Japan Criticises Troop Movements

"EXCESSIVELY NERVOUS"

Australians Arrive At Singapore

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received February 20, 11.30 p.m.) TOKYO, Feb. 19.

A Government spokesman characterised the Australians' landing at Singapore as "another British demonstration" designed to create the impression that the Far East situation is very critical, and said that the British were needlessly and excessively nervous, whereas the situation actually, as Baron Ishii pointed out on Tuesday, does not warrant alarm.

While the British were free to move troops anywhere in their own territory, in the event of an attempt to menace Japan, then the latter's attitude will be firm.

"Japan has done nothing to deserve warnings from any Power. Our policies, including the southward region, are entirely peaceful."

A Shanghai message says that a Japanese spokesman declared that Britain's moves in Singapore were part of a British-American plan to strangle Japan, which will be countered with appropriate measures. The spokesman did not amplify the statement beyond hinting that Japan intended to speed up Thailand mediation.

SOLID BLOC AGAINST GERMAN AGGRESSION

Balkan Pact Was Probably Influenced By Britain, Greece And Russia

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received February 21, 1 a.m.)

LONDON, Feb. 20. Explaining events leading to the Turkish-Bulgarian declaration, the Ankara Radio last night declared that the Turkish Foreign Office, facing up to the misunderstanding arising from the presence of troops on the Turkish frontiers. had approached Bulgaria and explained that Turkey's military measures were in no way directed against her, but the fact that the war was getting nearer necessitated such steps.

The announcer emphasised that both countries not only agreed to abstain from war between them, but from aggression against any nation.

At Ankara Deputy Saddak, generally considered a semi-official spokesman, stated in an article in the "Aksham": "Turkey's policy is tightly linked with Britain's by al liance which is unchanged and is not being changed.

"The joint Turkish-Bulgarian de claration is the outcome of Turkey's untiring and courageous peace efforts, and conforms to the spirit of the British-Turkish alliance. By the terms of the declaration Bulgaria has not only pledged herself to Turkey but also to Greece.



THREAT OF GAS WARFARE

There can be no doubt that if Germany ultimately brings herself to attack Great Britain directly from the English Channel, the North Sea, or the Atlantic, every possible form of weapon will be employed, including gas.

As yet, Hitler has not seen fit to embark on gas warfare in the present conflict, presumably for fear of reprisals on Germany, but gas attacks were expected in Britain as soon as war broke out. In the last months of 1939 and early in 1940 virtually every civilian carried a gasmask, and in many places theatres and cinemas refused admission to persons who did not have their masks with them. But as time went on, and the German air attacks continued to be confined to the east coast ports and Channel shipping, gasmasks in the streets became noticeably fewer, and it was not until the Germans embarked on their full-scale war against civilian populations that the threat of gas again became imminent.

To-day the prediction in a New York newspaper, based on a report from Lisbon, that it is the intention of Germany to employ poison gas as an invasion weapon is not only credible but it may be regarded as almost a certainty. Unless Hitler can reduce Great Britain to submission within a reasonably short time he has lost the war and will be compelled to abandon every hope of the world-wide extensions of the Nazi tyranny known as the New Order. Further, his career to date leaves no reason for believing that he would scruple to use gas if he thought that it would deal to Britain that swift knock-out blow which has long been the basis of Nazi strategy. A leader who has not hesitated to approve the machine-gunning of refugees in France and of shoppers in London suburban streets as necessary war measures is hardly likely to be disturbed by the thought of employing gas against the cities and villages of England.

Prior to the present war there is no record of gas having been turned deliberately upon defenceless civilian populations. Gas attacks were first used by the Germans in April, 1915, and the element of surprise gave this horrible device a certain effectiveness. But within a few weeks the Allies were in a position to make reprisals in such a form that the Germans never again attained to superiority in this branch of warfare.

It has to be remembered, however, that in the last war an undertaking not to use gas was observed honourably by both the Allied and enemy air forces. To-day there can be little question that if Germany uses gas at all in her attempt to conquer the British Isles her method will be to use it from the air. In view of the state of British preparedness, such a move would not imply disaster but would be merely another element of horror in an unprecedentedly ruthless campaign.

If a gas offensive is launched against Great Britain, there will be immediate reprisals against Germany. No nation fighting for its existence could afford to allow an enemy the exclusive use of such a weapon. And it may be anticipated that during recent years, as in the period following the first German attacks in 1915, British scientists have prepared an adequate means of retaliation against any form of frightfulness which Nazi Germany may adopt.

RUMOUR AND DEDUCTION

The recent agreement signed by Bulgaria and Turkey has been followed by a world-wide crop of more or less unsubstantiated deductions which have done nothing to clarify the situation, but as yet there is no reason to question the Turkish affirmation that the pact was the logical result of the Turkish endeavour to stabilise the situation in the Balkans and to erect some sort of barrier against a drive by the Germans towards the Aegean.

Probably the pact is of little importance in itself in view of the fact that German infiltration from Rumania into Bulgaria is apparently well advanced. From the Allied point of view the situation will become

serious only when it becomes plain that Germany is planning an attack on Greece by means of a move towards Salonika,

MEDICAL BENEFITS TO BE MADE AVAILABLE BY MARCH Censors' Powers SIR CYRIL NEWALL WILL

DUTIES OF DOCTORS WHO WORK UNDER SCHEME

Regulation With Which Patients Are Expected To Comply

(By Telegraph—Press Association) WELLINGTON, Feb. 20.

The Social Security Medical Benefits Regulations, 1941, were gazetted to-night and will come into force to-day. The regulations generally set out the scope of the medical benefits to be provided—that is, the medical services which can be provided by the ordinary general practitioner. They do not include the maternity benefits, which are already provided for; the administration of anaesthetics, for which a separate fee may be charged, or specialist services.

These specialist services are defined as those which involve the application of special skill and experience of a degree or kind that general medical practitioners as a class cannot reasonably be expected to possess.

Before a general practitioner who claims to be a specialist in certain branches of medicine may charge his patient for the services which he renders he must first inform his patient that he proposes to charge for those services and, secondly, he must obtain the patient's consent. Further, he cannot claim any specialist fee unless he complies with at least one of three conditions:—

The value of the practitioner who is made here for a simpler method of transfer of patients from the list of the practitioner who is attending them to that of a doctor who returns to his practice.

They also provide that where any person is entitled to receive medical benefits desires to make a complaint about the service rendered by the practitioner of his choice the complaint must be made in writing to the Medical Officer of Health, who

(1) That he has held hospital or other appointments affording special opportunities for acquiring the special skill and experience of the kind required for the performance of the specialist services in question and that he has had actual recent experience in the performance of service of a similar kind.

(2) That he has had special academic or post graduate study of the subject that comprises the specialist services rendered and that he has had actual recent experience in the performing of services of a similar kind, or

(3) That he is generally recognised by other practitioners who have direct personal knowledge of his work as having special proficiency and experience in the subject or subjects that comprise the specialist services rendered by him.

Application Card
A patient who desires to take advantage of the services must first procure an application card, which he will complete and take to the doctor of his choice. If the doctor is willing he will countersign the card and be responsible for sending it to the local Medical Officer of Health. The signing of the card by the practitioner constitutes an agreement by him to attend and care for the patient and to be responsible for the free treatment of that patient from that date.

In the case of children a separate card is to be filled in for each child. On the special children's card the patient is required to notify the Medical Officer of Health of any change of address and, if he fails to do so, may be charged such an amount as has been wrongly paid to a doctor on whose list his name appeared.

Practitioners who are prepared to work under the scheme are required to provide and maintain a suitable surgery and waiting room accommodation; to be in attendance for consultation and treatment of patients at his surgery or elsewhere at regular times; to visit any patient lents at his surgery or elsewhere at regular times; to visit any patient whose condition of health is such that it is impossible or inexpedient for him to visit the practitioner's surgery; to visit any of his patients in hospital where the rules of the hospital permit and where the patient requires the service which the general practitioner is capable of affording; to prescribe such drugs and appliances as may be required for the treatment of any patient; to issue free of charge medical certificates or recommendations required for the purposes of the Social Security Act; to keep clinical records of the history of his patients and his treatment of them; to answer all reasonable inquiries made by the Medical Officer of Health with regard to any prescriptions, certificates or recommendations which he has issued.

Provision is also made that the doctor shall supply the patient in case of emergency with such drugs as may be required and in this connection he is entitled to claim the cost from the patient until the pharmaceutical benefits have been provided, in which case he will be paid from the Social Security fund.

The regulations detail the provisions which have to be made where a practitioner who has agreed to accept patients under the scheme employs an assistant or engages a partner. Generally, the obligation is upon the practitioner to give personally such benefits as he has undertaken to do "except where he is prevented from doing so by urgency or other professional duties, temporary absence from home or other reasonable cause."

The medical practitioner is also obliged to make all the necessary

The medical practitioner is also obliged to make all the necessary arrangements for securing the proper treatment of his patients in cases where he is unable to give treatment personally. If he has any standing arrangement in this matter he is required to notify the Medical Officer of Health.

Doctors In Partnership

A doctor agreeing to care for a patient and who engages any deputy or assistant is responsible for compliance by that deputy with the requirements of the regulations. Where two or more medical practitioners are in partnership treatment may at any time be given by one or other of the partners to any patient on the list of the practitioner in person if reasonable steps are taken to secure continuity of treatment. ness—an aim which has been endorsed in no uncertain manner by the people of the Dominion. "May I at this stage make an appeal to the public to co-operate with the profession in every possible way. A doctor's instructions should be carefully carried out; unreasonable demands should not be made upon desires to terminate all his agree-ments under the act. In the latter case he must give three months' notice of his intention to do so.

"Except in cases of serious emergency he should not be summoned at night and when a visit is required at home he should, if possible, be called early in the day. Observance of these simple provisions will ensure that doctors' skill and experience are economically utilised.

Doctors Will Benefit

"While the scheme will have many advantages to the sick it will also be of great benefit to the profession. The payment which has been decided upon by the Government will be recognised, I think, as not merely adequate but as generous. It is, of course, impossible to assess the value of the service which doctors render to the community in terms of cash, but it is quite certain that under the scheme the profession as a whole will not suffer financial loss. The scheme will free members of the profession from the worry of collecting bad debts, from the embarrassment of sending accounts to patients whom they know in many cases can ill afford to pay, and from the difficulty of deciding how much in any particular case it is fair to charge a patient.

"I am confident that when the doctors operate the scheme fully they will appreciate the immense advantages of the system over that which has prevailed in the past.

"Incidentally, I may mention that doctors who are working under the maternity provisions of the Act, whatever their original attitude to the scheme, are now enthusiastic in their praise of ft and I venture to hope that the same experience will occur in connection with this new section of the Act.

"It should be noted that while the regulations apply to most people in New Zealand, there are certain isolated areas where provision has been made in the Act for the Minister to make special arrangements. Capitation Fees

With the prior consent of the medical practitioner, the Minister may at any time publish a list or lists of names of medical practitioners who have entered into agreements under the regulations. Every medical practitioner who agrees to provide medical benefits in accordance with the regulations is entitled to receive from the Social Security fund for every person on his patients list a capitation fee of 15/-per annum. This applies to every person on his list, including children. RIGHTS USURPED

"Another year of war has passed since I last addressed you and in that time the serious dangers besetting the Empire have been more fully realised and our hearts go out to the people of Great Britain in admiration of the courage and fortitude with which they are bearing their trials and sufferings and the grim determination with which they are putting forth the whole of their strength to achieve a successful result," said Sir Henry Horton, chairman of the New Zealand section of the Empire Press Union, in his annual address.

Sir Henry added that newspapers

Sir Henry added that newspapers still had a duty to perform in urging that New Zealand's efforts should be still greater and should in no way lag behind those of the United Kingdom.

The war had struck the Empire newspapers very heavily, especially in the matter of newsprint supplies, he said. In Britain, in addition to this difficulty, many newspaper plants had been more or less destroyed by bombing.

Wartime Censorship "It must be recognised that in British countries there is fortunately no opportunity in peace time for practical experience of the duties imposed on censors in wartime," said Sir Henry in reference to the censorships. "The censorship is consequently experimental and mistakes and inconsistencies are certain to occur.

tain to occur.

"Because of their inexperience the officials should be readily responsive to suggestions for improving the administration of the rules. WIDE POWERS TAKEN BY GOVERNMENT

THE BLACK-OUT

By Telegraph-Press Association WELLINGTON, Feb. 20.

Comprehensive regulations for the adequate control of lighting throughout the Dominion, announced on Saturday by the Rt. Hon. P. Fraser were Gazetted to-night.

As indicated by him, they provide for the appointment of a Dominion Lighting Controller, and outline his powers, which include the preventing, prohibiting, controlling or regulating of the display of lights or reducing power of lights or extinguishing, disconnecting, dismanting, removing, shading, obscuring or otherwise dealing with lights.

Arrest Without Warrant

The Minister or Controller may appoint wardens and may also grant exemptions from the regulations. Constables are authorised to arrest without warrant anyone wilfully contravening or falling to comply with the regulatinos, and may search and detain for search anyone suspected of committing of-

anyone suspected of committing offences against the regulations.

Penalty clauses for offences against the regulations include imprisonment up to three months or fines not exceeding £50 in the cases of individuals, with a fine not exceeding £10 for every day during which the offence continues. In the cases of corporate bodies fines not to exceed £200 may be imposed.
