Criticism Of Bill To Aid Britain

ROOSEVELT'S EFFORTS

Limitation Of His Powers Is Thought Probable

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received January 12, 9.15 p.m.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.

Sentiment appears to be developing to impose limitations on the Aid to Britain Bill. The sentiment is crystalising slowly but the indications point to the possibility that those in favour of modification and the Bill's outright opponents together may have sufficient votes to put in some

The most discussed limitations are: (1) A two-year limit to the President's authority to provide materials and repair ships for the democracies; (2) continuance of the law that the Army and Navy chiefs must certify that the present equipment is not essential to United States defence before transfer; (3) a ban on outright gifts of war materials under the "indirect benefit clause."

The chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee (Senator W. F. George) foreshadowed that the Senate would amend the Bill to require "reasonable security" from Britain for arms material. He said that this would not necessarily mean

"If we could have some interest in British tin or rubber production it would be good business for us," he said.

He favoured without qualification the Bill's objectives.

The New England Republican leaders expressed approval of the Bill's objectives, but Senator Austin suggested another change—a time limitation on the great powers given to the President

to the President. Senators Barkley and McCormack said that under the Bill certificates for the disposal of war material from the Chief of Staff or the Navy Chief were not needed. Hitherto such disposal had been limited by a law requiring the defence chiefs to certify that any sold must be "surplus."

They said that the President would have power to dispose of new material as well as equipment already in the hands of the Army and Navy. The President would not be required to publicise transactions involving the shipment of war materials to friendly nations. At a Press conference to-day President Roosevelt intimated that individual contracts are being negotiated under the Bill just introduced to Congress to enable the speeding of help to Britain, and he added that each contract might provide some specific means of repayment. The terms of the Bill appear to make this authority discretionary. Some official observers said that

the President could even make gifts of material if he desired.

The President will ask for funds to finance the Bill, variously estimated at between 2,000,000,000 and 10,000,000,000 dollars, after it is practed.

He side-stepped ah inquiry whether additional destroyers were involved, saying they had not been requested by Britain.

All reports of the raid are in agreement that the raiders were kept very high by an intense anti-aircraft barrage. They adopted the newest practice of the German Air Force of showering down fire bombs at an early stage in the attack. After a few hours there was a pause and later a new wave of raiders arrived.

Damage was minimised in a num-ber of areas by the efficient work of fire-bomb-fighting parties of neigh-bours who extinguished hundreds of

incendiary bombs.

Several churches and cinemas were hit at Portsmouth and a hospital receiving casualties was dam-

LEADER OF THE GIRL GUIDES

Sympathy In Her Loss

DEATH OF LORD **BADEN-POWELL**

Fine Collaboration Ends

The Girl Guides of New Zealand will feel deep sympathy with Lady Baden-Powell in the loss of her husband, Lord Baden-Powell, whose death has occurred at his home in Kenya. Lady Baden-Powell and her late husband were well known in the Dominion, for they visited here in February, 1935, and were accorded a typical guide and scout welcome from the two organisations with which their names are so vitally connected.

Many will remember, for instance, the rally held in the Auckland Domain to welcome the Chief Guide, when some 2000 rangers, girl guides and brownies drawn from places as far apart as Kaitaia and Gisborne, and about 4000 of the general public were present.

When, in 1908, Lord Baden-Powell set up the Boy Scout organisation in England he found in Miss Olaves Soames an assistant in the formation of a similar organisation for girls, and with her aid the Girl Guides came into existence. In 1912 the couple married, and as Chief Guide Lady Baden-Powell enlisted the interest and support of Princess Mary and the movement

When, in 1908, Lord Baden-Powell set up the Boy Scout organisation in England he found in Miss Olave Soames an assistant in the formation of a similar organisation for rigirls, and with her aid the Girl Guides came into existence. The Chief Guide declared that its growth had been compelled by the girls themselves. The exercise of a hobby, she declared, was essential to the development of a healthy and contented girl, and of the 586,000 guides in Britain, all had hobbies, which included arts and crafts of every kind.

On her visit to New Zealand in 1935 Lady Baden-Powell said she

On her visit to New Zealand in 1935 Lady Baden-Powell said she was convinced that guiding had a definite purpose to serve in a period of mechanical movement and hurried chasing after pleasure. It endeavoured to build character and to teach useful arts and handicrafts, the quiet practice of which brought the true joy to be found in constructive living. No one to-day will be more satisfied with the way in which the guides have lived up to their principles under war conditions, especially in such countries as England, Poland and Czechoslovakia, than their Chief Guide.

Although much younger than her husband, Lady Baden-Powell's birthday fell on the same day as his, and this gave the scouts and guides the world over a unique opportunity of extending their good wishes to both leaders at the same time. Grief at the loss of one leader will be universally felt by both guides and scouts, for with the death of the Chief Scout the collaboration of two notable personalities in a movement which has made a unique monu-

notable personalities in a movement which has made a unique monument in history has come to an end.





PARTLY-VEILED WARNINGS

Ministers of the Crown, with somewhat irritating persistence, continue to refer vaguely to the perils which surround New Zealand at the present time. This is done, presumably, to counter in some degree the more than irritating apathy and complacency with which a large section of the population regards the war danger, but there is no question that these Ministerial statements would be very much more impressive if they were backed by a few specific facts.

That the danger which confronts New Zealand to-day is both real and formidable cannot be doubted by anyone who reads a newspaper, and that danger has obviously come appreciably nearer since Great Britain has been compelled to fight desperately for her own existence. New Zealand, for the time being, can no longer rely comfortably on the British Navy for her defence, and she must do something to organise her own resources.

For this reason the indefatigable Mr Semple has made an appeal for increased support for the Home Guard with a view to raising its strength to 100,000 men. And in making the appeal, Mr Semple refers to an enemy attempt at invasion as a serious possibility. An indication of the urgency of the situation, he says, is provided by the activities of the raiders

There can be no question that the Government is fully aware of the peril of both enemy action and internal treachery, but for various reasons the Government has not found it possible to take the people into its confidence to any marked degree. Exactly the same situation arose in Great Britain in the early days of the war, when the inconveniences and hardships imposed by wartime regulations were criticised and condemned by people who, largely because of official reticence, were completely ignorant of the desperately critical state of affairs. Since then, however, the British Government has relaxed the blackout on information to a considerable extent, and the reaction of the British public has fully justified

A point to be emphasised is that the public do not want information which might be of value to the enemy. Recent events in the Pacific seem to indicate that somewhere in New Zealand or Australia there are too many people who know more than they should about vital shipping movements. But there must obviously be some middle course which would avoid the present situation, in which Ministers repeatedly give voice to semi-veiled indications of the Dominion's danger which are too often disregarded or dismissed as scaremongering.

As long as the present situation continues there will be a considerable section of the population which will persist in regarding the war as a far-off event until bombs fall on their own roofs or haystacks. The ostrich complex has long been firmly rooted in New Zealand for the simple reason that the isolation of the Dominion has been an incentive to insularity in outlook. To-day, when that isolation may prove to be as much a danger as a protection, and when, if Ministerial references are justified, there are a good many subversive influences within these islands, it is difficult to stir people up to a realisation of their peril.

Then there is the widespread popular belief that the enemy Powers and their friends have too much on their hands to worry much about a small and remote part of the British Empire—a pleasant fallacy which will have to be weeded out sooner or later. After all, as Mr Semple has said, one part of the Empire is as much in danger as any other, and New Zealand, as a valuable source of supplies for the British war machine, has not the slightest reason for regarding herself as being remote from the firing-line.

It may be possible that a full-scale invasion of the Dominion is unlikely. No one, except the Government, knows whether this is so. But carefully-planned attacks on the Dominion's ports and efforts to disorganise the country's industrial life with a view to hindering Great Britain and reducing her ability to carry on a world war almost singlehanded, must be regarded as something more than a faraway possibility.

There is no reason for a continuance of the present apathy of New Zealanders, but the Government could combat the attitude which it criticises if it could be a little more explicit in its warnings.

TRAVEL TO KIDNAPPERS

Forty Tons Of Superphosphate Carted Along The Beach

HOLMWOOD CAPTAIN'S REPORT

THREE RAIDERS

Coolness of Crew Praised

How three German raiders flying Japanese colours shelled the Holm-wood after removing the passengers and crew, and the cargo of sheep, has been told by Captain James H. Miller, in a preliminary report received by Captain S. Holm, managing director of the Holm Shipping Company, Ltd., Wellington.

Available details of the report were released to the Christchurch "Press" after a telephone inquiry from officials in Wellington.

from officials in Wellington.

"It is with great regret that I have to report the loss of the s.s. Holmwood on November 25, by enemy action, 27 miles west-southhalf-south from the western reef, Chatham Islands," Captain Miller's letter stated. "I had sailed from Waitangi at 2.30 a.m., being on the bridge myself until the western reef was cleared at 5.10 a.m. At 7.25 a.m. the second mate, Mr Clarke, called me and reported a large steamer overtaking fast, astern on the port quarter.

Went On Bridge

"I immediately went on to the bridge and saw a steamer showing Japanese colours about two miles on the port quarter, with three hoists of flags showing. I altered course and brought the strange vessel astern, and sent orders for all women and children to dress and for the boats to be put in readiness. "I heard what I thought to be a

"I heard what I thought to be a gun fired, and at the same time observed two other vessels closing in, one amidships on either side. The one on the port quarter and the one amidships on the starboard side had us covered with eight-inch guns, and were flashing by Morse signals: 'Ston immediately.' The hoists of flags were made out to read: 'For the benefit of your company you should stop immediately.' COLOURED OFFICERS

Admission To Ranks Of British Army

A NEW HONOUR

Despite the preoccupation of war, Britain has found time to consider some of its more pressing social problems, particularly that of coloured persons of the Empire, and the special London representative of the "Christian Science Monitor" quotes an example: The regulation governing admission to the British Army, stating that no man could be commissioned as an officer unless of "pure European" parentage" has been broken to allow a coloured perservice. missioned as an officer unless of "pure European parentage" has been broken to allow a coloured person to train as an officer.

Mr Arundel M. Moody, son of Dr. Harold A. Moody, president of the League of Coloured Peoples, who early this year was accepted for training as an officer in the British Army, will, it is believed, be the first man of colour ever to be given a commission in this country's armed forces. This does not include India, where there are many native officers in the Indian Army.

Bar Removed

That Mr Arundel Moody has achieved this unprecedented honour is largely due to the work of his father who personally sought the help of the Prime Minister and Mr Malcolm MacDonald, then Colonial Secretary, in having the strict column and race have to army comple-

Secretary, in having the strict colour and race bar to army commissions removed.

Mr Moody is to be an infantry officer. Two other coloured men are to receive commissions in specialist branches of the forces, the medical and dental corps.

But although progress has been manifested in this particular phase, in others it still remains a problem, as for instance in the city of Liver-

as for instance in the city of Liver-

pool.

A report published a short time ago by the University Social Science Department under the auspices of the Association for the Welfare of Coloured People states that the coloured population of Liverpool is due in part to men from, for example, West Africa and India, who, having obtained employment on a ship in West Africa and India, who, having obtained employment on a ship in their native country, land as soon as the ship reaches Liverpool and do not return home. These men, having only a limited amount of skill (probably in one direction and that one not suitable for employment ashore) speak little or no English, so that they find serious difficulty in obtaining employment. Although no one can prevent a coloured man—if a British subject and owning a current British passport—from landing in England and settling down ashore, yet 73 per cent. of these coloured men are out of work; whereas the incidence of unemployment in a corresponding group of white seamen is only 34 per cent. The report states, however, that as a rule, coloured families respect the law, live honestly and cleanly and are prepared to be friendly with the white population if the latter show any inclination to reciprocate. Investigations over a long period by skilled observers indicate that coloured and white families, in similar

skilled observers indicate that col-oured and white families, in similar income, spend almost identical amounts on light, fuel, food and clothing, but coloured people are usually asked to pay a higher rent.
