Senate Passes Lend-and-Lease Bill By Large Majority VICTORY FOR LEANDER

HOUSE TO APPROVE

Opposition Beaten In Long Fight

Full Details Of New Powers Given To President

(United Press Association—Copyright) (Received March 9, 11.15 p.m.)

WASHINGTON, March 8.

The Senate passed the Lend and Lease Bill by 60 votes to 31. Forty-nine Democrats, 10 Republicans and one Independent voted for the measure. Thirteen Democrats, 17 Republicans and one Progressive voted against.

At noon on Monday two Senate messengers will carry the Bill to the House of Representatives. The Speaker of the House (Mr Sam Rayburn), hopes to obtain the consent of the House to concurrence in the 11 amendments on Tuesday. It is expected that President Roosevelt will be able to sign the Bill by the middle of the week.

The Senate, on the voices, adopted Senator Barkley's amendment to include farm products in defence materials which could be transferred abroad. Senator Barkley said that the 1,300,000,000 dollar limitation on defence stocks which could be sent abroad did not apply to farm products.

Senators debated far into the night on Friday as the Administration forces successfully repelled successive amendments, most of which was designed to restrict the President's power to send troops outside the Western Hemisphere or to order the Navy to convoy shipments to Britain or to any point within the zone the President has proclaimed as a combat zone.

Isolationists made their biggest fight on the proposal to limit the President's power in regard to troopship movements outside the Western Hemisphere.

President's Powers. Power is granted to the Presi-

(1) To order the manufacture and procurement with funds made available by Congress of any defence

article.

(2) To dispose of these defence articles to such Governments by lease or loan, transfer or title of exchange or otherwise.

(3) To test, repair or recondition any defence articles, including warships, for such Governments.

(4) To furnish such Governments with any defence information, plans or blueprints pertaining to defence articles furnished.

(5) To release these defence articles for export but not to transport them.

(6) To purchase or otherwise acquire arms and implements of war produced within the jurisdiction of such country whenever the president deems such purchase or acquisition in the interest of United States defence.

Keep Out Of Range Of Japanese Guns

United Press Association-Copyright (Received March 9, 9.35 p.m.) HONG KONG, March 8. Chinese troops are reported to-day to be offering vigorous resist-ance to Japanese forces attempting to drive inland after the landings on the Kwangtung coast on Mon-

on the Kwangtung coast on Monday.

Chinese dispatches said that the landings were not contested because the Chinese strategy all along had been to withdraw beyond the range of Japanese naval bombardments before making a stand.

They said the coast was practically undefended to a depth of 15 miles and added that foreign interests had been hit hard by the Japanese landings since many of the towns occupied were entry ports for trade with Shanghai and Hong Kong. For example, considerable quantities of goods had previously been shipped to Hong Kong from Yeungkong and Kwanghoi for export to the United States.

The Japanese military authorities claimed to-night that their offensive in the Northern Hepei Province during the past three weeks had cost the Chinese 3000 dead as against 28 Japanese dead and 85 wounded.

LONDON, March 8.

In the central sector the Greeks imed at occupying certain mountain peaks and positions serving as natural ramparts, adds a Press Association cable. Artillery from midnight bombarded the positions from all directions and the infantry assault was delivered at 6.30 a.m.

BOMB WRECKS RESTAURANT THIRTY DANCERS

SHOCKING TRAGEDY

Worst Raid On London In Two Months

Thirty are feared to have been killed and many seriously injured when a high-explosive bomb from a German raider burst among 150 dancers in a London restaurant. The rescuers worked for three hours extricating those buried in the debris An eye-witness said that one

An eye-witness said that one moment the restaurant was thronged with a gay and carefree crowd of uniformed officers, their wives and friends, then came a terrific explosion. The bomb came right through the building to the dance floor, which received the whole force of the explosion.

Police, civilians, A.R.P. squads and soldiers celebrating Saturday night leave rushed to the wreckage and began to drag out girls in dance frocks, who were laid on the footpath till the could be taken to hospital in ambulances or taxis. Women tore up handkerchiefs and even

tore up handkerchiefs and even took pieces from their dresses to bind up the wounds of those more seriously injured. Soldiers used field dressings and nurses were summoned, who worked heroically.

There were stirring scenes when King Haakon received 300 Norwegians from the Lofoten Islands. Their leader declared: "We vow to the last drop of our blood to fight for the cause for which all the democracies are fighting. King Haakon said he had a feeling that the refugees would be able to return to Norway to liberate their country. "Eleven officers and 89 men were picked up by the Leander and are now prisoners of war. Among those rescued were five wounded.

"No damage or casualties were suffered by the Leander."

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

THE NEXT GERMAN MOVE

Although it is generally agreed that the advent of spring will see a resumption of the German offensive on a grand scale there is a surprising difference of opinion as to when and where the blow will fall.

Mr Oliver Stewart, editor of the publication "Aeronautics," and B.B.C. commentator on the war in the air, has made up his mind that we are about to see a great intensification of the counter-blockade. Germany, he says, is preparing large scale attacks on British shipping, in which she will employ long-range bombers. They will set out from bases in occupied France to intercept British shipping far out in the Atlantic, and will co-operate with the German submarines to destroy the ships laden with war material from America.

It is probably true that the Germans will attempt something of the kind, but there is little reason for supposing that it will be any more successful than previous attacks on British shipping. By this time Germany must have lost many of her most experienced airmen and the ease with which the R.A.F. shoots down German bombers and chases their fighters away suggests the pilots now employed in raids lack

the skill and morale of the men who have been used up. The same remark applies even in a greater degree to the

Germany has been very busy all the winter in putting new submarines into commission to replace the many undersea craft that have failed to return, but it takes longer to train the crews than it does to build the submarines, and the knowledge that most of them will be going to their death when they leave port is calculated to take the edge off their enthusiasm for this class of warfare.

With the longer days, and the improved means of detecting the presence of submarines, their capacity for destruction will be correspondingly reduced.

Mr Stewart is of opinion that the Germans may even attempt the invasion of Ireland to secure air and submarine bases, but how they are going to get there in sufficient numbers he does not explain. If they cannot get across the English Channel, it is difficult to see how they can travel round to the coast of Ireland without meeting with disaster, and slow troop-carrying 'planes filled with parachutists would have a poor chance of escaping the attention of the

Mr Wickham Steed, another B.B.C. commentator, takes a very different view. Mr Steed is steeped in knowledge of the Balkans, where he lived for many years as a correspondent of "The Times." The German invasion of England having become too hazardous, Hitler has changed his plans, which, according to Mr Steed, now envisage conquest in the Middle East and a move against Russia to secure the oil supplies at Baku and to tap the granary of south-eastern

According to Mr Steed in 1936, Germany was planning a frontal attack on Russia, and on second thoughts abandoned it in favour of an invasion in the Black Sea area and in the Caucasus. Now that she is committed to a long war, which will require larger supplies of oil and food than she has in sight, Hitler has decided that they can be obtained only at Russia's expense.

Perhaps it would be unwise to take either Mr Oliver Stewart or Mr Wickham Steed too seriously. The outstanding fact at the moment is that the Greeks are expecting an ultimatum from Germany in the course of the next few days. At the moment it would appear that any such demand will be rejected, in which case the German war machine will be set in motion with the object of passing the frontier and occupying Greek territory.

WHAT TO DO WITH RAIDERS

The exploits of H.M.S. Leander, one of the cruisers of the New Zealand Squadron, in dealing promptly and effectively with an Italian raider in the Indian Ocean has one or two unusual and interesting features.

It will be noted, for one thing, that it was the raider which opened the attack when the vessel was ordered to stop and when the British Red Ensign was replaced by the Italian colours, but what is more unusual is the fact that the Ramb I was probably the first enemy raider to strike its colours and call off the fight. Still more remarkable, in view of the apparent willingness of the ship to engage the cruiser in the first place, is the poorness of the raider's gunnery, which caused no casualties and did no damage to the British ship. These things lead to the conclusion that the Italians are no happier aboard a raider than they are with the Italian Navy or with the armies in Albania and Africa. One might have expected that commerce-raiding would be more in the Italian line of warfare, but the fact that there is no mention of prisoners aboard the Ramb I seems to indicate that the raider could not have achieved any notable victory even against merchantmen.

By Telegraph—Press Association AUCKLAND, March 9. Private advice has reached Auckland that Commander C. B. Tinley, O.B.E., formerly officer in charge of the Devonport Naval Base, died of wounds in January.
Commander Tinley, who left New
Zealand in October, 1939, was appointed about May, 1939, to be commander in the cruiser Southampton. mander in the cruiser Southampton. This ship, with the aircraft carrier Illustrious, was bombed by German aircraft while escorting a convoy through the Sicilian channel early in January last. Fire broke out on board and attained such proportions that the vessel had to be abandoned and sunk. A great majority of her crew of 700 were saved.

As her commission dated from about the middle of 1939 it is presumed that Commander Tinley was aboard her and was fatally wounded in action.

"The Times" correspondent on the French frontier says that General Weygand's arrival in Vichy coincides with a new crisis in French-German relations.

A Berlin message stated that unless Pierre Laval was reinstated Franco-German collaboration would be ended. Vichy insists that Laval consented to put Marseilles, Toulon and Bizerta at the disposal of the Italian and German fleets.

The Vice Premier (Admiral Daran) has returned to Vichy from LATE SPORTING Paris and conferred with Marshal Petain. General Weygand later presided at a Cabinet meeting. He opposed attempts to break the British blockade, declaring that this would serve as a pretext for the Italians and Germans to enter North Africa. Weygand is returning to Africa to-

The Havas News Agency at Vichy says that Press censorship in unocupied France will shortly be abolshed and newspapers will be allowed full latitude to print the news as received and comment on hap-penings. The Government will still exercise control of the Press but only after publication, should the need arise.

60ft. long and 20ft. in width, with depth ranging from 3ft. 6in. to 6ft. 6in. Dressing accommodation is yet to be provided, and a further £90 is to be raised to pay the capital cost of the baths.

Formation of Club It was hoped that the baths would be made available for the public as well as children of the school, said Mr Burns. He suggested that it would be in the best interests of those using the baths to form a club ensuring a greater degree of

those using the baths to form a club, ensuring a greater degree of safety for swimmers.

Mr Burns announced that Miss Lucy Holmes, on behalf of the Holmes family, had donated a handsome cup for competition among senior boy pupils of the school. The trophy perpetuates the memory of the four sons of the Holmes family who lost their lives in the last war. A similar cup has been given by Mr W. Tucker and also a trophy by Mrs P. Brody.
