ALL IN GOOD TIME

There is a time for everything, and it is hard to believe that the moment is opportune for a detailed statement of Britain's war and peace aims. Yet on both sides of the Atlantic one hears talk of the necessity for a "psychological offensive" allegedly designed to sustain public morale and to counteract German propaganda in favour of Hitler's "New

If anyone outside a mental hospital has any illusions left regarding Hitler's "New Order," he or she is unlikely to be appreciably influenced by anything so intangible as a "psychological offensive," and it is so little to the advantage of Great Britain to become engrossed in post-war problems before the war is won that one might be pardoned for suspecting the "psychological offensive" to be a subtle suggestion emanating from the enemy.

Whatever the motives of high policy behind the Chamberlain Government's ill-advised ultimatum to Germany that the invasion of Poland would be followed by a declaration of war from Great Britain, the prime object of Mr Churchill's Government is to save Britain and the Empire from the fate of the occupied countries and ultimately to liberate those countries so that they may be free to determine their political and economic future as seems best to themselves. Both purposes can be achieved only by the defeat of Germany. Unless this is accomplished, it does not matter much what our ideas may be about the future of Europe or a better social order in Great Britain. The only thing that matters at the moment is how the moral strength and the material resources at the disposal of the democracies can be employed to bring about the downfall of the enemy.

Still, there are always people who are determined to be two jumps ahead of others, even if they leap without much regard to a landing place, and some of them are planning in their minds a kind of super-state comprising the countries of Europe, which they vaguely suggest may come together in a federal union. All these diverse peoples with their differences of race, religion, language and varying degrees of political development, are to be represented in some kind of constituent assembly in which the will of the majority is to Thereafter they are expected to settle down in a happy European family like the United States of America. Trade barriers are to be removed, the resources of all are to be available to each, and a good time is to be had by everyone.

Others who find the issues of world politics a little beyond them, prefer to speculate about the future course of events nearer home. We have sincere and earnest men like J. B. Priestley telling us that the post-war England must be so planned that never again will there be unemployment and distress. There must be a higher standard of living, proper housing and a sufficiently equitable distribution of the national income to admit of comfort and happiness for all. He is supported in a measure by the eminent economist and financier J. M. Keynes, director of a large insurance corporation and other companies. Mr Keynes says that the financing of the reconstruction will present no problems, which is rather an astonishing admission from a man in his position and indicates, after all, that some of the lessons of the great depression have really been learned.

It is asking a little too much, however, to expect the advent of revolutionary changes in the social and economic structure of Great Britain without intense opposition from vested interests. They have always fought to the last ditch in the past and can reasonably be expected to do so again. Specifically to set out plans either for a new political organisation of Europe, or a remodelled internal economy in Great Britain is inviting controversy on matters that are better deferred till victory is assured. We cannot afford to become involved in disputes over these things at present. Interesting and important as they are, differences of opinion about them would provide a fatal distraction in the midst of

a war to the death. When Hitler is defeated and the Nazi regime is replaced by a German Government that is fit to associate on equal terms with the governments of other European countries, then only will it be possible to bring in any "New Orders" worthy of the name.

Because of the nature of the operations in which New Zealand troops had recently participated, it would be readily appreciated that considerable disorganisation must have taken place. It was anticipated however, that detailed information would be available in the very near future.

Ensuring Accuracy

Mr Jones emphasised the necessity for ensuring absolute accuracy in recording casualties.

Following the most careful and rapid checking of casualty lists, the next-of-kin were immediately advised and, after a reasonable lapse of time, casualties in the New Zealand forces overseas were released for publication.

Delay may be caused by the disorganisation of communications.
Extreme care in the compilation of casualty lists had to be exercised. At the overseas base casualties were carefully checked and then were cabled to Army Headquarters, Wellington, where they were subjected to a further check to avoid the possibility of error during transmission.

Mr Jones said that before telegrams were dispatched to next-of-kin, extracts from the cable from the overseas base were compared with details on the soldier's file kept in New Zealand in order to avoid the possibility of a mistake in identification.

After identification had been established a telegram was sent to the next-of-kin giving all the particulars then available as to the nature of the casualty.

Much extra work was at times entailed for the department by people making further inquiries after receiving a telegram containing advice of a casualty. All the information then available to the Army Department was in these telegrams, and the next-of-kin would be advised as soon as any additional information was received from Overseas.

Information available in London proves that the figures he gave of the German troops employed in the campaign are quite inaccurate and a certain suspicion attaches to his extremely low estimate of the German losses—losses which might have been admitted at a higher and possibly more truthful figure without danger to prestige.

BETTER PROPAGANDA NEEDED

Britain's Requirements

CLEAR STATEMENT OF WAR AIMS

Britain should loose a "psychological offensive" based on a clear statement of its war and peace aims to counteract Hitler's propaganda which has kept high the fighting spirit of his troops, the American Institute for Propaganda Analysis declared in a recent review.

The Institute, speaking through its monthly bulletin, Propaganda Analysis, observes that, owing to clashes of viewpoint between conservative and liberal supporters of Britain, it was difficult for Prime Minister Churchill to state anything much more specific than that Britain's aim was "to defeat Hitler."

"Churchill and British spokesmen like Viscount Halifax," the bulletin declares, "seek to talk in general terms: victory over Hitler, and a world so reconstructed as to avoid another war. Reconstructed how, and to what and? This question.

Reinforces Propaganda

"When Hitler talks of his relatively clear war aims, he reinforces the effects of propaganda processes on the Germans. Thus he whips up the fighting zeal of his soldiers. He makes them missionaries for the 'new order' that he proclaims he will build in Europe.

"The fact that he gave work to the unemployed in Germany and created a semblance of security and a sense of achievement strengthened his propaganda. He now leads his people to believe that the British would destroy these benefits, which the Nazis say, the Germans possess in greater degree than the English."

The Institute recalls the recent letter published in "The Times" of London from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, Cardinal Hinsley, and Walter A. Armstrong, moderator of the Free Church Council, calling for fundamental social reforms in Britain. However, it argues that if Prime Minister Churchill should state specific goals that might appeal to workmen, idealistic churchmen and social scientists, he might "alienate powerful individuals who have no desire to see a British victory followed by socialism" in Britain or elsewhere.

New Weapon Needed
On the other hand: if Mr Church-

New Weapon Needed On the other hand; if Mr Churchill should state as war aims the maintenance of the status quo, he would weaken the support from other millions of people, the Institute suggests.

would weaken the support from other millions of people, the Institute suggests.

Emphasising the need for some resolving of the dilemma, if only for its powerful effect on the war, the bulletin recalls that Captain Liddell Hart, British military writer, called for a "psychological offensive" last January.

"'Merely to tell the Germans that the war will go on until the Nazis are destroyed,' Captain Hart wrote recently, 'would be singularly ineffective,'" the bulletin adds: "He pointed out that in answer the Nazis naturally would say to the German people:

"If we disappear, the Treaty of Versallles will be a feather bed compared to a Treaty of Berlin drafted by Sir Robert Vansittart, chief diplonatic adviser of the British Foreign Secretary."

"'We must create a new order in Britain,' wrote Captain Hart, 'ready for extension abroad, that will be superior in nature and attraction to the Nazi order.'"

MR C. O. MORSE TO SUEZ CANAL: LIFELINE OR AN AXIS STILETTO?

Why The Nazis Want To Dominate PROGRESS SHOWN AT The Famous Empire Sea Route

Seventy odd years ago a strip of waterless desert stretched for 101 miles from the swamps that fringed the eastern Mediterranean to the Gulf of Suez.

Just before the war, through those 101 miles steamed more than 6000 ships a year, and half of them were British.

That is the meaning of the Suez Canal to Britain, the reason why Empire forces are fighting on many fronts to stop the German pincers closing on this vital waterway.

To other nations the canal is the link between East and West; to us it is an essential hyphen in Anglo-New Zealand communications.

Yet not to Britain, but to a Frenchman, and French backing, was due the cutting of the narrow Isthmus of Suez that once linked Africa and Asia.

Africa and Asia.

As the sun was setting over the desert on November 15, 1854, Ferdinand de Lesseps, brilliant French diplomat, sat in the tent of the Egyptian Viceroy, Said Pasha, whom he had known since boyhood, and broached his salvene for the and broached his scheme for the

Said agreed readily, as much, say romanticists, because he admired de Lesseps's horsemanship as for the actual value of the project.

Project Opposed.

Britain opposed the scheme.

"The kindliest thing that one can say about so absurd a project," said Prime Minister Lord Palmerston in 1859, "is that it is the greatest folly yet proposed to the simplicity and credulity of the people."

Palmerston frankly feared that the canal would endanger Britain's commercial and maritime relations by "opening a new route which, be-

by "opening a new route which, being free to the ships of all nations, would deprive us of the advantages

we at present possess."

The Frenchman was undaunted, even though British investors refused to subscribe to the company's initial £8,000,000 capital. Frenchmen took up half the shares and eventually in 1860 Said Pasha was persuaded to buy the remaining unallotted 176,602.

Britain Acquires Interest. Those shares shrewd Disraeli 15 years later bought from Said Pasha's successor, the Egyptian Khedive, Ismail, whom wine, women and song had reduced to penury, for

The buy gave the British Government 10 seats on the board of 32 directors of the Suez Canal com-

directors of the Suez Canal company, and, being a one-government block, practically a controlling interest among the other factions that comprised the board.

How strange to-day sounds that fear of Palmerston of 1859.

For through the Suez Canal in past months have passed New Zealand troopships and supplies to Egypt and Libya.

Through it since the war started tankers have carried oil from the

tankers have carried oil from the British depot at Aden, from Bahrein in the Persian Gulf, to fuel the Mediterranean Fleet, and the tanks and trucks that are fighting for the Allies in scattered Middle East fronts.



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
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
