It may take love to make the world go around and money to make the mare go, but it takes only a camera and a few lights to start Bing Crosby and Bob Hope off on an ad libbing duel.

The top comedians of the screen and air are recognised as the fastest extemporaneous talkers in either medium, and when they are teamed, as they are in Paramount's hilarious 'ROAD TO ZANZIBAR,' the results are little short of terrific.

Hastings Trained Horses Given Final Gallops

NAPIER PARK RACES

Laughing Song, Diana Tatrix And Endorsement Do Best

(By The Barb)

Yesterday morning, under perfect conditions, the Hastings-trained horses engaged at the Napier Park Racing Club's winter meeting, to be held on the Greenmeadows racecourse to-morrow and Monday, were given their final gallops.

The last week's work on the Hastings tracks reveals that the horses trained here should put up a very creditable performance at the Napier meeting, while the few that have already gone to Ellerslie and the trio who leave to-day for Wanganui should keep up the good average of the horses trained in this centre.

Both the plough and the course proper were in great order for these final gallops but the conditions were more like spring than winter. The times were a little faster than on Tuesday morning as most of the horses were galloping against the watch for pipe-openers.

No visitors had then arrived but some were due last evening while the others were never on the course proper with Royal Stuart home easily first by three or four lengths. The surprising part of this gallop was that they ran the first half-mile in the fair time of 51secs.

WORKED IMPRESSIVELY Worton (P. Atkins) worked impressively although the time recorded was mediocre, but as he was being eased over the last furlongs 51 for the half mile and 40 for the last three was, in the circumstances good.

The first to get going was Stolen Coat (L. Barnett) who ran the four furlongs against the bit in 42.3. This Pink Coat filly has no immediate engagements but is being prepared for the early spring.

On the course proper Vin d'Honneur (G. Stowe) and Burma (E. Stowe) were associated in what resulted in no more than a working gallop for the former, who was pulling her rider out of the saddle all the way to return of four furlongs. Vin d'Honneur appears the logical favourite for Saturday's Maiden Scurry.

BOOKED FOR WANGANUI Authress (W. L. Aitken), who leaves this morning for Wanganui, was galloped a mile alone on the course proper, this being her final for the Connolly Handicap.

The Defoe mare recorded a time of 1.45 for the distance, doing each half mile in 52secs. In Saturday's race she will be ridden by the successful apprentice rider, W. W. Cullen. On the plough Recompense (L. Cullen) after a slow start completed five furlongs unaccompanied in 67.3, but this filly was not hurting herself.

The juveniles, Parvati (S. Dockery) and Proven (G. Phelps) ran half a mile in 51secs, to finish on even terms. It may be mentioned that the trestles instead of being 39ft. out from the rails were only 24ft. thus the full distance on this track was not covered.

BEST OF MORNING The best of the morning from a time point of view was credited to Diana Tatrix (L. Barnett) and Laughing Song (W. L. Aitken) who recorded 61.3 and 61.4 respectively. Both were kept up to their work over the final furlong and breasted the tape together. If anything, Diana Tatrix was a shade the better.

Support (W. J. Mudford), who will not race until Monday at Napier, was not allowed her head where running three furlongs on the plough in 40 secs. This Bulandshar mare is in particularly fine order.

On the course proper Captain Star (E. Stowe) and Siyana (P. Atkins) both two-year-olds, were associated in a trial over half a mile. As both are being considered for Saturday's scurry, the gallop was watched with interest. Both showed prominently and ran the distance in a shade better than 50secs., but there was little to choose between them, although Siyana, on the morning, was ridden a little harder at the finish.

Hunting Moments (Kilgour) who has been working on the roads for two months and returned to the tracks only a couple of days ago, was sent an easy three furlongs with Achilles Song (W. L. Aitken) in 41.1. The former has been nominated for the Hawke's Bay winter meeting.

TO START ON MONDAY Centrepoise (F. Hannahrnan), who will not start at Greenmeadows until the second day, after working twice round at home, brushed home the last three furlongs against the bit on the plough in 41secs.

Cherry Hunter (H. J. Callahan) was pulling hard when returning 42 secs. for an easy three furlongs on the plough. He has speed but has yet to develop stamina, and is improving in this direction.

A fair effort went to the credit of Endorsement (S. Pell) who ran five furlongs on the plough by herself in 63.3, the first quarter occupying 24.4 and the first half mile 50.3. This was the best gallop recorded on this track.

On the course proper Earl'scourt (C. Cameron) took 52 for four furlongs but as he was carrying approximately 10st. it was a fair effort. The last three furlongs was run in a shade better than 40secs.

Acre's Beauty (F. Power) was worked a mile and a half at an easy pace and ran the last half mile in ever time. Later she was galloped a furlong in 12.1secs. She is in the scurry on Saturday and although her credentials are not very flattering she is likely to show some speed.

Singapore (H. J. Callahan) was striding along evenly throughout his five furlongs in 65secs, but it is doubtful if he could have improved on this time.

AGAINST THE BIT Cattanach (H. J. Callahan) and his stable-mate, Stella Lux (S. Pell) were against the bit for most of five furlongs run in 65.4, the latter half mile taking 52secs. Of the two the former impressed the more.

Over six furlongs on the course proper Proclamation (G. Stowe) was in front of the dilatory track worker, Lambourn (B. Stowe), over three-quarters of a mile in 1.18.1. Proclamation went pleasingly, but as finding it hard to make the open

Wanganui Winter Meeting

SINGLE POOL

Principal Events Discussed

BRIGHT PROSPECTS

(By "THE BARB") The old-established Wanganui Jockey Club will hold its winter meeting on the Awapuni racecourse to-morrow and Monday, when judging by the acceptances it should be an interesting gathering.

The principal events, the Century Hurdles, Wanganui Steeplechase and Connolly Handicap, are all run to-morrow. At one time these races had an important bearing on the big Auckland winter meeting, but the change of dates and the introduction of the Waikato winter meeting have proved anything but beneficial to the Wanganui club.

THE CENTURY HURDLES Hawke's Bay has supplied its share of winners of this race, particularly when it was run over two miles and a quarter. About 30 years ago both Waipu and Wimmera from here won this race and then went on to win the Great Northern Hurdles and may start first favourite this year.

Limbohm is engaged in these two races, but he can hardly be expected to compete to-morrow at Awapuni and again at Ellerslie on Monday.

This year's field has drawn only seven acceptors. Smoke Screen heads the list with 11.5, but want of racing condition should tell against him. Limbohm is working impressively at Hastings on the flat and his chances will be held in high esteem if he had done more schooling.

Foxiana is a promising young hurdler and may start first favourite (the betting is of the single pool) as he has already proved his ability. Segra so far is no more than useful.

Great Quex appeals at the weights but Foxiana's most dangerous opponent may be Eupatrid, another young but promising hurdler. Raana lacks experience. Foxiana, Eupatrid and Limbohm may be the betting order to-morrow.

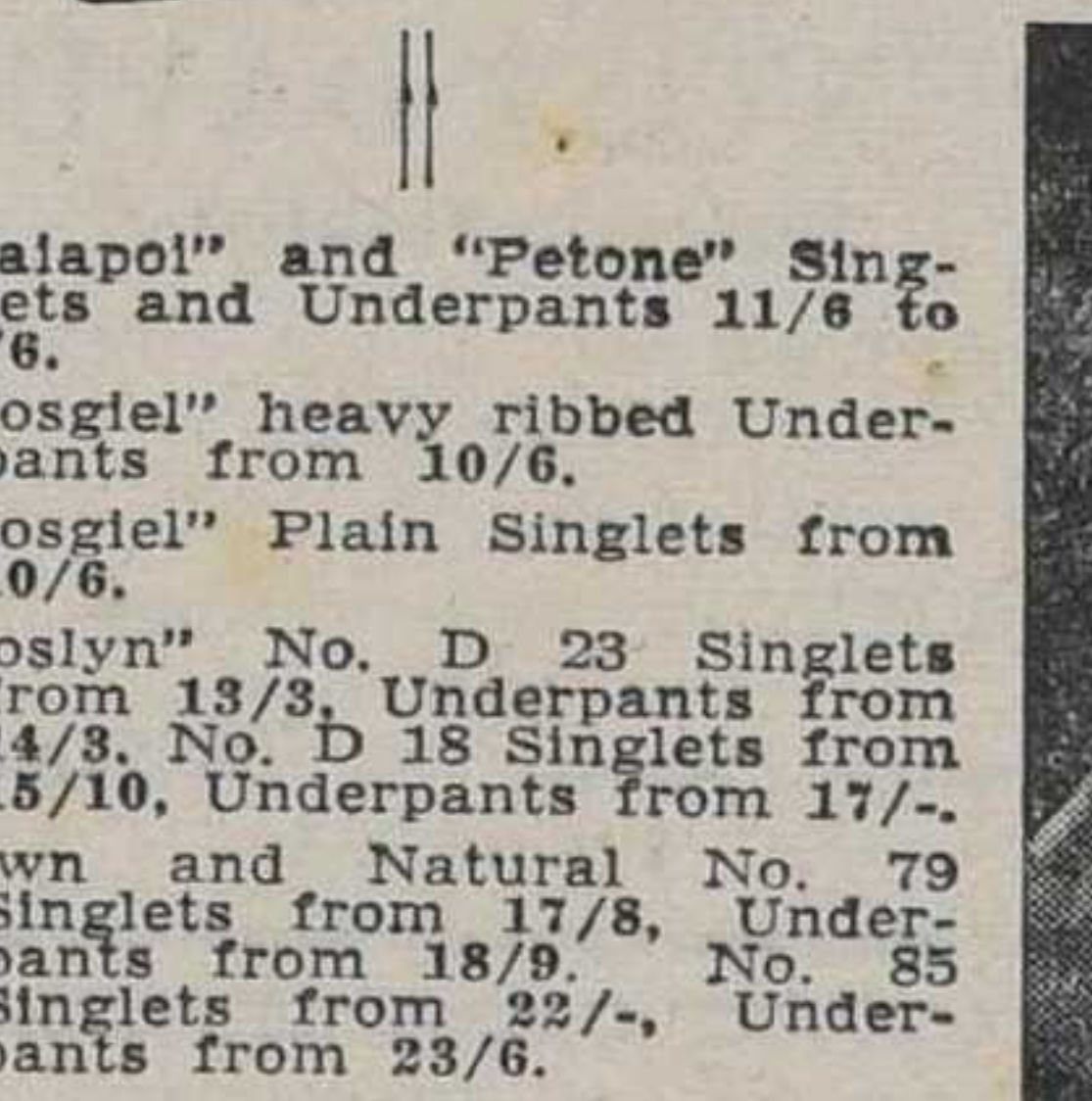
