After 15 years in exile for a crime he didn't commit, respectable barber Benjamin Barker, now using the name Sweeney Todd, returns to London to find his wife dead and his daughter in the hands of the evil Judge Turpin.

When he learns from his former landlady, Mrs Lovett, that his wife poisoned herself after being raped by the judge he vows revenge. In his anger, Sweeney goes on a murderous rampage, initially directed towards Judge Turpin and his manof-business, Beadle Bamford. His rage then spills rapidly out of control into a rampage on all of London.

With the help of Mrs Lovett, he opens a barber shop into which he lures his victims with a charming smile before casually ending their lives with a flick of his razor across their necks.

Mrs Lovett, who has amorous intentions towards Sweeney, persuades him that it would be 'such a terrible waste' to just 'bury the bodies' and so comes up with the even more diabolical plan, suggesting that Sweeny's victims be recycled into meat pies, thereby elevating her pie shop, from what was once known for serving the 'worst pies in London' to the most frequented new eatery in Fleet Street.

But not one man, nor ten thousand men killed, can satisfy Sweeney's lust for vengeance on those who've caused his years of pain.

This brilliant Operetta is both hilarious and horrifying! Sondheim's original intention was to create something for LIVE THEATRE that would have the same shocking impact on audiences as a HORROR FILM. His clever combination of wit, wickedness and wisdom makes this story a must for those who like their theatre intelligent and edgy!

A Brief History of the Show

Sweeney Todd (aka the Demon Barber) was a character from a 19th Century penny dreadful. He first appeared in 1846 as a secondary character in a short story called *The String of Pearls - A Romance* by Thomas Prest, which was published in The People's Periodical. A hack playwright by the name of George Dibdin Pitt, who commonly filched other people's stories, dramatised the story for the stage as *The String of Pearls -The Fiend on Fleet Street*, and advertised it as 'founded on fact'. The play debuted at London's Hoxton Theatre on 1 March, 1847, and ever since then people have speculated as to whether Sweeney Todd really had existed, or if he was simply a fictional bogeyman invented to sate the appetite of the morbid Victorian imagination.

Did Sweeney Todd really exist? Up until recently, nobody knew. A number of daily newspapers at the time had reported real-life horror stories that bore certain similarity to the ghastly tale of Sweeney Todd. Stories of fainting ladies aside, the Victorian community had an enormous, morbid appetite for all things ghastly. Shocking tales of crime like this would have been spread through word of mouth like wildfire, although they were also probably embellished along the way. Many penny dreadfuls were actually fictionalised accounts of real stories. It was known that Thomas Prest, who first wrote about Sweeney Todd, had the habit of scouring newspapers for story ideas. However, these were just written off by most as a story to scare bad children and to thrill audiences.

All of this changed when British author Peter Haining recently revealed, through painstaking research, that there was once a psychopathic barber named Sweeney Todd who lived in the 19th Century and who did actually murder his customers for money, although his tale is somewhat less exciting than Sondheim's musical. Unlike the Sondheim/Prest dramatised character, Sweeney Todd was simply an amoral, bitter man who was not adverse to killing for money.

Man or myth, one thing is for sure - the tale of Sweeney Todd, the Demon Barber, is not likely to be forgotten anytime soon.



Director - Carol Della Barca



Carol Della Barca began her career in the theatre as a child watching and learning from her Father, Paul Person and his Auckland Opera Company, Perkel Productions.

She continued her involvement in the theatre through her teens and then on into her early 20's when she took on her first ever production as a 'Director'.

Twenty-two years later, with 20 musicals under her belt, she remains passionate about the Theatre and her role as a Director.

Carol is a visionary person who has a unique style when it comes to interpreting and staging a major production. She paints with broad strokes, has a way of bringing out the guts of a story and always finds the heart. Her tireless belief in all who work alongside her makes her fun to work with and a wonderful mentor for the younger members of the cast.

Carol's vision for this production was to bring you believable, fallible characters with whom you will empathise - even as you are horrified by their actions.

Musical Director - Michael Joel



Michael's conducting training began at Otago University where he completed an Honours degree in conducting. He has taken part in several Masterclasses with such conductors as Heinz Wahlberg, James Judd, and Miguel Harth-Bedoya and has lessons with Jac van Steen in The Netherlands. He has also attended the Dartington International Summer School in England.

He has conducted many of the established orchestras and choirs throughout New Zealand and is equally at home in the orchestral, choral and operatic repertoire. He has worked with the Christchurch Symphony, the Southern Sinfonia, St Matthew's Chamber Orchestra, Opera Otago, the City of Dunedin Choir and the National Youth Orchestra.

From 2003 until 2006 Michael was on the permanent staff of Canterbury Opera (now Southern Opera) as Music and Development Officer, Chorus Master and Assistant Conductor. In 2003 he conducted performances of Canterbury Opera's productions of *Lakme* and *La Traviata*. In 2004 he conducted the New Zealand premiere season of *Count Ory*, and early in 2005 he conducted the 'work in progress' performance of Jonathan Besser's new opera, commissioned by Canterbury Opera. He arranged and conducted Dvorak's *Rusalka* for a run of sold-out performances by Canterbury Opera Youth in April 2006.

In August 2006 he conducted an enthusiastically received and successful production of *Die Fledermaus* for Opera Hawke's Bay. In 2009 he conducted concerts with renowned flute soloist, Alexa Still and the Hawke's Bay Orchestra, and piano soloist Catherine McKay and the Wellington Chamber Orchestra.

2011 is a busy year for him. As well as this production of Sweeney Todd for Opera Hawke's Bay, he will be working with the St Matthew's Chamber Orchestra in Auckland, the Kapiti Concert Orchestra and the Wellington Chamber Orchestra.



Sweeney Todd - James McCaffrey
