OPPOSITION TO AXIS

Russia, Britain, Greece And U.S.A. Offer Support

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received March 23, 11.45 p.m.)

A Cabinet crisis continues to delay capitulation to Germany, and meantime there are indications that Russia, Britain, Greece and America are taking a hand to stiffen Yugoslavia's attitude. Reports from Ankara and Moscow say that Russia is expected to publish very soon a communique detailing the conversations between M. Vyshinsky and the Turkish Ambassador to Moscow, reaffirming Russian-Turkish friendship and emphasising the Russian-Turkish non-aggression agreement which already exists.

Russia initiated these conversations, and the Turks are reported to have already received a written assurance from Moscow that they have nothing to fear from Russia should they be forced to fight for Turkish independence.

Some Turkish sources even foresee that Russia will then adopt the same attitude to Turkey as to China, "with all that implies."

Members of the Serbian peasant party at Belgrade, whose leader is the Yugoslav Minister to Moscow, said that Russia had indicated that she will accept any Yugoslav initiative toward Russian-Yugoslav initiative toward Russian

No Entry of Troops.

The Soviet Minister to Belgrade, who has just returned from Moscow, is reported to have told M. Cincarmarkovitch that Yugoslavia

Cincarmarkovitch that Yugoslavia should not sign any agreement with Germany involving the entry of troops into Yugoslavia.

The Yugoslav Minister conferred with M. Sarajogiu, who also talked with Sir Knatchbull Hugessen.

The British Minister (Mr. R. I. Campbell) and the American Minister are reported to have seen the Yugoslav leaders, Mr. Campbell pointing out the nature of the assistance Yugoslavia would receive if she asked for it, and the American emphasising the implications of the Lease and Lend policy.

Many Resignations.

Thirteen prominent persons have already resigned as a protest against appeasement, namely three Ministers, eight Senators, the Governor of the Vardar district, and the Vice-Governor of Croatia.

Two Senators of the Independent Democratic Party, which is the fourth largest in the country, have resigned, and one is even reported to be going to Cairo to organise cooperation with Britain.

Three Army officers have gone to Greece to fight with the Greeks, and four pilots are reported to have flown to Greece to place themselves and their three 'planes at the disposal of the Allies.

The Yugoslav Minister at Moscow has resigned, but this apparently arises from the Serbian Peasant Party's instructions to its followers to resign from Government positions.

Politicians Feared.

Cabinet Split

It was stated to-day that Prince Paul has accepted the resignations of MM. Konstantinovitch and Budiesvlyevitch (both Serbs), and M. Chubrilovitch lesvlyevitch (both Serbs), and M. Prodigious Valour Of

RUGBY, March 22.

The fall of Jarabub deprives the Italian High Command of the opportunity which they have exploited to the full of bringing much needed encouragement to Italian morale by fanciful accounts of the prodigious valour of the resistance of the garrison at Jarabub, to attacks which never took place.



THE ENEMY ALIEN QUESTION

There is a good deal of evidence to support the contention that in certain parts of the Dominion there is a feeling of disquiet regarding the Government's handling of the enemy alien problem. The subject has been discussed by at least one important local body and by other organisations in Hawke's Bay, but beyond a soothing and non-committal statement by the Attorney-General, the Government has not yet made any move to clarify the situation.

In wartime it is difficult for the ordinary man or woman to maintain a reasonably unbiased attitude over this question. The present conflict has given such vivid illustration of the work of Fifth Columnists that any alien who is or has been in any way associated with the enemy countries is suspect to a greater or lesser degree. In such circumstances it is inevitable that there should be individual cases of hardship in which innocent and inoffensive persons suffer. But this is one of the penalties involved in war, and at such a time as the present no country which is fighting Germany and her allies can afford to take risks.

The present agitation in New Zealand appears to be based on two fears: (1) that enemy aliens, however friendly and well-intentioned they may seem towards the country which has provided them with a refuge, may still be voluntarily or involuntarily linked with the espionage organisation of Nazi Germany, and (2) that aliens in the country may be filling positions left vacant by British subjects who, at the cost of heavy self-sacrifice, are in the armed forces at home or overseas.

In wartime apprehension on these grounds is understandable. At the same time it must be remembered that the Government alone is responsible for the control of aliens, whether "enemy" or not, and that the Government alone has authority to take any measures to deal with the situation.

At the present time the Government is apparently satisfied that everything necessary has been done. The Attorney-General has said that every alien known to the public is also known to the Government and is subject to close scrutiny. Further, he has said that if the Alien Tribunals had any genuine doubt as to the bona fides of an alien he was recommended for internment—"but this course could not be taken merely to satisfy public uneasiness, which might be quite

While this statement can hardly be described as explicit, it should be comprehensive enough to forestall any increase in that public uneasiness which the Minister mentions. Probably it will not do anything of the sort, but in view of the necessity for secrecy it is unlikely that either the Minister or any other member of the Cabinet will go into details.

The question of aliens occupying positions vacated by members of the forces is again the Government's responsibility. In some cases it is possible that aliens may do very useful work which would not otherwise be done during the absence of men overseas. If this is so there cannot be any reasonable objection to their earning a living in New Zealand, but the men who are in the forces have every right to expect that the Government will ensure that they are not in any way permanently displaced by foreigners.

It is as well to remember that wholesale movement of political, religious, and racial refugees is not merely a problem of the war. Ever since the accession of the Nazis to power in 1933 streams of people have been drifting from one country to another.

In Great Britain the problem was acute long before the outbreak of war, and occasional outbursts of anti-Semitism in London and other cities were due almost solely to the belief which was held, rightly or wrongly, that the influx of tens of thousands of German and Austrian refugees was an important factor in maintaining British unemployment figures in the vicinity of 2,000,000. At the outbreak of war it was estimated-there did not seem to be any reliable census-that foreign refugees in Great Britain numbered upwards of

It is not likely that any of these people or others who are scattered throughout the Empire, will have an opportunity of leaving their adopted countries before the end of the war, and their future will be one of the many problems which will have to be settled when peace returns.

As against this, the Attorney-General states that in all cases where internment had been recommended by the tribunals it had been carried out by the Government.

out by the Government. But that is not the whole story How many who have been recom mended for internment and have been interned have since been reeased and are at large to-day? Enemy aliens are divided into various classes as follows:

(1) For immediate internment.
(2) Liable for internment in the event of an enemy attack and in the meantime subject to certain restric-

meantime subject to certain restrictions.

There appears to be a grave weakness here. It must be obvious to everyone that the enemy is not likely to advertise an attack some weeks ahead and give the police time to collect and intern these people. We may not get 12 hours' or even six hours' notice of an attack of admit dances at West Point, and after a busy day of sightseeing over the grounds, she was asked by her escort how it had impressed her. I am told that before an enemy alien can be apprehended by the police for certain offences, permis-sion must first be obtained from the Attorney-General, but that such permission is not necessary in the case of a British subject. Is this so? I am also told that goods will be carried free of charge on our railways if consigned to enemy alien internees, but not so in the case of a soldier in camp for overseas service. Is this a fact?

While I agree with the Attorney-General when he says that "while New Zealand would be fair to the stranger within its gates, it could not risk having its safety imperilled in any way," I would stress the urgent need to attend to our own safety first and to be fair to our

I feel that I am expressing the opinion of a large section of the public when I say that the methods of dealing with the enemy alien should be reviewed and tightened up.—I am etc.,

Freezing Works To Reduce Classes Of Stock For Export

(By Telegraph-Press Association.) WELLINGTON, March 23.

Following recent communications from the United Kingdom Government, the Minister of Marketing (the Hon. J. G. Barclay) announced to-night that in view of the necessity of making the best possible use of storage space in the freezing works, the Government had decided that as from Monday, March 24, acceptances by the freezing companies of stock for freezing for export will be confined to lambs, prime beef and porker pigs up to 120lb. weight.

Proper Clothing | COASTAL AREAS TO BE BLACKED OUT TO-NIGHT

Regulations Effective For The Duration Come Into **Operation**

From an early hour this morning, dozens of workmen will be engaged in disconnecting lights which have almost become an institution in the daily lives of the citizens of Napier, in preparation for the permanent application of blackout measures in the coastal areas.

Although the measures will cause some inconvenience the residents of the districts affected will not be taken by surprise because the controlling authorities have taken every step to ensure that the public are well acquainted with the necessity of the precautions.

The main objective of the blackout, which will come into force to-night, is to prevent the enemy from determining his position, and the authorities seek the co-operation of the public in an endeavour to make the measures as effective as humanly possible.

Following several experiments carried out during the past few weeks, the comprehensive regulations have now been reduced to a workable basis.

Householders will be more concerned with the effective concealing ments of the blackout regulations.

Blinds which fit snugly may meet with the requirements in calm weather, but would probably serve to defeat the object of the blackout if influenced by a draught, so that they should be replaced or controlled by guiding wires. In many cases, blinds which have been subjected to the effect of the sun over a long period, will need some sort of treatment to restore them to their former condition. Old blinds may be given a new lease of life by the application of oil-bound water paint or distemper.


