THIS WEEK'S RECIPES

Rabbit Will Be A Welcome Change In Almost Every Household

RABBIT provides a pleasant change in the menu and if properly prepared has many of the qualities of mutton. It must be carefully cooked to obtain the best results. As rabbit is deficient in fat, fat bacon or ham should be served with it. Rabbits should always be well washed and soaked in warm salted water for at least an hour before cooking, as this whitens the flesh.

CASSEROLE OF RABBIT AND MACARONI

One soaked and jointed rabbit, 2 small onions, 2oz. dripping, 1 dessertspoon chopped parsley, 1 teaspoon thyme and marjoram, 4 tomatoes, 1 teaspoon vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger, 1 pint stock, 1lb. parboiled macaroni. Cut rabbit into neat joints, make dripping hot in frying pan, and fry joints until nicely browned, lift into casserole. Fry sliced onions and add to casserole, add herbs and vinegar, and cook 3 minutes longer. Add to casserole, pour stock over, add ginger and salt, and if tomatoes are very sour, a level teaspoon sugar. Place the lid on and cook for 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Add parboiled macaroni 1 hour before serving. Serve red currant jelly separately.

RABBIT CROQUETTES

Half-pound cold cooked rabbit, 2oz. ham or bacon, 1 teaspoon chopped parsley, 1 hard-boiled egg, salt and cayenne to taste, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, gill milk, grated lemon rind, seasoned flour, breadcrumbs, and egg glazing. Mince rabbit very finely, also bacon, add chopped egg and parsley, lemon rind, salt and cayenne and mix together. Make a thick sauce, with butter, flour, and milk. Stir this into other ingredients and turn on to plate to cool, shape into pieces like corks with seasoned flour, dip in egg-glazing, toss in breadcrumbs. Deep fry golden brown, drain, and serve on paper d'oyley; garnish with small sprigs of parsley.

CURRIED RABBIT

Ingredients: 1 rabbit, 1 apple, 1 onion, 1 tablespoon fat, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 dessertspoon curry powder, 2 cups water, stock, or milk, 1 cup boiled drained rice, lemon and parsley, salt and pepper. Method: Blanch, drain and joint rabbit. Dip in seasoned flour, fry lightly in hot fat and lift on to plate. Peel, dice and fry apple and onion, add curry and flour, brown slowly, then add liquid and stir until mixture boils. Add rabbit, season and simmer slowly until tender. Serve with rice, garnished with sliced lemon and parsley sprigs.

RABBIT PIE

Ingredients: 1 rabbit, 1lb. bacon, 2 hard-boiled eggs, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, grated lemon rind, troy weight pastry. Method: Blanch, drain and cut rabbit into joints. Dip in seasoned flour and place in saucepan with grated lemon rind and sliced bacon. Cover with water or stock and cook slowly for 1 1/2 hours, until tender. Season with salt and pepper, arrange in pie-dish, add sliced eggs and chopped parsley and cover with thickened rabbit liquor. Cover cold contents of pie-dish with prepared pastry. Decorate and glaze, then bake in hot oven for 10 minutes, reduce heat and cook for further 20 minutes.

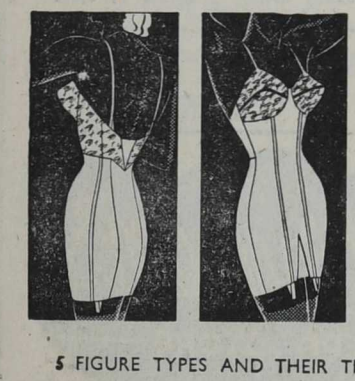
