Thousands are demonstrating throughout Yugoslavia against capitulation to the Axis. Demonstrators in Belgrade and other towns sang the Serbian song, ("Be Ready To Fight

Crowds of 30,000 assembled in the streets and cheered the Ministers who had resigned. One of the largest demonstrations was at Skopje, where the crowd demanded resistance to the Axis.



PROGRESS IN THE Heart Of Berlin And Other Cities Bombed By R.A.F.

LONDON, 1 a.m.

Berlin was bombed by the R.A.F. last night, British 'planes struck deep into enemy territory, and

among the objectives were Kiel and Hanover.

The most spectacular result of the raids was the dropping of incendiaries over the "diplomatic area" surrounding the Wilhelmstrasse. The Berlin radio contradicted itself in making a report of the raids. The announcer first stated that the British 'planes succeeded only in reaching the outskirts of the capital, but almost immediately a reference was read to the capital, but almost immediately a reference was made to incendiary bombs falling on the diplomatic quarter, which is in the heart of Berlin.

The attack on Hanover was apstarted by the raiders could be seen from the British 'planes over Berlin, more than 100 miles away.

"The tripartite pact is the pivot of Japanese policy," said the Japanese Foreign Minister (Mr. Matsuoka) when interviewed to-day on his arrival at Moscow en route to Berlin. "I wish to emphasise this. . "I owe it to emphasise this."

"I owe it to my country to visit the Axis leaders," he added, "because their personal friendship or enmity may be the greatest influence in human history.

"Naturally, I want to hear what the Axis leaders have to say, and perhaps to say something myself."

Mr. Matsuoka said he would be visiting the Soviet Prime Minister, M. Molotov, to-morrow. He hoped on the way back to meet the highest Soviet leaders.

Diplomats of all the countries adhering to the tripartite pact and representatives of the Soviet met him at the railway station.

went the latest air raid ordeal at Plymouth, declared at "This air raid business is not going to conquer Britain, and German armies are certainly not going to invade this

country successfully." Mr Menzies, who was greeting Australian officers and men serving in the Navy, added: "The enemy is not pro-viding any spectacular battles, but is making up for it by his tactics, so that we, as the British Empire, should have our Navy distributed all over the world.

"We should have immense patience in tracking him down and in protecting our trade and commerce, and above all in seeing that enough food comes to this country.

"These are not spectacular jobs, but are of enormous importance. As time goes on and this country gets more and more destroyers and other small craft we shall defeat what will probably be the enemy's most serious attempt to overthrow us. The real point of danger at this moment is on the water.

"I am proud to know that many Australians are in this country ready to play their part."

MEAT EXPORT RESTRICTIONS

The statement issued on Sunday night by the Minister of Marketing (the Hon. J. G. Barclay) makes the meat position clear so far as production for export is concerned, but the important question of payment for meat that cannot be shipped is to be the subject of a further statement, and until it is made judgment on the policy of the Government must be suspended.

In July last, the Minister of Finance, Mr Nash, gave an undertaking that the Government would purchase all the meat produced for export during the 1940-1941 season at prices on a parity with those it was paying for the 1939-1940 season. No doubt the undertaking was given in good faith, and before any very serious inroads had been made by the enemy into refrigerated tonnage engaged in the transport of meat from Australia and New Zealand to United Kingdom ports.

Since then many of the good ships in the trade with their valuable cargoes have gone to the bottom of the sea, and the vessels remaining can be used to greater advantage between Argentina and Great Britain. Accordingly, the British authorities find it necessary to revise their commitments in respect of New Zealand meat and have intimated that they cannot undertake to lift more than 180,556 tons. Compared with an export of 350,000 tons last year, the reduction has created a very serious situation both for the New Zealand Government and the meat producers.

There is a moral obligation on the Government to cover the cost of this unwanted meat to the farmer as far as it is in its power to do so. The farmer was urged to step up production to the utmost to meet the food requirements of the civil population in Great Britain, and the armed forces, wherever they might be. Stimulated by the assurance of remunerative prices for all they could raise, the farmer responded very effectively, and if shipping had been available the volume of this season's meat exports would have exceeded the great output of last year.

Now it becomes a question of who will have to find the money. The producer undoubtedly has a claim to be indemnified against loss, but the Government must look at the matter from all angles and see how far it is possible to protect the producer without injustice to the rest of the community. The amount of money at stake is very large, and if it eventually becomes necessary to boil down hundreds of thousands of carcases to clear the stores for next season's killings, the loss may have to be shared by the meat industry and the

In this connection it is, perhaps, worth remembering that after the last war tallow brought very high prices. Some of the meat export companies which had accumulated large stocks through lack of shipping space made a good deal of money through highly satisfactory realisations of tallow that had been taken into account at a nominal figure. It may pay to hold tallow to meet a post-war demand from countries which are already very short of fats of all descriptions.

RUSSIA ON THE FENCE

In spite of the optimistic cablegrams, there is no ground for a belief that Russia will intervene to save Yugoslavia from Germany. To do so would be to abandon every axiom of Russian foreign policy in the present war, and the basis of that policy is to take no step which would involve the

Soviet in war with Germany.

It is as well to remember that in somewhat similar circumstances in 1938 Russia threatened a great many things if Germany went to war with Czechoslovakia. Further, the Soviet bitterly assailed Great Britain and France for the betrayal of the Czechs. But beyond threats and reproaches Russia did nothing. Since that time, the Soviet has acquired territory from Poland and Rumania; she has reoccupied the Baltic States and has restored her frontiers in Europe to the level of 1914. Further, she has waged a costly and somewhat humiliating war with Finland which served to show that Russian transport and Army organisation is as slipshod as in the days of the Czars.

It is not an inspiring record, but it proves that Russia to-day has more to gain by peace than by war,

AUCKLAND WORKS TO CARRY ON

STAFF QUESTION

Further Statement Is Awaited

No immediate curtailment of kill-No immediate curtailment of killing activities at the freezing works in the Auckland district is expected as a result of the announcement of the Minister of Marketing that as trom to-day only lambs, prime beef and porker pigs would be accepted for freezing for export.

Representatives of the various works stated that stocks of the banned classes of cattle on hand at the works and due for delivery from farms within the next few days were sufficient to keep the slaughtering and allied departments fully engaged.

Problem of Staff

"The question of dispensing with the staff at works will not rise for at least another week, and will then depend on the nature of the Goverr.ment's pronouncement as to the disposal of meat which cannot be frozen for export," said one official. His considered opinion was that there would be no immediate catastrophic effect on the industry generally in view of the Government's assurance that the producer would be paid for all meat up to the end of September. That, however, did not alter the serious aspects to be faced by the

The total prohibition on the killing of ewes and wethers at the freezing works is expected to have a more serious effect in Southland than in other parts of New Zealand and particularly the North Island. The season in Southland has several months yet to run, and sheep killings have not yet reached half those expected in a normal season. Auckland Is Fortunate On an economic basis, Auckland was perhaps the most fortunate province in the Dominion in that its lamb season was practically over. The majority of ewes and wethers had been handled at the works, and it had shipped a considerable pro-portion of its meat, stated another official. The southern provinces would be more adversely affected on account of their later season.

The Southland freezing companies had already found it necessary to stop killing ewes and wethers because of the acute shortage of storage space, but this cessation of killings, just at the period when killings or ewes and wethers are normally at their height, was accepted philosophically by the farmers of the province as a temporary measure. Asked what he anticipated would be the policy laid down for the disposal of surplus stock the official said he assumed that as the farmers had been promised payment for normal killable stock, the freezing companies would be asked to receive and kill it.

Demonstration At The Tomoana Works

AN ENGLISH PROTEST

"In my opinion it will be a long time after the war before we can recover the English market for our ewes," said Mr S. S. Timbs, Wanganui, judge of the chiller beef class at the Autumn Show. Mr Timbs's statement was made in a talk to farmers and others interested in the meat industry at the Tomoana freezing works yesterday.

Mr Timbs was referring to pro tests which have been made by Eng lish butchers as a result of the condition in which over-fat carcases from New Zealand are said to have reached their destination and in this connection he read a copy of a resolution passed by the Manchester Master Butchers' Association. In this the "colossal waste" in the telescoping scheme was condemned, and the Ministry concerned was requested to have it discontinued.

Demonstration Given

Within the last year there has been a considerable amount of publicity attached to efforts on the part of Mr Timbs and others interested to secure a trial sample shipment of meat packed according to a method which, it was claimed, would mean a very substantial saving in

space requirements.

Yesterday Mr Timbs gave a practical demonstration of his method, by courtesy of Messrs Nelson's (N.Z.) Ltd.

"I should like to make it clear that in ordinary times I wouldn't think of bringing forward the idea," Mr Timbs said at the outset of his explanation, "but as a war measure I consider it at least merits a trial." In essentials the method demonstrated consists of removing the breasts, levelling off the scrag and cutting down the protruding shank, at the same time trimming down

Fitting Masks.

Fitting a mask to the headlights of most cars is a fairly simple business, clamps fitting around the bowl, but later models with lamps bowl, but later models with lamps recessed into the mudguards provide a problem. It is suggested that difficulties in dealing with this type of lamp may be overcome by pasting blackened paper or canvas over the glass, leaving slots for the light

The only difficulty associated with this method lies in the fact that the glasses of most recessed headlamps are not vertical, but "lean" with the curve of the mudguard, and it is difficult to project the light in downward direction without the use of baffles.

Busy Days At Foxton

MOUNTED CAMP Hawke's Bay Men In Training

1400 UNDER CANVAS

From dawn to dusk, busy days re being spent in Foxton by the econd Mounted Rifle Brigade, composed of Queen Alexandra and the Wellington East Coast Mounted Rifles. About 1400 men are under

Rifles. About 1400 men are under canvas at the Racecourse there.

The time is 5.45 a.m., and reveille has just sounded. Troopers are allowed 35 minutes to wash and dress for "stables" at 6.20. The quiet of the camp is broken with the bark of orders and the bustle of another day's activity. Horses wake and whinny for nose-bags. Troopers come to attend to their comfort with armfuls of gear. The sick horse parade at 6.30 draws its quota of "suspects," but within the hour grooming, watering, and feeding is finished and bugles are sounding for breakfast.

Domestic Chores.

In the routine of the mounted camp one and a half hours are allowed between breakfast and the first parade, but during this interval much has to be done. Eating utensils have to be washed, bedding folded, tents swept, lines cleaned, and denim outfits changed for the smart uniform of the mounted men. At 9 o'clock the brigade parades.
