British Official Wireless (Received January 14, 6 p.m.) RUGBY, Jan. 13. Mr Arthur Greenwood, Minister without portfolio in the War Cabinet, in a broadcast speech today dealing with Hitler's recent contemptuous references to living conditions in Britain, said he admitted that there were defects in the British social structure as there were in Germany, but "the fundamental point of difference between us and Hitler is that we have fought our way out of feudalism towards freedom, while he wishes to impose a new feudalism."

A minimum subscription of five shillings a month is the qualification for "adoption," and the details are arranged by the British Prisoners' War Fund, Carrington House, London.

APPLES NO LONGER IMPORTED The British Ban RULING WAS NOT UNEXPECTED Effect On New Zealand

The announcement by the Minister of Food (Lord Woolton) that apples, together with grapes, apricots and bananas, are no longer to be imported into Britain is as great a blow to the fruit trade in Britain, as it is to the New Zealand fruit farmers, said a recent London correspondent. It must be admitted, however, that the ruling was not altogether unexpected. It was only by the New Zealand Marketing Department exerting every endeavour that any shipments of New Zealand apples were made to Britain in 1940.

Tyre Supplies In N.Z. GARAGE STOCKS Widespread Shortage Not Feared CASH PAYMENTS

The view that there was no general shortage of motor tyres was expressed by a leading Hawke's Bay garage proprietor yesterday. He said that his firm had stocks of every size of tyre, and contended that the import restrictions had had little effect on British tyres. Hitherto the tyre distributors had traded on the consignment system, it was said. That is to say, they stocked a retailer and did not require him to pay for the goods until such time as he had sold them to the motorist. Import restrictions had altered that system, and unless the reseller could pay cash for his requirements he might find difficulty in obtaining supplies.

For the third time in his life of 54 years a London man has been branded as an habitual criminal, and for his latest offence he earned at the old Bailey from the Recorder, Sir Gerald Henderson, a new title of "Charming Feudalist" against whom society must be guarded. From his boyhood days this man, Frank Edmund Chard, has lived by his wits when in prison, duping people with his plausible tongue and schemes. His latest crimes were in his meaneast style, according to Detective-Sergeant Butcher of Streatham.

MOTORIST KILLED IN SOUTHLAND Tyre Bursts And Car Falls 160 Feet

A fatal motor accident occurred near Lee Stream, Outram this afternoon. A man named Eric King, Otautau, Southland, being killed. King, who had been staying at Clark Junction Hotel, was driving with the license, Geoffrey Farrell, about two miles on the north-west of Lee Stream when a tyre burst and the car plunged about 160ft. down a bank at the side of the road. Farrell escaped with bruises.

SUNFLOWER OIL'S VALUE EXTRACT FROM THE SEEDS A NEW INDUSTRY Steps Being Taken In Australia

If plans now in hand by the Development and Information Bureau of the New South Wales Department of Labour bear fruit, the once-despised sunflower may bring about the birth of a new industry in Australia. Efforts are being made to induce farmers to plant sunflowers as an aid to restricting the Commonwealth's annual imports of vegetable oils. According to the bureau, there is a ready market for sunflower seeds. One prominent Sydney firm is prepared to purchase 1600 tons of sunflower seeds at £35 a ton. The cost landed on wharves for imported seeds is £34.

RAIN INTERFERES WITH BOWLING Fours Championship Is Interrupted

Malicious False Alarms CONTEMPTIBLE ACTS Two At Hastings Last Night

The Hastings Fire Brigade turned out twice last night to malicious false alarms, the first at 11.10 p.m. from the street box at the corner of Caroline Road and Frederick Street, and the second at 11.50 p.m. from the box in Karamu Road outside Nelson Park. Strong criticism of the persons who perpetrated such "jokes" was voiced by the superintendent (Mr R. Henderson) last night. It cost some, in some cases, like £5 each time, the brigade was turned out, he said, and in addition to the monetary loss the inconvenience to the brigade was serious. Hastings has had a number of false fire alarms recently, and it is to be hoped that this unfair practice can be stopped. The brigade has no choice but to turn out, even though it may be suspected that the call is not genuine.

Electric Power Shortage GROWING DEMAND Rationing Likely This Winter

The demand for electrical power, which for 10 years has climbed steadily, though remarkably, climbs still higher. It may come as a surprise to most people taking electrical supply for granted, power in the North Island is short, and rationing, which was a possibility last winter, is more than a probability during the winter of 1941. Anticipating a power shortage, the Hawke's Bay Electric Power Board took several steps in economy. The board introduced a unit rate for an alternative to the flat rate for hot water systems, and the new system has been adopted by the majority of users in the board's district. While they were on the flat rate consumers were little concerned if their hot-water systems used power needlessly, but paying one-third of a penny a unit has meant that consumers turn off the power when it is not needed. Emergency Stations All auxiliary power stations, among them the Hawke's Bay Board's station at Eastwood Street, Hastings, were brought into use last winter, and at present it appears inevitable that the same will occur again this year. Although not many people are aware of the fact, should Hastings be deprived of electric power from outside sources in an emergency, the power station would maintain essential services. With a generating capacity of 900 kilowatts, lighting and power for certain industries could be supplied with a careful planned schedule of rationing by the station. £30 A YEAR FOR SOLDIERS Limit To Money From Home
