# Norway Blames Nazis For Loss Of Ships At Sea

U-BOATS, AIRCRAFT AND MINES

Objections Also Raised To **Contraband Control**

OSLO, March 1. The Norwegian Foreign Minister (Dr Koht) said that all Norwegian ships known to have been deliberately sunk were sunk by the Nazis. Norway had lost 50 since the outbreak of the war, involving the loss of 350 lives. U-boats and German aircraft sank nine and mines were responsible for most of the remainder.

The protests three weeks ago, he added, had not brought an answer. Germany's illegal sea warfare had endangered natural commerce between Norway and her friends.

Norway did not like the British contraband control and had declared it contrary to international law; nevertheless, if the English forced Norwegian ships to be controlled that did not give Germany the right to sink them.

Denmark has formally protested to both belligerents against the warfare on neutral shipping. This is in accordance with the decision reached at the meeting of the Scandinavian Foreign Ministers.

Denmark is demanding the return of her rights under international law. The Danish protest is general and is not based on special cases.

Estonia has forbidden her merchantmen to navigate in the North Sea and other dangerous waters except under convoy.

## FIVE FIGHTING FRONTS

According to Sir George Paish, the well-known British journalist and economist, the Allies are fighting on five main fronts-naval, military, diplomatic, economic and financial. Possibly from the general viewpoint this is a fairly good order if importance, but it may be doubted if the categories are complete. Where are the air services, for instance, and what of certain other aspects of the great struggle that are not ac-

So far as naval activities are concerned, we are assured that up to February 25 the Nazis have lost up to 6 per cent. of their total mercantile tonnage, whereas during the same period Britain has lost only 1.6 per cent. of her ocean-going tonnage. These fundamental figures, with U-boats thrown in, would not seem to be the cause of very much worry.

In the military sphere, if we think of land fighting only, it is essential that no real calculation can be made, inasmuch as the war on land cannot be regarded as having properly started yet.

In the air there is no shadow of doubt as to British supremacy, both as regards machines and personnel. In this instance accurate figures are not available, but the daily news items speak for themselves.

Diplomatically speaking, it is difficult to bring clear judgment to bear. Before real diplomatic successes can be achieved it is necessary that the word of the opposite party can be taken at its face value. But Munich and Berchtesgaden have shown the folly of any such assumption.

As to economics, the British blockade is looking after that aspect of the matter. Counter German propaganda makes a great play of stressing the sufferings involved on the part of women and children as a result of the blockade, but such statements must be weighed in the balance alongside the ruthless barbarism of the U-boat campaign. War is war, and it is of no use to pretend that it is a parlour game.

As to the financial front, we have Sir Harry Batterbee's word for it only yesterday that "on the maintenance of Britain's financial strength the whole of the British cause depends." On this aspect of the fighting front the Dominions have a duty to see to it that the Old Country's export trade is maintained by accepting goods, and that as many primary products as possible should be sent in return.

Columns could be written about these various points, and yards of figures quoted. But to dismiss a big subject in a few words it is necessary to say that these "fronts" are not so important as some others. Naval, military, air, diplomatic, economic and financial fighting prowess belong to the mechanics of the grim business. But the real driving power belongs to the moral and spiritual strength upon which they depend for their real application. All the five (or six) fighting fronts are included in the strong will to victory.

The essential for the winning of any kind of struggle is a rooted belief in the justice and righteousness of the cause in hand. The strongest weapon in the hands of the Allies is the conviction that failure means disaster to the decencies and amenities of civilisation and that victory means a further fighting chance of achieving real peace and brotherhood

Idealists are still the unacknowledged legislators of the world. When the actual fighting forces have done their bit on every front, the powers of the mind and spirit must be brought to bear upon the remaining problems so that the tragedy of Versailles will not be repeated. In this war we fight not only against flesh and blood, but against those 'principalities" and powers of darkness which are threatening the comfort and happiness of people all over the world. The final attack has a spiritual frontier.

# Reporter As A Patient In An "Iron Lung"

H.B. Hospitals Have Received Lord Nuffield's Gifts

# Aid To Breathing

For Use In Paralysis And Cases Of Apparent Drowning

All public hospitals in Hawke's Bay have received "iron lungs" as part of the Dominion-wide gift by the English philanthropist Lord Nuffield. Lectures in their use are being given nurses of the institutions by various doctors, and it is expected that the machines will apply the property of the control of into use as soon as they are

put into use as soon as they are needed.

A "Daily Mail" reporter who inspected one of these "lungs" at the Memorial Hospital, Hastings, yesterday, was somewhat surprised when he was introduced to the strangelooking contrivance. Seven feet in length, the "lung" is about three feet square at its largest end. It tapers in shape, to about two feet at the lower end.

It is supported on a small carriage, standing about three feet from the floor. At the top is a small round window, not unlike a port-hole, through which the patient's body may be examined. The patient's head protrudes through an aperture at the large end of the "box," a heavy spongerubber collar providing an air-lock. When receiving treatment, the patient's body is contained in the "lung" which is hermetically sealed, and his head protrudes through the aperture. A NATIONAL FUNCTION

Paralysis Cases The lung is for providing artificial respiration in paralysis cases,

ficial respiration in paralysis cases, in which the lungs of the patient are incapable of working properly of their own accord. It can be used in cases of apparent drowning.

Patients may be kept in the machine for indefinite periods, and it is on record that the paralysed son of an American millionaire was kept alive and taken on a European tour in a luxurious "lung" contained in a specially constructed motor caravan. The patient has no difficulty in feeding, for his head is out. The "lung" is most comfortable. The interior is lighted by a small electric lamp, while the temperature is maintained at a pleasant degree by a controllable electric element. The patient lies on his back on a heavy sponge rubber mattress, some four inches thick. His head outside the "lung" is supported on a pillow. Expiration and inhalation action is generated by a pump actuated by an electric motor, and air is introduced to the "lung" by a large, heavy rubber tube. When the machine is operating a sound emanates not unlike that of a man's heavy breathing.

pensation Court will be constituted as a judge sitting alone.

The change will be effective as from March 7.

It is pointed out that besides having the effect of relieving the Arbitration Court of compensation cases the establishment of the separate Court will enable compensation cases to be expeditiously dealt with and thus avoid anxiety often resultand thus avoid anxiety often result ing in prolongation of illness to the parties awaiting the settlement their cases.

# H.B. Committee's Report

One of the most vital elements in the development of a nation is the conservation of its land. The most insidious menace to this process is that of soil erosion. Before its onslaught in the past, civilisations themselves have crumbled. At the present in most countries it is claiming vast tracts of

once fertile land. Mindful of the fact that erodibility is not an inherent property of certain soils, but rather a man-induced condition, the secretary of the Hawke's Bay Afforestation and Land and Drainage Committee (Mr D. A. Campbell, M.Agr.Sc., B.Sc.) has prepared a report on soil erosion and its control in New New Zealand. This is made up of a survey of past and present aspects of the problem, its causes, effects and the reme-

In the interests of farmers and those concerned with the welfare of New Zealand as a primary-producing country, the "Daily Mail" publishes this report—the result of over a month's research by members of the afforestation commit-It will be presented in three parts. The first dealing with soil erosion generally and its causes, is set out below.

"Recently into the scheme of things on this earth man has blundered; his tenacity and wit have achieved miracles, while obstacles have spurred him on to their mastery in his onward drive to civilisation. But one, still unconquered, still menacing, and still relentlessly victorious over most of the earth's surface and responsible for greater losses to civilisation than all wars in the past — in fact, exacting the extinction of civilisation as its price— is soil erosion, the dynamic recoil of nature to misuse of the land.

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


