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Germans Try 'Bulge' Tactics Against Russia

BUKOVINA AND POLAND

Two Double Thrusts Towards Strategic Railways

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received June 25, 10.15 p.m.)

LONDON, June 25. In view of the official reticence on both sides, no clear indication is available where the flux of battle has carried the opposing armies. Axis reports specifically mention Russian offensive tactics in Bukovina and Poland which conform with the Russian pronouncement that the Red Army would fight

the enemy on his own territory.

On the other hand, there is considerable evidence that the Russians are effecting substantial withdrawals, particularly in Lithuania and north Poland, where, according to German reports, they have burned out towns and villages and destroyed supplies.

Extremely heavy filting is raging north-east of Brest Litovsk, where the German High Command states that the Russians have four armies, including 49 infantry divisions, three tank divisions, 12 armoured brigades and seven cavalry divisions with 2000 'planes based on airfields

with 2000 'planes based on airfields north of the Pripet Marshes.

A reasonable assessment of the situation suggests that the Germans have driven up to Siauliai (Suvalki) perhaps also to Kaunas (Kovno). These, like other thrusts, are probably promonotories, not necessarily consolidated or widely based.

It is the old principle of the battle of France of making a breach, rushing in, driving in, fanning out, and lastly consolidating and widening the breach.

Strategic Points

A map shows that all the German drives aim at strategic railway points, mostly junctions. The thrusts towards Grodno andWolkowys suggest that the Germans have passed by or captured Bialystok (north-east of Warsaw) which, at any rate would be cut off by rail if these two drives are successful. The same encircling movement seems the objective of the thrusts at Vladimir Volynsk, Rawa Ruska and Brody. The success of this triple drive would cut off Lwow (in the south) and the southern oilfields, which presumably are also the objective of the drives from Slovakia and Hungary.

The Germans have organised in Slovakia a band of White Russian terrorists, presumably for the purpose of dominating the country as the Germans advance. They have also concentrated in Slovakia for mer Tsarist officers to form the nucleus of a Tsarist General Staff and Administration. A map shows that all the German ives aim at strategic railway

Rumanian Thrust

The Rumanians claim that they crossed the river Pruth Galatz, Jassy and Lipcani in a double thrust, the northern prong of which is directed at Kiev and the south ern prong at Odessa. The force from Galatz is claimed to have advanced 50 miles in the direction of Tarutinu.

The Russians assert that the Ru The Russians assert that the Rumanians are not participating in the fighting but are held in reserve for a northern thrust from Czernowitz to Kiev designed to link up with the German thrust at Kiev along the railway from Lublin. The joining of these forces would threaten 30 Russian divisions in this triangle with encirclement.

Radio Battle

A curious Russian-German radio battle is also going on. An Ankara report says that the Soviet has effectively jammed all German broadcasts. It is understood that the Soviet prepared and is operating 150 wireless stations for this purpose. German sources said that a tank battle was being fought all along the Russian frontier and that fierce hand-to-hand fighting was in progress. The Germans claim that they have penetrated Russian territory under cover of artillery protection, but they admit that the Russians are defending themselves not inefficiently. An unconfirmed report says that the Germans are using fiame-throwers.

A report from Helsingfors says that the Germans have advanced only a short distance into the Soviet-occupied Baltic State of Lithuania, through which they are making one of the major drives towards Leningrad.

A message received in Stockholm from Helsingfors says that the whole of Tallinn, capital of the Soviet-occupied Baltic State of Esthonia, is in flames after a German air-raid.

German reports pay a tribute to the flerceness of the Russian fighting in localised engagements, but usually claim final success for the Germans. One account describes how a Silesian infantry division, with the support of heavy artillery, smashed through a belt of the Russian main-line fortifications after a five-hour engagement. The Russians fought to the last.

AIRCRAFT DESTROYED ON GROUND

STRONG RETALIATION

Motorised Regiment Wiped Out

United Press Association—Copyright, (Received June 26, 0.30 a.m.) MOSCOW, June 25.

"The Soviet air force on June 23, 24 and 25 lost 374 'planes, mostly destroyed on the ground. In the same period we destroyed 161 German 'planes in combat and at least 220 on the ground," states a Soviet communique.

It adds: "During June 24 the enemy continued to develop the advance in regions of Siauliai (Suralki), Kaunas (Kovno), Grodno, Wolkowys, Wlodimierz and Brody, everywhere meeting with stubborn resistance from the Red Army. Enemy forces in the Siauliai district were repulsed with major losses. Our mechanised forces counterattacked and annihilated an entire

motorised regiment. motorised regiment.

"In the Grodno, Wolkowys and Brest Litovsk sectors fierce fighting continues for Grodno, Kobryn, Wilno and Kaunas.

"Heavy fighting between large tank units in the Brody district (south-east) in which the enemy were heavily defeated, is continuing.
"Our air force successfully trans."

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

REACTIONS TO THE CONFLICT

The sudden clash of the rival "ideologies" of Nazism and Bolshevism has had some curious results throughout the world. In the British Empire and the United States the only reaction of any consequence has been a rapid realisation of the possibilities embodied in the new struggle between Germany and Russia.

A less important point, which is not without a certain element of humour, is the unfortunate predicament of Communist sympathisers. Until the signing of the Russo-German pact in 1939, these people were embued with the bright idea of pushing Great Britain and France, in alliance with Russia, into war with the Axis. The announcement of the treaty between the Soviet and Germany caused them to swing towards Hitler on the ground that Great Britain was engaged on "another imperialistic war," and they backed the Russo-German alliance until the present development flung Russia." into the arms of the democracies, leaving "local Bolshevists" throughout the world high and dry.

A more serious aspect of the situation is the reaction of the few remaining neutrals to the general war situation now that Russia has been forcibly brought in as an opponent of

Some nations, like Turkey, have sat back with a sigh of relief at the withdrawal of the conflict from their own immediate neighbourhood. Others, like Spain, remain apparently in doubt, and it must not be forgotten that on Spain and Portugal a great deal depends.

Throughout the war Spain has managed to preserve some sort of neutrality despite strong sympathies for both Germany and Italy and a deep-rooted hatred of the Soviet and all its works. This hatred, common to most predominantly-Catholic countries, owes its origin to the events preceding the Civil War of 1936-1939 and to developments in the war itself, when Russia backed the Republican Government and the Axis Powers gave tremendous assistance to the Franco forces. That same war was responsible for an unprecedented slump in British prestige in Spain for the simple reason that the British Government's policy, in the formless guise of "non-intervention," succeeded only in antagonising both sides in the dispute and resulted in the entrenchment of German influence in the Iberian Peninsula.

Some authorities allege to-day that since the fall of France the number of German "tourists" in Spain has increased to about 75,000, and there has been steadily increasing

Axis pressure on the Franco Government. But still Spain has evaded any open declaration of support for the Axis bloc.

The reason is, of course, not hard to find. General Franco's dictatorship has been established for only two years. There is still a powerful anti-Franco and anti-Nazi element in Spain which is only writing for the apportunity to break in Spain which is only waiting for the opportunity to break out in open rebellion. At the same time the ordinary people of Spain have suffered so grievously from war and famine that it is difficult to stir them up into enthusiasm for a new war in which they are not vitally concerned. Spain to-day wants to be sure of a number of things before she commits herself, and particularly she wants to be certain whether or not Germany can defeat the British Empire. If Spain joined the Axis in the field and if Britain continued to show no sign of collapse or defeat and extended both the blockade and the R.A.F. attacks to include Spain, a great many unfortunate things would happen to General Franco and his supporters

at the hands of a hungry people.

Nevertheless, there is still a possibility that Franco will be forced into something, and the German crusade against Russia will give the Nazi propagandists as valuable a lure as Russia will give the Nazi propagandists as valuable a lure as the long-promised attack on Gibraltar. The fact that if Spain joined in an attack on Gibraltar Great Britain, and perhaps the United States, would pounce on Spanish Morocco in reprisal might act as a brake, but it is a question if such a brake would be capable of withstanding German pressure.

In the meantime it can be said that the policy of Spain, like that of Turkey and other neutrals will depend to a large

like that of Turkey and other neutrals will depend to a large degree on the course of the Russian war. German propagandists hopefully talk of a victory within 14 days, but this is extremely unlikely unless the whole facade of Russian strength is nothing more than a colossal bluff. At the same time it is incredible that the Kremlin should have permitted the irretrievable deterioration of Russo-German relations unless it had a reasonably strong faith in its own defences. The course of events has shown that the Soviet Government has acted in the belief that Britain would eventually defeat Germany, but the fact that in countries like Spain, outside certain limited sections, the Soviet is both dreaded and hated makes Moscow a somewhat uncomfortable, if welcome, ally.

The president, Mr Batten, remarked it seemed apparent that the Government was materially to assist the league. It would not be prepared to deal with several sections of one organisation, but with a central body.

AMAZING TEN DAYS OF ATTACK

112 NAZIS DOWN

Superior Men And Machines

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received June 25, 6 p.m.) LONDON, June 24.

Nine enemy fighters were destroyed this evening in a further offen-sive sweep by the R.A.F. across the Channel and occupied France. Two

British fighters were lost.

In the ten offensive operations carried out recently by the R.A.F.,
112 German fighter aircraft have been destroyed for the loss of 26 British 'planes, with five of the British pilots safe. The ratio is five German fighters destroyed for every British airman who has not re-

As there was no large-scale offensive on one day and virtually no opposition to our forces on another, when only one Messerschmitt was shot down, 111 of the 112 German 'planes destroyed were shot down in six days, states the Air Ministry news service. These figures do not include the destruction of isolated day raiders by fighter patrols round the coast.

Offensive Sweeps
On eight of these offensive
sweeps, forces of British bombers
have been escorted to attack targets have been escorted to attack targets in northern France and enemy shipping in the Channel. Many squadrons of our fighters, constituting very formidable striking forces, have flown over occupied territory in the last eight days, but only a few enemy machines have approached Britain singly in daylight.

A famous Polish squadron which destroyed more than 100 enemy aircraft last September in four weeks' fighting has taken a leading part in these offensive operations. The pilots have shot down 20 enemy planes without loss to themselves. A British squadron has accounted for 17 German fighters, and an auxiliary squadron has shot down 15.

One of the most remarkable fea-

One of the most remarkable features of the operations has been the way in which the bombers have been escorted. A squadron of Polish fighters who had had practically no previous experience of fighting together as a unit played a big part in the success of one operation. Although attacked, they did not leave the bombers at any time, merely turning off to meet the attacks by Messerschmitt 109's and then returning to the escort duties. All the bombers returned without incident because of this cover.

Superior Machines One reason for the fighters' success is that the new Spitfires and Hurricanes have the same superior

ity of performance and armament over the new Messerschmitt fighters as the Spitfires and Hurri-canes used in the Battle of Britain last year had over the Hun fighters

Another reason is that, although many new pilots were flying in these operations, they were led by men who fought throughout the Battle of Britain and know the Huns' every trick. These veterans have reported that the enemy pilots frequently seemed inexperienced and reluctant to engage except when they could find only a small force of British fighters. British fighters.

This morning the gas office was deluged with complaints from householders who had not had sufficient gas. About eight months ago the company was losing between 30,000 and 40,000 feet of gas a day, and this went on for six weeks, costing about £15 a day. Russia Was Warned Of Danger

LONDON, June 24.
Both the United States and Britain will give Russia their aid against Germany, according to statements made by President Roosevelt and the British Foreign Minister (the Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden) to-day.

President Roosevelt stated to-night that all possible United States aid had been pledged to Russia.

Mr Eden made an important statement in the House of Commons to-day when he revealed that the Soviet Government had agreed to reday when he revealed that the So-viet Government had agreed to re-ceive a military and economic mis-sion, and also that Russia recognis-ed that Britain's pledge to restore the freedom of Poland still stood. Turkey and Finland, added Mr Eden, had given declarations of their neu-teality.

Reviewing charges by the Nazi Foreign Minister (von Ribbentrop) of British collusion with Russia to encircle Germany, Mr Eden declared that they were entirely false. The Russian pact with Germany made collusion impossible.

Mr Eden said that some time before the events of the past few

Mr Eden said that some time be-fore the events of the past few days the Foreign Office was already convinced, from information at its disposal, that Hitler was going to attack Russia from behind the smokescreen of the non-aggression

"With the Prime Minister's consent," said Mr Eden, "I told the Soviet Ambassador (M. Maisky) of the danger confronting Russia. The Soviet Government, even at that late hour, was careful to avoid any expression of online, which would expression of opinion which would seem to throw out its observance of ts engagement to Germany.

The rank and file were convinced that, given proper equipment, they could "give the Hun a start and a licking" any time they met them, but the Greek campaign had shown how essential it was for those opposing the Germans to have every assistance from modern arms, both on land and in the air.

MILK "WAR" IN SOUTH

PRICE TRIBUNAL'S STATEMENT

"UNREASONABLE"

Sharp Reply To Action Of Companies

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, June 25.

The attention of the Price Tribunal has been drawn to Press reports, originating from Dunedin, to the effect that dairy farmers in certain localities are refusing to supply milk, owing to a difference with the tribunal, with the result that the supply of milk to certain schools has been discontinued for the time being.

The tribunal stated to-night that it considered the action of the parties concerned so unreasonable and unwarranted, especially in wartime, that it felt compelled to place the full facts before the public.

The tribunal explained that it was its policy, in the absence of special circumstances, to approve normal seasonal adjustments in the price of milk, but anything more than this, especially when a probable increase in price to the public was involved, required special consideration. equired special consideration.

Customary Procedure The customary procedure been applied in respect of milk prices in Dunedin, and normal sea-sonal adjustments for the winter months being made by the parties

months being made by the parties concerned.

Some weeks ago, however, the tribunal learned indirectly that two or three of the co-operative dairy factory companies supplying milk to Dunedin milk vendors during the winter months were negotiating in the direction of securing prices for this winter in excess of those secured for last winter.

No application was made to the tribunal for any increase over and above the normal seasonal increase, and nothing further was heard until representatives of the Stirling Dairy Factory Co. and the Momona Dairy Factory Co. called on the tribunal on June 12.

As a result of the discussions which then took place it became apparent that a small adjustment might be possible without giving rise to the likelihood of any resulting increase in the price of milk to Dunedin consumers, or in any way reflecting on the stability of the existing arrangements for the supply of winter milk from sources other than the two companies mentioned.

Increase in Cost. Increase in Cost.

It was, however, clear that any such adjustment which might be approved by the tribunal would involve an increase in the cost of providing milk for schools in Dunedin, Balclutha and the surrounding district

trict.
Accordingly, steps were at once taken by the tribunal to put the necessary machinery in motion to bring about an adjustment in the contract price.
On June 24 the tribunal was advised by telephone by the district officer of the Department of Industries and Commerce at Dunedin that the Stirling Co. had refused to supply milk for the town and schools as the milk was being utilised for the manufacture of cheese.



The introduction of new blood into a flock, a necessary and important part of a sound breeding programme, presents a big problem to many, and in some instances the results are disastrous. A common idea is that to bring in fresh blood all that is necessary is to obtain a male somewhere and use him with the hens. Neither utility nor show birds are produced haphazardly. Results count and it is by foresight and careful calculation that results are obtained.

A strain is not a breed, but a certain blood line built up carefully over a period of time. If fresh blood is required make sure that it is fresh in that it is not of the same blood line as your own. Each strain carries certain characteristics and the careful breeder is forever striving to eliminate faults while maintaining the good characteristics.

One must bear in mind that one is likely to introduce faults together with the good points desired. Therefore it is necessary to purchase from a farm where sound breeding methods are practised, and when making the purchase find out all that is possible about the ancestry of the bird. The usual means adopted for the introduction of new blood are either the purchase of male birds or eggs for the purpose of hatching both males and females of the new blood. In males, wrong colouring, especially in the eyes and lobes, and in some breeds the wings, bad tail carriage, faulty combs, side sprigs and bodily deforts or weaknesses in your flock that need remedying. Keep these in your mind when making the selection of the new line. It does not necessarily follow that these faults will be directly eliminated as the result of this, but by breeding along these lines the majority of the progeny will show the correct characteristics while the minority will of course, be kept away from the breeding pen.

After having decided upon the bird of your choice be prepared to pay a decent price, not excessive of course, but one which will compensate the breeder for his part in producing a sound breeding specimen.

The sores that develop on the combs of cockerels, unless treated in good time, will eventually cause the comb to fall over, thus ruining permanently the appearance of the bird. A treatment that has been found every effective is the dressing of the wound with iodine followed by the rubbing in of about half a Chinosol tablet, softened by holding it in water for a minute. Care must be taken to see that the iodine does not get into the eye of the bird.

For proper digestion it is a mistake to feed a too concentrated ration as it fails to distend the intestines sufficiently to allow a thorough mixing with the digestive juices. Diarrhoea and other troubles result if there is insufficient bulk. Bran, dried lucerne or chaffed greens added to the mash serve to increase the bulk.
