### **Enemy Reorganising For** Fresh Push

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received April 14, 11.10 p.m.)

LONDON, April 14. The British United Press Cairo correspondent says that the new official name for the British army in the Balkans is The Forces of the Empire. These forces yesterday drove back German tanks and infantry in the eastern sector of northern Greece. Otherwise there is no change thereabouts, northern Greece. Otherwise there is no change thereacouts, states an authoritative report from Cairo. Some Australian Bren-gun carriers in one of several patrol encounters caught a group of German infantry napping and inflicted losses. The Greeks repulsed two German reconnaissances. The Germans are evidently reorganising for a fresh push, which explains the accumulating of supplies at Monastir.

The Germans are hindered by appalling weather and R.A.F., activities. A number of German 'planes are bogged in the Monastir Plain.

In the last three days of heavy rain masses of cloud on the mountains have entirely prevented air operations in Albania. This is to the advantage of the Allies, enabling the release of British squadrons for use against the Germans in Macedonia.

Correspondents emphasise that the Greek spirits have rallied magnificently after the severe test resulting from the collapse of the Yugoslav Army leading up to the loss of Salonika.

Wounded Greeks from the mountain area southward of Monastir related how 30 soldiers held up 400 Germans for three and a half hours until lack of ammunition forced a Greek retirement. A wounded Greek declared: "When we got the Germans from their machine we found them no better than the Italians. They didn't like our bayonets. They are nothing more than chauffeurs."

The "Daily Mail's" Athens correspondent says that an Australian mechanised unit caught a German tank column broadside on at a point where a narrow mountain road was blocked by lorries stuck in the mud. The result of the Australian fire is reported to have been terrific.

Panzer Units Pour In

British and Greek armoured divisions are driving against the Nazi Panzer units pouring through the Monastir Gap. The Allies are trying to keep the Germans hemmed-in in the Florina-Banitza sector.

Dispatches reaching Sofia describe a battle between completely armoured British and German forces, which are manoeuvring on the plain between Monastir and Florina, as the first action of its kind. In the Nish area, the Yugoslav Army has delivered a counter-attack on both sides of the river Morava, and a German armoured force which had reached Topola, about 50 miles from Belgrade, has been isolated.





THE RETREAT TOWARDS EGYPT

In spite of the disappointment which has followed the brilliant British victories in Libya, there is no reason to regard the present withdrawal as a preliminary to a walk-over invasion of Egypt by the Germans. In the last week there have been some spectacular enemy successes, not the least of which is the recapture of Bardia, but there are many factors to be taken into account.

The British appear to be holding Tobruk in considerable force, and this fact is a guarantee that the withdrawal is not regarded as a permanent abandoning of Cyrenaica. The British retreat has never been in danger of becoming a rout, and there is no doubt that Tobruk would have been evacuated If the present movement had been anything more than a retirement necessitated by the transfer of the bulk of the Army of the Nile to Greece. The fact that the British forces near Benghazi were surprised by the size of the mechanised German reinforcements approaching from Tripoli did not prevent

the withdrawal being carried out with considerable success. The most unfortunate aspect of the German advance towards the Egyptian frontier has been its effect in Turkey where, according to the Istanbul correspondent of "The a feeling of discouragement is spreading. This idea is probably based on apprehension lest the Germans should continue their advance through Egypt towards Alexandria and Suez. Such a development is not the least likely. The further the Germans advance across the desert the more difficult their problem of supply will become. The fact that they achieved the admittedly creditable job of transporting an army to bolster up the defeated Italians in Libya does not mean that they will be able to maintain a flow of supplies and reinforcements across the Mediterranean. Now that the greater part of the Italian Navy has been put out of harm's way, there is no doubt that the British Fleet will watch the narrow passage between Sicily and French Tunisia with extreme caution.

The German plan is obviously to advance as far and as fast as possible before the Imperial Army is reinforced from East Africa and elsewhere—a fact which explains the Italian effort to maintain some semblance of resistance in Abyssinia, where the campaign has been so plainly lost, in order to keep as large a British force as possible busy in mopping-up

The British reverse in Libya will have a considerable propaganda value for the Axis, but it is as well to remember that the force which has withdrawn from Bardia is only a fragment of that which advanced so triumphantly a few months ago.

### RUSSIA AND JAPAN

The Russo-Japanese agreement which Mr Matsuoka has at last been able to obtain as a neat period to his European odyssey is much more interesting for what it does not say than for what it ostensibly lays down as a basis for future

There is, for instance, no mention of any lessening of the flow of Russian aid to China and Russian recognition of the territorial integrity of Manchukuo is a small price to pay for a guarantee of Japanese neutrality if Russia should become involved in the European conflict.

There are very good grounds for regarding the new agreement as being more satisfactory to Moscow than to Tokyo. At the same time it is reasonable to interpret this pact between two nations which have several times come dangerously near to war as a sort of Soviet insurance policy in which no mention is made of premiums.

Within the last month Russia has made no secret of her alarm at the German excursion into the Balkans. She complained bitterly of the occupation of Rumania; she freed Turkey of the fear of Soviet aggression if the Turks should enter the war on the side of Great Britain; she roundly condemned the action of Bulgaria and Hungary in entering into voluntary servitude to the Axis and, most important of all, she signed a pact with Yugoslavia after the anti-Axis revolt had made a German invasion inevitable.

The possibility of a German attack on Turkey with a view to the occupation of the Bosporus and the Dardanelles has long been a Russian nightmare, and the result of the present battle in the Balkans will have a profound effect on Soviet policy. The threat of a German victory in southeastern Europe is likely to have more influence with that Kremlin than any persuasion on the part of Mr Matsuoka,

PEOPLE'S ATTITUDE

European Affairs Not Their Concern

JOURNALIST SPEAKS

How the Far East is reacting to current world events was outlined by Mr S. C. P. Turnbull, who has returned to Australia after a five months' tour as an Australian Associated Press representative. Most people in Japan are neither pro-German nor pro-British, but are just 'plain Japanese," who do not favour involvement in a European war, he

Mr Turnbull went to Japan last November with the first Australian Minister to Toyko (Sir John Latham). He then visited Chung-king, China's war-time capital, and

king, China's war-time capital, and later reported the arrival of A.I.F. troops in Malaya.

In Tokyo Mr Turnbull interviewed the Japanese Foreign Minister (Mr Y. Matsuoka). "The official Japanese point of view is that Japan entered the Tripartite Pact with a view to preventing the extension of the European war," Mr Turnbull said. "Precisely how this was to be achieved is not clear. A large body of Japanese opinion questioned the wisdom of entering the pact. Presumably, the events of the last two weeks have tended to strengthen that section.

weeks have tended to strengthen that section.

The position of the Prime Minister (Prince Konoye) and Mr Matsuoka is not particularly happy at present as both must ultimately have the task of justifying to the Japanese people the adventure in China and Japan's participation in the Axis Pact.

Australia and China

Mr Turnbull said he was told by Government officials at Chungking that China had approached the Australian Government for an exchange of Ministers. The Australian reply was that the matter would be favourably considered. "General opinion in China now seems to be that Canberra has pigeon-holed China's request," Mr Turnbull said. "Everywhere, Australia is regarded as one of the great Pacific democracies. She is on the crest of the wave in popularity, both politically and commercially. Many Far Eastern people think that we are not exploiting an excellent commercial opportunity."

Mr Turnbull said the A.I.F. had won instant popularity in Malaya. Australian soldiers were being feted everywhere, particularly by the

everywhere, particularly by the Chinese, who regarded them as the most democratic Europeans in Malaya. "The A.I.F. boys are not concerned with Malaya's racial taboos. cerned with Malaya's racial taboos, and have accepted people of all classes and creeds as they found them. One wealthy Chinese family living near an A.I.F. camp has a free house for all soldiers on leave. This is typical of the reception being given A.I.F. troops in all parts of Malaya."



# LIVING STANDARD WHY GREECE TURNED TO GREAT BRITAIN FOR AID

Bitter Taunts In Open Letter Addressed To Hitler: Invasion Plan

LONDON, March 10.

Salient passages from the open letter to Hitler published in the Greek newspaper "Kathimerini" and signed by the editor, M. Vlachos, are as follows, says the Balkans corres-

pondent of "The Times": Your Excellency,-Greece, as you know, desired to stay out of the present war . . . Greece, when the Italians sank the (cruiser) Helle in Tenos Harbour, hid the torpedo fragments that were found after it was found they were Italian. She did this because she would otherwise have been forced to declare war on the Italians.

Greece at that moment had, besides her peaceful intentions, additional guarantees of security, two signatures, one Italian, the other British. Yet when Greece had tangible proof of the impending Italian attack and was thus persuaded that the one signature was valueless, she did not turn, as she should have—to the other, but turned—your Excellency will remember—to you.

Greece asked for your protection. The details of your answer I do not

A few days later Greek soldiers fell with the first British airmen at the front which had been opened by the Italians' barbarous assault. What happened next you and the whole world know. The Italians are being defeated—by us, the small, the weak. They have not been beaten up there on the front by the British, or no British soldiers have yet set oot in Albania, but because they foot in Albania, but because they have no ideals, no soul.... But this is irrelevant. For you told us yourself that you chose to remain an onlooker. "It is an Italian affair," you said. "I will not intervene unless the British Army lands in force in Salonika."

We might have asked you: "What about Florence? On the day the

about Florence? On the day the Italians attacked us you met them by the Arno. Did you not then deliver Greece to them?" But we put no such question, and when some indiscreet folk sought to remind us of that, we used to answer: "The Italians fooled them."

Air Force and Navy We wanted to believe that! It was in our interest. . . All was well. The British were our allies with their aeroplanes and their Navy, but with nothing else. It will be enough to mention that once when a British machine was forced down in Salonika we asked the British not to remove it themselves for fear the arrival of even 10 British saldiers.

Perhaps you will say to us. "What about the British?" We reply that we did not bring them. It is the Italians who brought them to Greece. Do you wish us to order them to go. But to whom? To the living? For we can hardly despatch dead, those who fell in our mountains, who landed wounded in Attica and here breathed their last, to those who while their country

Attica and here breathed their last, to those who while their country was burning at home, came here and fell here, and found tombs here.

Your Excellency, there are some infamies which are not done by Greece. We can send away neither the dead nor the living. Instead we will stand beside them till some ray of light shines again and the storm finally passes.



## Silent Revolt Against Tyranny

DENMARK, UNDER GERMAN LASH, DOES NOT DESPAIR

### Hatred Of Usurping Invaders Is Shown At Every Opportunity

"I have no official position. I am just an ordinary Dane trying to put the point of view of the Danish man-in-the-street before the reader," writes Henning Crabbe in the London "Listener," describing the condition of Denmark

Danes Love Peace. The Dane is, in fact, a lover of peace, and the whole Nazi mentality is entirely foreign to our national character. In our country each man wants to think for himself and to speak freely; we believe in a progressive democracy without any violent break with the past. Actually our ways of living, our whole outlook, are very much like yours, and we feel at home in this yours, and we feel at nome in this country, just as my English friends tell me they feel at home when they go to Denmark. But fortunately England was too far away to be able to give us any help in the hour of danger.

If you look at the map you will find that the Danish mainland has a

find that the Danish mainland has a common frontier with Germany and there is no natural barrier of any kind against an invader, like the mountains and fiords of Norway and the dykes of Holland. The plain of North Germany merges into the lowlands of Jutland. So when the League of Nations lost political power, when Hitler began spending on rearmament sums of astronomical figures—Denmark was actually at the mercy of Germany. For it is as certain as anything can be, that even if we had armed to the utmost of our capacity, we should have been unable to resist successfully. fully a German attack.

Neutrality Maintained.

When war broke out between Germany and Great Britain, we maintained, in spite of Nazi protests, the strictest neutrality. As you know, we had in May, 1939, under German pressure, concluded a non-aggression pact with Hitler.

### Systematic Looting.

The economical problems with we were now faced were enormous. Not only did we at one stroke lose nearly three-quarters of our export trade, but the Germans immediately

Ever since the occupation a steady stream of cattle and pigs has been going to Germany. In September the authorities in Copenhatember the authorities in Copenhagen had to agree to an immediate reduction by half of the pigs, cattle and poultry left in the country, because of the difficulty in obtaining fodder. They are thus slaughtering one and a-half million pigs, three hundred and fifty thousand head of cattle, as well as seven million hens. Almost the whole of this meat is going to Germany. Hitler pays for all this in worthless paper money, and the German debt is already well over £50,000,000.

The number of unemployed before the war out of a population of 3,500,000 was as high as 94,000. Since the occupation it has risen to nearly double. During the summer the shortage of food was not very nuch felt, but now rationing is get-

much felt, but now rationing is getting severe.

Here are some comparative figures of German and Danish rationing for the month of October: Bread, Germany 80oz, Denmark 70oz. per week; sugar, Germany 80z., Denmark 13oz.; fats, Germany, 9½ oz., Denmark 4oz. per week; coffee (of an inferior brand), Germany 3½ oz.; Denmark 1oz. per week. Fuel will be short this winter in our country. And this is the Dane's first country. And this is the Dane's first taste of Hitler's much-vaunted New Order, which is to bring peace, stability and prosperity in Europe.

But with their curious lack of psychological sense they try to make up to the population, and cannot understand why they fail. "Why do the Danes hate us?" was the headline of a recent German newspaper article.

### National Reawakening

Since the Invasion a profound national reawakening has taken place in Denmark. The Danes have come to realise that only a united nation, faithful to the national tradition, can survive. Community singular has become an outstanding feaing has become an outstanding feature of our national life since the occupation. Some months ago a tramway conductor, leader of the tram-workers' choir, called upon the University students' choir and suggested a joint open air concert in a park in Copenhagen, the idea being that people should join in and give vent to their repressed feelings in singing national songs.

Of course many of these songs referred to old fights with our hereditary enemy, Germany. An audience of 10,000 was expected and texts printed for that number. But all expectations proved wrong. On the the day 150,000 Copenhageners joined the singing, and Sunday after Sunday new meetings were called with the whole courty to the ing has become an outstanding fea

joined the singing, and Sunday after Sunday new meetings were called until the whole country joined the movement. On the first Sunday of September the singing was arranged simultaneously in all Danish towns. When the chimes of the Copenhagen Town Hall clock had given the six o'clock time signal, the tune of the song was broadcast, and the whole country, towns and villages, joined in the same song, a hymn to the Danish language called "Our Mother's Heavenly Voice." It is estimated that over three-quarters of the population took part. From all over the country telegrams were sent to the King with best wishes for the future of Denmark.

### Unshaken Loyalty

The King is to the people the rallying point of all national feeling, and he is indeed more popular than ever for his dignified attitude towards the Germans. It was on the twenty-sixth of September that King Christian celebrated his seventieth birthday, and in spite of the occupation it became a festival unique in our history. When I tell you of the King and Queen's drive through the streets crowded with wildly enthusiastic people, you naturally think streets crowded with wildly enthusiastic people, you naturally think of the Silver Jubilee or Coronation day. But in Denmark the joy of the people stood out against a background of sorrow. In the evening the King received the Danish people in the form of 20 representatives of all classes, including the Prime Minister, the Minister for Iceland, a clergyman, a physician, a peasant, a fisherman, an artisan, a business man, an actor and a man of science.

But perhaps the greatest moment was at midday when the King and Queen appeared on the balcony of the Royal Palace madly cheered by 80,000 people below. In his speech the King thanked them for their loyalty, and said that he considered this demonstration not for himself but for Denmark. He asked them to stand firm and united in these dark days, and he said he looked forward the former Danish Government perform their duties as before, and they still have some influence on internal questions. 

Myrna Loy The FAMOUS MAORI CHIEFS (No. 2) Tamati Ngapora

Tamati Ngapora was a high-bred chief, being cousin to Te Wherowhero (better known as Potatau), the first Maori King. He took part in the Waikato expeditions against the Taranaki tribes in 1829-30, but on the intro-duction of Christianity he was one of the first to embrace it and eventually became a cateand eventually became a cate-chist of the Anglican Church. When the Government gave an area of land at Mangere (near Auckland) to the Ngati-Mahuta tribe, Manuhiri, as he was later known, erected a stone church and held regular services until 1863. He was a peaceable man with a generous, nassuming nature.
