## Wave After Wave Of Tanks Thrown Back

## **OLYMPUS PASS HELD**

## New Zealanders In Action On Main Greek Front

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received April 18, 10.55 p.m.) LONDON, April 17.

Despite almost non-stop attacks on the heights of Mount Olympus by wave after wave of German infantry the British line forming the right flank of the Allied armies defending northern Greece holds firm and is inflicting enormous casualties. The German hordes are flung into the fray regardless

Olympus Pass itself is held by New Zealanders.

Hitherto the enemy has failed even to dent the main
British front, but German advances on the left flank southward of the Monastir Gap may entail rectification of the line.

An officer of a famous British mechanised regiment declared that not a single British tank had been put out of action by gunfire, whereas British shells went through the German tanks like cheese. "But," he added, "numerically they have the upper hand and are advancing in swarms with motorcycle infantry in support.

"Backing up the enormous German land army is a powerful air fleet. They fly over in batches of 20 and sometimes 40, unload their bombs and then return for more."

"The Times" estimates that Germany now has 15 armoured divisions. Putting the strength of a division at 400 machines this would represent a first-line force of 6000 machines.

The release of the Germans in Yugoslavia by the collapse of resistance there means that the Greeks may have to evacuate Albania, and this must create serious difficulties and have serious repercussions on the Empire forces. The Germans, despite heavy Allied fire, which is inflicting severe losses, have continued their three-pronged attack with undiminished ferocity.

# Concentration Of New Heavy Bombs Dropped By R.A.F. On Heart Of Berlin

LONDON, April 18.

Last night's raid by Royal Air Force bombers on Berlin was the heaviest yet made on the enemy capital. An Air Ministry communique states that the attacks was pressed home with the greatest determination and many hits were scored on selected targets. Substantial damage must

certainly have been done.

The Minister of Home Security (the Hon. Herbert Morrison) speaking in London, stated that during the raid many heavy bombs of a new, more powerful type were used for the first time and must have wreaked great havoc as repeated bursts were seen in the centre of the city.

Mr Morrison also revealed that among the aeroplanes taking part were several of the new Sterling bombers.
"We make no hysterical noise about reprisal raids," continued Mr Morrison. "We bomb according to plan. We have as much right to bomb Berlin as Hitler has to bomb London."

DEFENCE NEEDS

Aircraft Spotters Being Enrolled

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 18, 11.5 p.m.) WASHINGTON, April 18. The Co-ordinator of Defence Pro-

The Army has not enough equipment to protect half the principal cities on the eastern seaboard or the field armies.

If the Navy should be ordered in the near future to convoy duties, he says, the shortage, particularly of guns roughly equivalent to the British pompoms, would probably handicap the efficient protection of such convoys. ## **HEAVY DANGERS MUST** NOT BE MINIMISEI

Successes Of Germans Balance Italy's Losse

> (British Official Wireless.) (Received April 18, 7.45 p.m.)

RUGBY, April 17.

Commenting on the military situation newspapers strike a balance of events from December to the present date and set out the conclusions which must be drawn from the facts as they stand.

"The Times," after recalling the great successes of the past few months, continues: "In the exultation created by our victories we may not have kept in mind their comparatively secondary significance. They were gained one and all over a very minor confederate in the unholy alliance with which the British Empire it as war. They have hardly weak ened the major confederate directly, though they have caused him some embarrassment and have necessitated some reshuffling of his plans.







PASSIONFRUIT, that delicious and refreshing fruit, is unfortunately considered rather a luxury for those who are not fortunate enough to have a well-laden vine of their own. The lucky folk will now be picking quite good supplies of fruit and other folk will perhaps have an occasional treat and purchase some from the shops.

These recipes are all very delicious and can not really be termed extravagant because the flavour of the fruit is strong and a few will go quite a long way.

PASSIONFRUIT CREAM

PASSIONFRUIT SAGO

Take 2 tablespoonfuls sago, 1½ cups water, pinch of salt, 2 tablespoonfuls sugar, 6 passionfruit, 2

Take 1 cup cream, 6 passionfruit, 2 cup sugar, 6 macaroons, 1 teaspoonful powdered gelatine, 2 cup water.

Method: Dissolve the sugar and gelatine in water over boiling water.





COALITION PROSPECTS

On the eve of the Prime Minister's departure for England the question of a coalition government and the postponement of the elections has been raised again by Mr Holland, but in the circumstances he could hardly expect anything to come of his proposal. Mr Fraser has temporised and has promised a decision on his return, when the best course to pursue may be dictated, perhaps rather emphatically, by developments in Europe.

On general principles, political unity is very desirable at a time when the nation is engaged in a life-and-death struggle for survival, but would it be achieved by a preelection coalition? The Massey-Ward coalition was anything but a happy family, although on questions of policy there was very little to choose between the Reform and Liberal parties which joined up for the duration of the last war.

What Mr Holland, in effect is asking for, is that Mr Fraser should call for the resignations of a number of his Ministers in order that their portfolios may be assumed by members of the Opposition. If the division were made on a fifty-fifty basis, the Opposition would have a substantially larger representation than their numbers would entitle them If membership in a coalition government were proportioned to the number of seats occupied by the Opposition in Parliament, Mr Holland and his friends would be very much in a minority. The former situation would not be acceptable to the Labour Party, and the latter would be far from comfortable for the Opposition.

In a time of national crisis it is undeniable that the government of the country should consist of the ablest and most public-spirited men in the whole community, and the most serious criticism that can be levelled against our very democratic electoral system is that it fails to produce them.

The great responsibilities of public administration in time of war devolve on men who reach office through the functioning of the party system. Without questioning their sincerity or the earnestness of their desire to do their very best in the onerous positions in which they find themselves, the fact remains that the calibre of some of the men in ministerial positions does not inspire public confidence. The same feeling would still prevail, in perhaps a lesser degree in half a dozen Ministers were forthwith recruited from the Opposition ranks.

Mr Coates and Mr Hamilton are in the War Cabinet already, and Mr Fraser has acknowledged their loyal assistance and co-operation since they joined it. Mr Holland has been offered a place, but in the meantime has preferred the freedom of his position as party leader with an eye on the general elections which, in the ordinary way, will be held six months hence. Unless the war takes a course which renders it undesirable to hold the elections, it is proper that the people of the country should be allowed to exercise their right of saying at the polling booths how far they approve of everything the Government has done during the previous three years.

Elections have taken place recently in the States of South Australia, and Queensland, and one will be held in New South Wales next month. A general election in New Zealand would do a great deal to clear the air. If it results in an accession of strength to the Opposition there would be a better prospect of a coalition being arranged on a basis that would give Mr Holland's party a more effective voice in the Government than it would have by joining now and agreeing to a postponement of the elections for the duration of the war.

## MAINTAINING PERSPECTIVE

The review of the present trend of the war published by "The Times," a cabled report of which is printed this morning, will go a long way towards correcting the tendency to magnify successes and reverses.

The "Daily Mail" has pointed out more than once that the war must be won in Europe. The Battle of Britain and the Battle of the Atlantic, two closely-linked campaigns, will decide the issue. Either the incredible—the fall of Great Britain—will happen, or the onslaught will be countered and British forces will set about the liberation of the Continent. Against this vast drama every other campaign is little more than an interlude,

The demand for flats in the town is steady, especially as many families unable to secure a suitable house have entered flats in the meantime. The erection of a number of new blocks of apartments has considerably eased the situation in recent months. ecent months.

"When married men without children are called up for military service the demand for houses may be expected to ease," the reporter was told. "There has already been a slight tendency in this direction through married men volunteering in the first year of war, and if there is a general call-up the effect may be pronounced."



Awed and silent suburban residents going to the city this morning after the prolonged blitz were scarcely able to believe that this was the London of yesterday, says a special correspondent of the Associated Press of Australia. Taxidrivers were uncommunicative and morose, and even the sight of a tailor's dummy dressed in an officer's uniform astride a grand piano failed to produce a smile among workers picking their way across the wreckage.

Members of the A.R.P. Services are feverishly working to recover persons trapped in the debris, but there is little hope that they will be rescued alive.

## Wrecking Of The Guildhall

LONDON LANDMARK

Portion Survives Two Great Fires

ARCHITECT'S VIEW

In an interim report to the Cor-poration of London on the damage done to the Guildhall in the fire raid on London, Sir Giles Gilbert Scott says that there are undoubted gains to be set against great losses. He will be unable to make a complete report until the charred remains of the roof have been removed from the floor of the hall.

the roof have been removed from the floor of the hall.

"It is a remarkable fact," he says, "that, in spite of the devastating effect of the fire upon the Guildhall buildings generally, the medieval portions of the old hall remain intact and practically uninjured.

"This medieval work, both in the walls of the hall and the crypt below the hall, formed by far the most valuable architectural treasure in the whole group of buildings, judgled both from the artistic and historical points of view; and to find this old work bravely standing up in the midst of such destruction is still more remarkable when it is remembered that exactly the same fate overlooked it in the Great Fire of London, and that for a second time this masonry has had to withstand the intense heat of a great fire.

"Most of the work destroyed in

fire.

"Most of the work destroyed in the hall, including the roof, was Victorian Gothic of no particular merit, and unless further damage is sustained I see no reason why it should not be restored in such a way as to give a much finer effect than it did before.

"The destruction of the stained glass windows has provided a solution of one of the most troublesome problems in restoration work—

tion of one of the most troublesome problems in restoration work—namely, how to remove windows that form memorials. The glass generally was dark and gloomy in tharacter, and did much to frustrate the purpose for which the windows were provided, to admit light to the interior of the hall. There is no loubt that finer glass can be obtained now than was possible when nost of these windows were put in, and here again is an opportunity for effecting a great improvement."

Hospitals Hit

## More Casualties AUCKLAND 'PLANE CRASH; ONE OFFICER IS KILLED

## Artillerymen Swim Half A Mile To Rescue Survivor In Wrecked Machine

(By Telegraph-Press Association.)

AUCKLAND, April 18.

One officer lost his life and another escaped with minor injuries when a Tiger Moth aeroplane from the Royal New Zealand Air Force base at Hobsonville crashed into the Rangitoto Channel near Castor Bay this afternoon.

The survivor was brought ashore by a party of men of the Royal New Zealand Artillery, who swam nearly half a mile in all to the flyers' assistance. The victims were:

After being attended by a doctor, Pilot Officer Hoy returned to his

station.

Both officers had recently been transferred to Hobsonville where they were to begin an instructors' course on Monday. They were in one of the station aircraft fitted with dual controls, and it is not yet known which of the two officers was actually flying the machine at the time of the accident.

The body of Pilot Officer Butler was found and brought to Auckland. The wrecked machine was dragged ashore on the beach by a naval party.

Prompt Rescue

A prompt rescue of Pilot Officer Hoy was made by Gunners O'Meara, Hipkins and Mansell, all of the Royal Artillery, assisted by a Maori, Mr W. Chelford, Castor Bay, who was working in the vicinity, from

was working in the vicinity, from the top of steep cliffs overlooking the channel.

They had seen the aeroplane crash and they also saw Pilot Officer Hoy climb from the wrecked machine and grip the tail, which was protruding from the water.

Machine Sinks Rapidly, however, leaving the survivor struggling in the water in his heavy flying clothes and attempting to swim about 400 yards to the shore.

Hurriedly climbing down the cliff to a small beach, Gunners O'Meara and Hipkins threw off their clothes and swam out to Pilot Officer Hoy. They supported him and were later They supported him and were later joined by Gunner Mansell and Mr Chelford, who had brought a rope. The five men came ashore together without great difficulty and without using the hope.

Body Recovered There was no trace of Pilot Officer Butler, who is believed to have been caught in the machine when the wings buckled under the impact of the crash. Naval launches were quickly on the scene and the body was later recovered with the wreck

In view of the fact that the coming elections will be the first held in wartime for a quarter of a century, the position of enemy aliens whose names appear on the rolls of the various local bodies, is giving the returning officers considerable food for thought. ## POSITION AT HASTINGS

A somewhat unexpected position has arisen in regard to deliveries of fruit to the assembly shed at Hastings.

The senior Government orchard instructor (Mr G. H. McIndoe) said yesterday that the fruit was not coming in as fast as anticipated and that they were still a long way short of Sturmer cool-store requirements.

"Actually, taking a line on the experiences of former seasons, we should now be at about the peak of receipts," said Mr McIndoe, "but possibly the drop is accounted for by the dragging-on of the Winter Cole and Winter Neils season, as a result of which packing of the later varieties has been retarded.

More Needed.

More Needed. "We should be receiving large quantities of Sturmers for long-storage, but they are not coming forward as quickly as we would like," he said.

Late cool-storage of Sturmers and similar varieties might very well have the effect of lessening their cool store life, Mr McIndoe pointed out, and in consequence towards the "tail-end" of the year the shortage of fruit might even become acute.

Questioned as to the fate of such oversize fruit, Mr McIndoe said that it would be classified and put on the market for immediate sale so that quick disposal was assured. With the two extremes of sizes cool-storage was not advisable. These reasons affected the specification of the sizes laid down for storage.

Miss Tennent traced the history of the Red Cross Society, which had its origin in the battle of Solferino, fought in Italy in 1859. Army medical services were then almost non-existent, and the terrible conditions prevailing on the battlefield so impressed Jean Henri Dunant, a Swiss banker, that he conceived the idea of training voluntary medical aids to serve under military discipline in time of war.

After touring Europe for some four years Dunant stirred up sufficient interest to result in an international conference being held. The emblem chosen was an adaptation of the Swiss flag (a white cross on a red ground), the colours being reversed in the Red Cross symbol.

Britain was not represented at the conference, and did not link up until some years later.

Dealing with New Zealand conditions, Miss Tennent said there had been a serious depletion of the ranks of professional nurses by the number sent overseas since the outbreak of war, and hospital staffs were already working at full pressure. There would be few nurses to spare for the emergency hospitals being prepared in every centre.

Epidemic Possible

There was a serious danger that an epidemic would follow the war, although they trusted that with the better medical services now available it would be averted. But it was always necessary to be ready, for the conditions of the last epidemic must not be repeated.

The emergency hospitals might also be required to take soldiers during convalescence. The policy of the military authorities in this war was to send sick and wounded men home as soon as possible, and not to keep them in overseas hospitals during convalescence. The hospital ships were now so well fitted out that this was possible.
