SECRETS OF SUCCESSFUL JAM MAKING

Rapid Boil Important: Weighing Sugar: Timing The Set: Perfect Seal

What makes jam or jelly set? What is the correct proportion of sugar to use? Why are some jams improved by the addition of lemon juice? How long should we boil the fruit, and why? Should we cover preserves hot or cold, and what is the best method of sealing?

Dry fruit will jelly more easily than wet fruit. Over-ripe fruit is also poor in jellying properties. The amount of sugar needed varies with different fruits. Preserving pans differ in shape, wide-bottomed, shallow pans giving quicker evaporation than deep ones.

The fundamental principle that governs preserve making is the mysterious substance called pectin, which, when combined with sugar and acid, gels into fruit juices. Not all fruits contain sufficient pectin and acid to jelly properly, so it is necessary to combine fruits rich and poor in this essential ingredient.

Fruit rich in pectin are apples, oranges, lemons, gooseberries, currants and certain plums. Fruits poor in pectin are strawberries, raspberries, blackberries, marrow, pears, red rhubarb and cherries. The skins, cores and pits of all fruits are especially rich in this valuable jelly-maker. Pectin is found most abundantly in fruits that are just ripe. When they are over-ripe the pectin turns into a form of sugar called pentose. That is why over-ripe fruit is sweet, juicy and delicious to eat, but unsuitable for jelly making.

Ensuring Keeping Quality If over-ripe fruit is used for jam or jelly, the fruit sugar or pentose, combine with the usual pound for pound weight of sugar of fruit, gives too much sweetness and the result is a syrupy jam incapable of setting well and inclined to crystallise on storing.

The most generally quoted rule is 1 lb. sugar to 1 lb. fruit, but the quantity of sugar depends on the ripeness and amount of pectin in the fruit. Sugar adds to the keeping quality of preserves, but too much tends to kill the real fruit flavour and in no way influences the set of the jam as so many people think. In a sweet fruit like strawberries, which are poor in pectin, 1 lb. sugar to each pound of fruit is sufficient. For tart fruit, such as apples, and most stoned fruits which are rich in pectin, 1 lb. sugar to 1 lb. fruit is best.

The set of a preserve depends largely on the time it is boiled. This varies with different kinds of fruits, with their state of ripeness and on the hardness or otherwise of their skins. Gooseberries and black currants are improved by being boiled first with a little water until their skins are soft and tender. This preliminary boil to soften and break down the fruit should always take place before any sugar is added. The cook's experience is the chief guide in the matter of how long to boil at this stage. Very moist, over-ripe fruit needs longer boiling to evaporate some of the moisture before the sugar is added and this is where a large surfaced preserving pan is a help, as evaporation is quicker than from a small, deep pan. Slow, gentle simmering is advised until the fruit is soft and tender and only sufficient water to keep the fruit from sticking.

Try To Retain Your Natural Charm





plump cheeks. Put it towards the centre a little. See what a difference it makes. Be sure not to yield to the temptation to use heavy eye-shadow or mascara. It's only a success when no one knows it's there. Black mascara would be much too deep, but brown or blue with a little mist-blue shadow, will make those blue eyes look stary.

For powder choose a pale liquid foundation in a delicate pearly flesh tone, with a slightly warmer powder over it. There's a delicious creamy liquid colour, or a thicker cream-like tinted vanishing cream if you prefer it. Peaches and cream or peach are good shades in powder. Don't forget your throat and shoulders when you make-up for a dance. You can match your powder shade with a flesh-tinted liquid powder that will give your skin a petal smoothness, and there's a new old-rose pink nail varnish to tip your fingers.



UNITED STATES ARMS CONTROVERSY

The reluctance of the United States Congress to accord dictatorial powers to the President in the matter of granting unlimited assistance to Great Britain raises a tremendous issue which has a direct bearing on the war from the point of view of the British Empire.

The first conclusion to be drawn from the proposed limitation clauses in the Aid to Britain Bill is that there is still a considerable body of semi-isolationist opinion in the United States which hopes for a continuation of the system by which Great Britain must pay, in one form or another, for the assistance she receives from America.

The suggestion that Britain should give guarantees that the American arms or their equivalent in value, will be returned after the war, is little better. This is not a time for such bargaining. In a life-or-death struggle which can end only in the survival or extermination of those liberties which America professes to maintain, any form of financial huckstering runs uncomfortably close to a betrayal of principles.

But the question is not as simple as this. It must be admitted that the United States is faced with the immediate necessity of making herself as impregnable as circumstances permit. After all, she has no final assurance that the British Empire will emerge victorious from the conflict, and, in taking a realistic and dispassionate view of the present crisis, she must look forward to the possibility of finding herself, at some future time, faced with the problem of defending herself against a totalitarian bloc stretching from Europe across Asia to the Pacific.

For this reason alone, the attitude of those Americans who are alarmed at the prospect of seeing the greater part of their armament production being diverted to Britain is understandable, even though British people must have difficulty in understanding the spirit behind the attempt to turn the Aid to Britain Bill into a bargaining device.

Then again there is the complication introduced by the opposition to any move which would confer unprecedentedly wide powers on the President. The reply to this opposition is the logical argument that in any time of crisis, such as war, the leader of a democratic nation becomes, temporarily, a dictator. The United States is still nominally neutral, but in practice she is already at war. The issues which are being fought out in Europe and Africa concern her as vitally as they concern any of the belligerents, and this fact has been openly stated not only by the President himself, but by his opponent in the recent election. Further, the result of that election indicated that a majority of the American people realised the truth of Mr Roosevelt's belief and roundly supported it.

As far as the immediate prospects of the passing of the Aid to Britain Bill are concerned, it is probable that a compromise will be reached by the acceptance by the Administration of at least some of the proposed modifications. It is hardly likely that the controversy will be permitted to degenerate into a deadlock, but it must be remembered that the President will have the final word. However, any development which might hinder or reduce the flow of American assistance to Great Britain is a matter of dangerous urgency. At a time when the triumphant flood of totalitarian aggression is on the turn, any development which may delay or weaken the blows which the British Empire is dealing so magnificently must have an influence on the great struggle.

Perhaps the most hopeful guide to the outcome of the present hitch in the passage of the Aid to Britain Bill is to be found in farsightedness and prestige of Mr Roosevelt himself. He has emerged from greater battles, and his earlier success in bringing the United States out of the wilderness of frightened isolation gives a great deal of encouragement to optimism.

MOTHER TAUGHT HIM TO BE CAREFUL The Captain Remembered RECEIPT FROM THE NAZIS

Sunken Freighter (Daily Mail Special Service) SYDNEY. Captain H. Henriksen, of the Norwegian freighter Vinni, got a receipt from the Germans for his sunken ship.

"When I was a small boy my mother always taught me to be careful," he told the "Daily Telegraph" on his arrival in Sydney among 23 survivors from ships sunk by German raiders.

"The Germans got us on December 7. We went aboard the Manayo Maru, and later I was taken to the German command. Over a whisky and soda the commander told me he was married to a Swedish girl. "I asked him for a certificate stating he had sunk my ship," the Vinni man replied. "Certainly I shall give you one." The commander wrote it out immediately. I have it in my case. I shall hand it over to my Consul in Sydney."

"WALTZING MATILDA" LIMPS ALONG Schoolboy Performance TRIBUTE TO THE AUTHOR Sundry Calamities

A. B. "Banjo" Paterson, 76-year-old Australian poet, saw a remarkable performance of one of his own works after he had scored at a cricket match between teams of small boys at the Woollahra Sports Ground.

At a party after the match at the home of Mr. W. A. Freeman, of Kent Road, Rose Bay, the boys arranged a performance in costume of "Waltzing Matilda," in gratitude to the poet for having scored for them, said the "Daily Telegraph."

Calamities during the performance were: "First verse: Everybody forgot the words. Second verse: At the words, 'Up came the jumbuk to drink at the billabong,' the boy playing the part of the jumbuk fell on his head. Third verse: At the words, 'Down came the squatter mounted on his thoroughbred,' there was a loud yell from the boy who was the back part of the horse. He howled: 'Get off my neck.'"

Fifth verse: The ghost entered too early, and threw the performance into confusion. "It was very nice of the boys to take so much trouble, and I enjoyed the performance very much," said Mr. Paterson.



Kept Below Mr. Clark said that he did not get the idea that the raider people had inside information. They said that they were surprised to get the Rangitane, which was sunk a few days later and was being shelled.

Children From Holmwod LIFE ON RAIDER "They Enjoyed The Experience" PLAYED WITH SAILORS

CAPTIVES' LIFE ON RAIDER HOLMWOD OFFICER'S DESCRIPTION SUFFICIENT FOOD Cramped Quarters, But Good Treatment

By Telegraph-Press Association AUCKLAND, Jan. 13. The Third Engineer of the Holmwod (Mr. G. R. Clayton), who arrived by the Mariposa to-day, said that 26 officers were kept in a room 15ft. by 10ft. On days when the raiders "made kills" the captives were not allowed on deck.

Allowances Paid To Crew HOLMWOD MEN First N.Z. Shipping Loss

By Telegraph-Press Association AUCKLAND, Jan. 13. Among the most welcome visitors aboard the Mariposa to-day—at least, as far as the members of the crew of the Holmwod were concerned—were representatives of the War Pensions Department, well supplied with money.

Sameness of Food There was sufficient food on the Mariposa, on which he had been prisoner, but it was of one class, consisting mostly of beans and compressed foodstuffs.

Two Days' Shortage There was a shortage of provisions on the Mariposa for the first two days after they landed. Mr. Clayton said, but they were able to get tea with tinned milk in it, which was a great treat. They also had fresh meat and ship's biscuits.

FIFTH COLUMN ACTIVITIES EXAGGERATED, IT IS SAID

Australian Charges Against New Zealand Warmly Denied

(By Telegraph-Press Association) AUCKLAND, Jan. 13. Complaints that reports sent from Australia to New Zealand concerning alleged Fifth Column activity in the Dominion, and others relating to the ill-treatment of captives aboard the German raiders are often exaggerated and sometimes wholly incorrect, were made by several passengers and members of the crew of the Holmwod, one of the raider victims, when they arrived from Sydney aboard the Mariposa.

"I think a lot of the reports issued in Australia were grossly exaggerated," said Mr. G. R. Clayton, third engineer of the Holmwod, referring to the charges that treacherous information from New Zealand had enabled the raiders to capture some of their victims.

Were Getting Information. "Undoubtedly they were getting information from somewhere," Mr. Clayton said, "but that is a very different thing from saying they were getting it from New Zealand. I think that talk was a lot of misguided 'hoovey'."

Children From Holmwod COSTLY UNIFORMS FOR WOMEN CRITICISM GROWING IN AUSTRALIA STORES' MONOPOLY Position Is Different In England

Hawke's Bay Horses At Trentham

Big Team At Wellington Meeting

PROSPECTS REVIEWED Form And Condition Of Local Representatives

(By THE BARB.)

There is no other racing centre which patronises race meetings away from home to the same extent as Hawke's Bay. Meeting after meeting sees big teams from this centre transported, and if other districts treated our local racing fixtures similarly, Hawke's Bay clubs would have little to worry about on general entry night.

This year is no exception. All of the Dominion's best horses congregate at Trentham fixtures, and Hawke's Bay cannot expect to win more than its usual proportion. On paper our chances in the big handicaps do not appear too bright, and the same is applicable to the Wellington Stakes, but in the other events our horses should certainly offer stiff opposition.

Approximately 30 horses have left to participate at the Wellington Racing Club's summer meeting which will commence at Trentham on Thursday, while in a few days' time a dozen will be making arrangements for the annual fixture at Trentham.

Following is a brief review of the form and condition of the Hawke's Bay team competing at Wellington: De Friend heads the list in the Highweight Handicap on the opening day. This Defoe gelding has earned his position in the handicap, but as he has had only one race this year he is not a sure thing. His hurdle engagement at Gisborne in the spring, he may be in need of a race. Thus Mr E. Fitzgerald's nomination may prove a better betting proposition later on at the meeting.

Arabic has contested a dozen races this season with his only placing at Waipukurau on Boxing Day, when he succeeded in the mile track. This Lord Quex chestnut has been racing with verve, little luck. Luck is essential in all branches of sport as C. B. Fry, the English cricket test player, all-round sport and critic once wrote, "To be successful in any sport you must have the element of vulgar luck with and not against you." Now, with the assistance of a stronger rider, Arabic's chances on Thursday are not to be ignored.

A brace of two-year-olds is the Bay's contribution to the Wellington Stakes, the only "classic" of the meeting. Ormond's Burra Sahib (Bulandshar-Provence) has shown a little form with four thirds and one win in six starts—a fair record up to a point, but the point is not towards stakes class. However, when he won at Ellerslie he registered 59.3.5 for five furlongs, which is a slight recommendation and also the fact that he is a gross colt and is sure to have benefited by racing and training.

The Wellington-owned but Ngatawara-trained Varuna (Vermeer-Asarth) has proved something of a quandary since commencing racing last October. At the Hawke's Bay meeting he was runner-up in the Telemeter Handicap, in Mr J. B. Todd's Rakahanga and again last year with Mr G. D. Beatson's Stenchace. Can we complete the "hat trick" on Monday?

Kathella is a high class galloper but it is open to question if he can over middle distance has not taken the edge off her brilliancy. In the ordinary course of events it would, she would not be an exception, but a galloper of her class always is a consideration in a final summing up.

Black Thread is another proved galloper of class. His form was nothing to enthuse over at the recent holiday meeting, but perhaps that was only a temporary lapse. He has won races at all the important meetings in the Dominion, including Ellerslie, Riccarton and Trentham.

Rakahanga, as previously said, won this race two years ago and appears to retain his brilliancy today. She was a winner at the New Zealand Cup meeting and again at Manawatu. This colt's record in game Waipukurau-owned mare left here quite to the satisfaction of her trainer, so that with 7.11 her chances of winning another Telegraph appears decidedly good.

Four from here are down to contest the Anniversary Handicap—Gayest Son, Lambourn, Gay Mimic and Charles Edward. Lambourn should do better than in the classic grade, which he just fell short of. He won at Masterton and a second to Globe Trotter in the Riccarton Handicap. This colt's record, although the writer is of the opinion that he has been handicapped above his form.

Gayest Son separated two high-class horses, Kindergarten and Orello, in the mile Christmas Handicap on the opening day at Auckland. Back to that form, Mr A. F. M. Symes's candidate looks like being as dangerous in the open mile race on Thursday.

Gay Mimic is one of the tough kind, winning in any class of going with all weights from 7st. to 12st. 10lb., and for good measure a hurdle race stands to his credit. Some may consider he is not up to this class, but a genuine counter like Mr F. Telford's white-faced chestnut gelding must never be lightly passed over.

Charles Edward has accepted, but is no certain starter. His form at Awapuni was not up to expectations. It was considered that his gelding accident was still having an effect. Yaseones has been sent down for the second and third days. This mare has started twelve times this season for one win, seven seconds and two thirds. At Trentham in the spring she ran a very close third in two of her last three days. This year again is justified.

Battlegain goes south for the Trial Plate, to be contested for on Saturday. This Gainscourt gelding is the most improved hack in Hawke's Bay to-day. Of late his track work has been impressive so that to rob him of major honours it should take a fairly good "Trialer."

The writer has had a fairly long and close connection with racing at Hawke's Bay and cannot bring to memory a weaker field than that which finished behind Kalka on both days at Hastings at the beginning of the month. Granted she could do more than win but now at Trentham over seven furlongs and ridden by an apprentice her prospects are not very bright. Later on at the meeting her chances will be better in a race like the eleven furlong highweight on Saturday.

No "hack" in this island has raced more consistently this last two months than Laughing Song with two wins and six seconds in a row. Racing has done her no harm whatsoever so it is probable that her consistent record will be added to within the next week at Trentham.

Rakanui has been a boomed horse ever since he commenced racing last autumn. His hollow win at Napier in June saw him go to Wellington in July for the Trial. He was predicted to be a certainty but failure was the result. Then he ran away with a race at Awapuni, a performance he repeated at Napier Park in November. He was taken immediately afterwards to Waikato to finish out of a place and to cost his army of followers a good deal.

His next start was the second day at Hastings recently and he appeared unlucky. That he can gallop is not denied but his few big disappointments, for which excuses were tendered, do not help to add confidence.
