Cabinet Ministers continue to be concerned and annoyed at mischievous propaganda disseminated overseas about Australia's war effort and alleged labour unrest and political disunity.

The acting Prime Minister (the Hon. A. W. Fadden) reiterated tonight that there was not an atom of truth in any of these suggestions. He announced that firm steps had been taken to deal with reports sent outside Australia by irresponsible persons and all that remained was to repeat the assurance given to the British and American people that Australia stood four-square behind the British Government.

Mr Fadden said that highly coloured accounts of possible political changes in Australia and untrue allegations of serious disagreements between the British and Australian Governments on the Greek campaign sent abroad had threatened to have considerable influence on United States opinion. Casey) expressing fear that this form of propaganda would give a fillip to the isolationists and, in addition, had caused some American newspapers to inquire whether there was any basis of truth in the stories cabled from Australia.

While in Moscow Mr Corpening formed the opinion that Russia had a better army than the world believed—not, as he was quoted by a Sydney newspaper as saying, "the finest army in the world and just as well equipped mechanically as the German Army."

Fresh from Egypt and Eritrea, Mr Corpening, who, until 1924, was a member of the United States Regular Army, praised the British strategy, which had ruined Italy's African empire.

A clever ruse led to the fall of Sidi Barrani, he stated. A small number of men, with motor trucks camouflaged as tanks and with light artillery, chose a high piece of ground to the left of the town and drove round in large circles, giving the impression that a large British force was approaching from that direction.

Arriving in Berlin in March of last year, Mr Corpening left for Switzerland in May. He returned to Germany in July but was expelled from the country for cabling a story containing details of a peace offer said to have been made by Hitler through the King of Sweden to Britain. He was given an opportunity of retracting his story or getting out of Berlin in two hours. He left Germany and travelled through Switzerland, Italy, Rome, Spain and Portugal to England, where he stayed while the Battle of Britain was won in the skies.



STRAW VOTES AND PUBLIC OPINION

The practice of attempting to secure beforehand, by means of a straw vote, some indication of what the electors will do when a national issue is submitted originated in America, where it has been tried with varying success. The newspaper the "Literary Digest," which has no political affiliations, was one of the first in the field, and the result of some of the polls it took coincided impressively with subsequent election returns. But the pitcher went to the well once too often, and the paper crashed badly when one of its straw votes foreshadowed the severe defeat of Mr Roosevelt for the Presidency of the United States!

Since then considerably less significance has been attached to straw votes, although an organisation controlled by a certain Mr Gallup, which has adopted a new technique, claims to be able to obtain a fairly reliable cross-section of American opinion on any question of national importance.

Obviously the value and reliability of these tests depends entirely on the method employed to obtain them. If, for instance, one were to insert an advertisement in the "Irish Times" asking readers the question: "Are you in favour of a United Ireland?", one could be certain of a 98 per cent. affirmative reply, but it would not contribute very much towards the realisation of the ideal.

Recently an organisation calling itself the "People's Movement" inserted an advertisement in newspapers politically opposed to the present Government and invited readers to "Yes" or "No" to five questions. Were they in favour of the Prime Minister inviting representatives from the Opposition to form a National Government, and of the post-ponement of the elections? Were they in favour of the cessation of party politics for the duration of the war? Were they in favour of a war council being set up consisting of the best brains in the country? Should it be given complete executive power? and, finally, who should be leader of the

It would have been surprising indeed if an affirmative answer had not been forthcoming to the first four, and it is more than surprising that having approved of the "best brains" being employed on the war council, the voters who were invited to nominate a new leader should have made the choice they did.

The promoters of this rather crude attempt to get a public endorsement of a particular point of view have not published the number of replies received. It may have been 50, or 500, or 5000, but in the absence of this important detail the result will not be taken very seriously. We can all agree with some unanimity that it would be a good thing if the "best brains" in the country could be employed in administering public affairs, not only for the duration of the war, but for ever after.

The difficulty lies in discovering in whose skulls they are to be found, and how to hoist the possessors into ministerial office. There are only two ways of putting a man into a public position. One is by electing him to it, and the other is by an appointment which can be made only by persons who have been elected to represent the people. To ask the latter to admit their incapacity is rather unkind. To suggest they should appoint somebody with better brains than their own to do the job they have been elected to perform is rubbing it in.

No doubt quite a few of us besides the "People's Movement" think we could hand pick a better government than the one in power, or one composed of an equal number of Labourites and Nationalists, but it is fortunate for us that we are not required to do so. Such a government might contain no elected representatives of the people at all, and the suggestion that the war council consisting of the "best brains" should be vested with complete executive power seems to leave Parliament high and dry.

It is the privilege of people who live under a democratic constitution to exercise an unfettered choice in the selection of their political representatives and although a dictator might choose a more efficient set of colleagues than the leader of a political party, they might be harder to get rid of when we wanted a change. Nobody in this country wants to exchange our democracy for a dictatorship, and if we cannot win the war without sacrificing democratic government it is not worth winning.

Sky Glow

Lighting restrictions to come int Lighting restrictions to come into force at noon on Thursday, May 1, have been approved by the Mayor of Hastings (Mr G. A. Maddison). Certain recommendations were made by the Hastings Reduced Lighting Committee and these have been adopted. In a statement issued yesterday Mr Maddison said:—

"The question of eliminating the sky glow of Hastings has been the matter of consideration by the Hastings Reduced Lighting Committee for some weeks past. As long ago as February, observations of the glare were taken, and then, 15½ miles from Hastings, from a launch at sea, the glare illuminated the sky, and was no doubt visible from a far greater distance.

Committee's Observations

Committee's Observations "From time to time the commit refrom time to time the committee have made observations from points surrounding Hastings, including the Havelock hills, Omahu, Te Awanga, Paki Paki and Meeanee. On these occasions the lights have been operated at five-minute intervals in the following manner: Neon

On these occasions the lights have been operated at five-minute intervals in the following manner: Neon lights off, then mercury vapour lamps in Heretaunga Street off, then street lights off, then street lights on, neon lights on and mercury vapour lights on, the switching being done in that order.

"The committee made arrangements with masters of various vessels to make observations of the sky glow, and a summary of these reports is as follows:—February 27, visible 23½ miles; March 24, 20 miles; April 2, 20 miles; April 3, 21 miles; April 4, 25 miles.

"It is the duty of the committee to prepare a scheme to eliminate this glare, and to submit the scheme to me as chairman of the local emergency precautions scheme and I am bound to put the scheme into operation. In their first report to me the Reduced Lighting Committee require me to have the following carried out:—

Three Main Points

Three Main Points

"(1) All neon lights on the outside of buildings and in shop windows to be disconnected. However, neon lights under verandahs, but not above verandahs, may be switched on between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

"(2) All gaseous discharge mercury vapour lamps to be disconnected. This applies to the street lamps in the shopping area, and for the present mercury lights.

"(3) All 200 watt street lights to be replaced by lamps not exceeding 100 watt capacity. There are only 50 of these in the borough.

"The committee advise me that these restrictions are not expected to entirely eliminate the sky glow, but that observations will be made and when necessary further restrictions may be imposed. The above

"We stepped in where angels fear to tread," said Mr E. Williams.
Mr P. F. Higgins said that he had taken a drive round the affected parts of the town just before the council met and had come to the conclusion that too many areas were unnecessarily blacked out.

"It may be of some interest to members of the council to know that I have been in contact with individuals who claim that the council is not doing all that it should do in the matter of the blackout," said Mr Hercock.

"One man has even gone so far as to say that he intends writing to the authorities," he continued. "A letter of that sort from a Napier resident will not do the town any

Mr C. D. Cox asked why Napier should be asked to suffer when other districts appeared to be ignoring the measure.

"We were proper 'greenhorns,'" commented Mr Higgins. "We walked into the question without knowing what we were doing."

The council eventually decided to make a further application to the Government for relief and to continue a number of experiments in the meantime.

He suggested that the council should communicate with the owners or agents of the property allegedly concerned requesting them to take steps to prevent a repetition of the grounds of the complaint received.

"I think that we are treading on very dangerous ground," said Mr P. F. Higgins. "What has been said here to-night is almost libelous." After Mr Higgins had reminded the council of the old adage: "The greater the truth, the greater the libel," the council decided to take the matter in committee.

During the discussion in committee the Town Clerk (Mr F. R. Watters) tabled a large file of correspondence covering the complaints received and after these had been perused by a number of councillors it was decided to take the action advocated by Mr Oldham.

CONTROVERSY CAUSED

Stronger Claims Of Past Champions

(By The Barb)

Since the Easter Handicap at the recent Auckland Racing Club's Since the Easter Handicap at the recent Auckland Racing Club's autumn meeting the question has been asked several times in turf circles which has been the best racehorse ever to race in the Dominion? When Kindergarten put in such a wonderful run at the finish of this Easter people were so carried away that he was afforded the greatest reception ever given to a winner on the Ellerslie racecourse. Perhaps, in the heat of the moment, sportsmen let their judgment run away in designating the Kincardine colt the best thoroughbred ever to race in the Dominion, while others went as far as to describe him as the best ever bred here. These remarks certainly appear exaggerated, although the "Daily Mail" does not wish to discredit the fine achievement or the fact that Kindergarten is a fine three-year-old.

The first to give his view to the Press was H. N. Wiggins, who has been associated with Kindergarten in his ten successive wins this season. Wiggins praised his mount highly and said that he was a better colt than either High Caste or Beau Vite and that he should know, as he has ridden all three. Wiggins, however, rode Beau Vite and High Caste only as two-year-olds and both were at the top of their grade at that age, while as a juvenile Kindergarten was only moderate. So, although Wiggins is fully entitled to give his version, he knows little more of the merits of the three horses than any other horseman.

THE MIGHTY GLOAMING

THE MIGHTY GLOAMING

Kindergarten has not raced in Australia, where one of Gloaming's greatest triumphs was accomplished, when he won the Chelmsford as a three-yean-old. However, the writer will stick to races run in the Dominion. When Gloaming won the Water-loo Plate at Trentham he beat such sprinters as Rational, Statuette and company over four furlongs that performance was selected as a real turf "classic." He was hemmed in and it looked as though he would not get out, but when an opening did come his horseman had to ease him first and then come on the outside and then put in a phenomenal run to win in 45secs. That day, good judges declared that the Welkin gelding ran the last furlong in a fraction under 10sec. Gloaming was a wonderful galloper and although comparisons are apt to lead nowhere, it does not seem right to say to-day that Kindergarten is a better galloper, especially as some have said that Gloaming was the fastest horse in the world.

Perhaps the greatest living authority on the merits of the thoroughbred in the Dominion is Mr J. E. Henry, who for many years was our premier handicapper. Once Mr Henry expressed his opinion in print that Advance was the best horse that ever raced in New Zealand and gave proof to substantiate his argument.

The Vanguard horse won many handicap races as well as weight-for-age. Just imagine placing Kindergarten on a higher level than Carbine the Great! Kiddies riding their ponies in New Zealand and Australia to-day describe their mounts as "Carbines," little knowing what the expression means, but so great was the brown son of Musket and Mersey that his name has for years been a household word.

Dan O'Brien's purchase raced little in New Zealand, winning the C.J.C., Welcome and Middle Park Plate. His Australian record is too long to go into. The Melbourne Cup with 10.5 on his back was not his greatest triumph. At one autumn meeting he came out and took on the best weightfor-age milers in Australia and beat them all. The same afternoon he was saddled up and beat the best two-milers in the Commonwealth. On another occasion he was asked to oppose Australia's best over 12 furlongs with the same result, and a few hours later he came out against the best three-milers and these too he led home.

Another black champion brings us nearer home and that was Mr T. H. Lowry's Bobrikoff (Finland-Gossip). "Old Bob" was one of the best horses that ever raced in this Dominion. His Classics were few and far between only because he had been withdrawn from them when an early two-year-old. As a hack he won the Hawke's Bay Stakes, then one of the most difficult short "Classics" in this country. "Old Bob" won from six furlongs to two miles and also went over to Australia and proved right up to their best w.f.a. standard form. beating the then champion, Prince Foot, over a mile and a-half, but the latter beat him later that autumn over three miles.

him later that autumn over three miles.

Bobrikoff was responsible for one of the greatest efforts ever put up in a race in the Dominion and in comparison to Kindergarten's Easter win, was a "Classic" in turfdom.

That was at the Napier spring meeting of 1909 when Bobrikoff raced as a five-year-old. The race has so often been described that it is known to the younger generation as vividly as if they had seen it. Mr Lowry's black gelding was not wound up for this particular race, as he was to have a light season in New Zealand before going to Australia in the autumn. He was listed to start in the Flying, six furlongs, for which he was weighted 10.4, but, although he was a "champ," it was recognised that he was not at concert pitch and also in his prelimininary that day he moved short from his almost chronic muscular rheumatism.

Came the dispatch and the brilliant field of sprinters quickly opened up a gap of 50 or 60 yards which was increased to over a 100 yards by the time the straight was reached and heads were turned for home. By this time all thoughts of Bobrikoff had departed, as he was so far back that all considered that he would toddle in last. Then suddenly "Bob" grabbed the bit in his teeth, laid his ears down his neck and set out after the far-distant runners. Stride after stride he made up the leeway, but 100 yards off the post it still appeared that he would be out of a place. Putting even more determination into this neverto-be-forgotten effort, he swooped down on the bunched field and actually passed them all and won by half a length.

Although it was just after the outbreak of the last European war that Desert Gold graced the New Zealand and Australian Turf, her deeds are still well remembered. She won 14 races as a three-year-old against Kindergarten's ten, as well as accumulating more prize money, so why is she not entitled to be rated a better three-year-old than Kindergarten? Great as this mare was, Mr T. H. Lowry has always maintained that Bobrikoff was the better galloper of the two.

Another great galloper that Mr Lowry raced was Estland by Finland out of a half-sister to Bobrikoff. This colt, while not sound, has a first-class record. A well-known horseman, now retired, told this writer once that Estland often started in the same race as Desert Gold, with whom he was bracketed, and had he been racing in a different ownership could have beaten Desert Gold.

THE "YELLOW" DEMONS

The late Mr George Gatenby Stead raced many champions over many years and once scooped down on Randwick to such an extent that his horses were known as the "Yellow Peril," due to Mr Stead's racing livery being yellow with a black cap.

How many champions did this gentleman produce? A glance reveals Lochiel and the old-timers would say that Lochiel was a better sprinter or stayer than Kindergarten. Then there was that great colt Menschikoff and that equally as great filly, Cruciform, who went to Australia to beat the wonder Wakeful both times they met. Nocturiform's win as a three-year-old (after coming back from his 100 yards win in the Australian Derby) in the New Zealand Cup was, under similar circumstances, greater than similar circumstances, greater than Kindergarten's in the recent Easter Handicap. Boniform (never beaten), Multiform, Golden Medallist, Sungod and dozens of others of Mr Stead's horses can boast records just as good as that of the Gisborne-owned colt to-day.

WHAT OF SASANOF?

The Melbourne Cup winner Sasanof won from five furlongs to two miles and beat such horses as Gloaming and Desert Gold. He also won the New Zealand Cup and holds the record of the highest weight ever awarded a horse in our premier handicap—10.3. The Barb does not think that Hector Gray would say that Kindergarten is a better horse than Sasanof. A KARAMU CHAMPION.

Kindergarten is undoubtedly a class colt and has galloping ability essential to a real champion. He will undoubtedly reach greater heights, but in the meantime followers of racing should not let their judgment get out of land.
