## ARMED CLASH AT BASRA

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received May 4, 9.45 p.m.)

The war in the Middle East has flared up in a new and threatening theatre and General Sir Archibald Wavell and his Imperial troops face the supreme task of combating a pincer Panzer drive against the Suez Canal from Syria and Iraq and from Libya.

There is ample evidence that Axis inspiration is responsible for the Iraqi administration's hostility. Franz von Papen and other German agents have been intriguing for months throughout the Middle East and it is now expected that the Germans will make a determined push across the Aegean Sea to Syria, achieving the isolation of Turkey and putting a new strain on General Wavell's forces, while applying pressure in the Western Desert.

Iraq is unquestionably working with the Axis. Von Papen has left Berlin for Ankara and the Turks expect that he will make demands for the passage of troops and

The radio added that Britain had at least 50,000 troops in Iraq.

It is officially stated in London that a clash occurred in the Basra area between British and Iraqi forces. The Iraqi were driven off by our bombing and artillery fire.

The Baghdad Radio announced a decree dismissing British from the State service and told Iraqis to report to the police any foreign 'planes or parachutists.

The concentration of Iraqi troops round Habbaniyah, the British air base 60 miles west of Bagdad, has unfortunately led to a clash with the British forces stationed there, said a British Official Wireless message.

"The 'German tourists' in Iraq are alarmingly more numerous than we thought," says the "Daily Express," "enough, it is believed, have filtered in to cause a real threat to the British Army in Palestine.

Thousands of British, New Zealand and Australian troops evacuated from Greece are already in line for the defence of the Middle East against the swelling German contingents in Africa. The situation does not permit of much rest for the soldiers after the strain of the Greek campaign nor, for the most part, do they want it. Their spirits are still high despite the three hellish weeks in Greece.

With the invading army from the

with the invading army from the Western Desert once more on Egyptian soil and the German 'planes which wrought terrible destruction in Greece flying across the Mediterranean in groups of 50 or 60 direct to their North African bases, all the indications are that action will not be long in coming. The new material, much of which is American, pouring into Egypt in recent weeks has more than offset that lost in Greece. In addition, a large part of the army which conquered Abyssinia is now free for service in North Africa.

Cat and mouse operations have been the principal form of fighting since the Germans became established near Soilum, except for great sweeps by British mobile columns round the Germans' right flank.

The majority of the fires were quickly extinguished.
Other raiders blitzed the northeast of England and south and south-west towns. London had its south-west towns. London had its first night alert for a week.
Raiders in the north-east dropped explosives and incendiaries at a number of points. Bombs, dropped from a great height, demolished houses in a coastal town and hit an A.R.P. casualty station, killing and injuring the occupants.
In another town a bomb struck a shelter containing 180 people, killing two and injuring others.

#### Churchill's Assurance That Day Of Freedom Will Come

(British Official Wireless.) (Received May 4, 9.15 p.m.) RUGBY, April 3.

The Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill) in a broadcast to the Poles, said: "To-night I am speaking to the Polish people all over the world. This is the 150th anniversary of the adoption by your Parliament of your Constitution. You are right to keep this day as a national holiday because your Constitution of 1791 was a pattern of enlightened political thought. Your neighbours in those bygone days saw in the adoption of this system the beginning of the regeneration or Poland. They hastened to enforce the partition of your country before the Polish nation could consolidate its

"The Germans became alarmed at the success achieved by the Polish in setting their house in order. They saw that all their aggressive designs would be thwarted by the growth of a strong and independent Polish State.

"At the time of the brutal German attack of September, 1939, your country had, in the face of tremendous difficulties, achieved notable progress during the 20 years of its revived national existence. To complete this work of national reconstruction you needed, and you hoped for, a similar period of peaceful development. When the call came Poland did not hesitate. She did not hesitate to risk all the progress sher national honour.

"It has been our privilege to come to know your Prime Minister and Commander-in-Chief (General Sikorski) whose leadership, energy, and unfailing confidence have been a source of great encouragement to all who have met him.

"Meanwhile, your sailors have been earning our respect and the high esteem of their comrades in the Royal Navy and the merchant marine for their share in the tasks of maintaining those free communications with America and the outside world which will mean the liberation of your country. The presence here of your Government and armed forces has enabled us to get to know each other better and get to know each other better and to build the foundations of British-Polish relations after common victory and the restoration of your

freedom.

"Our thoughts go out to-night not only to those exiled Poles whom we have learned to respect and love but even to those in the grip of the ruthless oppression which has fallen upon races and States whose history had made them a part of the general life of Christendom when the Prussians were no better than barbarians and the German Empire no more than a conglomeration of pumpernickel principalities.

Premium On Lighter Grades

The seriousness of the meat situation was shown to members of the Matapiro branch of the Farmers' Union when information received from the Dominion president ceived from the Dominion president said that a further 50,000 tons of storage capacity would be required to cope with the position as it will be by the end of the 1941-42 season, even with the exclusion from export of the classes of meat recommended by the Meat Production Committee viz all eves bonders beef tee, viz., all ewes, boneless beef, bobby calves, and chopper pigs. As a result of a discussion on this question a resolution is to be for-warded to the Provincial Executive

warded to the Provincial Executive as follows:—

"With the object of reducing the total tonnage of exportable lamb and so allowing of a greater allotment of space for other classes of meat, the Matapiro branch urges that by way of incentive to produce the lighter weights the farmer be given a premium on these grades."

The branch endorsed the resolution recently passed by the Provincial Executive urging the prohibition of the killing of white-faced ewe lambs.



#### N.Z. WAR INDUSTRIES

One of the most remarkable achievements in New Zealand history is reviewed in the broadcast address of the Minister of Munitions and Supply (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan), a report of which is published this morning.

The mobilisation of industry for war purposes has been of necessity a rush job, but the results, particularly in view of the fact that secondary industries have long been the poor relations of the Dominion's economy, are little short of amazing. To-day the Minister reports that not only are New Zealand factories clothing the Dominion's soldiers, but that our workshops are turning out a stream of munitions and equipment on a scale that would have seemed incredible a few years ago.

Some of the most striking points of the review are: Hundreds of thousands of bombs fabricated and finished; countless thousands of .303 cartridges have been and are being made; the production of trench mortars is going ahead; work on high explosives and chemicals for bombs is proceeding; the Dominion is undertaking the construction of its own minesweepers. And on top of all this there is the manufacture of cartridge clips, steel helmets, cordite containers and innumerable other of the odds and ends which go to the making of a modern war machine.

This development has two major effects on the war campaign of the Empire as a whole. In the first place, it means that New Zealand is making a notable industrial contribution to the common cause and is beginning to stand on its own feet in a comparatively new field; and in the second place, the expansion of war industry in the Dominion means a corresponding decrease in the burden carried by Great Britain. In these days, when British industry is being subjected to attacks on a scale which, even in the last war, was regarded as belonging exclusively to the battlefields, any such assistance from the Dominions is of vital importance. Further, home production of war essentials has a tremendous value in relieving the strain on British shipping

The situation revealed in Mr Sullivan's statement will probably come as a surprise to most New Zealanders, but the results achieved by the Dominion's extemporised armament industry are both creditable and encouraging.

#### MORE PINCER STRATEGY

The German manoeuvres in the Near East, following the Balkan campaign, have now developed into the familiar pincer movement, this time with the Suez Canal as the main object. The flare-up in Iraq, while something of a sideline (as the Mesopotamian campaign was in the last war) is still a part of the central plan to split the British forces and to cut the Empire's great lines of communication.

It is hardly likely that Turkey will agree to any German demand for the passage of troops to Syria, but it is probable that the Greek Aegean islands will be used as stepping-stones across the eastern Mediterranean and that every effort will be made to isolate Turkey with a view to dealing with her at a more convenient opportunity.

The apparent success of German intrigue in Iraq has created a difficult, but by no means disastrous, situation for Great Britain. The difficulty arises from the necessity of maintaining strong defence forces in both Egypt and Palestine, while nothing has occurred to warrant any relaxing of the guard maintained in the Far East and in Great Britain itself. Further, it must be remembered that next to Iraq lies Iran—always more friendly to Germany than to Britain—and beyond Iran is India.

The outbreak in Iraq leads to the conclusion that Germany is planning to defeat Great Britain by attacks on communications and on outlying Imperial outposts rather than by direct assault on the British Isles. To achieve this object Egypt and Suez must be conquered. If Iraq can be bought or persuaded to fight Germany's battle, so much the better for the Nazi plan. It is not particularly subtle strategy, but it is the sort of thing which the Germans love, and the archspy von Papen has had a great deal of practice at it. There can be little doubt that he has used his position as Ambassador at Ankara to concoct the plot in Iraq, and German money must have helped to bring it to fruition.

Thus the Near East becomes the new theatre of war.

TRAGIC ACCIDENT

Clothes Line Was "Alive"

A Hastings woman was fatally electrocuted while hanging out washing at her home at 11.20 a.m. on Saturday. She was:

Mrs Effie Elizabeth Marshall, 48, wife of the Rev. F. W. Marshall, minister of St. John's Presbyterian Church.

The accident occurred when Mrs Marshall was putting clothes on the line in the back yard of her residence, 609 Nelson Street. She reached up, grasped the line, and was flung backward, striking her head on the concrete path.

Mr Marshall ran from the house and found his wife lying unconscious on the ground. He immediately applied artificial respiration, realising that she had received an electric shock. When she failed to regain consciousness he telephoned Dr D. A. Bathgate, but further respiration proved unsuccessful. Mrs Marshall was rushed to the Memorial Hospital, Hastings, and placed in the iron

was rushed to the Memorial Hospital, Hastings, and placed in the iron lung, but she did not respond after five hours' continuous treatment.

It is believed that the clothes-line became "alive" through contact with a sagging 230-volt power line connecting the house and the adjacent motor garage. In normal conditions the clothes line might have been touched and no shock received, but on Saturday, when ground and wire were soaked by rain, dangerous conditions prevailed.

An inquest will be opened to-day.

The death occurred early this morning, after a brief illness, of Sir James Parr, the former New Zealand High Commissioner in London. He was 71 years of age.

Sir Christopher James Parr was born at Cambridge in 1869. In 1887, he entered the teaching profession, but ill-health compelled him to turn

to law.

At the general Parliamentary election of 1905, he stood as a candidate for Auckland West, but was defeated by Mr C. H. Poole. He was elected Mayor of Auckland in 1911.

He was elected M.P. for Eden in 1914, holding the seat until his resignation in 1926. He was given Cabinet rank in the Massey Administration as Minister of Education in 1920, and was appointed Minister of Justice in 1923, a portfolio he held for three years. He was Postmaster-General (1925-26) and Minister of Education (1920-26). Sir James received his knighthood in 1925, and was appointed High Commissioner for New Zealand in London in 1926, holding office until January, 1930.

## FLOODS SWEEP SOUTHERN HAWKE'S BAY

## HEAVY LOSS TO FARMERS IN WIDE AREA

## Roads Blocked And Bridges Destroyed When Rivers Rise Swiftly

The heaviest flooding in living memory occurred in the Porangahau-Weber-Akitio districts yesterday after a night of torrential rain in which 12in. of rain was recorded in 12 hours.

torrential rain in which 12in, of rain was recorded in 12 hours.

Inundated roadways, numerous slips and destroyed bridges isolated the area, and it is expected that access may not be possible for one or two days.

Stock losses are estimated to total several thousand, while there are few farmers in the district who have not suffered heavily through damage in some form or another.

The Porangahau River broke its banks in several places early yesterday morning, flooding the pa in the low-lying section of the township of Porangahau. Warned of the danger only just in time, the Maoris escaped with a few clothes and blankets.

Bridges and roads suffered severely and several local bodies will be faced with heavy expenditure to restore yesterday's damage. Two large bridges were swept away yesterday morning and until they are replaced a large number of settlers will be seriously inconvenienced.

The newly-constructed 100ft. Akitio Bridge, five miles from the mouth of the Akitio River and near Sir Alfred Ransom's property, was carried away at 8 a.m. As the water rose driftwood began collecting against the decking and it became abvious to those who were watching that the structure was weakening beneath the strain.

With a great crash the bridge broke free at one end, swinging on the torrent until the other end tore loose from the retaining pylons, and the entire structure was carried downstream toward the sea. On the rising waters there was ample room for the bridge to float, and it is feared that the structure, which cost £3000 to build a short time ago, will be swept out to sea.

The Parakatua Bridge, a 50ft. wooden structure also spanning the Akitio River, was swept away about an hour later. The terrific pressure of water made the structure quiver and sway, and the end came when a large tree became entangled in the decking, the bridge breaking free at both ends and sweeping away on the water. The bridge linked Weber and Wimbledon, and a number of farmers are cut off as a result of the collapse. It will cost £1500 to replace.

Carrying the bulk of the flood

Carrying the bulk of the flood waters from the inundated inland country, the Akitio River rose at an almost incredible rate, a small stream on Saturday night becoming a raging bank-to-bank torrent a few hours later. The river rose 50ft. in a few hours, comparing with the 37ft. rise recorded in the district's previous record flood of 1937.

\*\*Mill's Heavy Loss\*\*

At noon Hunter's mill at Waione, seven miles from Weber, was completely under water, and the men's living quarters had been washed away down the river. More than 100,000ft. of logs and a large quantity of sawn timber was carried away and considerable damage done to the plant.

The road from Weber to Danne-virke yesterday afternoon was cov-ered by 12ft. of water and in addi-tion was blocked by a number of slips. The Weber-Herbertville Road slips. The Weber-Herbertville Road miserable hours in their uncomslips. The Weber-Herbertville Road and the Weber-Pongaroa roads also are blocked by slips and will take some time to clear. The Porangahau-Waipukurau road is blocked by water and slips, but an effort is to be made this morning to clear it with Public Works Department bull-dozers. It is estimated that returning roads to serviceable condition, will occupy at least two months.

In some instances the farmers awakened to the fact that they must abandon efforts to rescue stock and turn to the welfare of themselves and their families.

Mr R. O. Christopher, Akitio, lost 100 lambs in one paddock, while numerous other farmers were similarly unfortunate. As darkness fell last night small, raised pieces of land dotted with huddled sheep and cattle could be seen on an expanse of water. Heavy Stock Losses

Holt-King, postmaster at Weber, played an important role throughout the day, dealing effectively with numerous problems of maintaining telephonic communication. The normal two-hour Sunday service was dispensed with, the exchanges maintaining a full-time service.

Miss M. Beamsley, postmistress at Herbertville, assisted by linking Weber with Dannevirke and providing an outlet for calls from the flooded areas.

Rivers Returning To Normal

TEMPORARY RISE Widespread Rain During Week-End

DELUGE IN TOWNS

The widespread fall of rain over the province during the week-end resulted in reports from the back-country of swollen tributaries and rising rivers, but from Whana Whana Mr F. N. H. Beamish last night said that the Ngaruroro River was going down and that no trouble was anticipated. Indications on Saturday were that the river would rise considerably but a slackening in the fall yesterday eased the situation.

The Tutaekuri River for a time carried a heavy volume of water, but was reported to be almost back to normal last night.

In Hastings the downpour resulted in flooded channels on all sides, and a feature of the rain was the amount of surface water which remained in some areas long after the fall had ceased. An assurance that a really worthwhile job was being done in the manufacture of munitions in New Zealand was given by the Minister of Munitions (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan) in a broadcast address on Sunday night.

In the main centres recently parades of defence and home service units had been organised. Included in those parades were Bren-gun carriers and men wearing steel helmets and so on. Those artcles were now being made in our own workshops and factories, and Mr Sullivan stressed the fact that the contributions of people to the National Savings accounts helped and would go on helping to make still more.
