On Axis War Policy WARNING TO BRITAIN Grim Story Of Suffering When Held By German Sea Raider

MOGADISCIO, March 3. Seamen released by the British advance told a grim story

of suffering after a German raider in the Indian Ocean sank their ships and took them, four women and two children aboard. The raiders later seized a Yugoslav vessel and transferred the captives to it in October. They were landed on the Italian-Somaliland coast on November 23.

A Scottish seaman who, like his companions, was dirty, underfed and clothed in rags, said that the total transferred to the Yugoslav ship were 197 British subjects and 20 other Europeans, mostly French, three Chinese, 67 Indians. Thirtyseven Yugoslav members of the crew were also taken prisoner.

"We were under the guards' machine-guns for a month," he said.
"We slept in the hold on the cargo, which was wet and salt, with a tarpaulin as the only covering. We suffered much from hunger and were so thirsty that we tried to

The United Kingdom will need to use every ounce of available exports in building up its dollar credits in the United States.

The vanguard of the German army in Bulgaria is reported to have reached the Greek frontier at four points. Two trainloads of infantrymen are reported to have left Ploydiv for the Turkish frontier early to-day.

Small German detachments have taken up their quarters at the towns of Svilengrad and Slatograd, near Daridere, and Melnik and Trigad, which are a few miles from the Greek frontier.

A steady stream of Army cars traversed Sofia all night. German headquarters are at Chamkuria, 43 miles east of Sofia and 70 miles from the Greek frontier. Troop trains continue to roll towards Plovdiv. Anti-aircraft batteries are

placed at railway stations, bridges and tunnels throughout Many residents of Sofia are leaving.

With hundreds of fighters and bombers displaying the "crooked cross" in terrorisation patrols over Sofia and other big centres of population, German troops poured into Bulgaria all day on Sunday at three points—Russe (Ruschuk), Lom, and Vidin—over pontoon bridges strung across the Danube. Those entering Russe are reported to be taking the route through Tirnovo and Plovdiv, avoiding the Maritza Valley, which touches the Turkish frontier.

The Sofia correspondent of the British United Press says the Germans are keeping as far as possible from Turkish territory with the specific object of not antagonising Turkey.

"Blood Bank" In Sydney

EMERGENCY CASES

(Daily Mail Special Service)
SYDNEY. To provide an adequate supply of

To provide an adequate supply of clood for transfusions in case of emergency, a blood bank—one of the largest in Australia—is to be installed at Sydney Hospital.

Prospective donors are being "typed," and when the special equipment for the storage of the blood is completed, the hank will be opened. ompleted the bank will be opened. The Medical Superintendent of ydney Hospital (Dr Banks) told the

Sydney Hospital (Dr Banks) told the "Sun" that the installation of a bank was only practicable in a large hospital where there was a regular call for transfusions.

At Sydney Hospital the call on donors for transfusions has steadily increased, and, in order to maintain an adequate supply, as well as to minimise the delay in carrying out transfusions, it has been decided to start the bank.

Furthermore, said Dr. Banks, in the event of an emergency, unless such banks were established, lives might be lost through delays in obtaining suitable types and adequate supplies of blood.

Givers Wanted

Any person willing to contribute to the bank will be welcomed by the hospital. The operation is quite simple, painless and absolutely without any danger to the donor.

The system of storage to be installed is the most modern, and is being adopted by leading hospitals throughout the world. The blood is stored in containers, packed in ice and then kept in a refrigerator at a constant low temperature.

The blood is kept for not more than ten days, after which the cor-

than ten days, after which the cor-puscles are separated and the plasma, or remaining, clear liquid, is stored. This plasma can be kept in-definitely and is widely used for arious treatments.

Check On Types

In carrying out a transfusion every care must be taken to see that the blood transferred is of a type comparable with the blood of the

patient.
To assure this the donor's blood is "typed" and its classification group determined. Tests have shown that 43 per cent of the population are "universal donors" (their blood is suitable for transfusion to anyone). Only 7 per

ent in group are universal recipi-

TO EQUIP YOUR KITCHEN

The Problem Of The Small Flat

Entertaining in a small flat has difficulties which are obvious, so obvious that many people give up the unequal struggle and invite their friends to luncheon or dinner at a restaurant. Yet it is possible to develop a certain technique of special planning by which most of these obstacles may be overcome.

Size of the Kitchen

Let us try in this article to deal with the chief problem, which is usually the size of the kitchen. Over and over again one sees kitchenettes in modern flats, complete with refrigerator, with scarcely room to turn round in, not a corner where food can be kept, except in the refrigerator, and an enamelled-top table to work on, or a wooden flap with flimsy supports. When once the cooker is alight, everything is enveloped in steam, and if the window is opened out goes the gas; if the door, the smell of cooking pervades the entire establishment, and tempers rise accordingly. If we add to this that the amateur, or simple cook, has sadly inadequate weapons, it does not surprise us if the results are lamentable.

A Good Work Table

The first essential in any kitchen is something solid to work upon, a small wooden table, with a top 1½in. thick. Get it made if necessary, or if space does not allow, then use the flap variety, but equally thick, and with adequate supports, so that it may stand absolutely steady. Then you may chop or carve to your heart's content without feeling that the world is slipping away from you. An electric fan, suitably placed, is the best way of controlling the heat.

Two chopping boards, good and solid, are needed. These can stand under the table when not in use.

A marble slab fitted to the top of the refrigerator is a godsend, for it is cool for pastry making. The refrigerator must be of a proper height, of course.

Shallow cupboards up to the ceiling will store your excess china, and a pair of midget steps should be tucked away somewhere.

One or two first-class knives, a large chef's knife, a medium and atiny "office" knife are better than all the gadgets and far less wasteful.

A STRANGE OUTBURST

An organisation calling itself the Reciprocal Trade Federation of the United Kingdom has evidently decided that the time is opportune for a scarifying attack on New Zealand, particularly with reference to the Dairy Export trade.

According to South Island newspapers, the Federation has addressed a letter to local authorities in the course of which they are told that so far as New Zealand butter is moa," and that after the war, "every butter-producing country will be faced, if not well nigh annihilated, by margarine which, whether you in New Zealand like it or not, is as good as most New Zealand butter, and will after the war be much cheaper." The cause of this incoherent and ungrammatical outburst is rather obscure, but it looks as if some disgruntled exporter is using the Federation to air a personal grievance. He tells us that "New Zealand is doing everything it can to make post war conditions harder. Licensing conditions, prohibitions and whatnots hurt this country. You are ostracising deliberately the sympathies of millions of workers who before the war made the goods you wanted and still want and

As a parting shot the writer of all this nonsense and misrepresentation says: "New Zealand can't go on building up sterling exchange at Britain's expense, nor can you expect us to believe your products are the best in the world, when anyone interested-and certain interests here even made disinterested persons interested—can learn that certain parts of the machinery making your products are of inferior quality." The last clumsy sentence, perhaps, gives the show away. Some dairy factory must have committed the crime of using locally made machinery and a disappointed exporter who has failed to make a sale is using the propaganda department of the Reciprocal Trade Federation to express his anger

and to predict the doom of the New Zealand dairy industry! In the circumstances it may be worth while to point out that so far from New Zealand being desirous (as alleged by the Federation) of "protecting our economic structure at the expense of British industry," New Zealand is the largest purchaser per caput in the Empire of British goods. It has been such a lavish buyer in the past that it has gone into debt to the extent of about £160,000,000, and the interest on this vast sum is a first charge on the proceeds of the sale of our exports to Great Britain.

When Mr Nash went to England in 1936 to arrange for the repayment or the renewal of a loan that was falling due, he made an offer to Great Britain to buy British goods with the entire proceeds of the sale of our products in Britain after provision had been made to meet our obligations to British bondholders. What more does the Reciprocal Trade Federation expect? The licensing and control of imports into New Zealand does not diminish the amount available for the purchase of British goods; it merely vests with the Government the responsibility of saying how the money shall be spent. Interest obligations and maintenance of our troops abroad must necessarily come first, and this means that we must do without a great many things we would like to be able to

A similar policy has been adopted by Great Britain herself and by other Dominions. Economists are unanimous about the necessity of doing without luxury goods and of confining domestic expenditure as far as possible to the necessities of life. Any income in excess of the amount required for legitimate living expenses should either he lent to the Government for war purposes or saved against the period

when capital will be required for post war reconstruction. So far as the future of the dairy industry is concerned, it is unnecessary for the Reciprocal Trade Federation to tell us that there are post war difficulties in store. The competition of margarine is no new thing. If the people prefer a synthetic butter compounded from whale oil, dripping and vegetable fats to the best butter the Empire can produce, then New Zealand will have still less to spend on British goods, and that will be as bad for the British exporter as for us. Without being accused of excessive optimism one can look forward to a day when Europe will turn from guns to butter and Great Britain will continue to provide a satisfactory market for the products of New Zealand dairy farms,

COASTAL PATROL of volunteers

AMATEUR YACHTSMEN ON GUARD

THEIR OWN IDEA

Efficient Work Is Carried Out

"Daily Mail" Special Service. SYDNEY.

A small band of Sydney yachtsmen who foresaw the need of such a body in the event of war started

a body in the event of war started the Volunteer Coastal Patrol just three years ago.

To-day the patrol has blossomed into a highly efficient, hard-working organisation, about which very little is heard, but the importance and value of which cannot be over-esti-

mated.

No fewer than 40 ships form the fleet, and more than 300 men are engaged in carrying out the work of

the patrol.

The patrol was formed with the object of training men in the handling of small motor vessels, in seamanship, coastal navigation, signalling, first-aid and the use of firearms, so that in a national emergency they could form, at least, the nucleus of a unit to man small craft for coastal and harbour patrol work. During the last war a similar During the last war a similar organisation was started among motor yachtsmen in the British Isles. It was soon taken over by the Royal Navy, and performed invaluable work as a small-ship auxiliary, patrolling estuaries, rivers, and close inshore areas of sea.

Expansion Planned

To-day on the waters of the British Isles the Royal Naval Volunteer Supplementary Reserve is carrying on the high traditions established in 1914-18.

ong.

In the near future it is proposed to embark on a systematic plan of large-scale expansion, with the object of establishing similar patrols in all States of the Commonwealth, with the object of expansion, with the commonwealth, with the commonwealth, with the commonwealth of the c with units at every important port or harbour around the Australian

When war broke out one important duty to be performed was the patrolling of the waters of Port Jackson, on the shores of which are so many "military objectives."

To do this work the military authorities called upon the police, who, in turn, enlisted the co-operation of the V.C.P.

Harbour Watch

Now, each night members of the patrol, in their grey-painted trim craft, patrol every bay and inlet in the harbour, as an auxiliary to the Water Police.

Water Police.

But the work does not cease at daylight. Daily the patrol co-operates with the military authorities in exercises to test coastal defences and in carrying out special reconnaissance work along the coast.

In the seven months that the patrol has been assisting the Water Police it has placed to its credit 3500 ship working hours and 13,000 man hours of service—all voluntary.

In the past two months ships of the patrol have travelled more than 2000 miles at sea, up and down the coast, in co-operation with the military authorities—as far north as Port Stephens and as far south as Port Kembla.

Attainment of the high standard of efficiency, of which the patrol is justly proud, has entailed long hours of arduous study and exercise. For example, one night a week for 14 weeks, members of the patrol attended three-hour lectures, at the conclusion of which were examinations.

tions.

The lectures were divided into three sections—police law, air raid precautions, and first aid—and every member passed with flying colours.

When the patrol was formed, at the beginning of 1938, in the words of the commanding officer, Skipper H. W. G. Nobbs, "there wasn't a mariner among the private motor yacht owners in the Harbour."

Now the majority of the 300 odd members of the patrol are competent navigators, and signallers, and are qualified in many other branches of seamanship, necessary to carry out efficiently the patrol work.

At present the patrol is "under canvas" at Clontarf, Middle Harbour, where a miniature naval station has been temporarily established.

From here are operating the 40 ships of the fleet, in an intensive course of training which extends 24 hours a day.

"Remember that hospitals near the war zone must not have beds occupied by soldiers who have 'cracked up' during the training period. This can be obviated to a large extent by careful pre-selection.

The report points out that a review of the cases brought back by the Manunda reveals a low incidence of disease with "detectable physical signs," most of the illnesses being of the variety that cause symptoms rather than signs (says the "Sun.")

This, in the opinion of the medical officers, shows that, although a high standard was maintained in the work of physically examining the recruits, sufficient emphasis has not been laid on a careful 'clinical' history.

"Hard to Realise Damage" Mr MacGibbon, speaking from Lake Coleridge, said the position caused by the breakdown could have been much worse in the city. It was difficult to realise the extent was difficult to realise the extent of interference caused by the water which, released from the broken casing of one of the huge turbines, spouted out over the main hall of the station in which the generating units are situated and flooded everything in reach. Even the basements were flooded as it was impossible to turn off the head of water rushing into the damaged turbine for at least five minutes. at least five minutes.

When the steel casing burst and few across the floor of the generating house no one was injured.

Flight From Dunedin Mr MacGibbon was in Dunedin at the time and took an aeroplane imthe time and took an aeroplane immediately for the north. In the meantime the assistant district electrical engineer (Mr L. S. Payne) issued an urgent appeal to consumers to conserve power as much as possible. This was followed by a broadcast appeal and an appeal by the general manager of the Municipal Electricity Department (Mr E. Hitchcock).

The latter stated this evening that the response to the appeals made had had a measurable effect in relieving the shortage and had pre-vented much more drastic steps being taken to conserve supplies for essential services.

One of First Units The turbine which was damaged through the casing breaking away was one of the first two units installed at Lake Coleridge somewhere in 1914.

Mr MacGibbon said that it had

given splendid service, running under a heavy overloading during the shortage of generating capacity in the early days of the scheme. It was an old No. 5 unit of 1500 kilo-

watts.

The water from the turbine shot across to the switchboard gear, damaging the instruments and the other generating units, All had had to be dried out. A special band of eight or nine men from the Addington station had gone up to Lake Coleridge to assist in the work.

Shortage Eased

"We will be able to give power when it is wanted to-morrow mornwhen it is wanted to-morrow morning," Mr MacGibbon said. "The shortage will be eased considerably then. We will have two units producing, each generating 7500 kilowatts, to take the peak load to-morrow. The work of bringing the steam plant into operation was begun immediately word was received of the breakdown at Lake Coleridge, and within about an hour power was available from this source. The rush of water in the channel from Lake Monowai to the power station brought down a considerable quantity of marine weed which is at its maximum growth at this time of the year. Men were stationed at the screens to deal with the weed and there was no interruption in generation as occurred last week when contact with Waitaki was lost, and Monowai was called on to bear the full load.

Southland will be able to contribute to a material extent in the supply of power during the present emergency. Monowai and the city plants have a capacity of more than 7500 kilowatts, and it will be possible to divert to Canterbury power normally supplied to Southland from Waitaki.

Docks And Oil Plants Attacked

An Air Ministry communique issued to-day states: "Last night, aircraft of the Bomber Command attacked Cologne with high-explosive and incendiary bombs. Visibility was good, though later it was much obscured by smoke. Full details of this operation are not yet available. However, large parts of the target areas were observed to be on fire, and considerable damage must have been done. Other aircraft successfully attacked docks, railway targets, and oil installations in the Ruhr and at Rotterdam and Boulogne."

logne.' Second In Week Later reports confirm that the attack on Cologne, which was the second within a week, was most successful, though three British aircraft are missing from this operation. Once again, the bombers left behind them a multitude of consuming fires, with the sky full of acrid

smoke.

To many crews the voyage out was a hard one, with thick cloud all the way and electric storms in the air, but their persistence and skillful navigation were rewarded by very good weather immediately over Cologne. All around there were layers of clouds, but over the target itself there was clear sky across which no more than a few patches of vapour occasionally drifted.

Guided by the Rhine, and later by the welcoming blaze of countless fires, the aircraft came over in quick succession and concentrated their attack within the few hours from soon after nine o'clock until midsoon after nine o'clock until midnight. So many bombers were over at one time that the crew of one aircraft saw four during the short period in which they were over the city. One of these bombers was caught in the cone of 20 searchlights—there were several such cones ranged around the town—and another shot unexpectedly by within hundreds of yards.

A Shortage Is Not Feared

PRESENT SITUATION

Referring to a message in which the Minister of Marketing (the Hon. J. G. Barclay) commented upon a shortage of eggs, a poultry producer approached the "Daily Mail" on Thursday night with an entirely opposite opinion, claiming that he would find difficulty in marketing any large quantity of eggs.

Qualified support for this view was forthcoming yesterday from another producer, whose experience had been that there was no pronounced shortage. It was pointed out that with the approach of the moulting season, egg production might be expected to fall off, while pullets' eggs would not bring the price of the larger grades.

A poultry-keeper who sends most of his product to Wellington for marketing told the "Daily Mail" that if it were not for this arrangement, whereby his eggs were graded and all sizes sold, he anticipated that it would not be easy to dispose of the smaller sizes in Hastings where no provision was made for grading. His only experience of signs of a shortage came, he said, from occasional inquiries for supplies, made by shopkeepers who found their regular supply temporarily insufficient. This is believed to apply to both Hastings and Napier.
