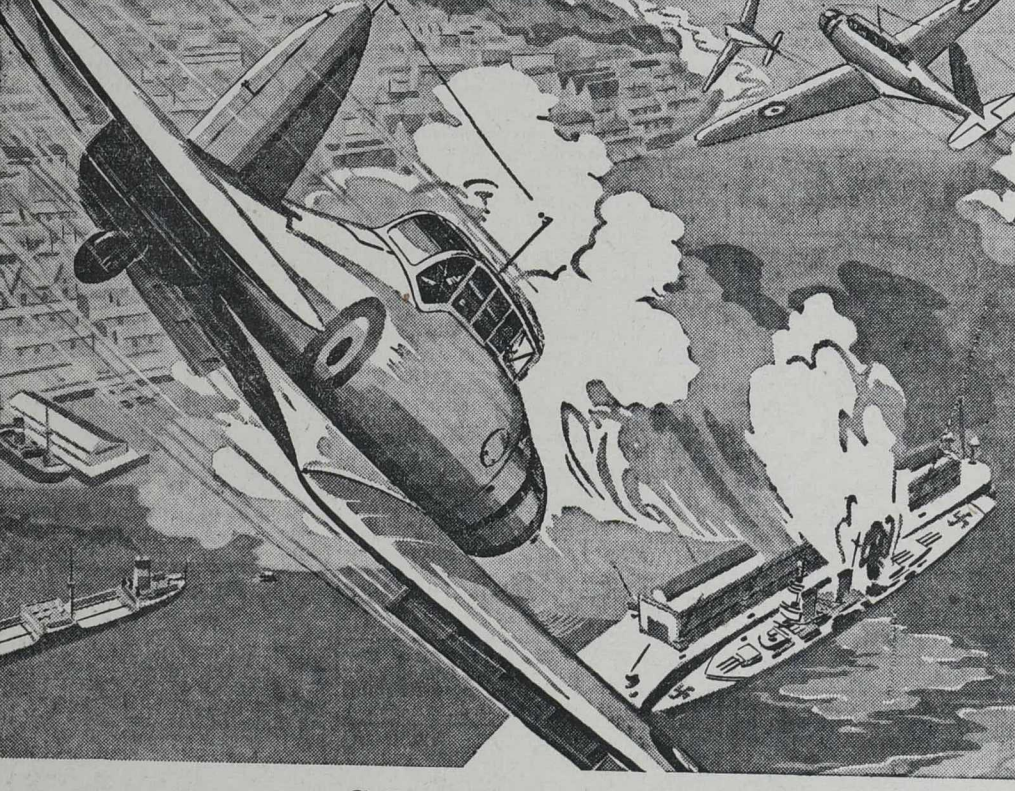
