Greeks Charge With **Fixed Bayonets**

ATHENS, Feb. 8. Heavy losses were inflicted on the Italians when Blackshirts attempted to counter-attack on the central front and suffered one of the most complete defeats so far, leaving the pattlefield strewn with dead and

wounded.

The counter attack sought to break through the Greeks closing in on a certain point in a mountain pass near Klisura. The Greeks stopped the Blackshirts even before they had time to deploy for the engagement and the counter-attack was smashed after a short fight.

Then the Greeks fixed bayonets and charged the Blackshirts as they fled in great disorder down the steep mountain passes and through narrow gorges.

Speedy Advance Beyond ITALIANS FLEE IN Bewildering Series Of Surprises Leave

(British Official Wireless.) (Received February 9, 10.15 p.m.)

The skill with which General Sir Archibald Wavell has been able to make use of the weapon of surprise throughout the Libyan campaign is commented upon by military experts here. They recall Marshal Graziani's original dispatch in which he said that when the Army of the Nile made its first attack there had been no element of surprise, as everybody forsaw its probability. Yet at the first blow the Italians in Nibeieva, the outpost of Sidi Barrani, were taken completely by surprise at the unexpected appearance of the British forces.

The next move was at Bardia, where there was no chance of a similar surprise, as the Italians knew they were surrounded and there obviously was going to be an assault. Here the surprise was when, after the usual artillery prepara-

British forces moved.

An interesting comparison is to be found in the figures of similar campaigns. The Germans advancing through country well roaded and full of food and petrol took 24 days for nearly 200 miles from Sedan to Dunkirk, averaging nine miles a day. General Allenby in 1918, advanced 340 miles from Nablus to Aleppo in 38 days—again about nine miles a day. General Wavell has advanced 450 miles in 57 days on his own petrol and with no water. He also had a "hold up" of five battles on the way. His average also was about nine miles a day.

The Coup de Grace.

Messages from Cairo emphasise how General Sir Archibald Wavell's strategy in sending the Australians along the coast road while armoured units forked south from Tobruk to Mekili applied the coup de grace to Cyrenaica. The Italian resistance at Mekili was overcome after two days. The armoured units then, without using the radio in order not to reveal their po-

The enemy armoured forces, which were numerically superior and supported by infantry and artillery, then made a determined effort to break through our cordon. Every effort was repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy.

After sixty of their tanks had become battle casualties the enemy cased fighting and prisoners surrendered in large numbers. They included the Army Commander, corps commanders and many other senior officers. Quantities of war material of all descriptions were also captured.

It was later announced from Cairo that the Army Commander captured was the officer commanding the whole of Cyrenaica, General Berganzoli, who is second to Marshal Graziani.

The news from Benghazi is still scanty. It is not yet known how many remain of the two Italian divisions recently encamped around the town, but the British uniforms to-day seen in the palm-lined Avenue Benghazi provide the inhabitants with evidence of the defeat of the Italian forces.

Helping the Army.

"Impressive as are the records of the fighters and bombers, an outstanding feature has been the work of the Army Co-operations, which dally make low and hazardous reconnaissances and photographic flights over enemy territory. The numerous duties of the Army Co-operation Squadrons include bombing and fighting. Mr Landon advocated gifts totalling billions of dollars to assist Britain's war effort. He however, insisted that the United States' primary need now was "deliberation in Congress and speed in the factories."

He stressed that the November elections gave President Roosevelt no mandate to grant Britain unlimited aid nor unlimited powers to the Presidency.

As a young woman, Miss Card, who was the eldest of a well-known Melbourne jeweller's family of ten, established and ran Astolat, a girls' school in Hawthorn, until deafness compelled her to give up teaching.

Hobby Became A Living Crochet was her hobby and, while living in Ireland for some years, she had acquired a knowledge of Irish crochet. Struck by the lack of de-signs for Irish crochet, she originat-

crochet patterns to be worked from a chart method of her own inven-tion, instead of the usual written di-The first one published on a large scale in Melbourne was a rose and pigeon design, which sold in tens of thousands. There is still a demand

In 1917 Miss Card went to the United States, where some of her charts were immediately published by the "Ladies' Home Journal." A little later she went to London and set up a studio. Except for periodi-cal trips back to Australia she lived

and worked in England until early this year, when she returned to Vic-toria in bad health. Overseas some of her designs were sold to purchasers for several hundred pounds each. 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

SECOND OVERSEAS BALLOT

The announcement by the Minister of National Service (the Hon. R. Semple) that no fewer than 19,000 names are to be drawn in the second ballot for overseas service will come as a marked surprise to the people of the Dominion. The first overseas ballot on December 4 accounted for 14,000 men, and the new "dip" on March 4, when added to the total number of men undergoing training, waiting to enter camp, or already overseas will affect a very considerable proportion of New Zealand's manpower. Further, the men who have been drawn for Territorial service but who missed the first overseas ballot, must be taken into consideration.

The only conclusion to be drawn from this morning's announcement is that within the next few months the industrial life of the Dominion will be faced with the problem of making wholesale adjustments to meet the situation brought about by the drastic withdrawal of so many thousands of men from productive work in every department of national activity.

There must be many people in New Zealand who would welcome a statement by the Government on its policy with regard to the transfer of men from civil life to military duty. The Minister says that "the men concerned and their employers will have sufficient time to make any necessary domestic or business arrangements," but it is obvious enough that in modern industry the replacement of key men or of valuable technical workers cannot always be made a matter of weeks or even of months, and a comprehensive statement on the rate at which men will be withdrawn from civil life would at least permit long-distance planning for vital reorganisation.

It may be argued that the position in New Zealand is a great deal better than it is in Great Britain, where men are called up in age groups irrespective of whether they are married or single, but in spite of this fact it is doubtful whether British industry has been seriously disorganised on this score because the British schedule of reserved occupations appears to be considerably more flexible than that in operation in the Dominion.

There is no question of the willingness of the New Zealand public to carry any wartime burdens that the Government may be compelled to impose on them, and for this reason there does not seem to be any logical argument against an official long-range review of the manpower problem. In the case of the unexpected announcement of the second overseas ballot, there are a good many people who will feel that they have a legitimate grievance.

DRAMA IN LIBYA

The swift British advance beyond Benghazi, the fall of which was reported on Saturday morning, is an indication that General Wavell has no intention of permitting the disorganised Italian forces to make any attempt to block the triumphant advance of the Imperial Army through Libya.

General Wavell's strategy has brilliantly exploited the weaknesses of the Italian national character, and the irregular alternation of swift, unexpected blows and disconcerting pauses which are timed to play on the nerves of the defending troops have plainly had the result of demoralising the entire Italian army in Libya.

At the present time it is probable that General Wavell is taking advantage of the short period before the blistering African summer closes in on Libya, while preventing any large proportion of the defeated force in Cyrenaica from reaching Tripolitania, the western portion of the Italian colony. But it is becoming extremely doubtful whether the Italians are capable of making any effective stand in Libya unless some unexpected development elsewhere relieves the

Apart from the brilliance of its strategic conception, one of the most interesting features of the campaign in Africa is the effective employment by the British Army of the tactics of mechanised warfare which carried the Germans through Poland and France. The victories in Africa give grounds for future optimism when the time for the final conflict with the nerve centre of the Axis arrives.

GROWTH OF DOMINION INDUSTRY

MINISTER'S REVIEW

Full Extent Cannot Be Revealed

WELLINGTON, Feb. 8.
The production of munitions has now become an important part in New Zealand's war effort, and the extent of this enterprise is outlined by the Minister of Munitions and Supply (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan).

"The full extent of the nation's achievement in the manufacture of machinery of war can never be

achlevement in the manufacture of machinery of war can never be fully revealed during the war, and there can be no exchange by the combatants of such valuable information while the struggle rages," said the Minister.

"A number of engineering firms are now engaged in the production of war material of varying descriptions. Some of these are producing component parts as, for instance, in the case of hand grenades. These parts are being delivered to a central point for final assembly and filling with explosives.

"Several hundred thousand warmunition units are now in productions."

munition units are now in production, and some of these have already beeen completed.

Preparatory Work Completed. "The preparatory Work Completed.
"The preparatory work in connection with the manufacture of high-explosive and smoke bombs for the three-inch mortars has been completed and orders placed with 18 firms throughout the Dominion to enable the machining of these bomb body-casings to be carried out. To meet delivery requirements suitable groups have been set up, necessitating the hiring from private owners of lathes not in full use and installing them at central points.

"Eight groups have been estab-lished ready for the maximum out-put when castings become avail-

"To increase the production of small-arms ammunition, the Government has decided to duplicate the existing factory operated by the Colonial Ammunition Co., at Auckland. New buildings are well advanced, and will be completed next month, when the machinery will be available for installation. When this new Government factory is in full production, the present rate of .303 ammunition will be doubled, thus fulfilling the small-arms ammunition requirements of the New Zealand armed forces.

Experimental Tank. "An experimental heavy tank adapted to a caterpillar tractor has been completed by the Public Works Department and has been tested and approved by the army authorities

"The immediate requirements of the Navy are being met by the construction of minesweepers at Auckland, engines from obsolete ships being used to meet the needs of the service at the earliest possible moment, and designs will be adopted which will enable these boats to be used as trawlers at any future date. The large increase in shipbuilding throughout the world has also made it necessary to build additional mine-sweeping trawlers of an improved type, and this work will be proceeded with immediately drawings are available."

COAL SHORTAGE DUE TO DIVERSION OF SHIPPING

South Island Mines Are Able To Meet Northern **Demands**

(By Telegraph—Press Association) CHRISTCHURCH, Feb. 9.

If shipping transport from the West Coast to the North Island could be made available, the enormously increased demand for coal for industrial and electricity expansion would be met. Confidence that, with the co-operation of the industry, full supplies would be available was expressed in an interview by the Minister of Mines (the Hon. P. C. Webb).

"The situation, especially in view of the need for steaming coal for generating electricity to meet the requirements of power boards in the North Island, is undoubtedly serious," Mr Webb said. "This has been because of the rapid brought about because of the rapid expansion of the demand for elecrricity for industry, exceeding the record production of coal.
"We require at least 150,000 tons to supply industry, and on top of that comes the demand from the power boards for an additional 150,000 tons for Auckland alone. "That one order would represent the output of two ordinary-sized mines."

Review of Figures

While it was not possible at this stage to give the exact figures of coal production for 1940, as returns from all the collieries had not been received, the data to hand showed received, the data to hand showed that the output exceeded 2,500,000 tons, Mr Webb said. There was every indication that when the final returns were compiled a new record in coal production would be set, the previous record being 2,542,092 tons in 1930, just after the Australian strike.

Production Years Compared It was interesting to compare the roduction for each employee in the ecord year of 1930 and in 1939.
In 1930 the output of a miner work-

ing underground was 574 tons, or 87 tons below that in 1939. Similarly production a man on the payroll in .930 was 433 tons, or 59 tons fewer than in 1939. "These figures refute the unfair statements levelled against the miners," the Minister said. "I am of the opinion that the miners of this

country have never put greater zeal nto their work to meet national re-

Imports and Exports The Cu-toms returns showed that coal imported in 1940 was 64,856 ons, or 46,414 tons below that in 1939. On the other hand exports were 37,297 tons higher at 81,287 tors. Balancing imports and exports, there was 8711 tons less bituminous coal than in 1939. 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
