

Dick Johnstone

One of New Zealand's foremost theatre and opera directors of the 1960's and 1970's returns after almost 12 years in the field of social work with this production of Me and My Girl for Napier Operatic in his home town.

His 19 year professional career covered 200 productions ranging from rock to grand opera and from contemporary plays to Shakespeare. Versatility, vitality, style and innovation were his trademarks.

His first production at the age of 21, while he was choreographer for TVNZ, won Auckland's award for best production. After five years as director of Wellington's Downstage theatre he toured the Soviet Union with his production for the Maori Theatre Trust.

In the next decade he was a regular guest director with the Volksoper in Vienna, the Royal Court Theatre in London, the Festival de Firenze,

the Amikov Theatre in Kiev, the Australian Opera Company, the Mercury and New Independent Theatres in Auckland, the Court Theatre in Christchurch, Southern Players in Dunedin and opera companies throughout New Zealand.

Focusing on Maori work he directed the Waitangi Day Pageant in 1973 and the South Pacific Arts Festival hosted by New Zealand in 1976. His OBE was awarded for services to New Zealand Theatre.

Barry Fell

Born and educated in Hamilton Barry also studied piano, singing and violin. In his time in Napier he has been much involved with music in secondary schools and taught at Colenso High School as Head of Music and then as Senior Master. He is an adjudicator for various competitions societies throughout the country, is on the panel of accompanists for broadcasting and is a music critic for the Hawke's Bay "Herald Tribune".

His first involvement with operatic productions came in 1964 when he was chorus master for Hamilton operatics 50th Jubilee production of "Belle of New York". He has been musical director for a number of productions for the Hawke's Bay Song and Opera Workshop.

For Napier Operatic Society he was musical director for our Centennial production of "The Sorcerer", for "Oliver" in 1988 and most recently for "Tom Jones", in March of this year.



Briar Horrocks

Briar first started dancing at 8 following on to part-time teaching at 13 and then full-time on leaving school.

She was winner of the first ever choreographic competition held in New Zealand, in 1978, and her work was performed in 1980 by the New Zealand Ballet Company.

She has had her own Dance Theatre Company performing in Hastings and has been involved in many productions as dancer and/or Choreographer.

We are delighted to have Briar as our choreographer following her successes over the last two years with our productions of "Grease" and "Evita". Once again we see the proof of her talents, expertise and versatility.

Me and My Girl

Do you remember The Lambeth Walk? Goodness you must be old! That was 1938!

The dourness of the late Victorian era gave way to Edwardian gaiety and then the frenetic hilarity of the 1920's.

Toward the end of the next decade the joy soured with the preliminary fears leading up to a second world war. The western world was ready for escapist theatre with catchy songs and dances.

Along came "Me and My Girl" with its show-stopping Lambeth Walk and a cockney male Cinderella played by the comic star Lupino Lane.

The composer Noel Gay was credited with three dozen major hits between 1928 and his death in 1954. The author L. Arthur Rose was an actor turned writer with eighty West End productions The lyricist Douglas Furber contributed to more than seventy West End shows and his hits included "The Bells of St Mary's" and "Limehouse Blues".

This talented trio presented the perennial conflict between the upper class of England — the titled and landed gentry — and the lower class — personified here by the glowing raucous cockneys of London.

What does happen when a loud young cockney lad inherits a title, a mansion and accompanying millions?

Maria, Duchess of Dene and her eccentric family and staff soon find out, with help from young Bill from Lambeth and his cockney sparrow girlfriend Sally.


Yes, "Me and My Girl" was a sellout pre-war success.

Then somewhere in the middle of this century the full scores and scripts of the show were lost. Ten years ago Noel Gay's son Richard Armitage pieced together fragments and, with the help of collaborators with long memories, a rivival of "Me and My Girl" burst onto the West End in 1985. It was a hit all over again.

So here it is — Lambeth Walk and all. Enjoy the show, tap your feet and if you want to join in the dancing please sit near the aisle.

Robert Hickey as Bill

Rob was born and bred in Napier and educated at Colenso High School. He attended Palmerston North Teachers College where he performed in and directed a number of shows.

His first show with The Napier Operatic Society was a Music Hall in 1981 and since then he has performed in the Society's productions of "Chicago", "Ginger Bread Man" and "Fantastics". He has also directed two Music Halls for the Society, "Grease" in 1989 and the very successful "Evita" in 1990.

Other Hawke's Bay Society's have had the benefits of Rob's performances and direction but The Napier Operatic Society is his home. His future as a director and performer at the ripe old age of 28 looks very good indeed.





Joanne Stevens as Sally

Joanne's first appearance with the Napier Operatic Society was in "Sound of Music". She appeared in the chorus of "The Great Waltz" and in "Music Hall 1980". She has performed with Hastings Musical Comedy Co, Wellington Operatic Society and Wellington Repertory.

June retired a few years ago but was co-erced to audition for "Me and My Girl", for which the Napier Operatic Society is truly grateful.

Neville has been heavily involved with the Napier Repertory Theatre for more than 30 years. He has had lead roles in many of their productions, spent many years as president and is now their patron.

He appeared in Napier Operatic Society's production of "The Fantastiks" in 1990. His last appearance on stage at the Municipal Theatre was in "Romeo and Juliet" in the 1960's, directed by Dick Johnstone. Neville is delighted to be working with Dick once again.






Jan Gare as Jacqui




Bill Dalton as Gerald






