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Allies Ready To Enter Damascus

LITTLE RESISTANCE

French Divided, But Native **Troops Going Home**

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received June 11, 11.45 p.m.)

LONDON, June 11. The Free French expect the Allies to enter Damascus to-night or to-morrow. Reports from Beirut indicate a heavy artillery battle not far south of Sidon.

Military circles at Vichy claim that the British coastal advance is held on a line at Litani, and that air reinforcements flown direct from Tunis give General Dentz an air strength almost equal to that of the British Spring and other

From Cairo it is stated that French, Syrian and other colonial troops are apparently joining the Allies in considerable numbers. Others are surrendering after nominal resistance, or going over to the Allies on a kind of neutral basis, "neither with you nor against you."

"The latest assessment at Cairo is that the attitude of the Arabs and Druse tribes is generally favourable, but the French are 50-50 for General de Gaulle and for Vichy.

A senior officer of the Lebanese gendarmerie who joined the Allies declared: "If the number of French officers and men joining the Allies continues at the rate of the past two days, resistance will be reduced to nothing, and General Dentz will have no alternative but to surrender."

Many native troops are returning to their homes.

The British advance is deliberately slow for the purpose of minimising bloodshed, and fraternisation with the local inhabitants is widespread.

The French Deputy-Premier (Admiral Darlan) in a broadcast said: "Without waiting for the end of hostilities we must create a favourable atmosphere for an honourable peace. I appeal to the nation for unreserved support for a policy of collaboration with Germany in building a new Europe, for the purpose of preventing France from perishing. "Germany has agreed to negotiate, because she is planning the reconstruction of Europe which cannot be achieved without France and other France of States.

Assassin Was Bribed By Mussolini

LONDON, June 10.

The Cairo correspondent of the Associated Press says that a photostat copy of a letter from Amerigo Dumini to Marshal de Bono, in which Dumini confesses to the murder of Matteotti, and declares he re-ceived 190,000 lire from Mussolini ("to put me straight") is published in the anti-Fascist paper "Correre d'Italia."

Dumini lived in Derna and the letter, dated October 28, 1933, was found when the British captured the town last January.

Dumini told the Associated Press that he waited for the entry of the British because he preferred capture to living under Fascist rule. He was exiled to Libya in 1934 for anti-Fascist activities, and the letter tells a terrible tale of persecution by the Italian police. Italian police.

The most revealing portion of Mussolini's speech on the anniversary of the Italian entry into the war is the announcement that in agreement with Germany the whole of Greece, including Athens, will be occupied by Italy.

"Greece is thus re-entering the Italian sphere of influence in the Mediterranean."

The task of meeting this crisis may fall upon your shoulders. "Don't underestimate the critical danger facing our country or the courage and diligence needed to stop the Nazi Armies. Seven years of efficient and tireless preparations by shrewd and ruthless methods have inculcated a spirit of fanatic-

an equal intelligent effort and superior devotion.

"I have talked to many gallant British soldiers who endured agonies at Dunkirk, in the Balkans and in North Africa, and the tenor of their words was always the same: Give us numbers and equipment equal to our opponents and we know we are better men.

"The issue between the democratic way and the totalitarian way is between right and wrong, between freedom and slavery, kindness and cruelty. The situation today is exactly the same as faced Abraham Lincoln 83 years ago.

"A nation divided against itself cannot stand. The world to-day is divided between two camps. The issue is irreconcilable, and cannot be appeased.



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

E.P.S. Work Described

In his address, Mr Yates traced the history of the E.P.S. work in Wairoa. This had actually commenced before the war, but at the Government's request a meeting was called by the Mayor in September 21st, 1939. The work of this meeting was four-fold: to make provision for earthquake, epidemic, flood and war emergencies. At the meeting, a committee was set up and controllers appointed for the following committees: Supply, Transport, Medical and Health, Works, Finance and Records, Law and Order, Fire Control, Accommodation and Evacuation, Communications, River and Sea Transport.

These committees produced values.

These committees produced valuable reports which however could not be co-ordinated and brought to ruition because at that time the Home Guard was instituted and the Mayor encouraged members to join. Many of the controllers and members of committees were swallowed up in the Home Guard and the National Reserve. Many had

also gone overseas.

This was the position up to last Thursday night. Then the whole matter was brought up for discussion, and controllers and deputy controllers were appointed where vacancies had occurred.

These controllers were to meet in the near future with the object of seeing that no overlapping oc-

arred in the selection of the com-

The new committees set up would bring the reports already submitted up to date and report back to a further meeting. Mr Yates consid-ered that it was then the most important work to be done. JAPAN AND THE WAR CRISIS

The second World War or, more correctly, the second great phase of the conflict between rival "ideologies," has reached the most critical stage since the defeat and collapse of France a year ago. It has been said again and again by such men as the Prime Minister of Australia (the Rt. Hon. R. G. Menzies) that the next few months will decide the issue of the conflict however long that conflict may continue in the future. And while the tremendous struggle is being fought out in Syria and in Africa, in the air over the entire Continent of Europe and the British Isles, and on and under the Atlantic, the Pacific, and the Mediterranean, one of the greatest problems of all remains to be decided: What will Japan do?

During the last two months there have been hints and even admissions from Tokyo that the endless undeclared war with China is not going well. The Japanese Press has gone so far as to say that hopes of conquering the entire country as a preliminary to the establishment of the Japanese "New Order" in Asia are by no means bright. But it would be a fatal mistake for the nations which have opposed and are opposing the Japanese scheme of unlimited plunder to assume that this means that Japan is prepared to relinquish any of her dreams. The Japanese Press says what it is told to say and there is not the slightest guarantee that the writers who profess the most peaceable of intentions to-day will not swing to a diametrically opposite view to-morrow if such a change suits the Japanese war party.

At the present time Japan has a tremendous nuisance-value to her Axis friends in Europe. The threat of a Japan-ese attack on the Netherlands East Indies, Singapore, or Hong Kong, or on all three, together with the threat of 'southward expansion" into the Pacific, acts as an effective brake on United States aid for Great Britain and seriously complicates the whole Far Eastern situation for both America and the British Empire.

There are some curious sidelines connected with this situation. For instance, it is known that the United States, although it has imposed an embargo on the export of copper and other metals to Japan, is still sending heavy shipments of oil to that country. United States Commerce Department figures show that last January 1,491,000 barrels of petroleum were exported to Japan. In February the figure dropped slightly to 1,279,000, but in March it rose to 1,558,000. In view of the fact that the bulk of this oil was intended almost exclusively to lubricate the Japanese war machine in China it is, at first sight, difficult to reconcile the exports with the United States policy of aiding all those nations, including China, which are opposing the Axis.

The explanation is simple. Washington and London are believed to have agreed that any drastic curtailment of oil shipments, either from the United States or from Anglo-American-controlled sources in the East, would push Japan into an immediate attack on the Dutch East Indies, which would raise the likelihood of war throughout the Pacific and Malaysia. This in turn would make an American-Japanese clash almost inevitable, with a consequent diminution in the volume of direct American support for Great Britain. Thus Germany would be helped in Europe and Asia and the main objective of the democracies—the defeat of Germany removed still further into the future.

Again, it is known that Japan has sufficient oil reserves to permit her to undertake a campaign of some months' duration in the East Indies where, with any measure of success, the Japanese would find valuable reserve stocks.

Yet another complication is introduced by the recent Soviet-Japanese pact which followed the formal entrance of Japan into the Axis alliance. The pact does not seem to have produced any notable change in the Far East, but there is always the possibility of some secret understanding which, in the event of war between Japan and the democracies, might drastically affect the Anglo-American position in eastern Asia.

The most encouraging feature of the situation is the fact that Japan has shown herself to be no more anxious for a clash in the Pacific than the British Empire and America. There is a strong suspicion that Japan's attitude to Germany and Italy is wholly opportunistic and that until the admitted difficulties in China are cleared up Japan will at least endeavour to avoid new adventures on an internal economy already exhausted by years of war,

Any plan made at present, Mr Mason considered, would tend to hamper the war effort by creating dissension.

The first consideration was the winning of the war, following which planned peace aims could be effectively propounded.



Mr Holland: Yes. It is far better to state the simple truth than to try to cover it up. In this war there should be no suggestion of hush-hush.

In Crete, the numbers were almost exactly equal, and the British losses were slightly heavier."

Out of the 90,000 lives lost in the war so far (which number excluded civilian casualties), at home and abroad, at least 85,000 had come from Britain, the Prime Minister said. "Therefore," he went on, "I repudiate the German taunt both on behalf of the Mother Country and New Zealand."

The Royal Marine rearguard in Crete had suffered the most. Fourteen hundred of the 2000 men there were casualties or taken prisoner. The naval fatalities at Crete exceeded 500.

The poisons were generally kept upon a shelf above the door, and to procure them a chair or step-ladder had to be used. There were three bottles of poison on the work bench which should have been above the door. As should have been above the door. As fur as witness knew, the deceased had no financial or domestic wor-

ries.
Alan J. Grant, chemist of Hastings, gave evidence that the dead man was his brother, a married man man was his brother, a married man with two children, and a returned scldier. He had been gassed at the Great War, and suffered from a complaint which he attributed to this cause. Witness and his brother were to proceed to Wellington, where treatment was to be obtained, no date being fixed.

As a qualified chemist, deceased would be well acquainted with drugs and poisons, and would be aware of the consequences of taking intern-

the consequences of taking internally anything of this nature. He was of a happy disposition, and at no time had he given any inkling that he would be likely to take his

Was Depressed.

George E. Stiles, accountant, Waipukurau, testified that he knew Grant both professionally and personally, and at about 4.50 p.m. on Tuesday he entered the shop where a customer was being served by deceased. After the customer left the shop both men went to the office, where Grant sat down and clasped his hands. He seemed very depression is hands. He seemed very depress-

Constable D. H. Sutton stated that Constable D. H. Sutton stated that on receiving a message from the assistant Bibby, he went to the shop and found the doctor and Bibby present. Grant was lying on the floor with a bottle containing poison alongside him. On examination of the body at the morgue, no signs of

violence could be found.

Witness knew Grant and saw him practically every day. He was the last person that the witness thought would commit suicide. In company with Bibby the premises were searched, but no note or letter could be found.

Coroner's Verdict.

Dr C. Raymond stated that on receipt of a telephone message he proceeded to Grant's shop, and there found deceased lying on the floor. On conducting a post-mortem examination indications of poison were

In witness's opinion death was due to asphyxiation as a result of taking poison. The coroner returned the following verdict: "That death occurred from asphyxiation as a result of a dose of poison self-administered."



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
