Hitler Will Shortly Proclaim A "United States Of Europe"

NEW YORK, June 4.

Dr. Martin Fuchs, of Chile, formerly of the Australian Government's Press Bureau, writing in the "New York Times" says that about next Monday Hitler will proclaim all Europe a federation of States under German management. This information has been received via Lisbon and by Archduke Otto of Hapsburg, at present resident in the United

The proclamation will be designed as a psychological war manoeuvre to offset the swing of American opinion towards aid for Britain.

Hitler will also say that with the establishment of a "United States of Europe" the German war aims are accomplished, therefore there is no reason to continue the war.

A federation of States with policymaking in Berlin, Individual States will maintain only local police

Currency will be unified into a "Europe mark." Customs barriers will disappear. There will be a single German High Command, with Italians holding certain key positions

Over 3000 Soldiers Failed To Escape From Crete

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received June 5, 1.30 a.m.)

MELBOURNE, June 4. More than half the Australian troops who fought at Crete are missing. Of 6486 members of the A.I.F. on the island when the German attack was launched, 3599 are not

accounted for. The total number so far reported evacuated is 2887. These included 218 wounded.

This announcement was made to-day by the Minister of the Army (the Hon. P. C. Spender).

According to dispatches received by Mr Spender from the commanding officer of the A.I.F. (Major-General Sir Thomas Blamey) there were 6486 men of the A.I.F. in Crete, of which 2887 are reported to have been evacuated, including 218 wounded. The number unaccounted for is 3500.

"It is clear from the dispatches," Mr Spender said, "that a substantial body of Australians in the north were probably cut off.

"The number of missing may be varied by later reports, but it is clear that of the total losses a large number are prisoners." Revived



REVOLT IN THE DESERT

Behind all the manoeuvring for position which is going on along the frontiers of Syria looms one of the greatest of the German objectives in both this war and the last-a Moslem revolt against the authority of the British Empire in the East. The fact that Rashid Ali's coup in Iraq has failed does not alter the situation and there can be no doubt that Germany is still employing every means in her reach to keep the Arab nations in a state of unrest.

The swift action taken by Great Britain to restore order in Iraq was inspired by more than the threat of German penetration. If Rashid Ali had succeeded the Germans would have had a valuable propaganda weapon in the fact that Britain's imperial control in the Near East had been challenged under native leadership. And had Baghdad remained in hostile hands, Britain would have lost for an indefinite time the use of all the overland lines of communication from the Mediterranean to the Persian Gulf, Turkey and Iran.

The fall of Rashid Ali has almost certainly averted more or less serious disturbances in Palestine. It has also strengthened the hand of the Emir Abdullah, the pro-British King of Transjordan, who sheltered Abdullah Illah, the Regent of Iraq, until his restoration a few days ago.

The spotlight of the war has now moved to the area bordering the Mediterranean to the east, and the main problem for Britain is to prevent German infiltration into Syria while maintaining the defences of Palestine at the highest possible pitch. While Britain has hitherto refrained from any important move against Syria—largely on account of a somewhat inexplicable desire not to offend French susceptibilities—it must now be conceded that it has become advisable to occupy that Arab territory if it is militarily possible to do so. Such a development, besides countering the present German threat to Egypt, would eliminate the German plot to encourage and organise a Moslem revolt throughout the vast area between the Mediterranean and the Persian Gulf.

In working out this plot, Germany has been helped by the fact that for 20 years the Arab world has been seething with an intense nationalism the importance and significance of which has been little appreciated in the West. The revolt against the British in Iraq in the years immediately following the Versailles Peace Conference awakened considerable agitation among the Arabs of Syria and had its effect upon the rising under Ibn Saud in the heart of Arabia. Later came the serious uprising against the weak and inefficient French administration in the mandated territory of Syria, and this was followed, in the 1930's, by disorders in Palestine which flared into open arti-British warfare over the Palestine which flared into open anti-British warfare over the question of Jewish immigration.

The situation was clarified in 1939, when the Arabs of Palestine obtained a major concession from the British Government, and a British White Paper was issued providing for a limitation of Jewish immigration to Palestine to remove the Arabs' fear of one day becoming a minority in their own country. Nevertheless, Palestine and Syria remain the focusing points of Arab unrest, and the bitter enmity towards Zionism and towards European (French) domination in Syria provides some useful material for the German propagandists and trouble-makers. The basic demands of the Arab nationalists are for the complete independence of all the Arab lands, a confederation of Arab States, and the end of political Zionism, and these are things which Germany can promise

very glibly as long as such promises suit her policy. The strongest card in the British hand in this highly delicate situation lies in the fact that few Arabs have any illusions about the Nazis and the Fascists. Many have retained the pro-British enthusiasm of the last war, and many more—despite the deplorable bungling of the Palestine question—have great admiration and respect for the British as a fighting race. If the well-disposed and more moderate Arabs are assured of a reasonable satisfaction of Arab hopes and desires—and Mr Anthony Eden gave them a straightforward assurance the other day—they may be able to hold in check the more fanatical nationalists who, like Rashid Ali, have fallen into the German trap.

The succession of German victories in the Balkans and the capture of Crete have not improved the British situation. But if a successful campaign were carried out in Syria not only would the British be enormously strengthened strategically, but success would almost certainly be followed by a rallying of the Moslem world against the Axis.

"MAKING GENUINE EFFORT"

RETAILERS PREPARE FOR RESTRICTIONS

OPERATE TO-DAY

Napier-Hastings District Affected

"Some of the shops are making a genuine effort," said the lighting controller (Mr H. H. Wylie) after an inspection at Hastings last night inspection at Hastings last night commenting upon preparations being made for the new lighting restrictions coming into operation in Napier, Hastings, Taradale and Havelock North at noon to-day.

A warning that retailers must comply with the terms of the restrictions was given by Mr Wylie. Every effort is being made this week to ensure that shopkeepers are fully acquainted with their obligations in this respect and there will be no excuse for breaches of the regulations.

Use of Pelmets.

From his observations last night, Mr Wylie said that he was of the opinion that the use of pelmets on window lights contributed greatly toward reducing glare. Many retailers are finding that stiff brown paper is one of the most effective shades for window lights, while others are using materials of cloth and cardboard.

The regulations require that no window light may be visible from the footpath and that no unshaded light of any kind in the shop's interior may be seen from outside. In windows, 60 watt lamps may be used where the fixtures are 10ft. apart, 40 watt for 6ft. centres, reducing to lower-powered bulbs where they are closer.



The remaining men will all be included in the next overseas ballot, which it is anticipated will be issued in about three months' time.

Enrolment of married men will take place towards the middle of this month, but it is most unlikely that any married men will be called up for service before the end of this year.

When the proclamation directing the enrolment of married men is issued, all men up to the age of 46 will be required to register, irrespective of the number of children. Their order of selection, however, for military service, will be in accordance with the number of children they have.

When asked if the ages of married men required for overseas service would be the same as for single men, Mr Wilson stated that the ages of all men of the Second NZ.E.F. would be restricted to 21 to 40 years. That would apply to both married and single men.

HUGE INCREASE IN N.Z. PRODUCTION OF CHEESE

Dominion Asked To Produce 160,000 Tons In Next Season

(By Telegraph-Press Association.)

WELLINGTON, June 4.

Heavy Expenditure

Many factories would be faced with heavy expenditure in making the change-over and it was under-stood that the Government would

stood that the Government would lend the necessary money to dairy, companies at 4 per cent.

To secure the most economic distribution of the dairy equipment available, every manufacturer in New Zealand had agreed to supply to the dairy factories only as directed by the Dairy Division.

The change from butter to cheese production would mean several hours' extra work daily for the farmers concerned, he said, but there were very few unwilling to undertake it. Most of them were glad to feel that they were able to do something to help the war effort.

Before the war the maximum amount of cheese imported by Britain from all sources in any one year was 154,000 tons. Next season New Zealand alone is asked to produce 160,000 tons, an increase of 40,000 to 50,000 tons on the current season's record production.

The record production of this season, he said, was obtained merely by diverting butterfat supplies from butter to cheese factories. In order butter to cheese factories. In order to keep the existing vats full the whole year round in the coming season, something more would be required. Every vat would have to be used to the best advantage.

Double Shifts

This would mean working double shifts at many factories. It would also probably mean a redistribution of production units. Some vats would be removed from existing cheese factories. Those vats remaining would be used twice daily and those removed would be placed in another district, possibly in casein stations at present disused. Some old cheese factories which had been closed for a number of years would, no doubt, be reopened.

Temporary Annexes

It was also possible that butter factories in some districts where there was a large supply of milk available within a short radius might be asked to build a temporary annexe for cheese manufacture. This would allow the existing steam plant to be used to the full advantage.

The building of new cheese factories would not be encouraged, he said. Anything done would have to be regarded as of a temporary

Government Allowance

As last year, the Government would allow each farmer up to a maximum of £20 toward the cost of the special plant required in the special plant required in the special plant required for milk required for cheese, compared with the cream required for butter, would present a difficult problem. Already in some cases, however, arrangements had been made for the milk to be carted in lorries owned by the factory.

In other cases farmers living close together might be able to run a truck co-operatively.



MEN'S PROPERTY LOST IN GREEK EVACUATION

Clothing And Equipment Dumped By Dominion Soldiers Before Leaving

Grim tales of the New Zealanders' last-minute evacuation from Greece in the face of the relentless enemy onslaught are told in letters received in Hawke's Bay during the past few days. The writers tell of the horrors of the campaign, but also they describe the more pleasant events of their chaotic days in Greece.

A Hastings soldier writing home says that his company made their escape only with the barest necessities, discarding equipment and clothing in the withdrawal.

BANKRUPT PUBLICLY **EXAMINED**

HASTINGS MAN

Wage Tax Manipulations Admitted

Details of his affairs in connection with the conduct of the Sunbeam Milk Bar in Hastings, were given to Mr Justice Smith, in the Napier Supreme Court, when Arthur William Laing (Mr W. E. Bate) was publicly examined at the instance of the District Official Assignee (Mr W. Harte).

This was one of the rare occasions in New Zealand in which such proceedings have been insti-

casions in New Zealand in which such proceedings have been instituted and it was the first of the sort in the Napier jurisdiction.

Mr L. W. Willis appeared for the Official Assignee.

The hearing brought to light an admission that the bankrupt had deducted unemployment levies from the wages of his employees and had used the funds so derived for the general purposes of his business.

At the conclusion of the hearing, his Honour made a formal order declaring that the bankrupt's affairs had been sufficiently investigated.

Laing told his Honour that he purchased the Sunbeam Milk Bar from Donald Cranko in 1939 and that he had had a similar business in Auckland for about 14 months.

Only One Book

Only One Book The bankrupt said that he had only a cashbook which he considered was all that was necessary for that type of business. The cashbook was supported by invoices for goods purchased and receipted on the invoices.

"From the inception of the busi ness I did not keep any record of my personal drawings," said Laing. "They would amount to about £4 a

"They would amount to about #4 at week but that is purely an estimate based on the requirements of an average man."

Pressed by Mr Willis, the bankrupt said that his drawings were made from the till.

Laing admitted that an accountant had told him that his position was not particularly bright.



Beef Market Slightly Easier

STORTFORD LODGE SALE

Demand Quite Active For Store Sheep

Well supplied with an entry of more than 280 head, the beef cattle market at the weekly Stortford Lodge stock sale yesterday could be quoted as just a little easier than last week's. The yarding was mixed in quality, ranging from plain, unfinished drafts to some prime topweight beasts, and while for the former there was a slack inquiry, for the latter there was ready competition.

Despite wretched conditions out among the store sheep pens, with a steady downpour of rain, there was quite a steady, active market for the offering of some 2000 head. With a small gallery comprising mainly genuine buyers, competition was there for all good drafts and most lines went at auction.

As was the case last week the entry of store cattle was small and comparatively little interest was taken in the selling. Rates realised, however, appeared steady.

Some of the principal realisations yesterday were as follows:

A draft of medium-framed P.A. heifers, light prime finished and quite useful young beef, made £5 to £5/18/6 on the bidding, the majority being passed in.
