### German Peace And Trade Plan Said To Be Brewing

An American who has just arrived from Portugal brings news of more German peace feelers.

Nazi propagandists in Portugal say that Germany is planning a peace move linked with an economic plan for Europe. It would not include Britain but would embrace

America in a bartering cartel.

The American adds that Germans at Lisbon contend that Hitler will secretly march out of Norway, Denmark, France, Belgium, Greece and southern Yugoslavia and then announce a plan for trade revival with the Nazis keeping only Poland.

They are convinced that Britain will agree rather than waste the lives of thousands of men and that Britain will be content to revise the main portion of her trade with the west, waiving her pledge to Poland and returning Somaliland with Abyssinia under mandate to the Axis.

The Maritime Commission has ordered 14 Atlantic, gulf and coast-line shipping operators to make available 50 per cent of their tonnage to Britain. It is estimated that the order will affect between 60 and 70 yessels of a tonnage of 375 000 70 vessels of a tonnage of 375,000.

Owing to the serious shortage of shipping, the Chilean Government has issued a decree prohibiting the sale or charter of Chilean merchant vessels to foreign companies with-out the permission of the Foreign Office.

### **CLOTHES RATIONS COMPARED**

QUALITY BETTER IN BRITAIN

LONGER LASTING

Synthetic Materials In Germany

The general system of clothes rationing just introduced into Britain is very much the same as in Germany, according to the Ministry of Economic Warfare, both being based on freedom of spending by coupons and mainly having no relation to the price paid for the articles. A point of difference is that boots and shoes are not included in the German rationing but are covered by special rules whereby a permit is needed and, owing to the leather shortage, it is not easy to obtain.

Coupon Percentages Coupon Percentages

As the total of coupon points is different in the two countries the only possible method of comparison is by the percentage of coupon points available. Thus, in Britain an overcoat needs 29.1 per cent of the total coupons, while in Germany from 37.3 up to 80 per cent is needed, the amount varying with the type of coat required, raincoats being covered by the lower amount. In the course of a broadcast to the United States National Conference of Social Workers, the Minister of Labour and National Service (the Hon. Ernest Bevin) said: "I am often asked by visitors in Britain to explain why Labour over here is so whole-heartedly supporting the national effort in this

great struggle. "My answer is that we regard this as a righteous cause. We know that there can be no material gain. Indeed, whatever the result, the expenditure and loss of wealth will be colossal, but we are determined to preserve our spiritual inheritance.

"We will not be driven back into slavery. The great driving power within us and urging us on is the spirit of the crusade against evil. We have as a people emerged from feudalism. We have overcome the main ravages of the industrial revolution, then we struggled through the years in order to establish adult suffrage and full, free education. We fought our way through miserable periods of poverty and inequality and at last arrived at a stage where all the barriers which stood in the way of people themselves working out their own destiny had been destroyed.

"We turned this new-found power to account for, in spite of all our economic difficulties, we were tearing down our slums, rebuilding our cities and wiping out the terrible mortgage handed on to us from the nineteenth century.





DEATH OF THE EX-KAISER

The death of the ex-Kaiser, which was reported yesterday morning, removes one of the most remarkable figures of the modern world. Almost defied by his own people in the glittering days of German imperialism, and feared and hated by most of the world during the 1914-1918 war, Wilhelm II lived to become a forgotten exile, a dim memory to most of the people who had seen him at the height of his power. At the time of his death the All Highest who had once dreamed of being Emperor of the World was an object of pitying contempt.

It would have been better for Wilhelm if he had died in 1918. He would then have become a legend and in the course of time his name would have become surrounded by the imaginary glamour that surrounds the name of Attila, the leader of the earlier Huns. As it is, at the time of his death, he was little more than an actor who once took a leading role on the European stage and had lost his public by overplaying his part.

It is probable that history will treat Wilhelm in the kindest way by forgetting his existence after the day when he ceased to be the symbol of Prussian militarism. The fact that when the conquerors of Germany were at the frontiers and when the whole imperial structure was crumbling, he took the easiest and safest course by decamping with sufficient of the Potsdam valuables to keep him in semiregal state for the rest of his life was a rather shabby anticlimax to what began as a flamboyant career.

Wilhelm's character, unlike that of his plebian successor, Hitler, was not at all enigmatic. He was a man of ordinary ability but with imagination and a pronounced inferiority complex. His nature was warped by his upbringing, which was deliberately planned to turn him into an impressive Emperor in the tradition of Prussian militarism and this, in conjunction with his imagination and love of pageantry, resulted in his becoming a figure which filled in almost every respect the German ideal of an emperor. All the trappings were there—the shining armour, the silver, the eaglecrowned helmet, the aggressive, pointed moustache, and the posturing, the swaggering and the arrogant intolerance of a ruler who was not altogether sure of himself.

Wilhelm's sense of inferiority was illustrated by his deep-seated jealousy of the British Royal House. He feared his grandmother, Queen Victoria, and he heartily detested his uncle, Edward VII., and his cousin, George V. these British monarchs was fond of display, but they all possessed what the British people value much more-an air of unassailable dignity. It was this which Wilhelm envied most and which he sought to counteract by somewhat vulgar ostentation. The result pleased the Germans, but to the rest of the world it was like a comparison between Windsor Castle and the ornate rococo splendours of the German palaces.

Wilhelm's jealousy of Great Britain, however, went beyond the Royal Family. He was not content with Germany as the most powerful military State in Europe. He wanted a fleet equal in strength to the British Navy, and he wanted a world empire. It was under his leadership and inspiration that Germany first embarked on the course of "world power or downfall." He improved on Bismarck's creed of blood and iron and laid his plans for the day when Germany would defeat both France and Russia and would be ready to destroy the British Empire. When Austria hung a war with Serbia on the peg of the Serajevo assassinations on June 28, 1914, the Kaiser wrote in the margin of an official document the words: "It is now or never," and the result of that note was

If the future should ever produce another Shakespeare he is not likely to find in the Emperor Wilhelm II. material for a great historical tragedy. There was nothing dramatic about his fall. Unlike Napoleon, he did not go down in a second Waterloo which decided the fate of the world. Germany's Waterloo had been lost long before Wilhelm, in fear of his life, abdicated and fled to Holland. His enemies did not even bother to pursue him. They left him to find humiliation and to kill time by chopping down trees.

No one outside Doorn knows what Wilhelm thought of his country's history after his flight. No doubt the rise of Nazism gave him a certain amount of gratification, but one would like to know what he thought of the posturings and rantings of the new ruler. Whatever has been said of Wilhelm, it must be conceded that he never brought Germany to such depths of grimy dishonour as the man who stepped into the imperial shoes.

AVOID WASTE

The need for economy in the use of electric power was recently stressed by the Minister of Supply (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan). Every power station in the North Island was working at full load, he said, and it was hoped to get through the winter without the need for rationing.

If there should be any breakdown in the generating plant, either mechanically or in the fuel supply, the position will become even more serious. The consumer can do nothing about this aspect of the power shortage but he can assist by economisage, but he can assist by economis-ing in the use of current wherever

The alternative to voluntary reduction in demand is restriction by rationing, which is bound to hit some users hard, particularly those in "all-electric" homes.

It has been suggested that as street lighting has been reduced to just a glimmer it might as well be turned out altogether, with a consequent saving in power, but the authorities do not agree that the glimmer of light is of no use, particularly so far as pedestrians are concerned.

Little Saving.

An inspection made of several blackout areas in Napier from 5.30 a.m. until sunrise shows that many householders who rise before day-In any case, if every street light in Napier and Hastings were switch-ed off the saving in power would be In Napier and Hastings were switched off the saving in power would be very small.

The cutting out of neon signs has made some difference, but again it is of no great account. Reduction of shop window lighting and the prohibition of under-verandah lights will effect a considerably greater saving than the switching-off of signs at sunset, but a far greater possibility in the saving of power lies in the multiplied effect of apparently trifling economies by the very large number of small users.

In the provincial towns such as Hastings and Napier there is not so much extravagance in the use of electricity for lighting as in cities, but there is probably room for economy on the part of the householder. Lights are often left burning in halls and passages where they are not required, or in rooms not for the moment occupied.



### QUESTION OF MYTHICAL REMITTANCE DISCUSSED

### Creditors' Allegations In Napier Bankruptcy Inquiry

Allegations that the bankrupt had incurred credit "under the shadow of his father's reputation," were made at a meeting of creditors in the bankrupt estate of Vivian Nebitt Hawke, an agent, which was conducted by the District Official Assignee (Mr W. Harte), at the Napier Courthouse

One creditor alleged that Hawke obtained four months' credit on the representation that he was in receipt of a remittance from England. This the bankrupt strenuously denied and said that his "remittance" was the subject of a long-standing joke, the circumstances of which were well known to the creditor's representative.

If they assumed that he had a remittance then it was their own fault that the bankrupt received credit

their own fault that the bankrupt received credit.

The bankrupt was represented by but I accepted his word and got Mr E. H. T. Dunn and the following nothing."

Questioned by the Official Ascreditors were represented: Hawke's Mr E. H. T. Dunn and the following creditors were represented: Hawke's Bay Tyre Rebuilders Ltd. (Mr Bodle), £8; Mr J. P. Swain, £13; Anderson and Hansen Ltd. (Mr R. M. Rickard), £26 19/10; and the Heretaunga Club (Mr R. P. Tabley), £32.

There is a total deficiency of £142.
Although the bankrupt stated that he had no assets, it was a question whether or not an old motor-car, which Hawke's father had bought for him should have been returned as an asset, said Mr Dunn.

In view of the fact that the bankrupt had secured a position which required means of transport, the creditors decided to allow Hawke to retain his car because it was thought they might be able to collect something if the position materialised.

Debt to Club

Questioned by the Official Assignee as to whether his transaction with Mr Swain had taken place when he was financially embarrassed, the bankrupt said that he had just been married.

"The whole question is whether you obtained credit on the strength of your 'remittance,' "said Mr Harte addressing Hawke.

"I say that he did," said Mr Rickard. "When he owed us considerably less than he does to-day one of my representatives granted him further credit and I had to reprimand him."

"Some months ago the bankrupt discussed the possibility of buying a new car from us and naturally we asked where the money was coming from," continued the creditor, who alleged that Hawke went so far as to seek advice about bringing sterling funds into New Zealand

Questioned by Mr Harte as to the nature of the debt owing to the Heretaunga Club, the bankrupt said that he had backed a bill for a friend who had proceeded overseas. Later he had been obliged to perform his undertaking and had to borrow the money from the club.

Mr Tabley: The bankrupt came to me about the end of January when he was financially embarrased. Hawke, who was a member of the club, had always been a "decent sort" and he was lent to the bankrupt, he said that his father was away and that the loan would be repaid within 14 days. I tackled him about the money, and he told me that his father had remitted his superannuation cheque, but had failed to endorse it."

Hawke denied that he had ever contemplated purchasing a new car. If anybody had assumed that he had money and granted him credit it was their own fault.

### LIGHTS BLAZE AS USUAL

**NEW RESTRICTIONS** IN FORCE

REDUCTION PLAN

Hastings Offenders: Most Comply At Napier

While several Hastings retailers ook full precautions to comply with the new lighting restrictions which came into force last night, the najority ignored them and numerous shop windows were ablaze with

If has been pointed out that as it was the first night of the restrictions, some shopkeepers as yet are unaware of their responsibilities and will await further advice before taking action. A member of the Reduced Lighting Committee in an interview expressed the opinion that it was unfair that while some firms should prepare extensively for the should prepare extensively for the restrictions, others should ignore nem entirely

them entirely.

The restrictions require that window lights be reduced to 60 watts and under and that no uncovered bulb be visible from the footpath. All exterior glare must be removed, either by the use of window coverings, doorway curtainings or lower powered bulbs. powered bulbs.

Lights As Usual

Lights As Usual

When the community lighting came into operation it was obvious that the advent of the regulations had been overlooked by the majority. In most of the larger shops window and interior lighting blazed as usual, contrasting wift the poorly lit premises which had complied with the restrictions. Although 60 watts is the maximum allowed for window lighting, in the window of a shop in Heretaunga Street north a light of about 300 watts cast a bright glare on to the roadway.

A warning that the regulations must be complied with immediately was given by the Lighting Controller (Mr H. H. Wylie) after inspecting Napier shops last night. The process of "educating" shopowners of their requirements will be completed in the next few days, and then more drastic action may be adopted in respect to offenders who defy the regulations with full knowledge of their implication.

The opinion that the chief source of the glare was the main street lighting was expressed by a Hast-

The opinion that the chief source of the glare was the main street lighting was expressed by a Hastings resident. He pointed out that in the lamp-shades now in use a large percentage of light is lost above the ground. He suggested that the tops and sides of the shades should be painted, leaving the base clear for light to shine on the roadway.

that retailers in that town are making a genuine effort to comply with the regulations. There were a few offenders, but he was sure that they would amend their lapse when approached by the authorities.

Fruit and fish shops were the chief offenders in both Napier and Hastings. At Napier the banks took little precaution to ensure that light did not show from the windows of their premises, while similar buildings in Hastings were very careful in complying with the regulations.

That deliberate non-observance of the restrictions would not be toler-That deliberate holf-observance of the restrictions would not be toler-ated was emphasised by Mr Wylie. The restrictions are imperative and must be given effect to immediate-ly, he said.

### BLACKOUT SCHEME DEFEATED

Hastings residents last night vondered why the blackened street ights had been returned to their

lights had been returned to their normal brightness. After nearly a fortnight of streets lit only by faint lights, they imagined that the authorities had weakened and were restoring lighting.

The answer lay in yesterday's heavy rain, the first since blackout paint was applied to the bulbs. Black drops falling from the bulbs soon after the rain began indicated what would happen, and when the what would happen, and when the ights were switched on last night hey were at their normal bright-

Painting the bulbs occupied three days, and now it will have to be done again. Unless a rainproof paint is adopted, the outside staff of the Hawke's Bay Electric Power Board will be busy this winter.




