LONDON, June 22.

Hitler has issued a proclamation announcing that the Germans had attacked Russia with the help of the Finns in the north and the Rumanians in

Dr Goebbels read the proclamation at 5.45 a.m., bitterly condemning the Russian occupation of the Baltic States as directed against Germany and ac-

cusing Russia and Britain of working for the same ends.

Dr Goebbels announced that 160 Russian divisions threatened the frontier of the Reich. Russia wanted to occupy Bulgaria, the Dardanelles and the

"Russia betrayed the German-Russian Pact," he declared. "At this moment the greatest march in history is taking place. German troops with Finnish divisions and the conquerors of Norway, under the officer-commanding in Norway, are marching together from East Prussia to the Carpathians. Along the Danube delta and the shores of the Black Sea, German and Rumanian soldiers are united. Our task is not to protect single countries, but to save Europe."

This explanatory statement was broadcast after Hitler's proclamation. The Assistant Commissar for the Soviet Navy (Ignatiev) earlier announced that all units were manning their ships for exercises against a seaborne invasion of Leningrad. The Red Fleet, he said, had been relentlessly

"The hour has now come when I can speak openly," declared Hitler. "The Jewish Bolshevists in 1936 wanted to set the whole of Europe afire. It was not Germany who threatened Russia, but the Jews in their centre, Moscow, who wanted to spread their domination, not merely spiritually but militarily. Britain incited Spain, Poland and later France to

"I thought I could reach an understanding with Russia so I sent Herr Ribbentrop to break Britain's encirclement plan. I hoped that the treaty he concluded would remove all tension. The treaty resulted in the disappearance of thousands of German subjects from Lithuania, but I kept silent and agreed to the Russian annexation of Lithuania, hoping to arrive at a lasting agreement with Russia.

"The victory in Poland, which was achieved entirely by German troops, gave me another opportunity to offer peace to the Western Powers, but this offer was rejected because England still had a chance of getting the co-operation of the Balkans and Russia. That is why Sir Stafford Cripps was sent to Russia. When Russia took over the Baltic countries she lyingly said she was protecting them, but the attempt to bring them and Finland under her yoke could only be directed against Germany.

"Then Russia penetrated Rumania and the Greeks acted with Britain, threatening the extension of the area of the war. Rumania said she would accede to the Russian demands only under an Axis guarantee for the rest of her territory.

"I invited Molotov to Berlin. He asked if the German guarantee to Rumania was directed against Russia, I replied: 'Against everyone,'

Inght of June 17 and 18 large Russian patrols entered Germany and were forced back only after lengthy exchanges of fire.

"We have no intention of remainting inactive in the face of this grave threat to our frontier. I have, therefore, ordered the German forces to oppose this menace with all the might at their disposal.

"The German concentration, which is the greatest the world has ever known, has been completed. The German people are fully aware that they are called on not only to defend their native land, but to save the entire civilised world from the deadly dangers of Bolshevism and to clear the way for true social progress in Europe. To-day I decided to put the fate of the future of the German Reich and people into the hands of our soldiers. May God help us in this battle."

Russia has evacuated the populations of several Baltic coast districts. Refugees who have arrived at Helsingfors after escaping from Esthonia state that Russia has created a "devastation belt" 60 miles wide along the German-Lithuanian frontier. Bridges and railways have been destroyed and entire villages blown up.

## R.A.F. Sends 26 Of Luftwaffe Crashing In Daylight Raids

(British Official Wireless.) (Received June 22, 9.10 p.m.)

RUGBY, June 22. The Air Ministry announces that 26 enemy fighters were destroyed in Saturday's R.A.F. offensive operations. In ad-

dition, one of our fighters on patrol off the east coast on Saturday evening shot down two enemy fighters. Five British 'planes—one bomber and four fighters—were lost.

Saturday's sweeps were two of the largest yet made over enemy territory since R.A.F. fighters assumed the offensive and they proved the Fighter Command's most successful daylight operations since the Battle of Britain last autumn.

Policy Approved

The policy as outlined in the notice and the machinery necessary for its administration have been discussed and approved by representatives of manufacturers, distributors and primary producers. Very careful consideration has been given to the information required from farmers, the object being to make the returns as simple as possible. At the returns as simple as possible. At the same time it has been necessary to see that the return was compre-hensive and covered all mixtures as well as "straight" fertilisers.

"It has also been my desire," said Mr Barclay, "to disturb as little as possible the relationship existing between the merchant and purchaser, and to maintain as far as practicable the state of business dealings existing before the intro-duction of the scheme. I want to impress upon all concerned the necessity for completing and returning promptly all forms which have to be filled in in order that distribution may be completely successful.

"Accuracy in the information supplied is important, and the co-operation of all concerned is solicited. fion of all concerned is solicited. Farmers must realise that the success and equity of our proposals depend on prompt attention to the request for returns of fertiliser used, and failure to comply in this respect will result in the individual concerned being missed from the allocations. Committees are being formed in each main centre to consider special cases of hardship or sider special cases of hardship or unusual circumstances, but failure to complete the returns asked for cannot be classed in this category."

#### WHEN THIEVES FALL OUT

There is a Scottish proverb which runs: "He needs a lang spune wha sups wi' the De'il," and Stalin has discovered its truth. Fear of Germany was the chief reason which induced him to conclude the Russo-German pact. Stalin could not overlook the fact that Britain and France, for geographical reasons, were not able to help him very much in the event of a German attack and he seems to have banked on the hope that a war in the west would leave the participants too weak to threaten the Soviet or to interfere with his designs to get back what Russia lost in 1918.

On the German side, the pact was designed to leave Hitler free to overcome France and Britain, and after they were conquered he could deal with Russia at his leisure. But his plan miscarried. The invasion of England proved too difficult an operation and had to be postponed. The plan was changed to a drive through the Balkans with the object of invading Egypt and eliminating Britain from the Mediterranean. British sea power and the stiff resistance of a relatively small expeditionary force in Greece and Crete again upset calculations, with the result that Hitler finds himself, after two years of war, facing an implacable Britain which is holding the fort and building up a terrific war machine with which to accomplish his destruction.

To carry on the fight, Hitler must have more supplies and more oil. The occupied countries have been plundered ruthlessly, but the prodigal consumption by millions of soldiens spread all over Europe must be depleting the German reserves, and unless Hitler can avail himself of fresh sources of supply the prospects for next winter are very bleak.

The invasion of Russia is simply an attempt to plunder the last remaining country in Europe where food and oil are produced in considerable abundance. The pretexts invented to justify the attack have a very familiar sound. They will deceive nobody. The Russo-German pact was a deal between gangster dictators which appeared to be to their mutual advantage at the time it was made. There may be honour among humbler thieves, but none between criminals of the dictators' type, and the pact goes into the discard just as soon as it suits one of them to repudiate it.

It will be remembered that when Hess made his sensational escape by aeroplane to Scotland it was stated that a dispute had arisen amongst leading Nazis about Russo-German relations, and this latest development lends a certain plausibility to the suggestion.

The conclusions to be drawn from the attack on Russia are (1) that the invasion of England has either been abandoned or postponed indefinitely; (2) the British communications with the East will be attacked through Persia instead of through the Eastern Mediterranean; (3) that the Germans are confident of a speedy and decisive campaign which will compel Russia to yield anything Hitler wants.

There is not much ground for hoping that the Russian army will be able to repel the invasion. The Russian air force, which is strong numerically, consists, according to Colonel Lindbergh—who was afforded the fullest facilities for studying it carefully—of machines of an inferior type. The ground equipment is defective and the general organisation of the force revealed serious weaknesses. The personnel lacked the intensive training of the German air force.

So far as the Russian army is concerned it has been the subject of a vast amount of boastful propaganda from Moscow broadcasting stations, but masses of inadequately equipped Russian troops will not offer a very effective resistance to the highly mechanised German war machine, which can be relied upon to reach its objectives with efficiency and dispatch.

The occupation of a large slice of Russian territory will, however, present serious difficulties to an invader who already has millions of troops doing garrison duty all over Europe. Hitler, who is obsessed with a Napoleonic complex, may be desirous of proving to the world that he can succeed where the other "Little Corporal" failed, but the same causes as contributed to the defeat of Napoleon in 1812 will operate next winter, and possibly with the same result.

One of the chief obstacles to the successful plunder of Russia is the defective transport system. In another six weeks the wheat in the Ukraine will be ripening. Germany must achieve quick military successes and remove the harvest to Germany within the next few months. There is little enough time in which to do it. And after that, the task of holding an extended frontier from the Arctic to the Black Sea seems to be a pretty big order.

What is a conscientious objector? This is a question which will be given prominence within the next day or so when the No. 4 Armed Forces Appeal Board sits in Napier

The whole question is so vague, even to the average legal practitioner, that the editors of the "New Zealand Law Journal" have seen fit to analyse the poser in the following article.

"There is no need," says the article, "to question the courage of genuine conscientious objectors who are prepared to do ambulance work or civil defence work of an equally dangerous nature. Nor is there any need to waste words (if words could be found for them) on those who seek to save their skins by such a plea, and in whom cowardice has made consciences. But the Appeal Boards have a far more difficult problem.

"Ruling out self-interest, what sort of objection can be called conscientious? The National Service Emergency Regulations speak only of those who have a genuine belief that it is wrong to engage in warfare in any circumstances, whether or not the cause he a just one. Tamati Ngapora was a highbred chief, being cousin to Te Wherowhero (better known as Potatau), the first Maori King. He took part in the Walkato expeditions against the Taranaki tribes in 1829-30, but on the introduction of Christianity he was one of the first to embrace it and eventually became a catechist of the Anglican Church. When the Government gave an area of land at Mangere (near Auckland) to the Ngati-Mahuta tribe, Manuhiri, as he was later known, erected a stone church and held regular services until 1863.
